You show a lot of character in your desire to make a good impression at your first wedding. Yes, there are many things you ought to know. A wedding is indeed a serious matter.

Naturally, my boy, there are a few business details. And it is better that they be arranged in advance so that there will be no hard feelings afterward.

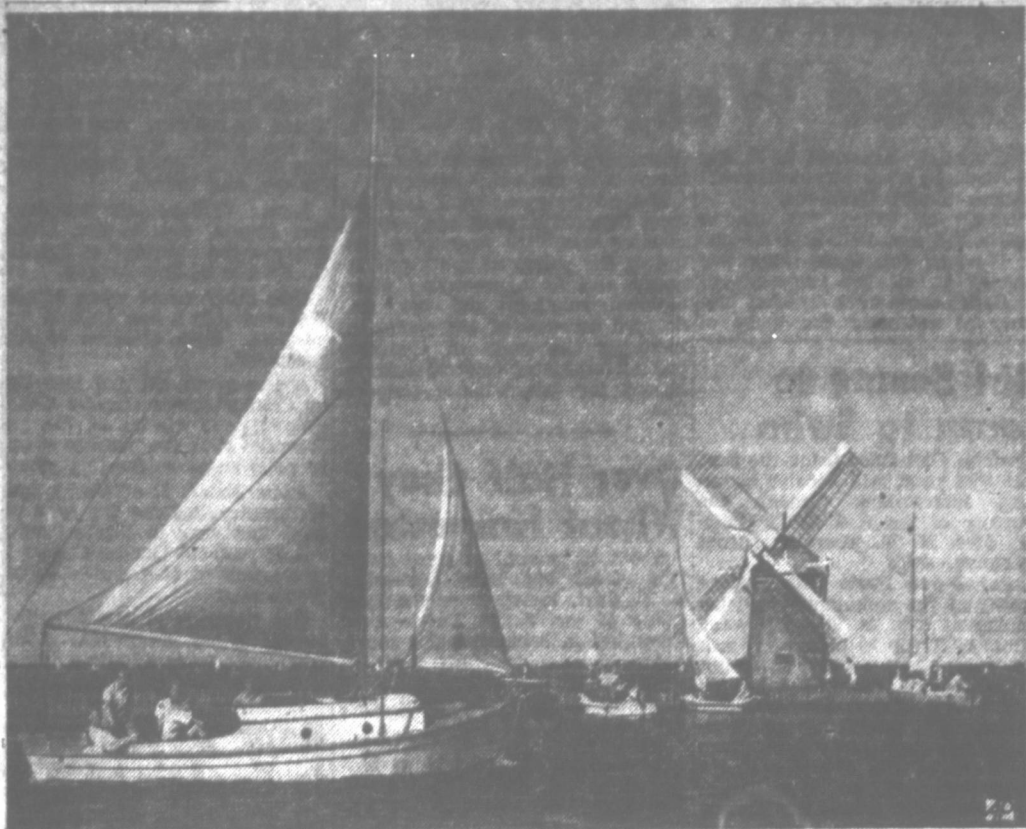

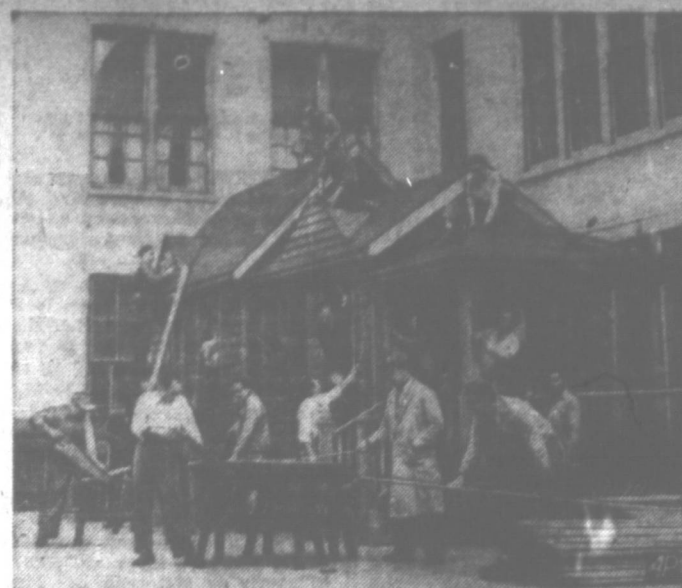
They came up with some pointers to the 1,000 white collar girls here for the National Secretaries' Association convention.

290 Funerals Expected by Monday

CHICAGO — (AP) — The National Safety Council estimated today that 290 Americans will die in traffic accidents during the three-day Fourth of July celebration.

Foreign-Trade Zone to Open

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Commerce Department has indicated in a report to Congress that the first inland foreign-trade zone in the United States may be opened in San Antonio, Texas.

The inland zone would serve as an added incentive to commerce between the United States and Mexico and probably other Latin-American countries, the Foreign-Trade Zone Board report said.

It added that if established the zone also would be the first located at an airport and the first to be operated by a private concern.

The board said a private ware-

housing firm was involved but did not identify it.

A foreign-trade zone is an area set aside at a port of entry where foreign merchandise may be landed without passing through customs. This merchandise may then be put through certain processes and reshipped abroad without paying U. S. duty. However, the importer must comply with customs regulations and pay duty when the merchandise is moved on U. S. soil outside the zone.

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Reciprocal Trade Agreements Act dies tonight—at least for a time—because Congress failed to pass it.

