

Phone Raceways Will Save Walls

Two of the most prudent precautions to take in building a new home today are the installation of adequate electric outlets for the constantly growing number of household appliances and the installation of telephone raceways.

After a modern insulated house is completed it becomes difficult and expensive to change its wiring system.

Telephone raceways are pre-installed connections that facilitate future instrument installation at almost any point in a house.

With monthly charges for extension telephone bells and extension phones now on a reasonable basis it is wise for a home owner to provide for changes of mind in the future.

Also the advantages of plug-in telephones are something worth considering, especially in two-story homes. With a plug-in system, an instrument can be moved from one room to another and back again at will.

Built-in raceways simplify auxiliary telephone installations and eliminate damage to walls and decoration.

A substitute for built-in raceways has been developed in a raceway baseboard. This consists of two extruded aluminum interlocking elements. The lower one is screwed to the floor and the upper is a removable plate—the two concealing all wiring in a fire-safe panel.

Another handy invention is an electric outlet strip. In the place of ordinary base outlets, this strip permits plugging in household appliances at any point around a room.

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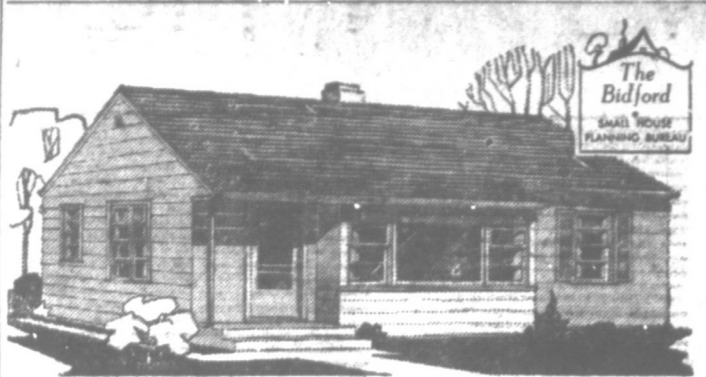

The Bidford is entered through a vestibule equipped with a coat closet, the roof overhang provides shelter for the entrance door.

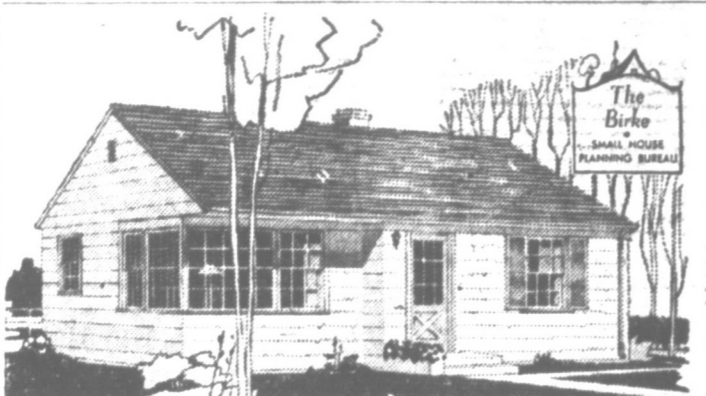

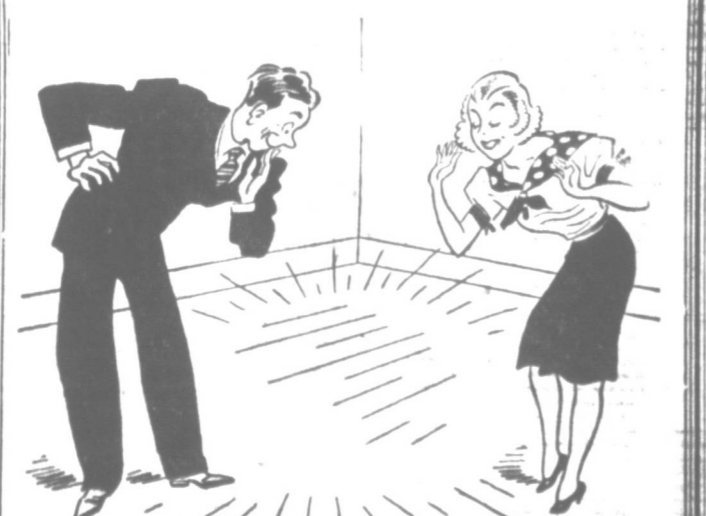

Floors Really Can Be Wiped Away in Time

Floors are scrubbed away more often than they are worn away! The scrubbing brush and hot soapy water have ruined more wood and linoleum than all the waxing that is ever done on them. Repeated scrubbing discolors the finish of both wood and linoleum, dries out the natural oils in linoleum and makes wood floors splintery.

