### RAIL DISPUTE HEADED FOR SETTLEMENT

CHICAGO — (AP) — The prolonged wage-hour dispute between the nation's railroads and a million non-operating employees today appeared headed for final settlement.

The 16 non-operating unions and the carriers, deadlocked in negotiations, agreed yesterday to submit remaining issues to a presidential fact-finding board for a final and binding decision.

The main issue reportedly holding up settlement of the 10-month-old dispute is over application of the 40-hour work week to the railroad industry. Spokesmen for the unions and railroads will submit the disputed issues to the emergency board at a meeting today but there was no indication a settlement would be reached at the initial session. They said severe penalties may involve much discussion.

This is the third time the three-man emergency board has been called to study the dispute, which threatens a strike of the non-operating employees. The workers — shopmen, clerks, maintenance men, telegraphers, signmen and others — approved a strike several weeks ago but no call was issued pending further negotiations.

After first studying the dispute, the board on Dec. 17 recommended a reduction in the work week from 48 to 40 hours, effective next Sept. 1. It also recommended a wage hike of seven cents an hour, retroactive to last Oct. 1.

The unions had asked for the shorter week, time and one-half for Saturdays, double time for Sundays.

**Patrons of Red Cross Drive Warned**

Residents should be sure they receive a sticker or button when they contribute to the current Red Cross drive, Mickey Ledrick, general drive chairman, said today.

A local woman, who has been a Red Cross supporter for many years, reported yesterday that a man rang her doorbell and asked for her Red Cross contribution. When he did not leave her a Red Cross sticker and button, she became suspicious. He said he would bring her the button and sticker later.

The woman notified the Red Cross office only to find that he had impersonated a volunteer worker. He got \$5 from the woman and may have used the same routine at other homes.

"Before residents contribute to the drive," Ledrick said, "they should be sure the worker has his supplies."

The drive officially began at 7:30 a. m. yesterday at the kick-off breakfast in the Palm Room of the City Hall. The first day of the drive for \$8,749, netted \$1,236. Most of the total was sent to the Red Cross office by mail. Volunteer workers have not yet turned in their contact cards.

Chairmen of the various Red Cross committees include: Huey Laycock, rural campaign; E. J. Haslam, industrial division; Jack Edmondson, school drive; and Frank Wall, before campaign.

The tulip bulbs will be of the Darwin variety, in red, pink, white, yellow and lavender. The daffodils, King Alfred variety, are trumpet-shaped yellow flowers, it was said.

## Sherman County Wildcat Brings New Oil Excitement to Panhandle

New excitement was evident in oil circles late yesterday after the Phillips Petroleum Co. ran a drill stem test on its No. 1 Kathryn, a wildcat in Sherman County.

The test was made at a depth of between 5312 and 5350 feet as the well was being tested back up the hole after reaching granite.

An estimated 10 million feet of gas which undoubtedly contained some distillate resulted from the test. Gas reached the surface within two minutes. After the tool was opened a 5-inch choke had been placed in the bottom of the hole and it was through this choke that the test penetrated. This fact would strongly indicate that the well is even better than the test showed, according to oilmen informants.

This gas show was found in Pennsylvania pay which would indicate there is some connection between the pay in the Kathryn and that of the Sinclair-Prairie-Lapps well which recently was run in the same area. There was stated that the pay found in the Sinclair-Lapps well is probably in the Mississippian. Though these two wells are from 40 to 50 miles apart, there is reason to believe that their structural formations are similar.

A Phillips official appearing before the API in its regular meeting last night at the Palm Room stated there is every reason to believe that the Phillips-Jontie well also followed the same structural pattern with some deviation.

The Phillips-Kathryn, Section 8, Block 3-B, GH & H Survey, Sherman County, in the western part of the Anadarko Basin. Total depth of the well was 7739 where granite proved to be relatively high.

## Filibuster May Be Checked to HST

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Democratic leaders indicated today they will check the next move to President Truman if they fail in their first formal attempt to break a Southern filibuster in the Senate.

Senator Lucas of Illinois, the party chief, told a reporter the administration's course will be a matter for "top level policy discussion" if the Senate rejects a debate-limiting cloture petition Lucas starts circulating today.

Dixie lawmakers were ready to resume for the first time since Saturday afternoon a talkathon against a proposed filibuster-crippling change in the Senate rules. The Senate recessed Monday because of the death of Senator Broughton (D-N.C.).

Senator Russell (D-Cal.) said some other senators may discuss other matters as happened yesterday before Senator Lyndon Johnson (D-Texas) took office.

Republican Senators Watkins of Utah and Clegg of Washington took up all of a nine-hour Senate session yesterday.

In a two-hour speech, Watkins demanded early publication of the text of the proposed North Atlantic security pact.

Then Cain spoke for 6 hours and 45 minutes against President Truman's appointment of Mon C. Wallgren, former Washington Governor, as chairman of the National Security Resources Board.

