WASHINGTON, July 6. (AP)-President Rossevelt today exert-ed direct pressure on congress to speed passage of the Guffey coal stabilization, bill, despite any 'reasonable" doubt about the constitutionality of the measure.

He expressed that wish in a letter Chairman Samuel B. Hill (D-Wash) of the house ways and means Guffey bill is pending. The letter was written after the president was informed a majority of that subwas against the measure. In it, Mr. Roosevelt said:

face possible kidnaping charges. Donna Mae was given a bath and clean clothes at the home of Sheriff Lester Stewart in preparation for the arrival of her mother. Mrs. Charles McGinty, Sapulpa cafe waitress, who was en route here with the Sapulpa

The Oklahon sheriff notified Stewart that charges would be filed against the wandering scissors grinder, who was arrested here on the public square as he led a trained

The girl, missing since Monday was found today at a creek side camp a short distance from town. She said she was waiting for Fisher and told officers of her trip from Sapulpa with the man who had promised to buy her "lots of pretty clothes at Tulsa.

Fisher admitted being with the girl, but insisted he picked her up five miles from here after she had been "dumped out" of a car by two

The tiny brunette, however, said he had told her to relate the same story. She said that he had brought here here, inducing her to get out of "house truck" at the Oklahoma-Texas line. "He said it wouldn't mean anything to me, and it would mean a lot to him," she told the sheriff.



AUSTIN, July 6 (P)—Blocked by federal court decision ruling it and not tax companies importing ligarets from adjoining states, the today determined to invoke a new law prohibiting possession of cigarets by consumers without pay-ment of the three cents per pack-

Sam Kimberlin, director of the eigaret tax division of the comptroller's office, said felony complaints would be filed in Travis county consumers who failed to pay

The law, passed at the last regular session of the legislature, makes use of untaxed cigarets a misdemeanor. A second provision requir-es persons coming into possession of unstamped cigarets to keep re-cords for two years and make monthly reports to the comptroller under a penalty of from \$100 to \$500 fine and imprisonment from one month to two years.





#### The Pending Amendments

Only two of half a dozen pending amendments are receiving public interest. As usual, the good amendments will likely perish with the bad, or the bad will pass along with the good.

One amendment would permit commitment of a supposedly insane person to a state hospital for 90 days without the public trial now required. Undoubtedly this would save much embarrassment and would result in no more abuses than now obtain. Another amendment would furnish free textbooks to every child attending school in this state, regardless of the present requirement that it be a state school. The objection that the State should not appropriate to institutions which it does no control is answered by the observation that the state is saved thousands of dollars by reason of not having to educate children not attending its schools. A third amendment would abolish the fee system of remunerating officials of counties of 20,000 population and FRECKLES AND HIS FRIENDS above. This would include Gray county. Long for the abolishment of the fee system, we of course favor this

What may prove to be extraordinarily important is an amendment to permit submission of constitutional amendments to the people at special sessions of the legislature. This is based on the likelihood that the State may be called upon to vote more relief bonds. To wait for a regular session would cause a delay which might well bring suffering to hundreds of thousands. However, those who look with disfavor upon another relief bond issue will oppose this amendment.

Another proposed amendment would allow judges in courts of original jurisdiction over criminal actions to suspend imposition or execution of sentences and place defendants on probation. This is in effect an extension of the suspended sentence law, in that judges may suspend sentences passed by juries. The responsibility upon the judges would be great, but the power, wisely used, would likely result in heavier sentences but granting of THE NEWFANGLES (Mom'n Pop) opportunity to avoid the punishment through exemplary

Currently at least, the old age pension amendment is getting the most attention. Most everyone agrees that it will pass. It provides that persons above the age of 65 may-not shall-be paid \$15 monthly if they are of good character. The rich as well as the poor would receive the pension. Its passage will mean nothing, however, until some new tax source-probably a sales taxis voted by the legislature.

Fate of the repeal amendment is in doubt, with both sides becoming active. Extremists on both sides will lose votes for their cause. It is tremendously important that the people of Texas decide, cooly and dispassionately, what they wish to do about liquor. The amendment is adroitly worded. Article 26, section 20, of the amendment provides that "The open saloon shall be and is hereby prohibited." This provision is laughably meaningless, as the next sentence reveals: "The legislature shall have the power, and it shall be its duty to define the term 'open saloon' and enact laws against such.' This is not a prohibition of the open saloon, but an enabling act. It was a piece of strategy by the wets and concession intended to appeal to the lukewarm drys Rather than being a ban on saloons, the provision would throw the question into the legislature, where the battle would be waged almost oblivious of the amendment's "shall be prohibited" clause. Counties, towns, and precincts which were dry before prohibition would remain dry until local option elections showed otherwise; howeyer, dry school districts under the old order would apparently be wet after repeal, until voted dry.

The repeal amendment is worded for and against "the amendment to the State constitution repealing statewide prohibition, prohibiting the open saloon, and providing for local option." As stated above, the prohibiting of the open saloon is misleading in that an act of the legislature would be necessary to define such a place and to provide penalties for its operation.






