and against a bill requiring civil service for firemen and policemen in cities over 10,000.

The first three Gimer-Aikin education bills, containing highly controversial provisions, were expected to attract a large audience at 7:30 p. m. The bills are in the hands of the Education Committee.

That committee was busy yesterday. It approved a bill providing that multiple lists of textbooks be made available for elementary grade schools to choose from, just as Texas high schools have been able to do for some 25 years.

House yesterday were 44 which went to the Appropriations Committee. They call for expenditure totaling \$160,792,846.

This does not include the vast amounts that will be requested for the public school system or the four essential bills which Kirkpatrick believes should have first priority.

He told his committee yesterday: "I recommend that subcommittees get to work on standing biennial appropriation bills immediately. The sooner we pass them the better off the state will be."

Filed for introduction in the House were two more proposed Constitutional amendments, one by Rep. Preston Mangum of Dallas to allow women as well as men to serve on juries, the other by Rep. S. J. Isaacks of El Paso to revise the setup of the state judiciary.

Isaacks' proposal would allow Justices of the Supreme Court and Justices of Criminal Appeals to receive salaries of not less than \$12,000 a year; justices of the courts of civil appeals, not less than \$10,000 and judges of

trial courts with jurisdiction in civil cases where more than \$2,000 is involved, not less than \$4,000. The measure also would create district nominating commissions composed of lawyers and laymen. These commissions would nominate three men for the Governor to choose from in filling vacancies for unexpired terms.

MORROW TO PLAN PARTY DINNERS; CONGRESSMAN SUGGESTS HE QUIT

PORT WORTH — (AP) — It's up to Wright Morrow, Texas' national Democratic committeeman, to decide how many Jefferson-Jackson Day dinners will be held in the state and where.

Party leaders gave Morrow authority to decide this question. Almost at the same time a Texas congressman called for his resignation.

Rep. Wright Patman of Texas said in Washington that Morrow is "a pretender in his present position," and he suggested that if Morrow refused to resign, state party officials should choose a liaison man to represent them in dealing with the Truman administration.

Morrow said he didn't "expect to take his (Patman's) advice," adding "he seems to be definitely in the minority with his feelings."

Certain elements of the state party had accused Morrow of disloyalty prior to the National Democratic Convention which nominated President Truman. Morrow has denied this, pointing to his contributions of time and money to the party.

Burr Jackson of Hillsboro said at Fort Worth that party leaders were "well pleased with Morrow and appreciate his support of the party" during the recent campaign.

The meeting here also restored the Democratic National Committee as the party's fund raising agency in Texas. This reversed a decision of conservative party leaders last spring that Texas should control its own cash.

Last spring, the then State Executive Committee chairman, Robert W. Calvert of Hillsboro, and Neville G. Penrose, a former state finance chairman, and others, decided that the Texas party should raise its own funds and then decide whether to give the national committee any money.

Previously the Jefferson-Jackson Day dinner take was turned over to the national party and it allotted money to the Texas party.

Morrow indicated an effort will be made to have a specified sum

allocated to Texas by the national party.

It was indicated at the meeting here that two or three dinners would be held this year. Fort Worth, Austin and Corpus Christi were mentioned more frequently than any other sites.

Morrow said he was sure the first dinner would be held before April 1 and the other shortly thereafter.

Patman suggested that the State Executive Committee meet "and select some person, perhaps Byron Skelton (of Temple) to represent it in dealing with the national administration."

He said Morrow "should step out of the picture" and let others of the party in the state organize the dinners.

"That would prevent a lot of friction and prevent some unpleasant situations," Patman said. "I guess a Democrat has a right to speak what he thinks," Morrow said in answer to Patman's remarks, "but I do not expect to take Patman's advice. I am surprised that he keeps talking about it. He has said it before."

Senator McGrath, chairman of the national committee, is willing to discuss party affairs with me. I talked with him during the inauguration in Washington and he told me the issue was closed.

"The senator definitely asked me to take charge of the Jefferson Day dinners in Texas and I expect to do my best in handling the matter."



tary purposes.
Hoffman's request for \$4,280,000,000 to be spent for Europe's recovery in fiscal 1950 is \$770 million less than ECA is spending during the first year's operation.

Already, he said, the recovery program has brought "an upsurge of hope and determination in Western Europe."

And he added this "is at least as important as economic recovery for the revival and maintenance of a free, strong, stable society in Europe."

Hoffman gave no breakdown of the funds by country. Some may need more than estimated, he added, and others may need less.

Europe has made "significant progress" in industrial and agricultural production, trade and financial stabilization, Hoffman said. Exports have gone up. Intra-European trade is increasing. And, he added, "ERP already has greatly strengthened the forces of freedom in Europe."

While he pointed out that ECA had encouraged little between Communist-controlled Eastern Europe and Western Europe, he added this is done only in cases "where it will clearly help Western European recovery."

