Pampan Being Held In Wichita Slaying

New Advisory Board to Be Named by CC

Plans were made for the election of new advisory board members for the Chamber of Commerce at a meeting of the Board of Directors yesterday, it was announced this morning.

Ballot No. 1 will be mailed today from the Chamber of Commerce office so members may select five men for one year on the advisory board.

The first ballot is due back in the office by Wednesday, Nov. 24, after which the second ballot will be sent out immediately listing the ten men receiving the highest vote on the ballot. After the second ballot has been tabulated, the five men receiving the largest number of votes become members of the advisory board.

At yesterday's meeting, Fred Thompson, vice president, and chairman of the Annual Banquet Program Committee, said plans are well underway for the annual banquet, Jan. 11, in the High School cafeteria. Therman Sensing, research director of the Southern Industrial Council, will be the principal speaker.

Also, it was announced planning is underway on the Pioneer Airlines which has filed application with the Civil Aeronautics Board to route their planes through Pampa, by way of End, Pampa, City, Bartlesville, Tulsa and Amarillo.

Roy Bourland, District 1 director of WTCC, reported on the recent meeting in Abilene.

Final plans on the community-sponsored flight of Santa Claus Christmas program were reported. The program includes a parade Dec. 4, with bands, choruses, non-commercial floats and other attractions. Many business concerns are cooperating by giving presents to children up to the age of 14 years who register at the American Legion-VFW Hall starting Nov. 6.

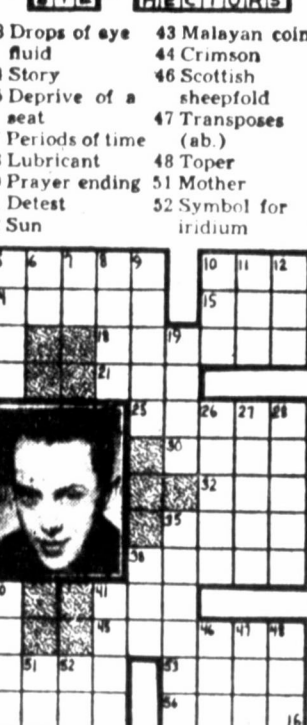

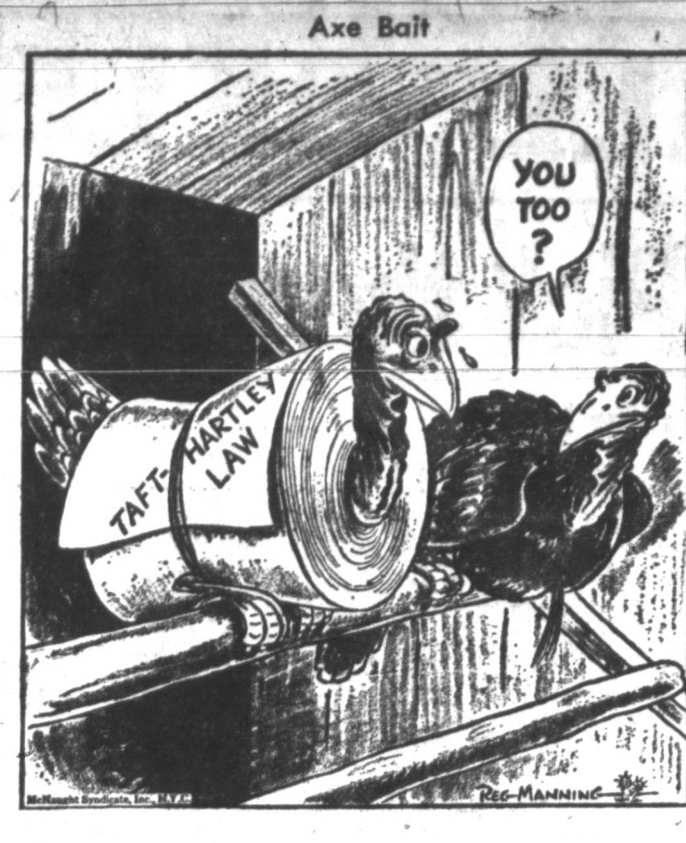

CONTROLLING THE ECONOMY

(The Wall Street Journal) Election returns will not tell us much—if anything at all—about where the United States is to locate its dividing line between a "free" and a "controlled" economy...

More than two years ago, Fred, Robert E. Warren, President of the National Association of Manufacturers, reviewed "Twenty-Five Years of Monetary Control."

The panic of 1907 made America acutely aware of the social catastrophes inherent in the fluctuations of the money economy...

