### Tag Match Is Feature on Mat Card at Sportatorium

#### Par Smashed As Houston Open Starts

HOUSTON.—The 60 golfers in the Saturday-Sunday final rounds of the \$10,000 Houston Open tournament may have to hold a score of par or better to qualify.

Houston's new Pine Forest Country Club took such a par-dribbling in yesterday's opening round that 49 players found the 6510-yard course at par 72 or lower. Sixteen others were only one-over.

Jim Turnesa, Briar Cliff, N.Y., one of seven famous golfing brothers took the biggest slice off the course's regulation figures.

He slipped in quietly with a 33-336 while most of the rain-soaked gallery was watching the putting of Johnny Palmer, Badin, N.C., who had collected a five-under 31 of the front nine.

That was two strokes less than any of the 140 other players had needed and he fans figures Palmer was a cinch as the day's leader.

He picked up a birdie on the back nine but faltered on the last two greens missing from 10 and eight feet away. That gave him a 31-36-67 and a second place tie with George Schoux, San Francisco, an early finisher who went out in 34 and came in at 33.

Clumped one stroke back with 68's were E. J. (Dutch) Harrison, Albuquerque, N.M., Bob Hamilton, Landover, Md., Les Kennedy, Pawtucket, R.I., and Ary Middlecott, Memphis, Tenn.

Eight were tied at 69 and seven at 70. Fourteen more had 71's, including the pre-tournament favorites Jimmie Demaret, Ojai, Calif., and Lloyd Mangrum, Chicago.

Tied with Ford were Marly Furgol, Albuquerque, N.M., Fred Hawkin, Antioch, Ill., Chandler Harper, Portsmouth, Va., Erl Monti, Santa Monica, Calif., Bob Toaki, Northampton, Mass., Jim Ferrier, San Francisco, and Herman Kesser, St. Andrew, Ill.

Sammy Snead, White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., headed the group clustered at 70.

Other big name players had 71's.

WICHITA FALLS.—(AP)—A new collegiate athletic conference probably will be named tomorrow in Denton.

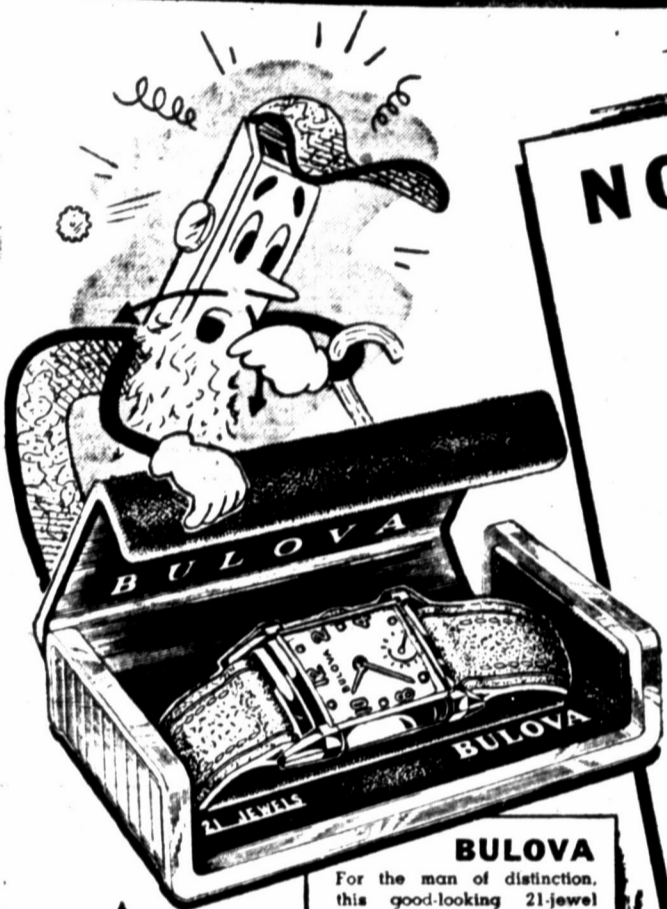

# WARREN'S WARM UP

**CONGRATULATIONS:** To the Harvesters and their Coach on the fine game they played last night. They proved again, to everyone, including themselves, that they can come through when the chips are really down. They played good basketball, and outscraped a team that had outscraped them twice previously.

## BETTER BOWLING

**EXAMINE GRIP:** New bowlers, especially, get the idea some knuckles are a necessary part of bowling . . . but that isn't the case at all. Instead of bravely enduring the pain (or maybe not so bravely!) I suggest you check up on the width of your grip. Aching knuckles always result when the grip is too narrow.

The back of the hand is forced upward and weakened when the fingers are congested and cramped. To hold the ball at all, it must be "pinched," when the grip is too narrow. The proper width of the span between finger and thumb insures a firm, comfortable hold of the ball throughout the swing, besides eliminating aching knuckles and blistering induced by "pinching."

The full weight of the ball must be taken up during the swing almost entirely by the fingers, and this is what creates the terrific pressure that soon wears on the knuckles.

First insert the finger (or fingers) when fitting the ball, to such depth that the ball reaches the ridge of the second knuckle. The fit should be snug, but NOT tight. Tight holes cause the ball to HANG ON at release, and the fingers are twisted. That's when the knuckle pains really start.

Next the thumb is fitted, and the width of the span should be such that the PULL of the hand fits snugly against the ball. There should be just a little pressure in the back of the hand—a feeling of PULL that gives strength. Spreading the fingers on the ball increases the firmness of the grip.

There should be an opening between palm and ball just large enough for a pencil to pass through with the hand on "TOP" when the ball is lifted (see illustration). If the opening is larger, WIDEN THE GRIP. Do this and steer clear of painful knuckle trouble.