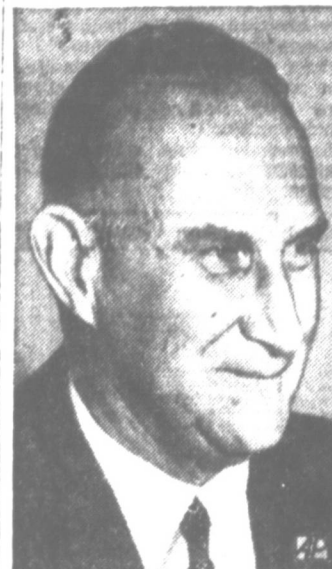

Million Left to Medical Trust

DALLAS — (AP) — Dr. David Graham Hall, a shy little benefactor who went about doing good deeds in patched shirts and secondhand suits, has left nearly \$1,000,000 to a medical trust.

Some \$300,000 had been given to the David Graham Hall Foundation established here in 1940. The remaining \$700,000 is in real estate. Director R. F. Voyer of the foundation said these holdings also would be added to the foundation's capitalization.

Glass Collectors Crash Top 10 in Hobby List

NEW YORK (NEA)—During the years of war and reconstruction, one thing America really recovered was its hobby habits. The first survey of hobbies since 1941, just completed by the American Hobby Federation, shows that, of the top 10 hobbies, seven are new to the list. Collecting stamps remains number one, but the runner-up, collecting American glassware, is a newcomer. Third and fourth positions also go to hobbies that just crashed the list, woodworking and model-making. This survey, which took one year to complete and was made by polling over 22,000 American hobby clubs, showed that only collectible stamps, dolls and coins survived from the 1941 study. Other newcomers are collecting autographs and miniatures, and painting and needlework. Old-established favorites that dropped out through the last eight years are: collections of books, buttons, arrow-heads and post-cards, and cooking, model trains and the amateur naturalists—botany and insect collectors. Biggest jumps were made by glass lovers, who usually specialize in things like collecting five-foot-tall vases or ruby-colored celery holders, and the woodworkers, who make useful things like toothbrush stands and magazine racks. In 1941, the glass people ranked 18th and the saw-and-hammer boys were down in the second 25. A young wife's most anxious moment, says a writer, is when she bakes her first cake. And her husband's, when he eats a slice. With the picnic season here and shoggers biting again, it's going to be a lot harder to get out of the red.

Just What Will Happen to T-H Law Isn't Very Good Betting Material

By JAMES MARLOW
 WASHINGTON — (AP) — Don't bet on what's going to happen to the Taft-Hartley Labor Act in Congress.
 That's because things are scrambled there, where the Democrats are supposed to be in control because they have a majority.
 It's a rickety kind of control. Just review a little history so that what's happening will be clear.
 In 1935, when the Democrats had a majority in Congress and were really able to run the show, they passed the Wagner Labor Act.
 The Wagner Act compelled a boss to bargain with a union representing his employees. It put no restrictions on a union.
 Employers, who looked on this as a one-sided law, never got used to it. But it stayed on the books until 1947.
 In that year the Republicans got control of Congress with a majority.
 They replaced the Wagner Act with the Taft-Hartley Act. Now it was the turn of the unions to scream because:
 While T-H put a few more restrictions on employers it put more restrictions on unions than they ever had before.

That was one of the big talking points for President Truman in last fall's elections.
 They promised, backed by labor, that if they won control of Congress they'd wipe out T-H and restore the old Wagner Act. They won.
 So they started this 81st Congress in January with a majority. Hearings on a new labor bill went on for months. Finally the House, where the Democrats have a majority, called it up for action.
 But the Democrats—particularly the Southern Democrats—were not all willing to tag along with Mr. Truman's campaign promises. This was duck soup for the Republicans who wanted to keep T-H.
 So the Truman Democrats weren't able to ram through the old Wagner Act in place of T-H. Finally,
 The bill was sent back to the House Labor Committee for further study. This prevented a final vote on the floor.
 A couple of weeks ago, the Senate, where the Democrats also have a majority, called up the labor bill for action.
 The Truman Democrats haven't been doing so well there, either. For they always lack control when the Southern Democrats shift

over to join hands with the Republicans.
 They've done that in the pinches, so the Southern Democrats and Republicans gradually are reshaping the kind of labor bill they want, not the kind the Trumanites promised. But—
 Why should that happen? For one thing, the Republicans might vote for doing that, since they want T-H to stand on the books anyway. And it will stand, if no new law is passed to change it.
 And the Trumanites might be willing to do that, also, since a new law anything like T-H would be a defeat for them.
 If they could put the whole business in mothballs now, they might be able to try again to get what they want next year. If they failed in that, they could make it a campaign issue in the 1950 elections.
 Even if the Senate passes a bill, it can't become law unless the House also approves and the President signs it.

Humble Files Court Appeal

AUSTIN — (AP) — The Humble Oil & Refining Co. filed a direct appeal in the Supreme Court Wednesday asking a permanent injunction against the Railroad Commission.
 The oil company wants the Court to stop the commission from ever enforcing a shutdown order for the Tijerina-Canales-Bucher Oil Field in Jim Wells and Kleberg Counties for alleged wasteful flaring of gas.
 The commission ordered the field shut down last November. A Travis County District Court issued a temporary restraining order against the commission but the order was dissolved by the Court of Civil Appeals.
 Now the oil company wants the appellate court's judgment reversed. Humble says that the King Ranch gas injection plant, a \$2,000,000 project, was completed March 31, 1949, and handles all gas from the Stratton, Borregan, Seeligson and Tijerina-Canales-

Bucher Fields. However, in case of a mechanical failure at the plant the company is forced to flare some gas, the appeal contends.