Regular care is the secret of a beautiful floor and proper care is simple and inexpensive. For hardwood flooring experts advocate a waterless cleaner that leaves a protective film of wax. If a glossy finish is desired wax should be applied immediately after cleaning. Either paste or liquid waxes are satisfactory, but liquid is more popular because it is easier to apply and buff.

(Self-polishing waxes contain water and are not recommended for hardwood.)

After a floor is cleaned and waxed it requires relatively little attention. Daily dusting with a dry dust mop is sufficient. It is important to use a mop rather than a broom because the broom bristles wear down the wax coating.

Of course areas such as doorways and hallways which are frequently used need extra care. These can be touched up when necessary without cleaning and waxing the entire floor.

If a floor has been neglected and abused, sanding and refinishing may be necessary to restore it to its original beauty. Compared with the cost of a new floor this is very inexpensive. Many homeowners do the job themselves with a rental sander.

A penetrating seal finish is desirable because it will not chip, crack or craze the way shellac, varnish and other surface-type finishes do. An old floor correctly refinished is just as easy to maintain as a new one.

Linoleum needs the same kind of care that hardwood does, although it ordinarily requires a cleaning more often. Most good housekeepers clean and wax their linoleum once a week and their hardwood floors three to four times a year.

It's Easy Task Making Bookcase

Despite the fact that rows and rows of bookshelves impart a look of luxury to a room, they can be made with little effort and at slight cost by the most inexperienced home carpenter.

Daniel Tower, of the staff of the Museum of Art, Rhode Island School of Design, has designed a simple method of making bookcases with movable free-standing sections which can be stacked side by side or over another to fill a wall space.

A few of the individual units may be made and stacked as a starter, with others added from time to time until the desired area is covered.

The separate sections are made like open face boxes and can be lifted from their places without disturbing the books—a boon to the booklover who must move his possessions from one dwelling to another.

A pine board seven feet long, 10 inches wide and 1 1/2 inch thick will make one section measuring 30 inches in length and 14 inches in height. It will hold books up to 12 inches long and also standard-size file holders.

Backs for the sections are made of 1-3/4-inch plywood. Dowel stock purchased by the foot is cut into strips to make supports for the inside of the boxes and provide leaning posts for books.

One length of board is sawed into two 20-inch pieces, for the top and bottom, and two 12-inch pieces for the ends. Boring a pair of 1/2-inch holes near the top of each side piece and connecting them to make a long opening make a grip for the fingers to facilitate moving the sections.

To receive the dowels, shallow wells are gouged in the top and bottom pieces. When the box is being assembled, the wells are headed toward the interior. In cutting the dowel to fit the inside of the box, allowance must be made for the ends sinking into the wells.

Assembling the box is child's play. After standing the side pieces in upright position with the grip openings to the one long piece is laid over them and fastened in place with screws. The partly-made box is then turned upside down so the side pieces will again be standing uncovered.

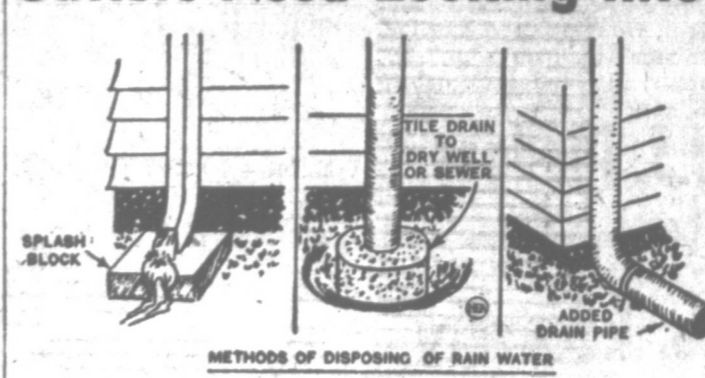
The dowels are forced into the wells and the top piece applied. When the dowels make their places in the wells in both bottom and top lengths of the wood, true right-angle corners for the box are assured.

