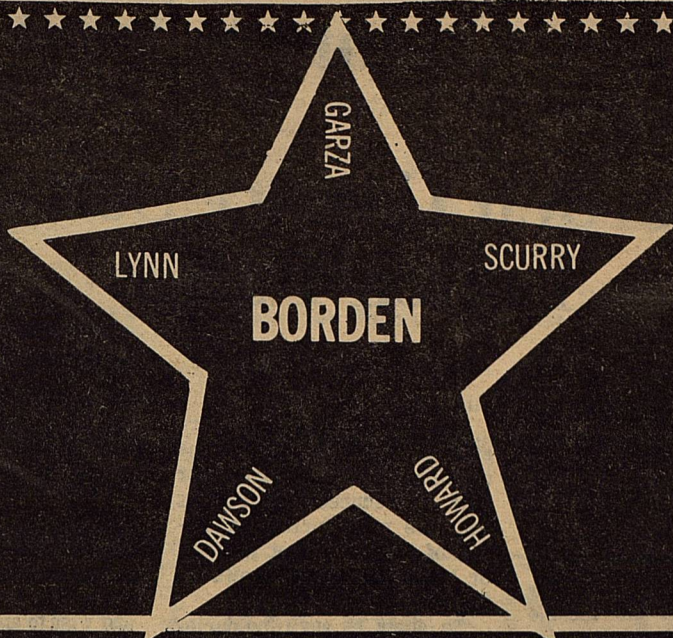

## Pioneer Rancher Dies

W.A. (Bill) Anderson passed away at his home in Lovington, New Mexico, Wednesday August 23, 1978.

Mr. Anderson, the father of Rich Anderson of Borden County, was a long time resident and pioneer rancher in Lea County.

Born in Childress, Texas in 1898, he moved to New Mexico with his family in 1906. At age 17, Mr. Anderson began his ranching career in Lea County with sheep in 1915, later going into the Registered Hereford business. His Anxiety the 4th herd was recognized throughout the Southwest.

Mr. Anderson was active in many civic affairs in Lovington until several years ago when his health began to fail. However, he attended his Rotary meetings until the time of his death.

Services were held in the 1st Baptist Church Friday, August 25.

Survivors include his wife Brookie Lee Anderson and four children. They are: Malcolm S. Anderson of Greeley, Colorado; Rich Anderson of Borden County, Texas; Mrs. Don W. Green of Midland, Texas and W.A. Anderson Jr. of Ruidoso, New Mexico. He is also survived by nine grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

## Open House At Borden Schools

### To Be Paid For In Ten Years

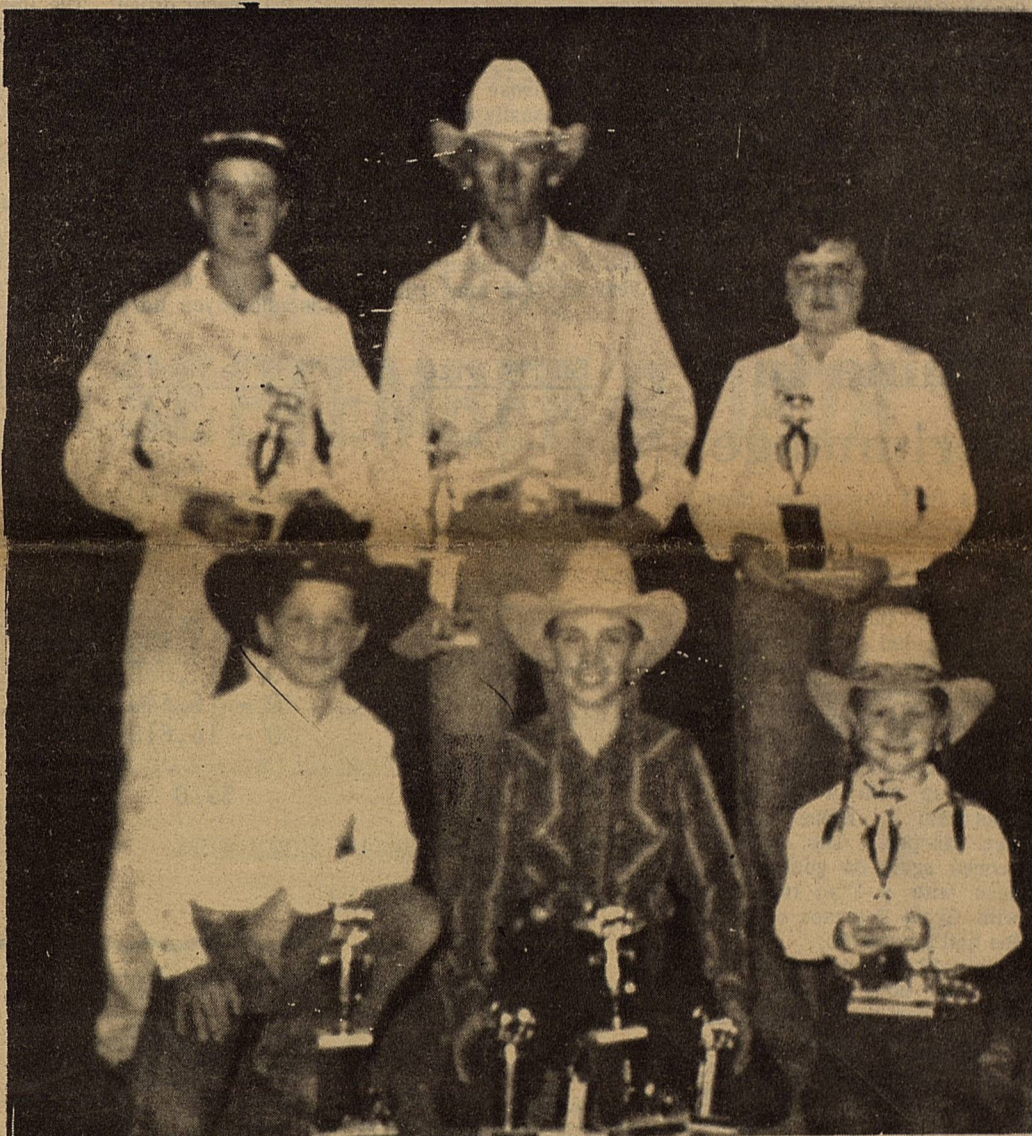
An open house was held at Borden County Schools on Friday, August 25 to give the area an opportunity to view the new million dollar improvements at the school. New facilities include cafeteria, gym, dressing rooms, offices, resource center and classrooms.