Lucas commented after the session that the day's performance proved that "the Republicans have joined with Southern Democrats in a filibuster."

Lucas called Northern and Western Democrats into a huddle to get cloture petition signatures. He also wanted to sound out their views on continuing the fight to pave the way for action on the President's civil rights program.

When the cloture petition is filed — which may be tomorrow — it may prompt a ruling from Vice President Barkley that two-thirds of those voting can stop the present filibuster against the rules change proposal.

The rules change would let two-thirds of those voting get Senate debate at any time.

Senate Republicans may join with the Dixie Democrats to reverse the vice president.

That would give the southerners a clear track to continue talking.

The administration would have to decide whether to try to wear out the Dixie members, at the possible cost of rent controls and other legislation or whether to abandon most of its hopes for its civil rights bills.

## GEOLOGIST DISCUSSES NEW POOL

Approximately two hundred oil men and business men of the Panhandle Area crowded into the Palm Room of the Pampa City Hall last night to attend a half-hour meeting of the Panhandle Chapter of the American Petroleum Institute.

Interest was created in the meeting following the announcement that G. L. Knight, division geologist for the Phillips Petroleum Co., would discuss the Jenkie and Carruth wells, and explain the tie-in between these wells, the Sinclair-Lapps, and the Elk City, Oklahoma field.

Knight, graduate of the Universities of Missouri and Wisconsin, former professor of geology at Kansas University, and present head of the Phillips Geological Department, with offices in Amarillo, has followed the geological development in this area for the past 13 years.

After explaining the connection between the Hugoton, Kans. field to the Panhandle field, Knight demonstrated by maps and figures how the various geologic strata forming the Jenkie and Carruth fields and the known area identified by the name of Anadarko Basin.

Knight explained that because of the structural formation above the Anadarko Basin it was extremely difficult and practically impossible to establish formation proof by means of seismicography. (See GEOLOGISTS, Page 10)

## Quake Jolts Frisco Area

SAN FRANCISCO — (AP) — An earthquake shook the San Francisco Bay area early today, causing no serious damage.

But burglar alarms went off, electrical fixtures swayed and rocks rolled off Telegraph Hill, and with considerable concern some San Franciscans recalled the great quake of 1906.

There were two shocks felt between 4:29 and 4:30 a. m., from the Santa Clara Valley, 60 miles south of San Francisco, to Sacramento, 90 miles northeast.

Mill Valley, in Marin County north of the Golden Gate, felt the shocks strongly, as did the East Bay cities of Richmond, Berkeley, Oakland and Alameda.

## Man Jailed on Exposure Charge

Bond of \$500 was set this morning by County Judge Bruce Parker on Guadalupe Gonzales, Santa Fe section hand, who pleaded not guilty to charges of indecent exposure.

Gonzales, unable to speak English, was charged by County Attorney John Studer with indecent exposure in front of a 13-year-old girl yesterday afternoon near the Santa Fe tracks on W. Tying. County officials had to go searching for someone who spoke Spanish before the section hand could be questioned.

Taken before Judge Parker, Gonzales pleaded not guilty and was placed under \$500 bond. Unable to post the bond, he was sent to the county jail to await trial.

He was picked up yesterday afternoon by Capt. E. G. Aherns and Patrolman S. B. Patterson near the scene of the alleged incident.

## Man Charged With Wife Beating Jailed

Unable to pay a \$25 fine plus costs, Lonnie Connor was committed to the county jail this morning on a charge of beating his wife last night during a family fight in The Plains.

Connor admitted to County Judge Bruce Parker that he hit his wife in the face with his fist while they were fighting last night.

## Clear Sailing Is Seen for U.S. Passage

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Secretary Acheson said today the Atlantic treaty, as now drafted, makes clear the nations signing it will defend themselves against aggression from any quarter.

Summarizing at a news conference the negotiations on the treaty text, Acheson pictured the pact as the end result of Western policy developments brought on by Russia's blocking of peace.

Only yesterday, the secretary of state discussed the proposed treaty with the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. The members informally approved a final treaty draft.

Acheson did not disclose the treaty text in his news conference discussion. But he said that in his opinion the United States, Canada and the countries of Western Europe have, through the text as it now stands, accomplished four major achievements:

1. They have recognized the fact of life in preparing to establish a formal relationship between the United States and the Western European countries. Acheson said this relationship is not artificial but has existed 200 years or more and has its roots in the common ideas and common institutions of freedom.
2. The treaty, in every word and every thought, fits within the United Nations Charter and makes clear the determination of the United States and its associates (See DEFENSE, Page 10)

## Ex-Pampan Indicted on Forgery

Damon Donald Blake, formerly of the American Hotel, Pampa, was indicted yesterday by a federal grand jury in Fort Worth for theft of a money order and forging an endorsement on it.

Blake was arrested here several weeks ago by the Sheriff's Department in connection with the theft of the money order made out to Roy Lewis, Pampa.

