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

DOUBLE STANDARDS

Double-standards are a major curse of our age! Nations, organized groups, and individuals are all guilty of demanding certain principles and standards of others which they re-

fuse to apply equally to the selves. What this must mean is that we have largely abandon principles ed only with our personal sympathies and privil-

For example, angry voices are now being raised in protest against the "landlords' strike" in Tulsa, Oklahoma. But many of these protesting voices have always demanded this very same right for themselves! Do the leaders of organized-labor protest because innocent and helpless tenants will get hurt? But they themselves have always refused to accept restrictions upon their own organized actions, regardless how many innocent and helpless persons get hurt! By what moral principle do some groups, but not others, have the right to organize which they do not like??

Double-standards are also ap-

parent in the proposed "civil-rights" legislation. Advocates insist that discrimination against persons because of their color or religion must be made a federal crime. Then why not make discrimination against persons because of their sex, or age, or nonunion membership an equal crime? If an individual is denied a job for which he is qualified, what difference does the cause of discrimination make? Also, if mob-violence is to be made a federal crime in race-relations, then why is it-not made a federal crime labor-relations? What difference does it make to the victim



M. U., Baylor, T. C. U., and so on. The Governor would name the examining board from the people who teach these subjects. What could be fairer?

The Minimum Standards Bill is not against anyone. It is for the public. It will help guarantee to you that all future practitioners prove they are basically qualified to treat you when your life may be at stake.


