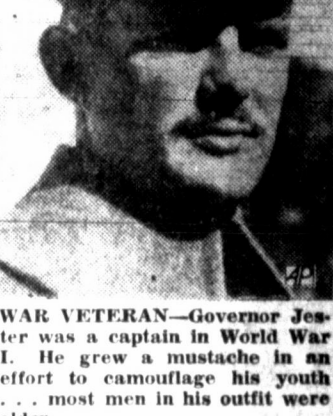

Paint Can Light Up the Darkest Bedroom Tonight

WASHINGTON — Fireflies, the will-o'-the-wisp of fiction, the gleam of phosphorescence beneath the surface of the sea... all have a quality that intrigues one mightily. With the various luminous coatings that are available these days, such mysterious radiance can be brought right into the home and used to advantage. When employed in sleeping quarters, for instance, it is a safeguard against grazed shins, jects rather than residential, chipped in \$7,300,095 of the \$17,711,707 total for non-residential work. Underneath Window Best For Convector

Proper placement of convector-radiators is important for maximum comfort in new homes. Best location is under windows to offset heat loss and eliminate cold spots at these points. Where there are several windows in a room, it is advisable to place convector under the window subjected to the most severe exposure based on prevailing winds — usually northern or western. In rooms where windows extend almost to the floor line, without space for beneath-window installation, convectors should be placed alongside or at points next to outside walls parallel to, or at right angles to the windows. This will take advantage of natural convection and, at the same time, cold air at the floor level will be quickly drawn into the convector, and heated.

Avoid Bargain Basement for Heat Systems

To provide greater floor area in small homes, plan to install convector-radiators as recessed units in the walls. Under-window installation is recommended if possible. "Wet heat" heating systems include both steam and hot water systems. Although slightly higher in original cost, they are long-lived than other systems, and require less maintenance and repair. Convector heating represents the most economical means of enjoying the many benefits of hot water or steam heating, according to leading heating engineers. Replacement of old heating units with modern convector-radiators usually is a simple and inexpensive means of quick modernization. Convectors are light in weight, and easy to install. They weigh only about one-fourth as much as conventional cast iron radiators.

Play Room Tonic for Home Health

A home, doctors say, should offer every opportunity for normal family life. That means that there should be at least one room in the house where music, games and conversation may be enjoyed without encroaching on the privacy of those who are not participating. Almost any home which has an unfinished basement or an unused attic can have a recreation room within the owner's budget. For example, insulating board can be applied directly to ceiling joists, over old wall surfaces or to a simple framework made of two-by-fours. It serves both as a building material and as an insulation. Wood sheathing applied diagonally to the sides of a house about eight times as strong as horizontal sheathing.

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broken toes and black eyes. It can also protect the other occupants of the bedroom from the annoyance of broken glass being caused by snapping of lights. Luminous paints, which glow for approximately six to eight hours after they have been "charged" by natural or artificial light, are easily applied. They come in several different tints, such as light green, pale yellow and oyster white. Brushed onto furniture which has been enameled in a similar color, they can be visually unobtrusive during daylight hours, if need be. There are several special tricks to applying the luminous material. Stir the paint thoroughly before beginning and brush on at least two coats. New surfaces should be primed and ones that have been previously coated with a product containing lead should be given an enamel undercoat. In a bedroom, the thoughtful and well-planned allocation of phosphorescent coatings can be both helpful and interesting. In addition to marking the furniture at strategic points, a trick is to use a luminous dial on the clock face, a flashlight with a luminous case, and slippers with luminous markings which make it possible to find them easily in the dark can be had. One of the most important surfaces to which luminous paint can be applied is the edge of a door. Left ajar frequently, doors can prove real collision hazards, and broken toes, as well as "authentic" black eyes can result. A luminous vertical stripe along the edge of the door frame can also serve as a guiding light. A narrow stripe along the edge of the window sill facilitates the opening or closing of a window during the night hours. Stripes along the edges of bureaus, night stands, dressing tables and benches are also effective. Phones can be painted if it is permissible. If not, the plastic cases available to cover phones can be so treated. And, as a guide, when one really wishes to win, the lights, a stripe of the luminous paint onto the lower edges of the bedside lamp-shades... as well as onto the light switch plates in both bedroom and bathroom can be painted. In one room where luminous coatings were carefully applied to the room's occupants, walls were painted terra cotta, while the furniture was enameled an oyster white which closely matched the color of the phosphorescent paint. The decorative pattern of the draperies, the upholstery of the dressing table bench, as well as two floral prints at the head of the bed suggested the beauty and tranquility of the South Pacific, while glints of flame color, blue-violet, pale green and off-white in both the fabric and the prints gave added beauty to the rosy tone of the walls and the cinnamon rug.

STORM WINDOW CARE
Before storing storm windows, examine them for loose putty and peeling paint and repair the damage before putting away. Store the sashes perfectly flat to prevent warping; better yet, hand them up in a dry place so air can circulate around them.