Blake admitted to officers here that he had taken the money order out of the American Hotel, mail box where it had been delivered by mistake. He added he attempted to cash it at Cretney's Drug Store and later got a friend to identify him to L. E. Long, manager of the American Hotel, Long and bank officials called the Sheriff's Department when the bank spotted the fraud.

Blake is being held in Amarillo for Federal Court. He indicated to officers here he intended to plead guilty to the charge.

At the time of the arrest, Lewis told The News he had known Blake for 20 years and that both of them had virtually grown up together. The money order was for \$30.

## Union Printers Get \$80 Minimum Scale

NEW ORLEANS — (AP) — A strike of some 100 union printers has been averted here after employers agreed to demands for an \$80 weekly minimum.

A. T. Herbert, president of the New Orleans Typographical Union No. 17, (AFL), said yesterday the new scale in commercial establishments will be \$80 for day and \$83 for night work. Previous scale was \$72 and \$75.

## BATTLE CRY — 'GET THE FARMER OUT OF THE MUD' — GETS RESULTS

AUSTIN — (AP) — Battle cries—"Get the farmer out of the mud," "Help the aged needy," and "Pay the legislators decent salaries"—roused representatives to action yesterday.

The House Highways and Roads Committee whipped out a \$15 million-a-year bill for rural road building. The voice vote recommending House passage of Senator Nevelle H. Golsong's bill was unanimous.

The House endorsed a proposed Constitutional amendment to knock the \$35 million yearly ceiling off state spending for old age pensions and aid to dependent children and blind. Debate was bitter, but the vote was decisively in favor of the resolution, 109 to 20.

Rep. Vernon McDaniel's proposal for higher pay for legislators was even more popular. It got a 118 to 15 vote. The Wichita Falls representative wants Texas voters to decide whether legislators should receive an annual salary of \$2,700, plus \$10 a day expense money during 120 days of the regular sessions every two years.

The present pay rate is \$10 a day hereafter until the session ends. They get no pay after the Legislature adjourns.

Mrs. Golsong's rural road bill introduced in the Senate nine-

days ago, needs only to clear the House to reach Gov. Beauford H. Jester's desk. Jester has endorsed the proposal despite the fact it calls for spending \$5 million more each year than he originally recommended.

The measure sets up a special fund to be used only for building hard-surface secondary roads. The fund will receive \$1,250,000 each month from the state's unallocated clearance fund. The Highway Department is to build rural roads in areas where they are considered most needed.

Rep. C. S. McLellan of Eagle Lake, a member of the Highways and Roads Committee, said he was for Mrs. Golsong's bill. He had won Revenue and Taxation Committee approval earlier in the day on his natural gas tax bill to provide money for all-weather, feeder roads.

He says his bill will give farmers the roads they need most, ones that will link them with the secondary, or farm-to-market roads built by Mrs. Golsong's bill. Substitute versions of firemen and policemen minimum pay and civil service bills were recommended for passage by the Senate State Affairs Committee.

Senator Walter Tynan of San Antonio said the substitute for his bill would give a 10 percent raise to firemen and policemen in cities of 40,000 or more pop-

ulation. Increases would be optional in smaller cities.

Permissive provisions replaced mandatory ones to which city officials objected in his civil service bill, Senator Kyle Vick of Waco said.

The revised proposition also omits plans to let firemen and policemen apply unused sick leave to the paid vacation period, and allows cities to hire a fire chief or police chief from anywhere in Texas.

Also approved by the Senate Affairs Committee was a bill allowing the Lower Colorado River Authority to double its bonding limits from \$25 to \$50 million. Legislation to create a Sabine River Authority was sent to subcommittee for rewriting.

The House Oil and Gas Committee approved an amended oil unitization bill, 12 to 6, recommending it for House passage. Despite revision to alleviate opposition, the measure still is expected to face tough sledding on the House floor.

After hearing testimony of attorneys, judges and teachers, on need for revising the state's criminal laws and court procedures, the House Criminal Jurisprudence Committee postponed for one week action of a bill to set up a commission to study and recommend revisions.



# MANY MUST ESTIMATE TAX RETURN

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the last of 12 stories explaining who must do what about his 1948 (or 1949) income tax return. The deadline is March 15.)

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The estimated tax return. What is it? Who must do something about it?

Some people, besides filing their 1948 income tax return by March 15 and paying up any tax owed, must—

Also by March 15 file an estimated tax return—it's called a "declaration of estimated tax"—on their 1949 income and pay on that too.

Who's in this group? Two kinds of people:

1. Those, like landlords and doctors, who won't have any tax at all withheld from their 1949 income.

2. Those, like wage-earners and salaried people, who'll have some tax, but not the full tax for 1949, withheld from their pay.

