Nazis Spearheads Reach River Don

British headquarters announced today that Gen. Sir Claude Auchinleck's Egyptian armies had driven the Axis into retreat for the second successive day, while in the Russian campaign a sharp new crisis was indicated by a German claim that Nazi spearheads had crossed the Riv-

A bulletin from imperial GHQ said British troops, pressing the initiative, attacked Field Marshal Rommel's forces in fierce all-day fighting in Egypt yesterday and "in a night attack drove the enemy from a strong point, inflicting heavy casualties.

The New York Times said private advices indicated that Gen. Rommel might fall back to Matruh, 110 miles west of the present battle zone, to shorten his supply line and await reinforcements.

The Times quoted unofficial reports that Gen. Rommel held a desert meeting yesterday with Field Marshal Wilhelm Keitel, chief of the German army; Gen. Ugo Cavallero, chief of the Italian general staff, and other high officers to decide on the next move. The Paris radio broadcast a re

Among other reasons why the Germans and the Japanese are pushing us so hard is the fact that we're too nice. We think and try to act like gentlemen. We refuse to recognize that war is a nasty, brutal business, which can not be settled with one hand while we hold our fastidious nose with the

We-meaning particularly the Anglo-Saxon peoples -are not irretrievably soft. We are as courageous as any-probably more than most. We are as clever, as scientific, as logical, as imaginative as our ene-

Yet we let them shove us around.

The time has come-Tobruk and Matruh are proof, if there were no others-for us to get tough, to forget Marquis of Queensbury rules, to inculcate ourselves with the fighting codes of the lumber camps.

The time has come for us to develop a good, ardent let's-knock-their-dirty-blocks-off hate against any man who wears an Axis uniform or has to do with the Axis war effort.

It seems to be agreed by on-the-spot observers that we probably had at one time the men and the materiel in North Africa with which to beat General

Good, competent correspondents who watched the campaign from the fighting lines say that we lost because, instead of asking "Where will we hit Rommel next?" our leaders worried about "Where will Rommel strike us next?"

Right now that is the Germans, the Russians, the

The Russians are doing the most creditable job, on our side, because they are as tough and ruthless as their enemies.

They're no braver than the British and Americans. They're no cleverer. They're no better equipped. They're no better led.

All they have that we lack, thus far, is the will to win at any cost. Every Russian fights with the feeling that upon him, individually, falls the entire burden of the war. \$25,000 VEAR INCOME

(The Alliance (Ohio) Review) At the moment, it would seem that the \$25,000 a year income becoming the limit that any one can claim, seems to have been pigeon-holed for the present, but how soon it will again come to the fore no one can foretell.

What is left of the excess after this deduction is subject to a 100 per cent tax that will bring his spending money down to \$25,000 a year.

Part of the news about the fighting in the Aleutian Islands has reached the American public in a strange manner. Through telegrams to various aircraft companies Lieutenant-General H. H. 



Edith Key Haines: Smothered Chicken (Servies 8) Two broilers (2½ pounds each) split, 1½ cups giblet broth, 4 table-spoons butter, 6 medium white onions, peeled and sliced, ¼ cup brown sugar, 5 tablespoons flour, 1 jar stuffed olives (8 oz.), drained and slivered, 2 teaspoons salt, 2 or 3

dashes black pepper.

Make giblet broth. Prepare chickens and cut in quarters. Melt 1 tablespoon butter in saucepan, add onions and sugar, and cook together slowly for 15 minutes, covered, stirring occasionally. Roll chicken in 2 tablespoons flour. Melt remaining butter in a skillet and brown chicken lightly all over, sprinkling with 1 teaspoon salt as it browns. Remove meat to a large casserole and add olives and on-ions. To the hot fat add remaining 3 tablespoons flour and stir and cook until blended. Add broth gradually, 1 teaspoon salt, and the pepper, and cook and stir until thickened. Pour over chicken.

Cover and place in hot oven (400 deg. F.) for 10 minutes; then reduce temperature to moderate (350 deg. F.) and continue cook ing for 35 minutes more, or until