In rooms where windows are unusually long or narrow, convectors should be located so that even heat distribution is secured in all parts of the room. It is often advisable to use two convectors of small or medium size in such cases, rather than one large unit.

bedroom may be just the right idea for fixing yours. Two opposite walls of the room were painted sapphire blue, the other two in misty gray. The white-lacquered bed, placed against one of the blue walls, was matched with white stands at either side. Blue woodwork, slightly darker than the walls, a pale blue ceiling, and a gray floor, completed the background. A touch of cerise in the upholstery and hangings was an effective color point-up.

Dollars can be saved by re-furnishing odd or outmoded pieces of furniture when you ship to them. There are all sorts of color combinations you can use to transform old furniture. A smart choice depends upon the color scheme of the room and the liveliness of your imagination.

Where limited wall space does not permit conventional installation, convector-radiators can be built into furniture or cabinet work in new homes. In planning furniture arrangement in rooms of the new home, be sure that the heating units selected are not an obstacle. With most of the new units, notably the new convector-radiators, furniture can be placed close to the units without danger of drying wood, finish or fabric. Where frequent cleaning of the floor beneath the heating units is required, convector-radiators of the wall-hung type are advisable. These convectors are fastened to the wall, instead of standing on the floor. wall-hung convectors are especially recommended for use in offices, commercial buildings and institutions such as schools and hospitals where daily cleaning of floors is required. An attractive feature of the new convectors is the damper which permits manual control of individual units. By operating the damper, heat may be modulated to the exact requirements of individual rooms. This is especially desirable in bedrooms, where the damper, heat may be modulated to shut off the heat, without affecting temperatures in other rooms of the house. In selecting the heating system for the new home, don't be misled by low original cost quotations. Look into the life span performances of comparable types of systems, compare repair and maintenance costs, space requirements and comfort insurance. Too often, low first cost means mounting costs over the life of the system. Consult a reliable heating contractor.

Boreome Colors Not Necessary In Decoration

WASHINGTON—Decorating the home artistically or shoeing it is a challenge to ingenuity and can really be more exciting than planning with an unlimited budget. To achieve a distinctive room, despite penny-pinching, brings a thrilling glow of personal satisfaction.

For basic guidance and spur to the imagination, here are some suggestions on using interior finishes for economic styling.

Perhaps at the moment, your problem concerns the floors in some of the rooms of your home. You expect eventually to have carpets for the whole house, let's say, but your present budget won't stretch that far. If the floors are hardwood, you will probably want to finish with shellac or varnish. But if they are of softwood, you may wish to employ floor enamel to supply decorative color as well as protection. If the walls are painted in a silvery gray, for instance, a rich, red floor would provide your color accent. With brighter walls, such as creamy yellow, deep green is admirable. When selecting the enamel, be sure that you get the kind intended especially for floors as these finishes are made with the toughness and elasticity to withstand hard wear from constant traffic. Wax all your floors regularly so they will be easy to keep clean.

If you have a wallpapered room which is dreary because the paper is faded, the emulsion type of paints offer an economical means of hiding faded or dingy wallpaper with cheerful colors. These paints come in paste form and are thinned with water. A single coat is usually sufficient, saving the expense of applying primers and undercoats. Make sure, before application is begun, that the paper adheres firmly to the wall. Drying takes only about an hour, allowing a room to be decorated in the morning and made livable again by night-fall. The finish is suitable also for plaster and for virtually any painted or unpainted interior wall surface except glazed tile. The color range is wide and standard colors can be intermixed to provide a variety of hues and tints. Cutting expenses doesn't mean that you have to put up with dull, monotonous color schemes. Inexpensive ways to add accent are legion. It costs little or no more to get stimulating contrasts by painting the woodwork a different color from the wall, or by using two wall colors. Beige, ivory, or white walls gain character when set off by bright woodwork, which may be coral, chartreuse yellow, hyacinth blue, or the dominating color of your furnishings.

In contrasting wall colors, a scheme developed for a lovely Sing Sing prison received its name from Indian words meaning "a stony place."

DiMag, an honorary appointee by Boudreau, has captured the attention of the fans throughout the nation with his electrifying performances since his return to the lineup.

With or without Joe in the starting lineup, the proud American Leaguers ruled a 5-7 favorite in an All-Star contest a year ago. They carried a three-game winning streak into the game, and it is expected that the American part will be saved for the finishing act after games of July 4 and 5.

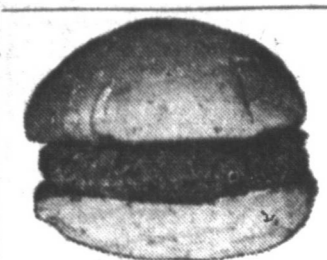

Doyle, as of the past month, has been assisted by his brother "Doc" Clanton, formerly of Dallas. Both have had experience plus in barbecuing—thus the taste treats that result. Sale of Pipeline Is Announced By WAA

WASHINGTON (AP) — The War Assets Administration announced today approval of sale of the southern portion of the Southwestern emergency pipeline in Texas to the Southwestern Independent Gas Pipeline Company of Houston, for \$278,000 cash. Built during the war by the petroleum administrator for war, the line was used to bring crude oil from fields in South and Southwest Texas to refineries in the Houston area, and to the terminus of the Big-Inch pipeline for transportation to the East. The WAA placed a fair value of \$272,000 on the 108-mile portion approved for sale. The company previously had acquired the northern portion of the pipeline and had been operating the southern portion under lease.