Because "estimate" means just what it says, the people in the two groups must do this by March 15:

1. Estimate what their 1949 income will be and what the tax on it should be.

2. Then start paying—in four installments—the difference between the tax withheld from them, if any, and the full tax they'll owe for 1949. The other payments are due June 15, Sept. 15 and Jan. 15, 1950.

If you find you'll owe more tax than will be withheld from you, then you must file an estimate and start paying by March 15 the first of the four installments of the difference between the tax withheld and the full tax owed.

File your estimate on Form 1040-ES. It's a very brief form, printed in blue ink. On the back of it are the same table and formula you used with the 1949 long or short forms in figuring your 1948 tax.

Be sure in figuring your estimated tax that you claim all your exemptions and the standard deductions explained in the previous stories.

And when you hand over, or mail, your estimated return to the internal revenue collector, enclose with it the first of the four payments on any estimated tax you owe.

1950. The idea is to have everyone on a pay-as-you-go system. Those who must make an estimated return and four installment payments should be paid up in full around the year's end, too.

If you should make \$600 or more this year, and no tax is withheld, you must make an estimated return.

(Because that income is so low, you may not owe any tax or have to make any payments. Still, you must make a return.)

If tax is regularly withheld from your pay—but you'll get more than \$100 income from which no tax is withheld—you must file a return and figure whether you have to make those installment payments.

Generally, employers withhold full tax on their employees' pay up to \$4,500, plus \$600 for each exemption claimed.

Example: Jones, single, will get \$5,100 in salary. He doesn't have to file an estimate. Full tax is withheld on the first \$4,500 of his pay, and then he gets the next \$600 as his personal exemption.

But Smith, single, with a \$9,000 salary, must file an estimate and start paying the difference between the tax withheld and the full tax owed.

Adams, married, has \$5,700. No estimate for him. Full tax is withheld from him up to \$4,500. Then he gets \$1,200 in exemptions, \$600 for himself, \$600 for his wife.

If you're wondering what all this means, do this: You know what you get a week or a month in pay and how much tax is being withheld from you every week or month.

So figure how much you'll get this year and how much tax will be withheld from it.

Then previous stories explained how to do it—figure what your full tax on your income for the year should be.

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Freedom Train soon will be rolling again across the country and residents of many a small city can thank Rep. Homer Thornberry of Austin when it stops in their home town.

A member of the committee which considered legislation financing the train's future tour, Thornberry devoted his first speech in the House to the subject.

"It is only right that the history-laden train visit small towns," he said, "because I feel the people of these communities have time and again demonstrated their willingness to be first when there is fighting to be done—first when there are taxes to be paid, and first when there is work to be done for the general welfare of their country."

Colleagues applauded and promptly passed the measure, which provides \$2,500,000 to operate the historic train until July 5, 1951. (The train was set up, and maintained until now by a private foundation.)

**Heir to A&P Fortune Plans Aid to Struggling Artists**

NEW YORK — (AP) — "When a young artist gets out of college," said Huntington Hartford, "he ought to work at it."  
"He ought to sit down and paint, or compose. But how can he if he has to look for a job? How can he write novels or script heads if he is tied to a filling station five days a week?"  
Huntington Hartford is going to do something about that.

Young Hartford is the heir to the A&P grocery fortune. He is 37. He has more than a million in annual income of his own. In his younger days he wanted to be a reporter — and found out that too much money is almost as bad as too little. So he says he plans to endow, through the Huntington Hartford Foundation, not a school for geniuses, as was reported, but a place where the up-and-comers of today can go instead of killing their incentive in corner garages. As he plans it, his sanctuary will have about 150 acres in the Santa Monica Mountains of California. There will be cabins with soundproofed walls for composers. The painters will have plenty of light. There will be all the necessary tools for writers.

"Our little community will be complete in itself," he said. "There will be a large dining room, with motion pictures. The University of California at Los Angeles is interested and we are working out a deal for the use of their library."  
But it won't be a school in any sense of the word — no classrooms, no professors. Just work, and the equipment to work with.

"I want to get them away from fuel and light bills," said Hartford. "Away from the rent." How will applicants be selected?  
"If you are a writer of promise, you must be recommended by at least two established men in that field. For instance, if you have merit as a novelist, we'd like an okay from, say, Sinclair Lewis and Lloyd Douglas. People like that."

"Take Clifford Odets. He was quoted recently as saying he borrowed \$2,000 to move West and rehabilitate himself. An established writer of Odets' qualifications probably would be welcome to live in our community, freed from financial worries, until he wrote his way out of his difficulties. It would be good for him and it certainly would have a stimulating effect on the young writers around him."