Following the open house, a general meeting was held. Mr. James McLeroy, Superintendent, welcomed guests and expressed his appreciation to the taxpayers for allowing "the quality of school we have in our county." He introduced the school board and expressed his appreciation to them for the time they spent meeting with engineers and architects and being instrumental in making our new school possible. Board members are Jack McPhaul, Ralph Miller, Doyle Newton, Martin Parks, Brent Murphy, Kenneth Williams and T.L. Griffin. On the board at the time of the bond election were Rich Anderson and Shorty Farmer.

The patrons were assured that the school system is in good financial condition. The million dollar bond will be paid in full within ten years at 4.63% interest. It is anticipated that the oil values will remain steady for at least 15 years. Oil values in Borden County at this time are assessed at seventy-two million five hundred thousand, up 8 1/2 million from last year. Thirteen years ago, the value was assessed at twenty-three million.

Mr. Ralph Miller, President of the School Board expressed his appreciation to those present for their interest in the school building and program. He described the new facilities and top notch education as a milestone that residents should be very proud of.

# Borden County School News

## Borden County School Lunch Policy

The Borden County School serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for 30 and 35 cents, breakfast for 25 cents, and extra milk for 5 cents.

Children from families whose income is at or below levels shown on the income scale below are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. If the children are eligible for free meals, they are also eligible for free extra milk. The reduced price for lunch is 20 cents and for breakfast 10 cents. If your income is greater than those shown, but you have unusually high medical bills, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of your income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses, your children may still be

eligible.

The school children of parents or guardians who become unemployed are eligible for free or reduced-price meals and free milk during the period of unemployment to be at or below the levels shown on the scale.

To apply at any time during the year for free meals and free milk or reduced-price meals for your children, an application may be obtained at the school office. The information given on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility for free meals and milk or reduced-price meals. Within ten days of receiving your application, the school will let you know whether or not your children are eligible. If you do not agree with the school's decision, you have a right to

a fair hearing. This can be done by writing Mr. James McLeroy, Box 95, Gail, Texas 79738, or calling (915) 856-4262.

In certain cases, foster children are eligible for these benefits. If you have foster children living with you and wish to apply for such meals and milk for them, please notify us or indicate it on the application.

All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, or national origin.

If assistance is needed or your family size or income changes during the year, please contact the superintendent's office.

