

United States Is Called 'Meddler'

BUDAPEST; Hungary - (AP) - Josef Cardinal Mind-Weekdays 5 Cents AP Leased Wire szenty received a life sentence today from a court which stripped him of his worldly possessions and criticized the United States as a meddler in Hungarian affairs.

The five-man people's court, representing a Communist-backed government, classified Cardinal Mindszenty as a traitor to the country. It declared he had tried to overthrow the regime in favor of royalists, and has speculated illegally in American dollars.





The trial brought to a climax the long running fight between the government and the cardiwho as an archbishop defied the Nazis when they were guid-ing the destinies of Hungary, and was imprisoned by them.
From the time in Februay, 1946,

when he received the red hat symbolic of his high church office, the primate was at sword's point with the Communists who gradually took over the country and with the Russians.

The Russians first charged the Catholic clergy was inciting the people against occupation forces. The battle with the Commu-nists grew when they announced plans to nationalize church schools. The cardinal opposed the measure all the way.







The Administration's Fascist Labor Bill

By R. C. HOILES

Common Ground

Very few people realize how far the administration is proposing to go in the labor bill introduced into the Senate on the last day of January. The bill was introduced by Senator Albert Thomas of Utah. If the Senate Labor and Welfare Committee has any understanding at all about public welfare, this bill should be killed in the Committee.

Not only would this amend the present Taft-Hartley law, but it would allow the return of the closed shop conditions. Besides this it expressly invalidates all of the state laws which now declare the closed shop unlawful. It also forbids any state interference with compulsory check-off of union "membership obligations." This is a bold attempt to foist the closed shop on the nation and all those workers who believe they have a right to their individual consciences would not be able to use

them in labor matters. It would deny a great number of workers and individuals their equal right to help establish values. It would take away from them their God given right to use fully the talents God gave them. This is proposed in face of the fact of the tyranny shown by labor unions under the Wagner Law. It is even worse than the Wagner Law. Even Senator Wagner when sponsoring his bill in 1935 said on the floor of the Senate: "This bill does not establish a closed shop, or even encourage it." As a matter of fact, nowever, his bill did encourage establishing closed shops by use of

the secondary boycott. Adoption of this bill would prevent any state from enacting "Right to work Legislation" thus permanently saddling each state with a closed shop. Some of the other requirements of the proposed administration bill include elimination of the following: "(1) Communist affidavit

quirement: (2) Injunction feature in connection with National emergency (3) 'Free speech' proviso;

(4) Prohibition of union straint and coercion; (5) Secondary boycotting restrictions, except where recognition is the objective, or in connection with jurisdictional strikes;

(6) 'Featherbedding' restrictions; (7) Employer election petitions; (8) Opening of Federal Courts to suits by and against unions." It is hard to believe that we have gone so far that our representatives in Congress would pass such legislation.

It certainly shows, however, how grossly illiterate on economic and moral questions the administration is. Who would have thought a few years ago that a President of the United States would be advocating measures very similar to the fas cist measures in Italy and the Nazi measures in Germany.

But when we grab the youth of the land and teach them that the majority has a right to coerce the minority to pay for training that leads to statism, it is only natural that when people grow up they believe that the majority through their representatives has the right to take away from an individual his God given right to use his conscience. We are reaping in our federal government exactly what we are sowing in each com munity in tax supported miseducation.

"Be not deceived. God is not mocked; whatsoever a man soweth that shall he also reap." We have been sowing progressively more and more statism in our public schools for the last 50 years. The proposed administration bill is the natural result.

CRACKS IN THE KREMLIN

Local agents of the Democratic Party reported after the American presidential ele tion that Presidential Truman's abortive proposal to send a special emissary to Moscow to talk peace over the heads of the representatives of official United States, so far from losing him votes, played an importan part in inducing voters to support him. It is not improbable that the President had in mind thi: evidence of the popular craving for peace, and was anxious to follow up the favourable impression which he had created, when he made the sensational statem in a speech at Kansas City last week that there is a cleavage of opinion among the Russian lead-ers, and that some of them are anxious for an understanding with the United States. Possibly he himself did not expect the statement to create quite the sensa-tion which it did; but having committed himself to it, he was liged to stick to it when he was questioned on the subject later at a Press conference in Washington, Many are disposed for reasons to dismiss the "Cracks in the Kremlin" story as a mere political manoeuvre. They

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out that, if the President had received authentic information either through American secret service or other well-informed of dissensions among the Russian leaders not even he could be so clumsy as to blurt it out to the world and foredoom to failure any negotiations under taken with the dissidents, It is true that no body of men, not even the Politburo, is likely always to act with unanimity. President Truman's guess, if it was no more than a guess, is not necessarily wrong. Before one accepts the picture, however, of "dear kind Uncle Joe" forced against his will by persons unknown to adopt a bellicose attitude to the West, it will be interesting to read the articles by Colonel aev which are to appear in the Sunday Express.

Colonel Tokaev, who held high office in the Soviet Military Administration in Germany and is now a refugee in Britain, alleges that Stalin and the Politburo (he draws no distinction between them) are preparing frantically for a war planned to take place at latest in five years' time. Which are we to believe, Truman or Tokaev? The latter is an exile with a grudge against his country, which casts suspicion on his evidence. He speaks, however, from first-hand knowledge of events which President Truman can only view from a distance.