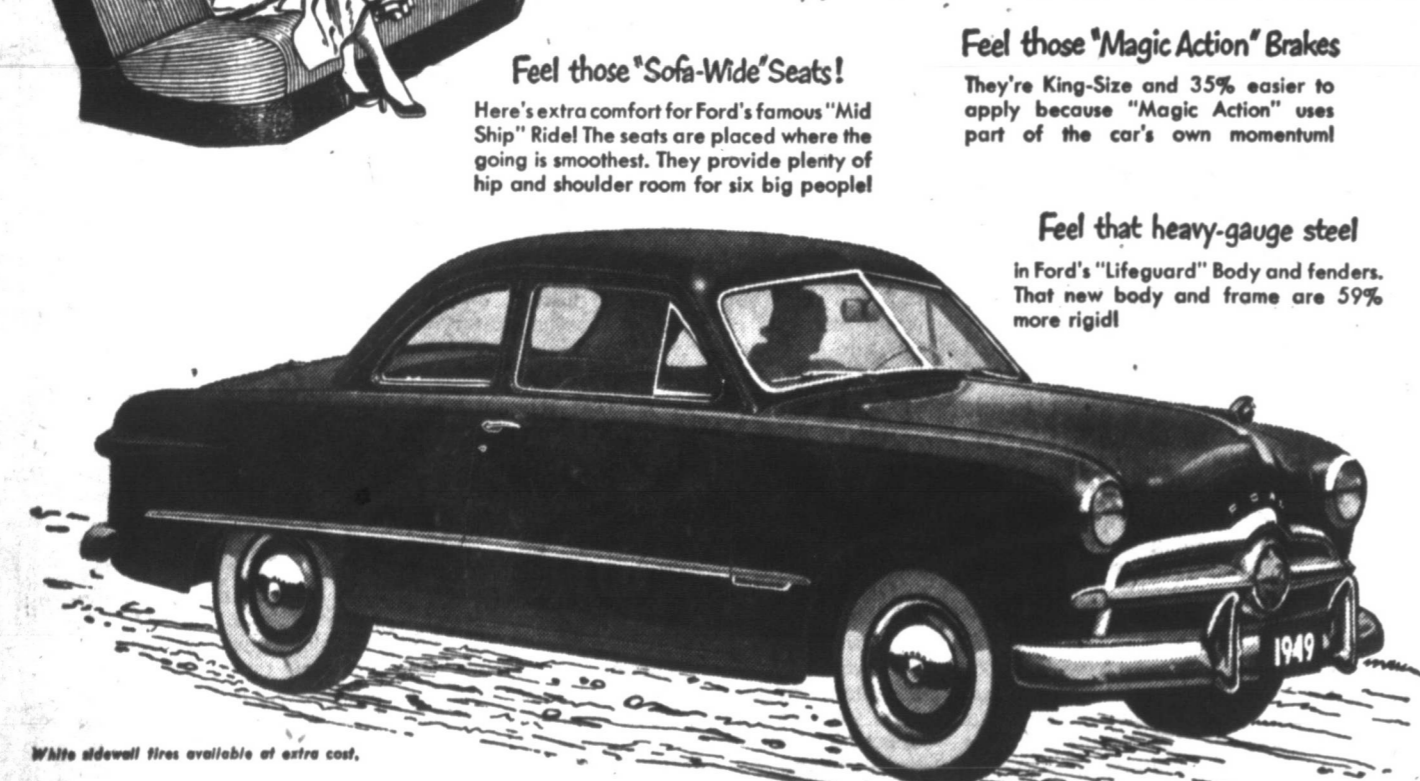

individual groups that made up this vast herd, and with guns mounted on their rest-sticks, killed them off in bunches... Thus harassed by a continual hunt, the main southern herd drifted to the south. The hunters followed in the spring of 1874, and met them on their migration north, on and below the Canadian, in the Panhandle of Texas.

And so the slaughter went on with concentrated fury around Fort Griffin and the foot of the Plains down through 1878, when the bulk of the southern herd, estimated in excess of three million animals, was killed off. Then the Indians, with insufficient food to sustain them, were forced back on the paternalism of the federal government.