The thin backing of plywood is tacked on securely or attached with headless wire nails. Each section is sanded and colored with an old pine stain. When dry, it is rubbed in a satin finish with wax.

If a paint finish is preferred, the surfaces must be done dry before the units are stacked. Otherwise, paint might adhere to paint and dissembling of the bookcases will be a difficult process.

Gutters Need Looking Into



Spring is the time to check, clean and repair your roof drainage system. A thorough job will make gutters and downspouts last longer and keep them doing the job they're meant to do.

Start by cleaning out accumulated leaves and dirt with a whisk broom to prevent rusting and overflowing gutters. Clogged downspouts can be opened by removing the elbow and forcing out the refuse with a stick.

To prevent leaves from stopping up downspouts, use wire cages, obtainable at hardware stores. They fit in the holes in the downspout and keep leaves from washing into the openings.

Winter's snow and ice may have bent gutters so that drainage is poor. Use a carpenter's level or a can of water to check the pitch of the gutters. Bend the hangers up or down slightly to give correct pitch, and replace rusted hangers.

The life of gutters can be lengthened by coating the inner surfaces with liquid asphalt paint, and the outer surfaces with house paint.

To repair a leaky gutter, remove the rust from both the inside and outside with coarse steel wool or a wire brush. Coat the inside with a thick film of roofing felt paper or heavy aluminum foil and press down firmly. Where these strips meet, overlap them in the direction of water flow and cement their edges together.

When the bottom end of a downspout is not connected to a dry well or storm sewer, an added length of pipe or a splash block may be used to lead the water away from the house. This will protect the foundation and shrubbery and may eliminate a source of moisture inside the basement.

A clogged dry well will usually flood the ground above it, and excavation will be required to clear the obstruction.