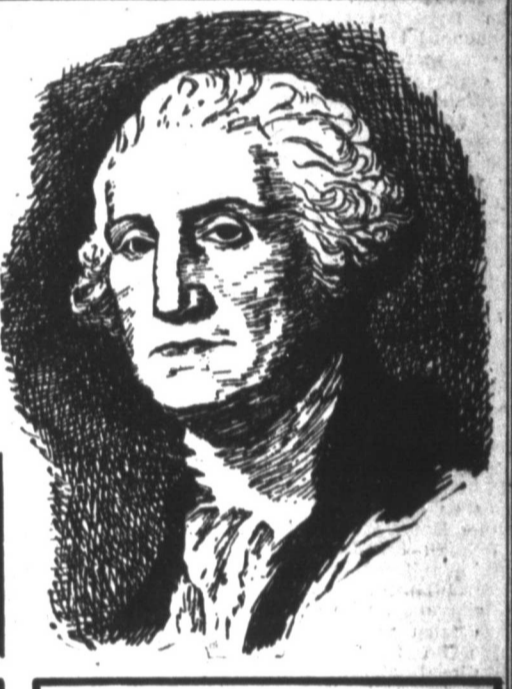

**How Did Jesus Choose His Apostles?**

Of the 12 men whom Jesus called to special discipleship, He said, "Ye have chosen Me, but I have chosen you."

These, whom we call "Apostles," and worthily so, were not Apostles at first. They were men from ordinary walks of life. There is no evidence that they were men of special education or training, though it is a great mistake to think of them as simple, or unlearned men.

The Jewish system of education, with schools attached to the synagogues and with the responsibility resting upon parents, assured the Jewish boy an education for his time and environment as sound as the average boy receives today. Their future work in the founding and leading of the Christian church made evident the training the disciples had in the Master's school.

In His companionship, but they undoubtedly had some education when they responded to the Master's call.

Why out of the many, did Jesus choose these particular men? We cannot answer that with full knowledge, but we can get some rather definite impressions, from the nature of the men, and the nature of the task to which Jesus called them.

It was not enough that they should be good men and well-intentioned. They must be good for the purpose for which Jesus chose them. They must be men of adventurous spirit, capable of endurance, men of ambition, willing to sacrifice everything for a cause and a worthwhile goal.

Their spirit was manifest in the bold declaration of James and John, "We are able." Their rivalry about who should be first.

**McKENNEY ON BRIDGE**

While today's hand may seem pretty simple to the expert, many good players would go after the wrong suit. Sure, West opens the queen of spades, you know that you have

two spade tricks and three heart tricks. You cannot hope for a fourth heart trick because the opponents' hearts will be divided at least 4-3.

The diamond suit is the solid suit. You have only one positive loser in diamonds. You are bound to make three diamond tricks as soon as you knock out the ace. But add them to the five tricks in spades and hearts, and you have only eight tricks. Your contract is for nine.

If you knock out the diamond ace first, West will win and come back without another spade. Now when you go to establish the club trick, West will win with the ace of clubs and run off the balance of his spades.

You should first win the opening spade lead. You can win it in either hand, but it may be better to win it in the closed hand with the ace, then lead a small club toward dummy's king. If West refuses to win, take the king and come back with a small club to your own hand. West has to win this trick, and you are assured of four club tricks, three hearts and two spades, the nine tricks needed for your contract.

Autopsy Said Necessary on Dallasite

DALLAS — (AP) — An autopsy was to be performed to determine which of several vicious wounds caused the death of Ray Adair Moore, 33, of Dallas.

Sheriff Bill Decker said the autopsy would be necessary to determine if a shot, a bashed-in skull, back stab or throat slashing caused Moore's death.

The man's mutilated body was found in a roadside ditch early yesterday.

His car was parked nearby and in the vicinity officers found a woman's lipstick and Moore's recently acquired false teeth.

A list of 10 names was found in his pocket. Officers have discounted an early theory that the names which might have been those of members of a pyramid club, had any connection with the slaying.

Decker tends to believe the killing was a grudge slaying. Officers said Moore was a hard worker with good habits. They said he had been married twice and that they talked to his two former wives.

He owned his home, where he kept a room. The rest of the house was rented to Mr. and Mrs. Jack Bratcher. They said Moore was afraid of the dark.

"When he had to stay home at night alone he would take the knobs off the doors," Bratcher said.

L. A. Hirsch, office manager of the Plastics Manufacturing Company where Moore worked, said the dead man had worked from 3 p.m. Tuesday until 11 p.m. His body was found at 7 a.m. yesterday.

Mrs. Effie Page, who lives near the spot where the body was found, said she heard a shot about 11:30 p.m. Tuesday.

State highway patrolmen are working with Sheriff Decker on the investigation. Officers said evidently Moore fought strongly for his life.

Custody Case Is Dismissed

A fight between grandparents for the custody of a minor child that wound up in 31st District Court, was dismissed this morning when testimony developed the child was in California with its mother and out of the jurisdiction of the court.

In direct language, Judge Lewis M. Goodrich dismissed the case before the first witness, Luke Graham, maternal grandfather of Rex Earl Collie, finished his testimony.

The court accused both sides of attempting to spite the other in their attempt to gain custody of the child.

The father of the baby, Earl Collie of McLean, was killed over a year ago in an automobile accident near McLean. The child's mother, in the meantime, remarried and moved to California where the baby has been taken recently.

Plaintiff in the case was Ross J. Collie, paternal grandparent. Luke Graham and wife were named as defendants in the case.

During the morning session of District Court two divorces were granted but judgments in neither were handed down by the court.
