Law Shoots Man; **Town Up in Arms**

Highway Patrolmen and a Texas Ranger have been patrolling rville streets since Sheriff Ben Lee shot a man to death here last Saturday.

Lee said today he shot Tom Bill Fatherstone, 29, during a scuffle while trying to arrest the heavily-built man "for disturbing the "for disturbing the peace and being drunk."

"The patrolmen and the ranger came at my request and as a result of threats made against me," the sheriff said. "They're not here right now. The patrol-men went to attend the Governor's funeral. But they'll be

Lee said Fatherstone had a police record and two years ago was indicted on assault charges after the beating of former County Attorney Lamar Palmer.

"Saturday afternoon I was driving down the main street here when Fatherstone hollered at me and cursed me, telling me to come and get him." Lee related.

"I tried to arrest him. He attempted several times to take my gun away from me. I shot twice. The first time I missed Fatherstone, but two bystanders were hit. second time I got Fatherstone in the right chest."

The bystanders were Wondell Bell, about 27, hit in the arm. and Jamie Craig, about 40, hit in the leg. Lee said neither was seriously hurt. Lee said he called an ambulance and a doctor to treat Fatherstone but that the latter died enroute to a hospital. After the shooting. Lee said, he learned of threats against his life and called upon the Highway Patrol and the Ranger. He said **Red Press** they have been patrolling Center-ville since the shooting.

"No threats have been made to my face, but I have learned of Strikes Back m. I think the whole thing has about simmered down by now, though.'





State Health Officer George Cox says "the finger of polio is probing deeper and deeper into the corners of Texas."

The State Health Department reported yesterday the highest number of polio cases ever listed in a single week. The record total, 121, was for the week ending last Saturday. Eleven counties reported polio cases for the first time.

The Harris County chairman of the National Polio Foundation, W. Stewart Boyle, said at Houston the county's polio situation is "definitely getting worse."

"It has done so in the past 10 days," he said. "Since last Friday, we have had 16 new cases in Harris County.'

Four polio patients were admitted yesterday and the day before at San Angelo Hospitals. Nine were dismissed during the same period, but four were sent to the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation for further treatment.

Fort Worth reported four new cases were brought there yesterday.

Two new cases were reported at Dallas and two at Wichita Falls.

Denton and Bryan each reported one new case. Both patients were sent to Fort Worth for treatment.

Last week was the second week in a row polio had set a new record in Texas. The week before the total was 118 new cases.

"Strict basic sanitation is the thing most needed to control this thing," said Dr. Cox.

He said the health department's figures on deaths go only through May. Through that month, 37 had died, compared with 36 during the same period last year.

The health department director said the most likely theory is that polio is a gastro-intestinal infection.

"This means that filth-fly and other loathsome insect breeding places in particular-must be cleaned up," he said.

WASHINGTON-(AP)- Funds set up for the Southwestern Power Administration by the House were trimmed more than half by the Senate Appropriations Committee. The SPA's operations include Texas, Arkansas, Oklahoma and Missouri.

Reporting the Interior Depart-ment appropriations bill for the current fiscal year, the committee recommended only \$1,616,115 in cash and \$2,257,905 in contract authority for SPA.

The House in passing the in-terior bill had allowed four milion dollars cash and five million in contract authority for expan-sion of SPA's power distribution

system. In its report, the committee said that private utility companies operating in the area of the Southwestern Power Administration had agreed to make their transmission systems available to the government for carrying power from government owned transmission lines to preferred customers of the government.