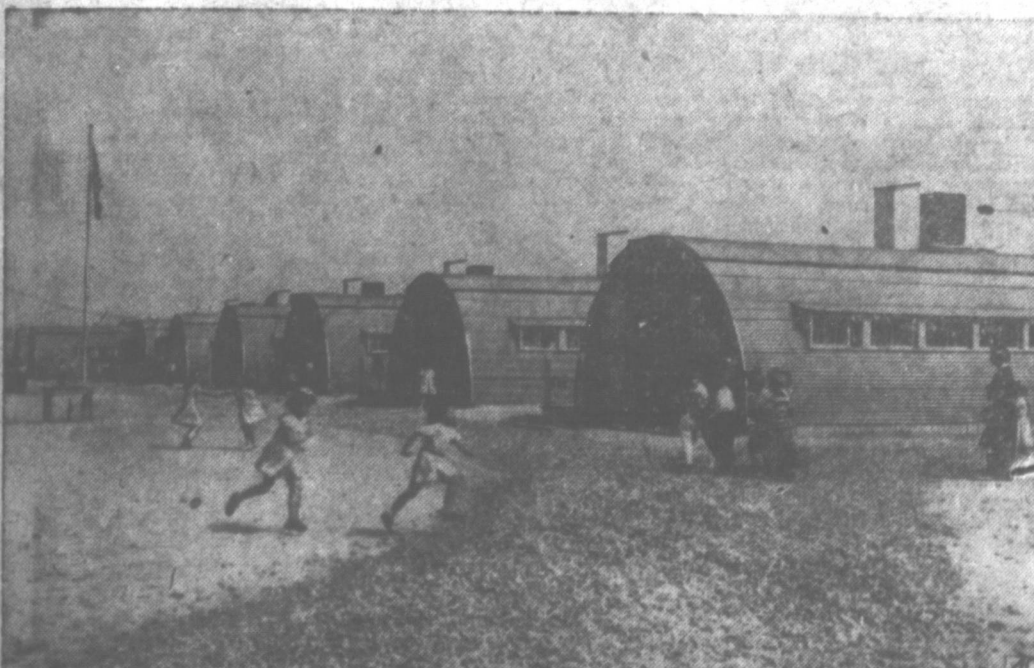

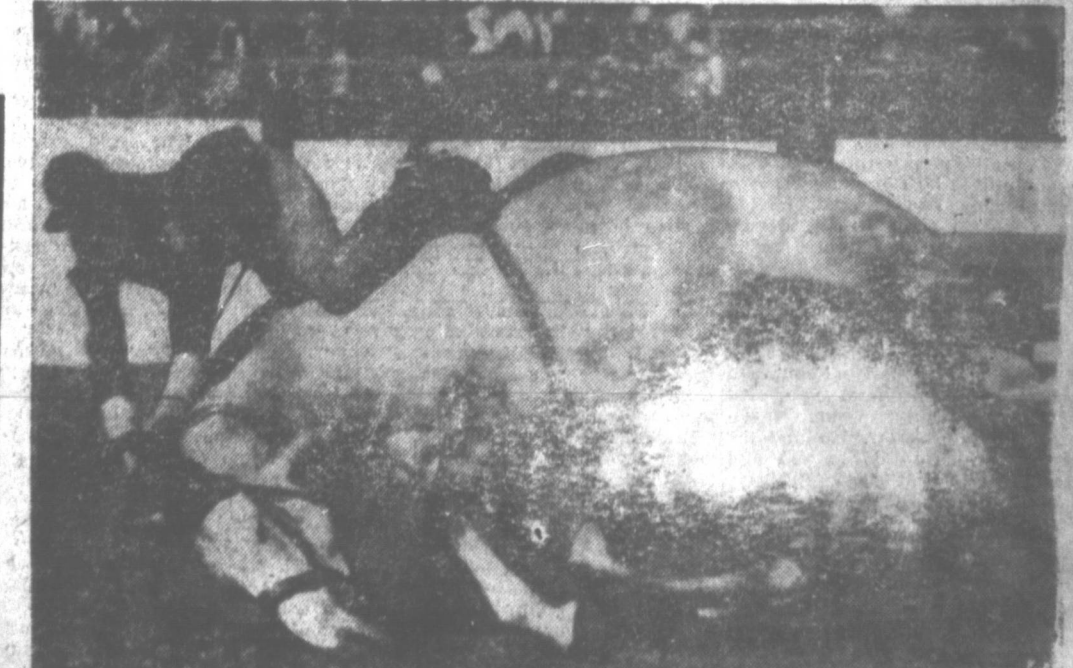

Writer Says Berlin Act Prove Russian Duplicity

The explosion of Russian rage over the Berlin railway walkout reveals the bunk in the stock claim of Communists that they are the real McCoy friends of the "tolling masses."

Edward Ochab, top trade union boss, to chide grumblers for their "incorrect attitude" toward Russian-inspired labor decrees.
Romania has divided the industrial population into 32 classes, each paid a little better wage than the group beneath.

What irony! Strikebreakers rushing in to man the trains, scabs waving the Hammer and Sickle, Red police firing on unarmed workers, leaving a trail of wounded and dead—all this and more a demonstration of how the insincere Soviet Union behaves in its own labor disputes.

Such disclosure of Communist double standard should strengthen President Phil Murray in his attempts to purge Moscow-minded traitors from the CIO executive board and from seats of power in local. It may finally open the eyes of all American wage-earners and left wing economists to the danger of giving the comrades even the narrowest toehold in union affairs.

In all capitalist countries, including our own, Communist hypocrites themselves use the strike as a political weapon to wreck the economy, foment class warfare and advance Kremlin policy.

Violence is encouraged, as in the case of Italian strikers hurling paving blocks of the police and French chemical holdouts throwing acid in the eyes of the gendarmes, to blind some of the workers for life. Efforts by the authorities to restore order were branded in the Marxist press as "murderous assaults" on "down-trodden, cattle" by "fascist assassins who do not tolerate strikes in their own Russia or elsewhere in the Soviet sphere."

When Berlin railroadmen asked for recognition of independent labor organizations, wages paid in Western marks and other legitimate aims of collective bargaining, Stalin gave them black-jacks and bullets.