BERLIN — (NEA) — The Berlin blockade has been lifted, but RIAS — America's "information air lift" into Soviet Germany — is going to start working harder than ever in a few weeks.

RIAS—Radio in the American Sector—has been the most effective U. S. radio weapon in the cold war. Last month it appeared in danger of being silenced for lack of funds, since the American Military Government's budget was trimmed.

Now, however, its \$4,600,000 annual operation cost will be supplied, at least temporarily, from money charged against German occupation costs, and on June 15 its power was stepped up from 20,000 watts to 100,000 watts.

From the Mediterranean to the Baltic, RIAS has had a far-reaching effect. It broadcasts on mid-wave length, which can be heard by more Iron Curtain listeners than can short wave, and even at 20,000 watts, its voice has irritated the Yugoslavs 1000 miles away. They have protested that it interferes with Communist-controlled Radio Belgrade.

Mostly, however, it transmits American-flavored programs into eastern Germany in competition with Soviet-controlled Radio Berlin. During the blockade, polls showed that 80 percent of Berlin's listening public tune in to RIAS at any given time.

Voice of America programs are relayed over RIAS, but its main attraction is its own programs, designed to combat the Russians in their own back yard. Such features as "Berlin's Fred Allen" and the dramatization of the book

"Animal Farm," a satire on Communism, have brought continual protests from the Russians, who have arrested at least one RIAS employe who went into the Red zone for broadcast material.

More than 12,000 letters a month pour into RIAS headquarters from listeners, most of them from people in the Soviet zone of Germany. Such letters, if picked up by the Russians, would mean certain arrest, so they are smuggled out or delivered in person.

During the blockade, when power was rationed in the western sectors, RIAS loudspeaker cars toured the streets to give Berliners current news broadcasts.

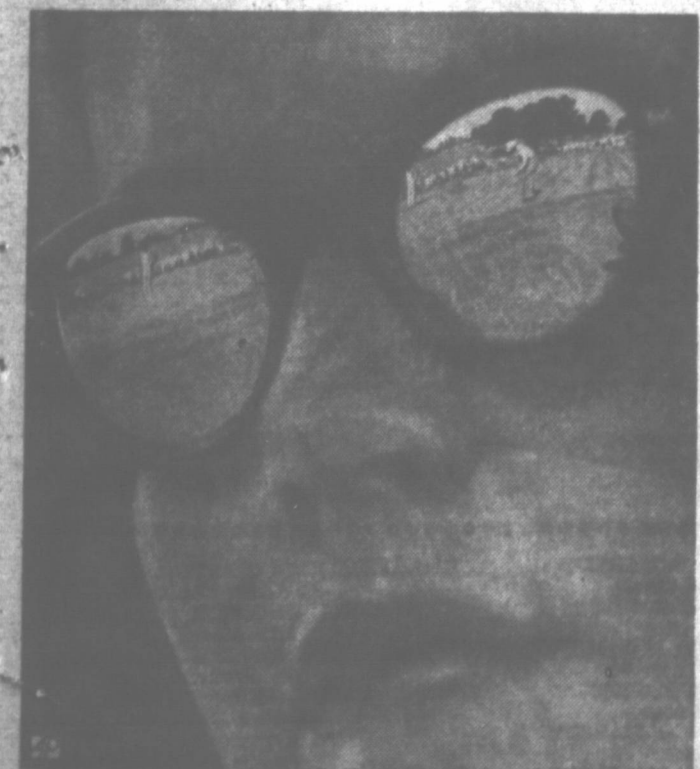

Texas Plans to Develop Her Children and Youth

By MANTHA COLE
AUSTIN — (AP) — The state's plan to develop its most precious resource—its children and youth—received final legislative approval Wednesday.

It provides for a Youth Development Council to coordinate the state departments in helping communities develop and strengthen all child services and prevent delinquency.

The Senate adopted a conference committee report on the plan Wednesday.

The vote was 25 to 1. The House approved it Tuesday.

The plan would bring under the youth council all the state functions relating to child services and rehabilitation of delinquent children.

State orphanages, however, are left outside the council.

Main provisions of the bill: 1. Creation of a state youth development council of 14 members—six to be influential citizens appointed by the Governor and eight to be heads of state departments whose work concerns youth.

2. Establishment of a state youth diagnostic center. Local courts may commit children to the council. The children will be examined and studied to help determine their needs. No child shall be committed to a state training school until he has been examined by the center.

3. Operation of the state's three training schools for delinquent children is turned over to the council.

It is given \$137,000 a year for its operation and maintenance of the diagnostic center. Funds for the training schools are made in another appropriation.

The eight state officers on the board are the heads of the Board of Control, State Health Department and the Department of Public Safety, the commissioner of education, the executive secretary of the State Parks Board, chairman of the Texas Employment Commission and the executive director of state hospitals and special schools.