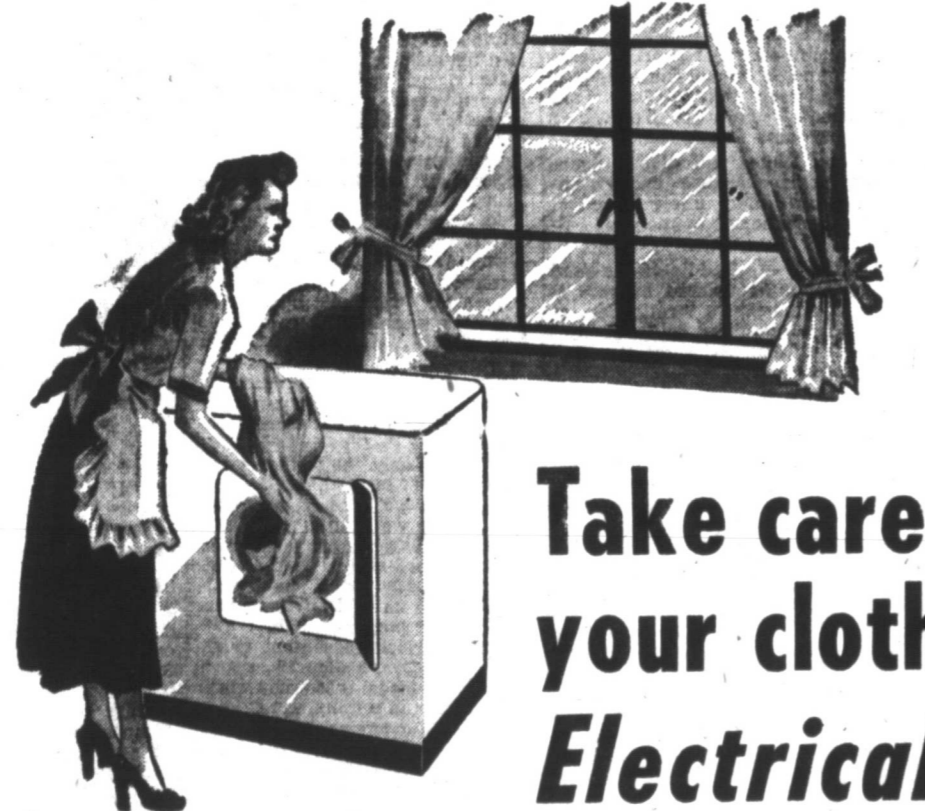

Two Suing Ballplayers Ask For Quick Action by Court

By WILL GRIMSLEY NEW YORK — (AP) — A quick showdown in the courts was sought today by two former St. Louis Cardinal pitchers who are suing Organized Baseball for \$2,500,000 damages as an outgrowth of their suspensions for jumping to the Mexican League.

The obtained a federal court order directing baseball to show cause next Tuesday why it should not be temporarily restrained from enforcing both the suspension and the reserve and termination clauses of its standard contracts.

It's the reserve clause, the legal backbone of the sport binding a player to one club until that club is ready to dispose of him, that is under fire in this and an earlier \$300,000 suit by Danny Gardella, former New York Giant outfielder.

The Gardella suit is still pending in the courts. A U. S. Court of Appeals recently held the case should be heard.

John L. Flynn of New York, attorney for Lanier and Martin, said he expected the show-cause order to produce an "early and definite" decision in baseball's running court battle with banished players.

Commissioner A. B. Chandler and other officials of baseball involved in the suits had no comment.

Named as defendants were Chandler; Ford C. Frick, president of the National League; Will Harridge, president of the American League; George W. Trautman, president of the National Association (minor) and the 16 major league clubs.