Specific government agencies armed with seemingly adequate powers are provided to stabilize the price level, the interest rate, the level of employment and the national income...

Control of the money economy occupies in contemporary economic theory a position of prominence that the market did to Adam Smith...

The high-ranking economist left it. We venture to carry the inquiry a bit further. What is this "social responsibility" which Professor Warren says caused the market system to fail?

States have made a pretense of assuming this unmeasured responsibility only to find that to maintain the pretense it is necessary to suppress the individual...

Control of the economy acts as a sort of chain reaction. We had in 1946 "created a succession of institutions charged with prescribed responsibilities for the money economy."

We have set up, more of them since then and if the campaign promises of this year were anything more than insincere bids for votes still more are on the way...

McKENNEY ON BRIDGE

ANOTHER PLAY WILL IMPROVE YOUR GAME
By WILLIAM E. MCKENNEY

This is the second of five articles on the fascinating but difficult smother play.
As I said yesterday, the smother play not only is rare, but it is one of the most difficult plays to recognize. However, it is to your advantage to know the principles of the play. It will help to improve your game, as it teaches you how to strip a hand out, the theory of the end-play and other important features of good play.

In today's hand East has four spades to the king, while dummy has only three. How are we going to keep East from making a spade trick? Here is the procedure.

The king and ace of hearts are cashed by East, and declarer trumps the third heart. The jack of spades is led, naturally East refuses to cover and it holds. Declarer then leads the four of spades and fineses the queen.

Now for the smother play. Declarer must cash the ace and king of diamonds in dummy, and ruff out the last heart. His next play is to win the two club tricks with his ace and king, then lead the five of clubs and West wins.

West has nothing left but the queen and jack of diamonds. I have underlined the cards remaining in all four hands. When the queen of diamonds is led, it is trumped by declarer with the nine of spades. If East plays the eight of spades, declarer will throw off dummy's four of clubs and the nine of trumps wins the trick. Dummy's ace of trumps then wins the last trick.

Founded in 1936 when it was recognized that boys under the age of twelve need spare time outlets too, the Cub Scout movement, part of Boy Scout work, has had a rapid spread. In Pampa there are now four packs with eleven dens and a Cub Scout enrollment of 169.

Cubs meet once a week at the home of their Den Mother and engage in various activities, primarily handicrafts, games and ceremonies.

Cubbing is primarily designed to be fun for the boys, centering around the home and the neighborhood. Besides learning to work and play together, the boys are introduced to the Boy Scout program. It generally results in their becoming excellent Scouts shortly after their twelfth birthdays.

Twelve Pampa women to date are donating one afternoon each week to their den meetings. Each den mother has an assistant or Den Chief who is appointed by Scoutmasters from various Boy Scout troops. The Den Chiefs handle the active work at the meetings and become the "ideal" Scout in the eyes of the Cubs.

A long list of potential Cub Scouts is waiting in the Boy Scout office and will continue to wait unless more Pampa mothers assume the position of Den Mothers. Approximately 500 boys in Pampa between the ages of 9-11 would like to become Cub Scouts if enough Den Mothers could be found to handle them. The ideal number of Cubs per den is eight; however, the present Pampa dens average 15 boys.