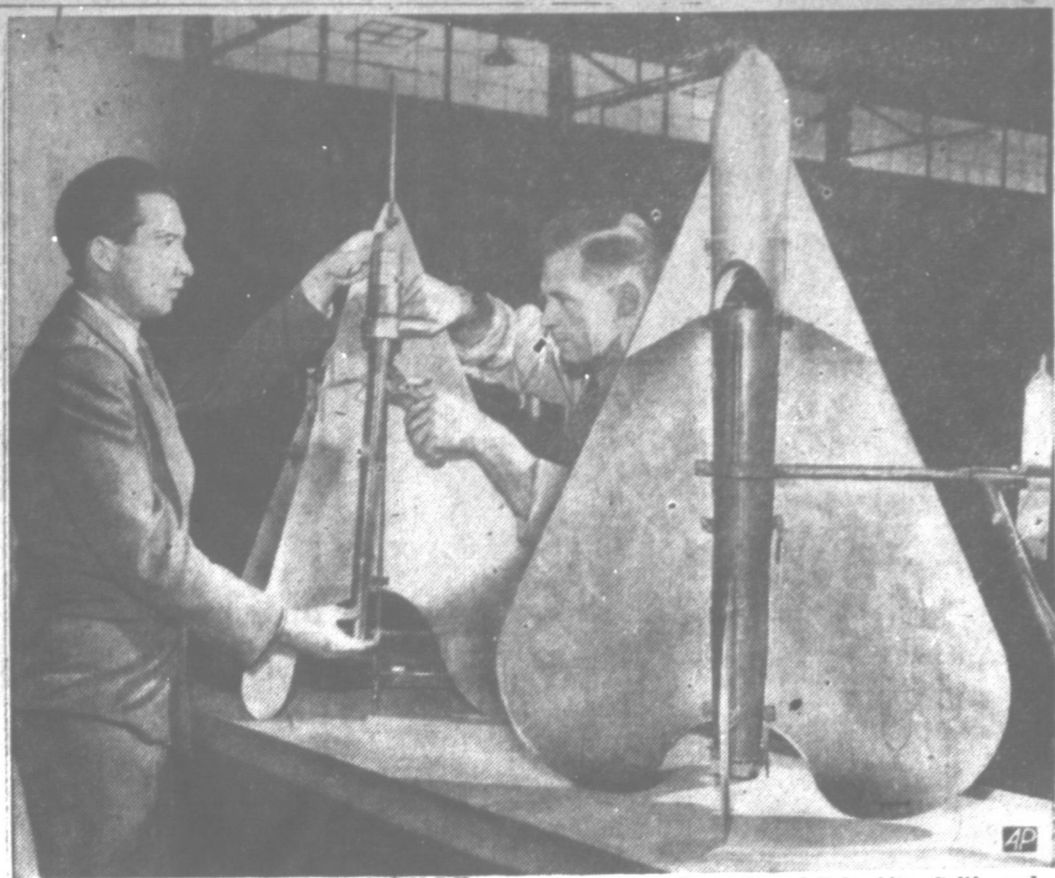

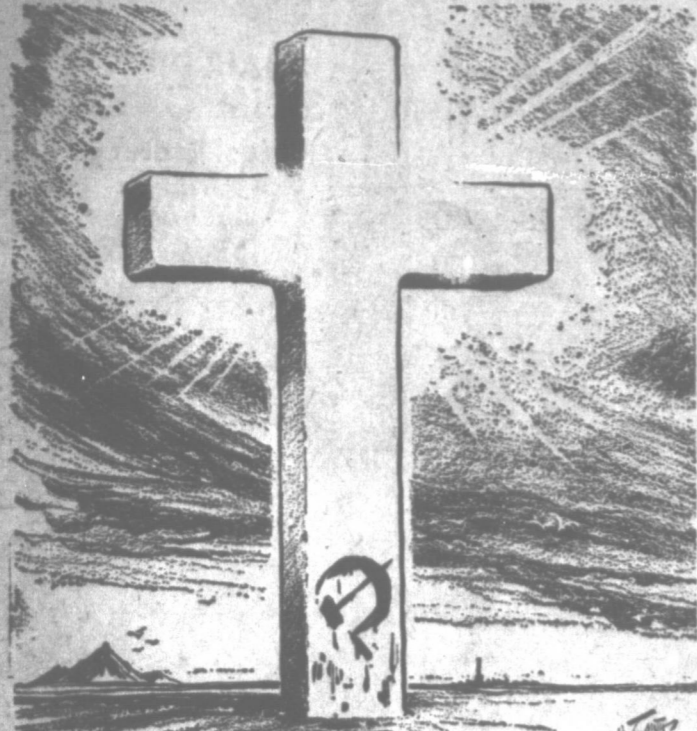

Winds and Hail Damage Wheat

AUSTIN —(AP)—High winds and hail caused only local damage to wheat in limited areas of the High Plains last week, the U. S. Department of Agriculture reported. Cotton was reported fruiting over most of the east half of the state northward to the Oklahoma line. Corn continued in excellent condition and most commercial vegetables were improved by good growing weather, the USDA reported. The 1949 spring pig crop in the state totaled 1,248,000 head—one percent above the 1948 spring crop but still seven percent below the 1938-47 average, the USDA reported.

Montgomery Ward Lists Reductions

CHICAGO —(AP)—The fall and winter catalogue issued by Montgomery Ward and Company, officials said yesterday, contains the most extensive price reductions since 1938. Officials of the mail order house said reductions, as compared with last fall's catalogue, included women's and misses coats and dresses down 4 to 39 percent; furniture 10 to 15 percent; radios 10 to 20 percent; auto batteries 15 to 25 percent; and men's work clothing 2 1/2 to 20 percent. Also marked down were several building material items. These include oak flooring, down 29 percent; kitchen cabinets, 21 percent; shingles, 12 percent; and paint, 15 percent.

Leaves From a Correspondent's Life Notebook

NEW YORK (AP)—Oh, I tell you New York is a wonderful town.

It must be fine or there wouldn't be so many people crowded here together to enjoy it.

It's really a terrible place to visit or die in, but a grand town to live in. For here the poor man has courage, and fights for his rights. He's as good as a millionaire any day, and he'll stay up all night to tell you why. Yes, rich or poor, you're just another number here. And sometimes it's pleasant to wonder whether you're 8,675,341 or maybe 1,435,768. Who cares?