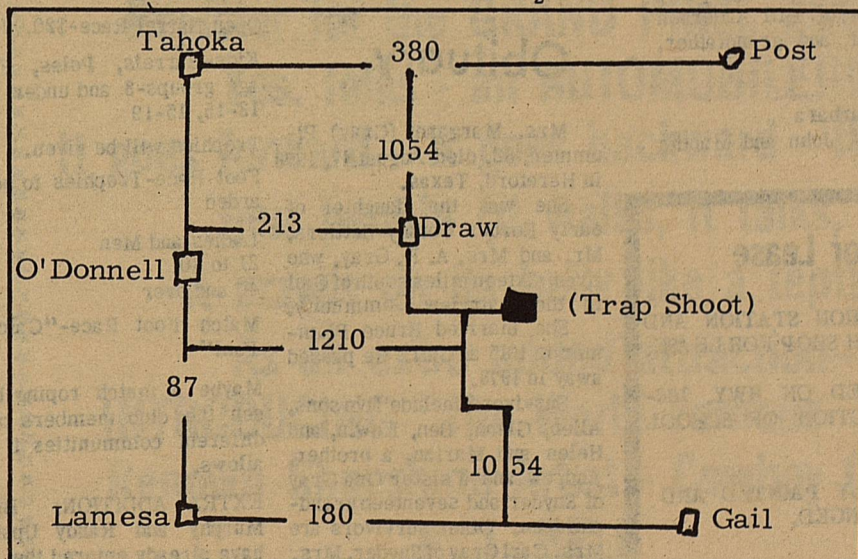

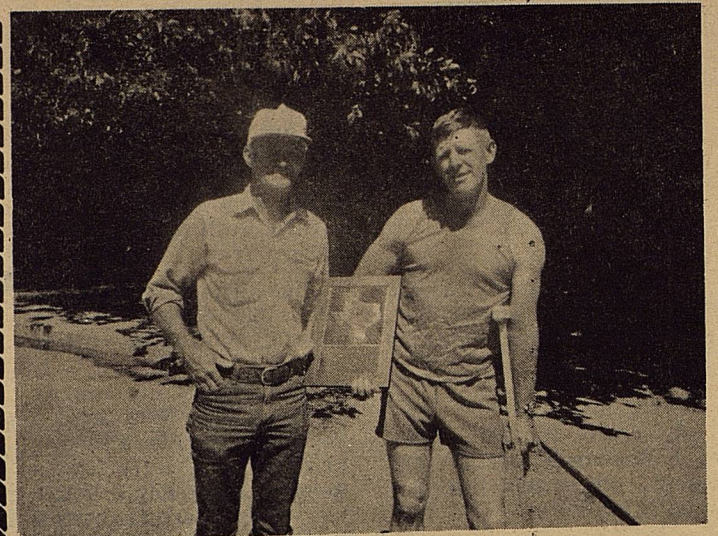

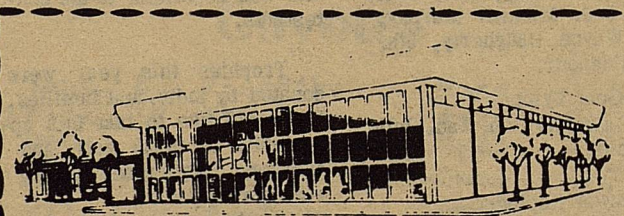

# Hot Weather Management For Cattle

COLLEGE STATION--Hot summer temperatures can put cattle in stress and cause death losses if they are not managed properly, says a beef cattle specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

With proper management, cattlemen should not lose any cattle or suffer production losses during hot weather, believes Dr. Larry L. Boleman.

"When outside temperatures range from 90-100 degrees F., cattle should be left alone as much as possible," contends Boleman. "Avoid movement crowding and handling of cattle because exercise and excitement increase body temperature. When the animal's physiological mechanisms are already trying to reduce body temperature during hot weather, any extraphysical trauma may result in permanent damage or death to the animal."

Also, protect cattle from flies by using sprays, dustbags, oilers or other approved control measures.

In addition, the specialist recommends delaying surgery such as dehorning and castration during hot weather since excessive bleeding may occur due to the animal's increased blood flow.

"It's also vital that cattle have a water supply available. Many creeks and stock tanks dry up during a long, hot summer such as the one we're experiencing this year," notes Boleman. "If water has to be hauled, remember that a yearling requires 8-12 gallons of water a day during hot weather while a cow nursing a calf needs about 16 gallons."

If cattle must be moved on foot or transported during heat stress periods, this should be done during the early morning at night or in late afternoon when temperatures are cooler. If cattle must be moved and then later worked, they should be moved to a holding trap in late evening and worked early the next morning. Keep cattle as calm as possible and avoid over-crowding.

"Although wind movement from fans can increase feed intake, daily gains and improved feed conversion for feed-only economical means for cow-calf operators to change the environment. Research

has shown that during periods of 90 degrees F. weather with a relative humidity of 63 percent, cattle under shade gained weight while those without shade lost weight," points out Boleman.