This betrayal of advertised principle is only one example of two-faced communism. At a recent 10th Congress of the Soviet Trade Unions held in Moscow, Chairman Vasily Kuznetsov, of course, flayed American capitalists and called on workers of the world to unite with Russia against their "Anglo-American warmongers."

Then he displayed his conception of solidarity by blasting the American CIO for "disruptive treacherous activities" and accusing the AFL of being "sworn enemies of the Soviet Union" who spread "malicious slander." Yet all the while his secret agents are trying to worm their way into both American outfits, using as an argument that the union's best friend is Russia.

If American wage-earners realized the enormity of this lie, they would recoil from contact with sneaky fellow travelers. One reason for the Iron Curtain is to hide the truth about the workers' lot.

The Stockholm Marxist press exhibits unbridled hatred of Estonian refugees sheltered in their nation. This venom stems from recent Communist losses in Swedish trade union and parliamentary elections, caused by stories Estonians told fellow Swedish workers of the persecution of labor in Russian-occupied Estonia.

A new crackdown on the tolling masses is underway in Soviet satellites. Discipline is stepped up, working time is increased, individual man-hour output norms are enforced, piece-work and speed-up are in force and unemployment is severely punished. Some reforms are reasonable. But others are practices frowned on by free American labor.

Polish Communists have embarked on an "emulation program." Formerly an individual was rewarded for turning out a record amount of products. Now competition is between factories, each striving to be first in its field to surpass Six-Year Plan quotas.

These were the nations that tried the very things being proposed in our country. The only thing different now is the way it's done. Then, some king or tyrant said he'd control things the way he wanted, and he charged them taxes.

WASHINGTON — "Why," asks M.T. of Columbus, O., "don't President Truman and Congress listen to and act on the advice of professional leaders in the labor, farm, medical and social welfare fields?"

It seems to me that they ought to know what their clientele wants, and that the easiest solution for these problems would be to incorporate these usually well-paid spokesmen into legislation.

SPKESMEN — The White House and members of Congress listen to and heed only those so-called leaders who agree with them. Nor is there any assurance that these usually well-paid spokesmen for the workingman, for the farmers and for socially conscious groups always reflect the wishes of the people they claim to represent.

President Truman, for instance, accepts the viewpoint of the Green-Murray faction on repeal of the Taft-Hartley Act. It is a question whether it is because they supported him last fall, or because he honestly thinks they speak for the mass membership of the union.

SUSPECT — The so-called farm leaders are equally suspect, although here it is the administration which distrusts them. The National Grange and the Farm Federation Bureau's officials, for instance, generally oppose the new Brannan two-price system for preserving farm

income at the same time that retail prices are permitted to fall to a lower level. The more radical Farmers' Union favors it. Naturally, Mr. Brannan believes that the grange and the federation, which have a rather conservative and Republican leadership, are motivated by partisan politics in opposing him. Therefore he consoles himself with the thought that they do not represent the reaction of the dirt farmers and their wives.

TRUST — Capitol Hill opponents, reversing the attitude they hold toward labor leaders' arguments against the Taft-Hartley Act, place their trust in the hostile views of the majority of farm leaders on the Brannan program. The same holds true of physicians' hostility toward health insurance. President Truman insists that they do not reflect the viewpoint of the layman who cannot afford costly medical and hospital care. So he disregards them. But the opposition, including Republicans and conservative Democrats, believes that the private medicals preach the one, true gospel.

Backtracking the war is too big a job for any one person. It was a long war in a wide world, and no man saw it all.
Can I help peel off some of the past for you? What shall I tell the girls in Piccadilly Circus? Is there someone you want me to look up for you in the cemetery that looks down on Omaha Beach? They say there isn't a red stain on the sands there now, and once there were so many. And a man lying on every stain.

It's June again in the Normandy hedgerows, soldier. Five years don't make much difference to hedgerows. But how the world has changed for the men who lived across them at each other in 1944! How odd it will be to see live cows grazing in the fields outside St. Lo. Remember, soldier, how it seemed like every cow you saw was dead? And they lay in the shell-pitted pastures with their legs stuck in the air like bloated toy rubber balloons.