There is one thing sure: you can never be Mr. Number One. Because nobody is big enough to be really important on this \$24 island. You have to belong to it—it can never belong to you. This is a man's town, and it's cut for size. It has outgrown everybody who ever lived in it—and it's still growing.

And the people who live in it are growing, too. The fat-voiced tourists come here and look around and shake their heads and leave again, saying, "after all, New York City isn't America."

But New York City is America, and there is no town more American. Because here people are really working toward the kind of democracy the rest of the country reads about in high school civics books.

There are only a few cities in the world that are really cities—London for courage, Paris for loveliness, Calcutta for misery, Shanghai for sin, Rome for healing and hurt, Athens for blue skies, Cairo for gold and intrigue, Naples for a merry heart and a dirty face, Berlin the tomb and womb and anvil of war, Moscow for mockery of human rights, and Washington, where every man who has been elected twice can hope for a marble monument.

Wrap them all together and you'll almost have New York—but not quite.

For there is nothing as tremendous as this tremendous village, America's long dream pushed into a few square miles of struggle and grope, where people move like moles underground and hope in terms of towers.

Never a day dawns here but my spirit feels taller on the way to work from seeing the Empire State Building shoulder the morning mist, comforting as a fairy tale in an hour of fear. And never an evening sun sinks down without my spirit weeping from the sight of some ugliness that dwells here, too, in men and buildings.

We have learned full well that no nation can live to itself alone. And we have also learned that when the free peoples of the world stand united they are unconquerable.

of the world's noisiest and busiest migrations is getting into full swing. It's accompanied by sweat and toil, dust and sometimes tears.

But a lovely, motherly woman who has gone along on the annual grain harvest trek for seven years finds it an "exciting life." She is Mrs. Y. W. Turner of (914 N. Beaton) Corsicana, Tex.

Each year in the spring this migration begins. Thousands of grain combines, accompanied by more thousands of gleaming grain trucks, roar down on the South from Canada and the Northern United States.

These combines cut and thresh grain in one operation. The combines roll southward until they reach warm latitudes where grain first ripens each year. Along the way other combines join the march.

When the men and machines reach ripe grain, they turn and work north, harvesting as they go. Finally, by fall, they cross into Canada to wind up the season.

Mr. and Mrs. Turner are a little different. They don't have to go south. The first ripe grain is on their doorstep.

Mrs. Turner's husband is a crew chief with an outfit of typical size. Including Turner, there are eight crewmen. He owns three combines, four trucks and a huge, 35-foot house trailer. The trailer is Mrs. Turner's domain.

She says: "Sometimes it seems to me that it's just as important to keep the boys well fed and to provide a home atmosphere for them as to actually combine the wheat."

And can Mrs. Turner cook? "She really can," says Glen White, a six-foot-plus youth in the crew.

The trailer is well equipped for Mrs. Turner. It has bottled gas for the range and a gas-operated refrigerator. Electrical connections provide lights, power for fans and heat for an electric iron. At one end is a semi-circular dining table which seats 10.

One half of the trailer is devoted to living quarters for Mr. and Mrs. Turner and their college sophomore daughter, Bobradine, who is going along this year. It has practically all the comforts of a stationary home. Turner has been harvesting 11 years. In the off season, he operates earth moving machinery and other heavy-duty equipment at Corsicana. He's made the trip north so

year since except for 1943.

It's surprising to discover that Mrs. Turner had two sons in the Army. She doesn't look old enough.

Two of the children are along this year. Bobradine is a music student at North Texas State College, Denton. She joined her parents when the school year ended. A son, James, is a crewman. Another daughter is Mrs. Jack K. Williams of Dallas. Another son, Lesley R., was reported missing in action while fighting with 70th Tank Battalion of the First Army.

Because the Turners have made so many harvest trips, "We feel as much at home at places we stop as we do in Corsicana," she says. The Turners often have discussed which town along the route they'll settle down in when they stop their yearly trips, but they haven't yet decided. Turner has offered to "settle

down" often, but Mrs. Turner says she knows he likes the work. So they'll continue following the harvest as long as he wants to.

"Sometimes I want to settle down," she said, "but when the crews start getting ready in the spring, I get anxious to go, too, and right then I start packing."

Mrs. Turner especially enjoys the scenery on the three- and one-half to five-month tour. She is a camera fan and has pictures of much of her travel routes.

The three combines in the Turner outfit usually cut 100 acres in a day which begins with breakfast at 6 a. m. and ends with supper as late as 10 p. m. When they hit an ideal stretch, he combines can cover 150 acres.

"It makes a good living but you don't get ahead fast," Mrs. Turner says. "It costs so much to replace machinery."

Despite their long hours and nomadic life, the crewmen manage to stay clean and neat —