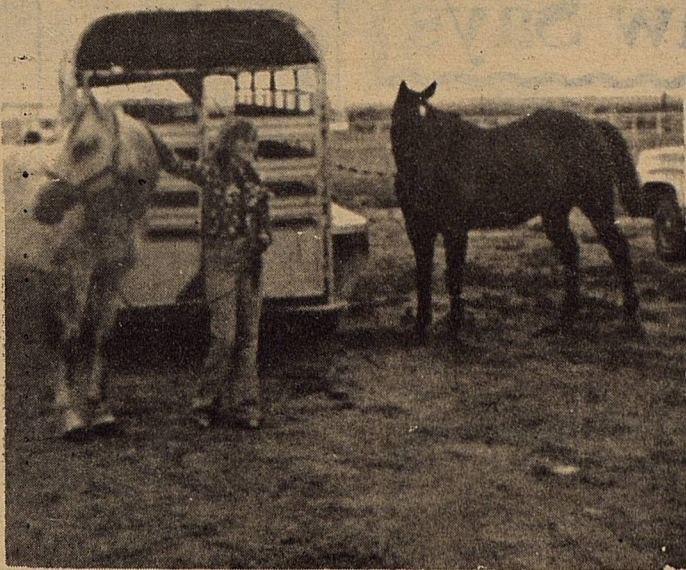
"To improve management practices, producers must first understand the physiological mechanisms that beef cattle use to control body heat created by increased environmental temperatures," contends Boleman. "Animals seek to remove excessive heat by increasing blood flow, water is added to the blood and there is a greater rate of respiration and sweating. All cattle possess the ability to maintain body temperatures under heat stress. Studies have shown that Brahman and Brahman cross cattle maintain lower body temperatures and respiration rates due to a lower heat production when compared to other breeds."

It is important to the life processes of the animal that a normal temperature be maintained, emphasizes Boleman. The normal body temperature to cattle taken rectally averages 101.5 degrees F. and has a range of 100.4-102.8 degrees F. It is lower in cold weather, in older animals and at night. Rising environmental temperatures as well as excitement, exercise and infection increase this body temperature along with the pulse and respiration rates.

The pulse rate indicates the rapidity of heart action. It can be taken either on the outside of the jaw just above its lower border, on the soft area immediately above the inner dewclaw, or just above the hock joint. The normal pulse rate is 60-70 per minute.

To determine the respiration rate, place the hand on the flank or observe the rise and fall of the flanks. The normal respiration rate is 10-30 per minute.

"With proper care during hot weather cattle can continue to function efficiently," adds Boleman. "The key is to keep their rate of activity down."

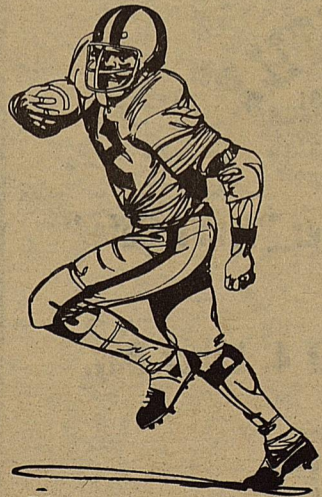

## Borden County Shares Economic Boost

THE MULTI-BILLION DOLLAR BOOST that oil and gas industry operations gave to the Texas economy in 1977 was shared by the citizens of Borden County.

The marketed value of petroleum production in the county has been calculated at \$103.4-million in an economic activity profile of the state's top producing counties prepared by the Dallas-based Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

"Texas' oil and gas industry remains the cornerstone to the economy of the state and of many of its counties," said the Association's president, H.B. (Hank) Harkins, Alice, independent producer and drilling company executive "It is imperative that the state maintain taxing and regulatory policies which will encourage the growth of this industry."

Borden was one of 201 counties last year which produced petroleum with a marketed value of \$100,000 or more. The county ranked 44th in the estimated total value of petroleum produced. The Association has computed that some \$93.5-million came from the production of 10.3-million barrels of crude oil, with approximately \$9.9-million attributed to an output of 11-million MCF of natural gas. Payments last year to owners of royalty in the county were calculated at \$12.9-million.

While paying local, county and state property taxes, producers in the county also helped support state government through production tax payments estimated at \$5-million. This included \$4.3 million from crude oil output, \$746,400 from natural gas.

The search for additional petroleum continues in Borden County last year. Oil and gas developers spent an estimated \$3.6-million in the drilling of 23 wells, including eight classified as wildcats. Some \$1.6-million of that amount was lost in 11 dry holes. The 12 strikes all were oil wells.

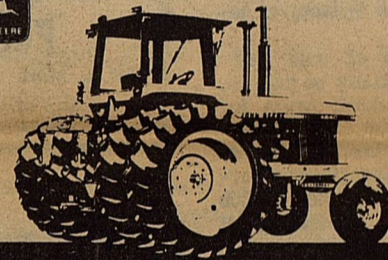