Hoffman said ECA has been careful to protect our own national security in this trade and has screened the shipments going into the "iron curtain" countries.

Europe cannot recover by attempts to restore the old pre-war pattern of things, Hoffman said. "The task calls for rebuilding the economy of Europe along bold new lines," he said.

when it was finally disclosed that the cardinal had been sentenced to life imprisonment—not death.

The cardinal and other prominent Catholics were arrested Dec. 28, setting off one of the fiercest church-state controversies in modern times.

The trial brought to a climax the long running fight between the government and the cardinal, who has archbishop status. The Nazis when they were guiding the destinies of Hungary, and was imprisoned by them.

From the time in February, 1946, when he received the red hat symbolizing his high church office, the primate was at sword's point with the Communists who gradually took over the country and with the Russians.

The Russians first charged the Catholic clergy was inclined to the people against occupation forces.

The battle with the Communists grew when they announced plans to nationalize church schools. The cardinal opposed the measure all the way.

Johnson Urges Mohair Support

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Senator Lyndon Johnson of Texas Monday urged the Agriculture Department to "save the mohair industry" with a government price support program.

Johnson told Agriculture Secretary Brannon that low prices on mohair are discouraging maintenance of goat herds on Texas ranches and that the industry is threatened.

"I am informed that many ranchmen are disposing of their goat herds because production costs exceed the prices paid for mohair," he said.

Texas goats are being shipped direct to packing houses for slaughter while between 9 million and 10 million pounds of mohair is stored in warehouses for lack of a market, he said.

plays. Mr. Corbett used just good, sound reasoning.

His jump to three no trump over his partner's heart bid showed a powerful hand, but North, with his minimum hand, had to pass. If West had elected to open a club, there would have been no problem, but he opened the jack of diamonds.

Now Mr. Corbett could count only eight tricks—three spades, three diamonds and the ace-king of clubs. If the club finesse worked, or if the club suit broke 3-3, it would give him his ninth trick. However, Corbett decided against his line of play, figuring instead that he would establish dummy's fourth heart for the ninth trick. Bear in mind that he could always take the club finesse.

He won the opening lead of the jack of diamonds with the ace and led a heart. East won this trick with the queen and returned a diamond, which declarer won with the queen. Another heart was led. West won and came back with another diamond. This was won in dummy with the king and the third heart was led. East won, but he had no diamond to lead back; so Mr. Corbett was assured of nine tricks.

The Pied-Pipers of Hamline, who had swept through 15 opponents without a defeat met the inevitable last night—and it came from an unexpected source.



QUESTION OF RIGHTS IS COMPLICATED

WASHINGTON — (AP) — In this country does a man have the right to work or quit his job if he dislikes the working conditions? "Yes," you say, "this country every man is free to do as he pleases so long as he doesn't hurt someone else."
But does a man in an industry which affects the public health and welfare, like a railroad, have a right to quit if he dislikes his job?
Again you say "yes," for the same reason as before. But then comes a bigger question: Do all the railroad workers, banded together in a union, have a right to quit their job in a strike over working conditions?
Remember, before you say "yes," what a railroad strike might mean. If it lasted long enough it might starve the nation and cause a revolution against the government which failed to stop it and get food to the people.
Faced with that, you may say: "No. A union in a vital industry that should not be allowed to strike."
But isn't that contradicting what you just said a minute ago, when you said an individual has a right to strike if he doesn't like a job?
Yet, when it involves a collection of such individuals in a union, you say "no." How do you draw such a line?
Does an individual, in your mind, lose his individual rights when he and other individuals act upon their individual rights collectively?
You may answer something like this:
"When a strike by a union in a vital industry can hurt, or even destroy the general welfare, I say such a strike should not be permitted."
But if you compel an individual or a union, to work at any kind of job, isn't that a form of slavery? Isn't forcing a man to work against his will contrary to the Constitution which forbids "involuntary servitude?"
So our problem in this country is how to preserve the most freedom even when we find it necessary to restrict some freedoms for the general welfare.
A strike is labor's biggest and final weapon in trying to force an employer into an agreement on wages and working conditions.
And labor fears that once there was a law forbidding strikes in big, vital industries, inch by inch this power to stop strikes might spread to the most non-vital industries and, in time, prevent all strikes of any kind.
This is one of the problems Congress faces in trying to figure out a new labor law that will protect the freedom of individuals and unions and at the same time protect the general welfare from the damage of a big strike.

Concerning influenza, the statisticians comment that there is, as yet, no indication of the spread of the current European epidemic to this country.

Average Life Span Increased To All-Time High

NEW YORK — The average length of life among American wage earners and their families reached an all-time high of 67.16 years in 1948, about one third of a year higher than in 1947. These figures are based on the experience of the industrial policyholders of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company. Last year, which set a new low record for mortality, was the fifth in succession to show an improvement.
"The new minimum in 1948 was reached," the Metropolitan's statisticians note, "despite the high incidence of respiratory dis-