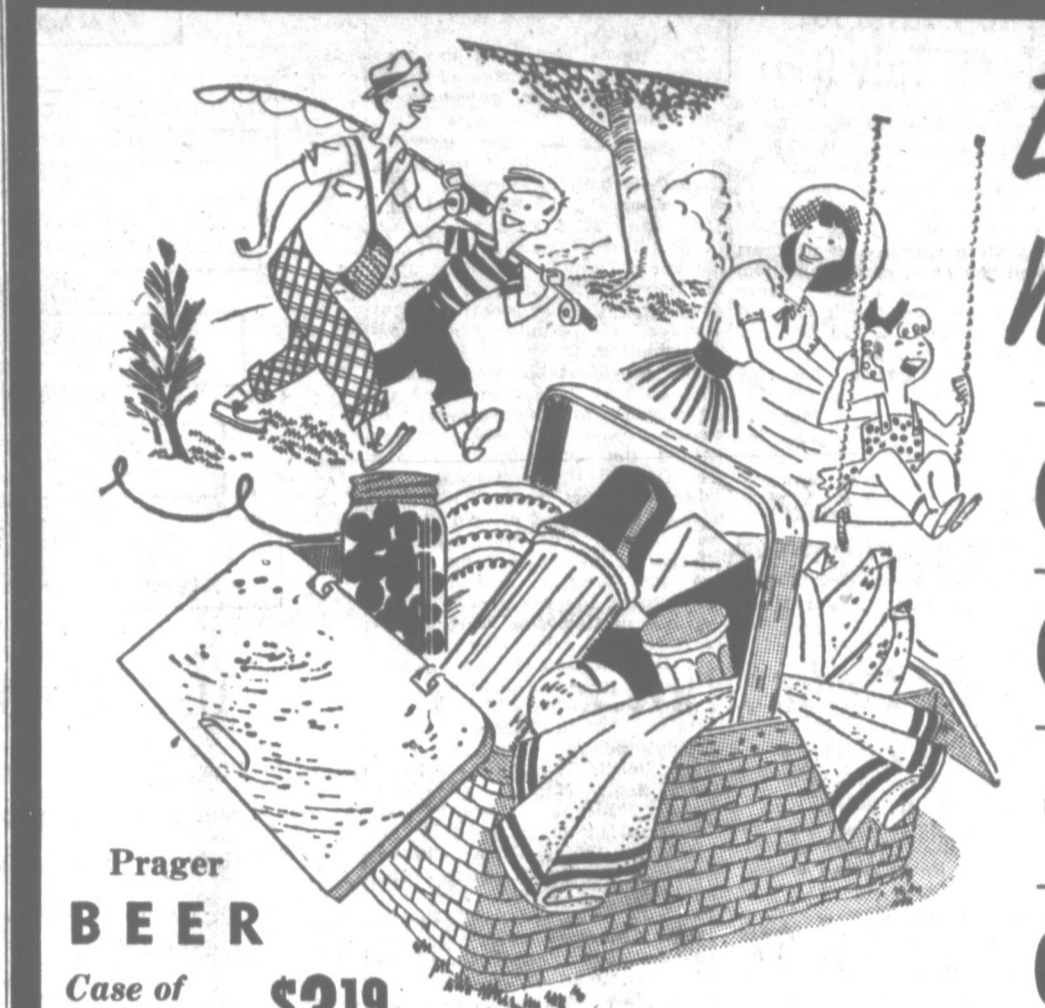

As the manicure and pedicure become an essential part of your garb, upkeep of the twin beauty ritual becomes a good grooming must. Badly shot polish jobs can "kill" any costume effect.

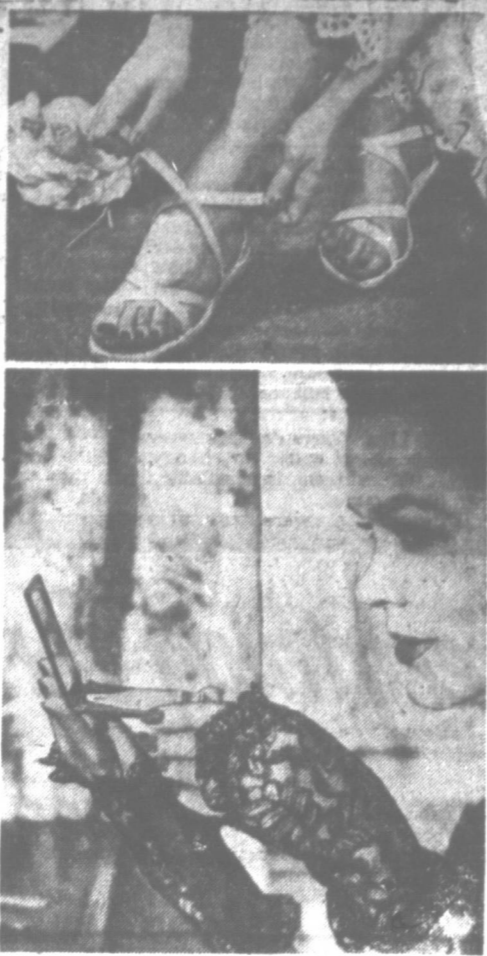

Toes get "the works" first: The barest rounding of toe-nail corners is best. Deep-filing won't give the flesh on toe tips the protection it needs; can be encouraging to ingrowing nails.

Use a liquid cuticle remover that allows dead cuticle to be shredded off with a towel. Follow with a soaking in warm oil which will help in sloughing off callouses. This double-routine cleans up the shaggy outline around the nails.

Pedicure routine should follow the manicure routine down to the last layer of "overcoat." However, toe polish should not cover the entire moon. A slight arc left unacquainted on all nails adds the salon-neat look of polished toes and fingernails.

Manicure method may be second nature to you by now, but a few new salon tricks can do no harm: Instead of swabbing off old polish with one swatch of cotton, saturate ten small dabs in oil remover, slip one over each nail. The old polish will vanish without reddening cuticle and fingers.

Polish the most difficult hand first (your right, if you're right-handed) with not more than four brush strokes per nail; one stroke of color to outline the cuticle and three more to cover the nail.

Little rolls of cotton wedged between toes before polishing will simplify your pedicure and keep polish on each toe safe from smears.

There's almost a prism of reds to choose from for color. Pick a red at fingers and toes that will be an accessory color for your favorite summer cottons. Keep that

QUESTION: Who was the last righthander to win the National League batting championship?