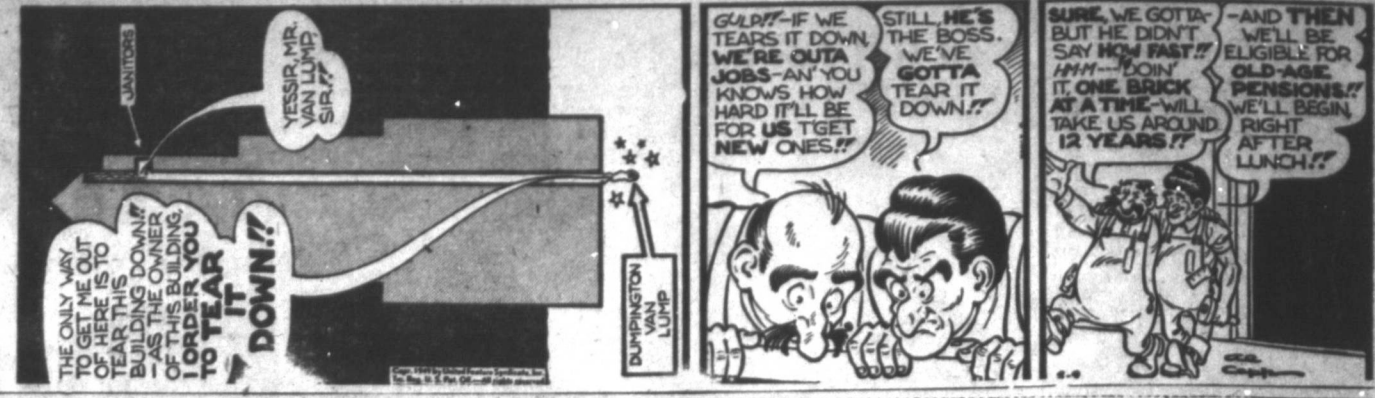

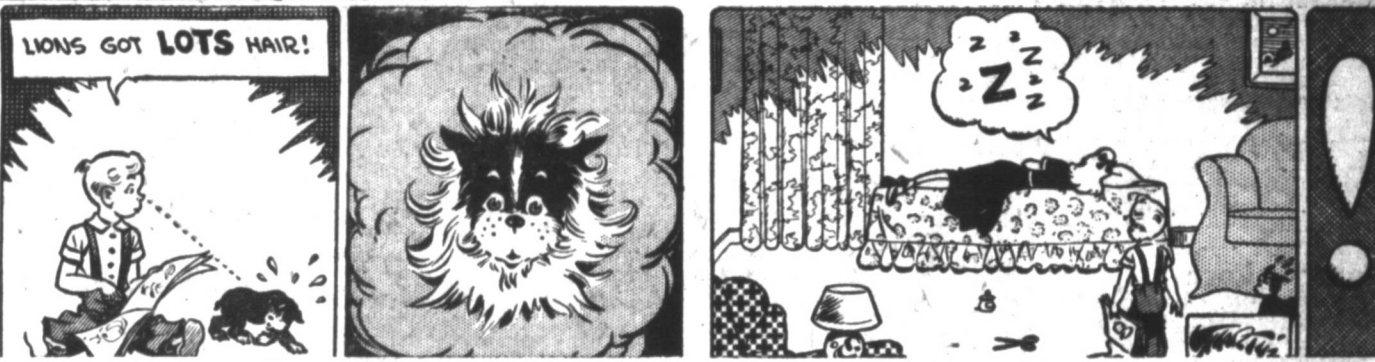

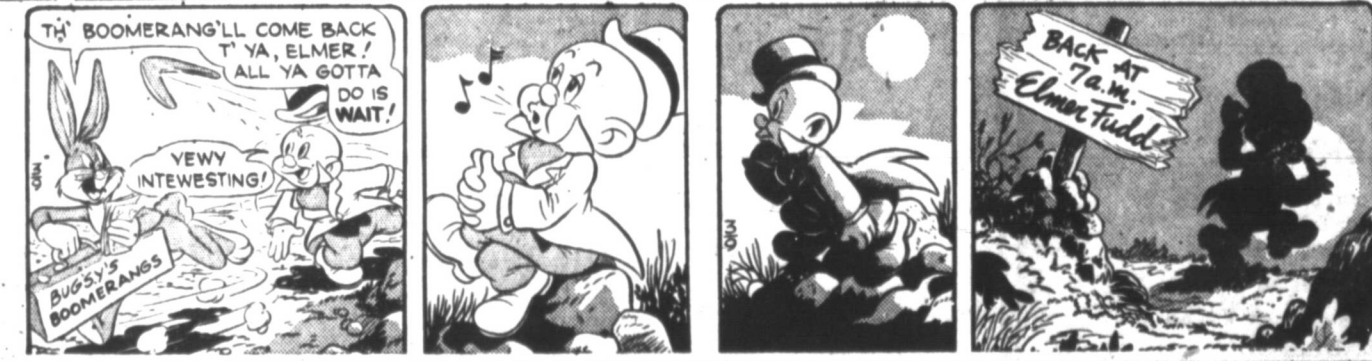

nations to exercise their inherent right of self defense as recognized in the United Nations Charter against aggression from any quarter.

3. Further, the treaty as now drawn provides means for eliminating a sense of security and thereby aiding recovery among the signatory nations. Presumably Acheson meant, though he did not specifically say it, that the Marshall Plan countries of Europe, having extraordinary assurance of United States military support, will feel less fear of war and generate greater confidence in the future—a confidence necessary to economic progress.

4. The treaty will set up what Acheson called the institutional aids and machinery which will make the regional security principles effective. The machinery will include a consultative body of the member nations and a sort of North Atlantic regional high command.

The pact would have the effect of binding the United States to the defense of Western Europe, although it would still be up to Congress to determine in event of an attack whether war should be declared by the United States against the aggressor.

The alliance is intended to make such a demonstration of unity on the part of the Western powers that Russia, if it was ever so tempted, would not dare to attack any one of them.

The text of the proposed treaty is expected to be made public in about a week, before it is signed. Officials now believe it will be signed by the end of the month—possibly at a meeting of foreign ministers of the Atlantic powers in Washington.

Only after the signing, in which eight or more countries are due to participate, will the treaty be formally presented to the Senate for committee hearings and finally a Senate vote.

## Hotel Floor Provides Plan For New Hexagon Elevator

PERRYTON (AP)—It's a long jump from a linoleum floor to a modern concrete grain elevator, but that's where this elevator got its start.

Residents of Farnsworth, Texas, a small hamlet located in the great wheat growing section of the Texas Panhandle, thought the construction workers were "off the beam" when they laid out the forms for the 265,000-bushel elevator of the Perryton Equity last May. The forms were "skewed" instead of round.

Concrete grain elevators are commonplace in this area, and even Farnsworth, with less than 100 population, already had a 400,000-bushel concrete elevator, owned by the Batman Grain Co. All other concrete elevators in this area are conventional round bins, however, not hexagonal like the Farnsworth Equity elevator.

This one is the second radically different hexagon elevator to be built in this country.