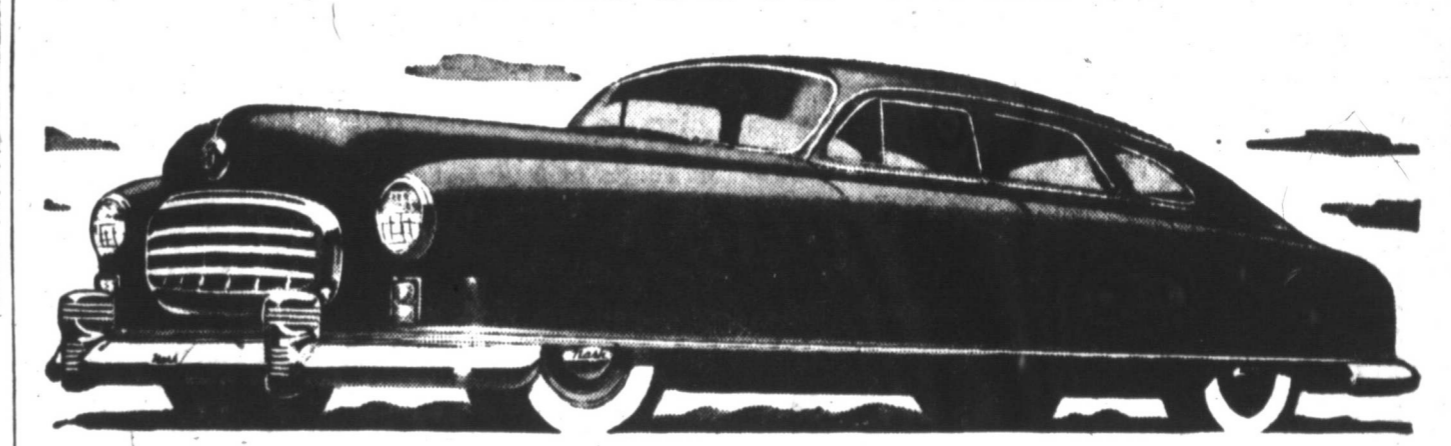

NEW YORK—(AP)—With only one more game to play, Michigan has taken a commanding lead in the race to be named the best football team of the year.

The Wolverines moved more than 200 points ahead of runner-up Notre Dame by grabbing 130 first-place votes in the weekly Associated Press poll of football writers and broadcasters.

They had a total of 1,952 points compared with 1,721 for the Irish, who led at the end of the season vote last year.

Army is in third place with 1,426 and California in fourth with 1,288. North Carolina, with 1,034, climbed from sixth to fifth on the strength of its smashing victory over Maryland.

Completing the first ten are Penn State, Northwestern, Oklahoma, Clemson and Southern Methodist.

The mighty men of Michigan drew in prestige by swamping Indiana, 56-0, Saturday while their main challengers, Notre Dame and Army, were shouldering through in the hardest way.

The Irish had to rally late to beat out Northwestern, 12-7, while the Cadets won in the last 30 seconds over Pennsylvania, 26-20.

The extent that the Wolverines rose in favor is reflected in the distribution of first-place votes. Notre Dame received only 27 compared with Michigan's 130.

Robinson Is The Winner By Decision

PHILADELPHIA—(AP)—Harry (Sugar) Robinson did not look last night like the man Joe Louis recently called "the greatest fighting machine in the ring today."

The Harlem dandy won a unanimous 10-round non-title decision over undersized Bobby Lee of Baltimore but many in the arena crowd of 4,792 cried "draw" at the fight's end.

The welterweight champion weighing in at 154—obviously was far from the devastating fighting man who won the title two years ago from Tommy Bell.

He was slow and seemingly satisfied to allow the energetic Lee—listed in his last three bouts—to carry the fight. The squat 148-pound Baltimore fighter battered the champion about the body with sharp rights and lefts. Occasionally he beat Robinson to the punch.

Even with an off par performance Robinson received a seven-to-three verdict from Referee Charley Daggert, a 6-4 win off the card of Judge Harry Laaky and a 6-2-2 decision from Judge Leo Costello.

The Associated Press agreed with Laaky's 6-4 verdict.

Robinson began to find the tiring Lee with vicious body punches in the fifth and finally in the ninth round floored his stubborn opponent with a bold punch for a count of nine. Lee kept his distance in round 10.

The crowd paid \$11,645 to see Robinson record his 89th victory, equalling the record he established as an amateur.

Johnson Named 'Man of Hour' In SWC Football This Week

Gil Johnson, Southern Methodist's mighty pitcher, is the man of the hour in Southwest Conference football.

Ginlet Gil, whose passes have carried SMU to victory after victory, was the fellow who paid off Saturday when the Methodists advanced within one step of the Cotton Bowl by beating Arkansas, 14-12, in the last second of play.

His pass to Paul Page from the Arkansas 16-yard line furnished the winning margin.

The passing he did against the Razorbacks kept him well in the lead. Gil now has completed 60 out of 93 throws for an average of 645. Those passes also have eaten up 854 yards.

Johnson, who has a trick knee which "locks" on him at times, has hobbled out there and thrown for eight touchdowns.

Johnson also has the distinction of being second in yards lost among backfield men in the conference. The reason is that he never runs with the ball and losses on pass attempts are charged against him. So Johnson to date has a minus 59 yards as a "ballcarrier."

The "back" on this line is Paul Campbell of Texas who has a minus 113.

Campbell is the second top passer in the conference. He has connected on 80 out of 119 for 788 yards and four touchdowns.

The total offense leader still is Lindy Berry of Texas Christian, who has gained 1,253 yards on 285 plays. He has rolled up 579 on 148 carries and gained 674 yards on 117 passes. Second in total offense is Clyde Scott of Arkansas with 868 yards on 115 plays.
