



The Russians, acknowledging the threat to Stalingrad on the Volga as the deepest penetration of Rus-sian soil so far, said that the enemy had gained ground to the south of Boguchar, which would place the German spearheads either on the fringe of or actually within the socalled North Caucasian area. This extends northward between the Ukraine and the Stalingrad area.

Axis reports on this phase of the battle of the Don basin placed the fighting well within the North Caucasian area, at Migulinsk, 30 miles down the Don from Boguchar and about 160 miles northwest of Stalingrad.

Coinciding with observance of Bastille day there were reports in London of German preparations against invasion of the Netherlands. Belgium and France, and the British press increased its clamor for a second front to aid the battered Red armies.

Sugar Shortage

The current controversy over sugar supply is unthose-not fifth columnists or sixth, but just ordinary suspicious and bellicose patriots-who will argue that the whole business has been badly bungled. These critics will be second-guessing, so they will have plenty of embarrassing material at their command. The office of price administration says firmly that sugar stocks on hand are not as large as the public believes, that the sugar shipping situation may not continue as favorable as in the past few months. OPA, while making two extra pounds of sugar available between July 10 and Aug. 22, still maintains that it is not possible to assure permanent increases in the weekly ration.

The real dispute is between those who believe sugar will continue coming in at the present paceand therefore the public should be given a fatter allowance-and those who fear shipments may fall off soon, and argue that a stockpile must be built up to insure against future shortage.

The original decision to ration sugar appeared amply justifiable, in view of the shipping situation and our need for molasses from which to make alcohol for munitions.

However, instead of 1.300,000 tons of sugar for munitions, we found it necessary to use only 400,000 tons. The balance came from grain:

At the same time ships returning from Hawaii were able to bring back more sugar than we had expected; and ships from South America have been able to drop in at Havana and pick up more of the cane product. Also, domestic beet production shot up once the government lifted the heavy hand of planting quotas.

So we have achieved an apparent surplusage. A Houston refinery has had to close down because more than 30.000.000 pounds of refined sugar are bulging its warehouses. A New Jersey plant has shut down because of too much refined and too little raw sugar. A congressman alleges that we are paying seven corporations for not producing sugar.

If the government decides to increase the sugar allowance, some will say the bureaucrats went too far in the beginning. But if, with the existing surplus, the moguls decide not to flavor the national sweet tooth, they can expect a mighty and devastating protest.

Yes, the rule for determining the better class is simply a burning desire and a determined effort to see that all people have equal rights to pursue happiness on the same terms.

This is a definition that makes it possible for every human being, if he so wills, to be of the better class.

DIFFICULTY OF GOVERNMENT OPERATION The recent decision of the Mexican supreme court that it was technically illegal for the government to take over the oil wells of foreign oil companies is a very interesting decision.

Reports indicate that since the Mexican government took the property over, they not only brought in no revenue but resulted in extensive and continued deficits.

When productive properties get in the hands of politicians, the properties usually are of little benefit to the customers. The politicians are interested in their own jobs rather than serving the customers of the property.

Wise Ruling

A Connecticut probate court has added to the legal protection thrown about the process of child adoption. He decided that when the secretary of a well-known columnist and her husband gave up their baby for adoption, the foster parents acquired substantially irrevocable rights.

This was a wise ruling. The law generally protects mothers who are under age, unmarried or acting under temporary stress, from losing their infants. PUBLIC INFORMATION (W. K. Kelsey in the Detroit News)

In the New York Times, Arthur Krock has out his finger on a journalistic sore spot- the publication, in books and magazines, of material (for which the writers are presumably well paid) which could only be gained by access to sources closed to the working press by the gov-ernment. There were several instances of that sort of thing during and after the first World war-with Secretary of War Baker a prominent offender-and now it is happening again.

Mr. Krock suggests that if and when this material is released, it should be in the form of government white paper, accessible to everyone. As the government's property, the information belongs to every citizen; and no favored writer or publisher should be enabled to copyright and sell t for his own profit. That seems a sensible view.

Against it is the argument that these stories may be due to an original idea of a writer or publisher, who thereupon pulls the necessary wire o obtain and release the information. That is all very well, but the fact is that the same idea frequently occurs to many people who either reflect that if the government wanted the material published it would have given it out as a press release or feel that they do not possess "inside connections" that would make a request for t successful.

If the idea can be inculcated that governmen information is not the private property of officials to be used for their own aggrandizement or peddled to their pets, but is owned by the people of the United States, who should have access to it as soon as it can be safely revealed, in the form of the widest possible circulation—that is to say, by release to the daily press—an unethical prac-