The first was a 6,800,000 bushel terminal elevator at Enid, Okla., built by the Union Equity Exchange. That's where the linoleum floor comes in—

For a number of years E. N. Puckett, Union Equity's general manager, had felt that there must be a more economical way to build a grain elevator than the conventional cylindrical method. While he was on a vacation at Hot Springs, Ark., he happened to notice the honeycomb design on the linoleum floor of a hotel lobby.

It was conventional enough as a floor, but the thought struck Puckett that this was the answer to his long search for an efficient and economical elevator design.

He copied the design and then turned the sketch over to his engineers with orders to make plans for building an elevator like that.

The original hexagon elevator, completed in 1948, has proved highly satisfactory, and the Perryton Equity of Perryton, Texas, largest grain concern in the Texas wheat belt, decided to build one at its Farnsworth station. The elevator was completed last October and is ready for the expected big 1949 wheat harvest.

It has 14 bins with six small bins, located at the ends. Since each bin has common walls with adjoining bins, less concrete and steel are needed to construct the same amount of storage space. There is no dead space between the bins, as can be seen from looking at a honeycomb design as contrasted with a design of circles.

It started from a linoleum pattern, but there is really nothing new about this design. As Aldon Bell, Perryton Equity general manager, says, "after all, the bees learned this design a long time ago. We're just now catching up."

## SPORTS AFIELD

By TED KESTING

Within the last half century, hunting has become a mass pastime to a greater extent than ever before in this country. Likewise, sport fishing has increased by leaps and bounds. Along with this increase, there is much evidence to indicate a decline in the average level of sportsmanship.

This decline in standards of conduct among sportsmen is a serious matter writes Dr. Ira H. Gabrielson in his forthcoming book "Wildlife Management." Dr. Gabrielson is president of the Wildlife Management Institute and formerly was head of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

He remarks that there are many different opinions as to what constitutes good sportsmanship, but all definitions should include some, if not most, of the following:

Shoot only when the game is clearly visible. Observance of this rule would eliminate many of the fatal hunting accidents that occur each year.

Shoot only when game is within range. Every man who goes into the field with a gun should know accurately its range and pattern.

Shoot only at individual targets. Don't shoot blindly into a flock of birds. If the majority of gunners would follow this practice, crippling losses could be greatly reduced.

Take only what can be used. Too many sportsmen like to play Santa Claus by bringing home game or fish to distribute to their friends. Too often the gifts promptly find their way into the garbage can.

Don't be a limit hound. Give the game more than an even break. Those who handicap themselves by self-imposed rules have many thrilling memories which are denied those who measure success by the number of kills.

Practice the golden rule toward your fellow sportsmen and landowners. 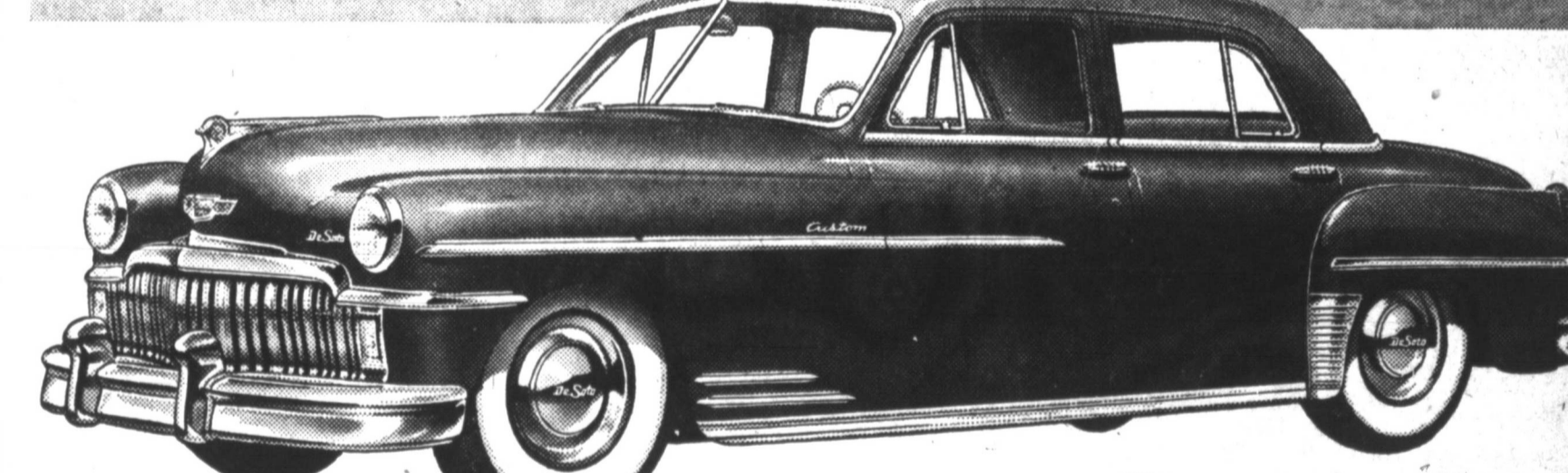