Then we're going on to Frankfurt and Berlin, where they are putting brick back on brick again and talking of "the New Germany." They aren't Krauts or Huns or Nazis any more, soldier. They're all Germans again—and peace, isn't it wonderful? It is while it lasts. But it can wear out mighty quick.

Well, soldier, I guess we all have changed as much as the battlefields. There isn't much use in trying to go back to anything in life, but everybody keeps right on trying. Maybe in the next two weeks I'll see a few old ghosts of something we used to know. And if I do, I'll say hello—and tell them you wish them well.

And that same afternoon, the House Committee sends up to the Senate Committee, for consideration, the restoration of a billion and a half dollars' debt to Britain and Europe's budget in order to save the value of our American dollar and the employment of our own workers!

If your offspring's roommates and college friends are heading for your home this summer, have your hostess-routine set up before your carefree guests arrive.

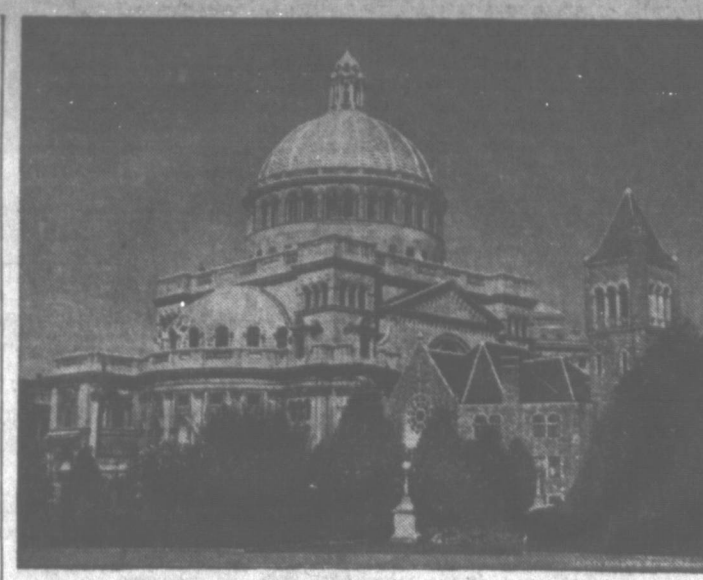

For an all-white color scheme, nothing is lovelier than Irish linen damask for the tablecloth and a lavish arrangement of white roses and green foliage for decoration. The white wedding cake will be garlanded with rosebuds or with green and white caladium leaves accented with clusters of sugar-roses or grapes or strawberries. White china, self-embossed in a grape design, and a milk glass punch bowl will complete the setting.

Switch the colors and this same table setting plan can be used in honor of a silver wedding anniversary. issued by a court which seeks to maintain conditions until it can determine its authority in the dispute.

The Appeals Court contended that the Supreme Court has ruled "that people who disobey such an order of a court may be punished for contempt of court, even if it is decided later that the act under which the order was issued was unconstitutional."

The restraining order was issued under the Taft-Hartley Law provision permitting injunctions against strikers that imperil the national health or safety.

Lewis and the union contended in their appeal that there was no evidence of a "strike" or that they authorized, ordered or suggested a work stoppage.

Looper described as a speedup process on June 18, 1948.

Before Hickenlooper brought this up, Lilienthal had testified that the AEC is keeping some persons with doubtful records on the payroll because that seems safer than firing them. He said some got their jobs when the Army was running the atomic project.

Under questioning from a Senate-House committee, the AEC chairman said he knows that atomic developments are a "primary target" for Communist spy activity.

But, Lilienthal insisted, there are some circumstances where persons with doubtful records should be kept at work.

As examples, he said some persons were cleared for work under wartime Army control and have learned top atomic secrets.

With many precautions," he said the employment of these persons was continued. He added, however, that if they had applied for jobs after the civilian commission was in control, the AEC probably would not have been willing to take "the calculated risk" the Army did in hiring them.

Much of the inquiry has centered around the question of how well the commission had been guarding this country's atomic secrets.

Senator Wherry of Nebraska, the Republican floor leader, has suggested that Congress create a little FBI—with somebody like J. Edgar Hoover in charge—to head up atomic security.
