

To receive the dowels, shallow wells are gouged in the top and bottom pieces. When the box is being assembled, the wells are headed toward the interior. In cutting the dowel to fit the inside of the box, allowance must be made for the ends sinking into the wells.

Assembling the box is child's play. After standing the side pieces in upright position with the grip openings to the one long piece is laid over them and fastened in place with screws. The partly made box is then turned upside down so the side pieces will again be standing