CLEANING THE DESK: Got around to cleaning the desk off yesterday-morning and there are a few odds and ends that were lying around under the pile of rubble that always accumulates in the rush to get everything ready for the paper run.

Got the inside story on the reason for the wildness of Dick Lockwood, former Oiler righthander, who was optioned out to Ardmore. Dick wouldn't tell about it, but a fellow who was an official scorer in the Sooner State League, where Lockwood hurled last season, offered the following: Lockwood started out last season with Seminole and went great guns. He had everything he needed. Then one day, while fielding a ball, the base runner ran into Dick, tearing a ligament in the shoulder of his pitching arm. Dick was out of the lineup for a long while, recuperating. He visited doctors in Oklahoma City, but the damage of the collision apparently couldn't be repaired. Anyway, after he got back in action, he had lost all of his control, and as yet, despite many, many hours of work, has failed to regain the form he showed prior to the accident.

Got a newswy little note from Morgan Hampton, club professional at Abilene. He would like me to call to the attention of the golfers that, so far as the Abilene Country Club is concerned, the war is still over and that the annual Independence Week golf tournament, officially the Abilene Country Club Invitational, will be underway shortly. It starts July 1 and ends July 4.

R. C. Otey, former Oiler brilliant infielder, has taken over a regular berth with the Little Rock

If you are one that hopes to someday catch a foul ball hit into the stands, and have often wondered what your chances of doing so were, here are the figures.

A check was made during a Texas League game at San Antonio, and it was found that 18 balls were fouled into the stands and bleachers during the game. There were 3,016 spectators at the game. Thus, the mathematical chance of getting a baseball was one to 167. Club officials think that 18 foul balls is about average for any park.

So if you are figuring on obtaining a baseball free, just find out how many fans are in the park and divide by 18 and you'll know what the chances are.

ANSWER: No righthander has won the National League batting championship since Frank McCormick, Cincinnati first baseman, did it in 1939.

British Press Gets Verbal Lacing by Royal Council

LONDON — (AP) — A royal commission criticized the British press Wednesday for partisanship, distortion of news and failure to give a clear picture of world affairs.

It recommended setting up a general council of the press to foster — but not force — integrity and responsibility to the public. At the same time, the report — issued after two years' study — declared "it is generally agreed that the British press is inferior to none in the world. It is free from corruption."

The commission, whose report is addressed to the King and presented also to Parliament and the government, has no power to put any of its recommendations into practice.

The 14 men and three women of the Royal Commission on the Press examined newsmen and publishers as expert witnesses during its investigation and found:

"There is nothing approaching monopoly in the press as a whole . . .

"Neither in the local weekly, nor in the periodical press, nor in the news agencies do we expect a significant trend towards further concentration of ownership . . .

"The gap between the best of the quality papers and the general run of the popular press is too wide, and the number of papers of an intermediate type is too small . . .

"The press does not do all it might to encourage its public to accept or demand material of

2 Americans Questioned on Invasion Plan

MEXICO CITY — (AP) — Two Americans are among 55 men held in Merida as supposed members of a Dominican invasion expedition.

M. R. Finley and Earl Adams have been questioned by the U. S. Consulate in Merida but a report has not been made to the Embassy here.

The 55 men were ordered held by Mexican Army authorities who seized two planes in which the men arrived off the coast of Yucatan after a storm that required them to be rescued.

Gen. Antonio Sanchez Acevedo, chief of staff, who examined the men in Merida, gave his report Tuesday to the Attorney General's Office for possible further action.

The general said Monday that the group refused to say from what base they started but said they were headed for the Dominican Republic. Two other planes of the same group continued their flight.

The first technical charge on which the 55 were detained was their presence in Mexico without proper papers. At first they asserted they came to seek work but soon abandoned that stand.

The Dominican Republic ambassador said Wednesday his government has proof Guatemalans and Guatemalan planes were involved in the invasion attempt.

The ambassador, Dr. Joaquin Balaguer, said six planes were in the invasion attempt. Four landed in Mexico in the Yucatan Peninsula area, he said. Mexican authorities took them in charge, but permitted two Guatemalan Army type planes to leave.

Balaguer said his government knows of a "LeMay plot" by at least three months in advance. He said the smuggling of some arms to the rebel base had been traced and that various informers had given information.

Very Few Price Changes on Food

Housewives stocking the larder for the long holiday weekend will find very few price changes from a week ago.

Lamb cuts were trimmed several cents a pound in some stores which were slow to follow the general price slashing of last week. But beef, pork and veal were about unchanged.

Poultry was a little cheaper in some marketing centers, with fryers cut two to four cents a pound to attract shoppers planning picnic menus. Most dairy prices held steady, although top quality eggs eased a penny or two a dozen in a few places.

Even in the produce department price adjustments were relatively minor.

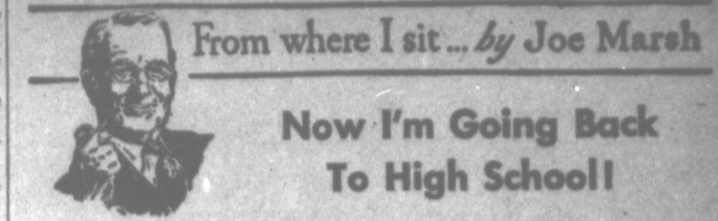

The 72-year-old Democrat resigned Tuesday.

"My turn has come to step down," said the author of the Wagner labor relations law and many other New Deal measures.

Wagner said the "battle for human rights is never ending" and that he had confidence a "new generation will exercise power for the common good."

His only regret: "I cannot remain in the front line."

Wagner's resignation paved the way for Republican Gov. Thomas E. Dewey to appoint an interim successor.

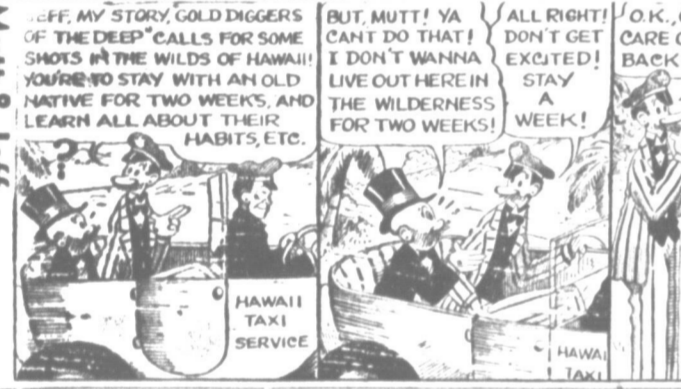

Relics of Scrap Turned to Useful Peacetime Scrap Iron

BALTIMORE, Md. (NEA)—An army of men with oxy-acetylene torches is accomplishing what Japanese dive-bombers and Nazi anti-tank units tried to do and couldn't—reducing Navy ships and Army tanks to scrap metal.

In the historic Patuxent River, where once Francis Scott Key watched the British bombard Fort Mifflin, a steady stream of half-fused relics—everything from cruisers to GI helmets—is being broken up into scrap steel to feed peacetime steel furnaces.

One of the ships at the Patuxent Scrap Corporation's yard is the light cruiser Memphis, which once took President Roosevelt to the Casablanca conference. Others are the Detroit, a survivor of Pearl Harbor, and the Richmond and Concord which, like the Detroit, are veterans of Pacific battles.

There's the HMS Emperor, which chased the German pocket battleship Von Tirpitz along the Norwegian coast.

And there are even two ferryboats which once plodded back and forth between Staten Island and Manhattan, in New York Bay.

During the war, this yard was the site of the Bethlehem-Fairfield shipyard, where more than 100 Liberty and Victory ships and LSTs were built. Now the process is reversed, and the workmen are stripping the vessels into hunks of scrap.

Besides ships, there are acres of obsolete tanks, several thousand of them piled sometimes five high. Many still have caked mud from rain-drenched battlefields; others have shell holes; a few have blood stains. There are enemy tanks, too, since the steel

furnaces know no nationality.

For the first three years after the war, the supply of scrap was critically short. Steel production, tied directly to scrap supply, was short, too. But now scrap yards like Patuxent are in full production, and the steel mills are turning the scrap from tanks and ships into such things as bird cage wire, knitting needles, tin cans, sheets for pleasure cars or new merchant ships.

Shipbreaking, as the reduction of ships into scrap is called, is a highly skilled task requiring careful planning and good judgment by the supervisor and his crew.

The vessel, warped to a pier, is worked over by men armed with torches, hacksaws, sledges and cold chisels.

First to come down is the radio aerial, permitting the big cranes to slide freely over the ship. Then, bit by bit, masts and superstructure are removed, decks torn away and the interior fittings taken out. The work proceeds cautiously, lest the ship become unbalanced and capsizes. When the vessel has been reduced to a waterline hull, it is drawn up on shore.

Objects like tanks are often broken up by the simple process of dropping a 10-ton steel ball on them.

No matter what the scrap has been used for in the past, it can be remelted and used over and over again. Little is lost per usage. Even rust—oxidized steel—is gathered and melted down in some scrap yards.

House of Delegates To Study Sites

TEMPLE—(AP)—The State Medical Association's House of Delegates will study possible sites for a new branch of the University of Texas school of medicine.

Dr. G. V. Brindley, president of the association, said yesterday he would call the House of Delegates to meet on the matter as soon as Governor Jester signs an appropriation bill for the school.

San Antonio, Dallas, and Temple have bid for the school.

The bill authorized by Legislature provides that the House of Delegates of the State Medical Association shall study possible sites and make recommendations to the Board of Regents of the University of Texas.

Man Who 'Shot Up' His Home Town Found Insane

DENTON — (AP)—A district court jury in five minutes found insane a thin, sandy-haired farmer who "shot up" his home town.

The jury Monday found Joe Allen Goforth, 26, insane at the time of the shooting last Jan. 7 and insane now. The verdict prevents his being tried on an assault to murder charge. He is to be committed to a state institution.

Goforth terrorized the small town of Krum, 12 miles northwest of here, roaming the streets armed with a gun. Sheriff W. O. (Oma) Hodges was blinded by a shot and Jake Chism, a Krum painter, was less seriously wounded.

Doctors testified at the sanity hearing which started Monday morning that Goforth suffered from a split personality (schizophrenia) and an inferiority complex (paranoia).

Goforth's parents testified their son's mind is unbalanced. They said he has brooded since being told he wouldn't be needed to sing any more at church.

Dr. John Harper of the Wichita Falls State Hospital and Dr. Joe Allen of Justin testified as to Goforth's mental condition.

Dr. Harper said Goforth's condition probably never will improve. The doctor was asked what causes a man to go berserk as Goforth did.

"God only knows—the doctors don't," he said. Harper said Goforth felt he was doing right at the time of the shooting.

The young farmer sat slumped at a table and stared at the floor during the trial.

Mr. and Mrs. G. E. Goforth said D. P. Windle, Krum barber and church leader, told their son he needn't show up to sing any more at the Church of Christ at Krum. Mrs. Goforth said her son had sung at the church about two years.

The day of the shooting Goforth had gone first to Windle's barber shop. Windle and two customers, seeing Goforth armed with a gun peering in the window, fled out the back door.
