Little League To Host All-Star Tournament ** ** ** League Records 28
Cotton, Inc. Lowers Seasons Of Play

'82 Crop Estimate

Cotton Incorporated analysts Tuesday lowered their estimate of the 1982 U.S. cotton crop to 10.7 million bales but said the overall cotton supply should remain adequate to meet a foreseeable demand.

The new crop projection, a drop of one million bales from Cotton Incorporated's previous estimate in early June, reflects the U.S. Department of Agriculture planting report issued earlier Tuesday plus heavy crop losses inflicted by severe weather in sections of the Southwest.

David W. Cox, vice president of Corporate Development and Business Services, reported that the US-DA planting report confirmed that cotton producers in most sections of the country did reduce their planted acreage to meet the government's acreage reduction program requirement of 15 percent. Cox said Cotton Incorporated was in general agreement with the planting figure of 11.6 million acres, although the figure reported as actual plantings in Texas was somewhat lower than expected, and apparently reflects planting difficulties associated with the weather

However, Dr. Lawrence Shaw, director of cotton analysis, said much of this planted acreage will be abandoned due to winds,

hail and rain in parts of West Texas and Oklahoma.

"At this time," Shaw said, "it appears that for the entire state of Texas, acreage abandonment will total 29 percent and that production this year will be only about three million bales, down dramatically from last year's bumper crop of 5.6 million bales." Cont. Page 6, Col. 6

Texas Folklife Festival Scheduled August 5-8

"The only difference between Texans and other people is they think themselves different." This observation by a newcomer to the state in the early 1900s still rings true, for Texans are truly a breed apart.

Perhaps nowhere is this uniqueness more apparent than at the annual celebration of the state's ethnic variety and pioneer heritage -- the Texas Folklife Festival.

The Festival is produced by the University of Texas Institute of Texan Cultures in San Antonio which serves as a statewide communications center for the ethnic and folk history of Texas. During the four-day festival, the Institute's 15acre grounds become an open-air classroom where visitors discover the differences that set Texans apart.

At the eleventh annual Texas Folklife Festival, this August 5 through 8, visitors will learn about the great diversity of cultural backgrounds among Texans as they meet some of the 6000 participants from around the state. Alsatian Texans, Belgian Texans, Swiss Texans, Mexican Texans, Polish Texans, Japanese Texans -- more than 30 ethnic groups are represented at the Festival, sharing their food, music, dance and folkways with vi-

The Festival's menu is a smorgasbord of exotic dishes with more than 145 selections at the 27 ethnic food booths were scattered throughout the grounds. Chinese egg rolls, German Sausage, Hungarian Goulash, Jewish Bagels and Wendish Noodles are just a few of the foods available. Prices are modest enough so that visitors can try something from each booth. For 20 cents visitors can sample Alsatian Parisa, Japanese Fried Wontons, or a Scottish Haggis Ball. Forty cents buys a Czech Kolache a Filipino Maruya (banana fritters) or a Mexican Ta-

AG WEATHER **ADVISORY**

Scattered precipitation continued to fall in Bailey County in the past week. At the Vinson Ranch, 0.24 inch of precipitation fell for the week while 1.56 inches fell at Muleshoe. Maximum and minimum temperatures were both below normal.

For irrigated corn planted near 15 April, anthesis is very near. Grain filling should begin approximately one week to 10 days after anthesis. On irrigated corn consumptive use is averaging approximately 0.3 inch per day. However, with dry windy conditions and high radiation loads this value could easily increase to 0.5 inch per day for selected days. For dryland cotton and sorghum, consumptive only approximately 0.15 inch per day.

The heat unit accumulation at Muleshoe should now stand at 395. The normal for this time of year is 515. Examining historical precipitation data for Muleshoe shows that in the next three weeks there is a 17 percent chance of getting three inches or more of precipitation, a 57 percent chance of getting one inch or more of precipitation, and a 79 perecent chance of getting 0.4 inch or more of precipitation. There is only a three percent chance of getting no rainfall in the next three weeks. The average precipitation for the next three weeks is 1.7 in-

Cont. from Page 1 Heavy losses occurred on the High and Rolling Plains.

"If a fortunate aspect to this can be seen." Shaw added. "it is the fact that much of the current oversupply of cotton on the world market is in the short-staple type of cotton produced in that area of Texas. Therefore, producers holding 1981 cotton should find an improved market as the supply moves more closely into balancc with demand.'

While U. S. cotton prices rose somewhat from severely depressed levels in the immediate wake of the weather - inflicted losses, Shaw said a dramatic change in the cotton market is not anticipated at this time.

He pointed out that crop prospects in other parts of the country range from good to excellent. Production estimates have been raised for the Mid - South and Southeast, and conditions have been favorable for most of California's San Joaquin Valley. Although textile mill activity is at a very low point, if economic recovery is occurring now, as is widely believed, cotton demand will increase as harvest approaches, he

gesons. A&M researchers locate fish along the Gulf coast

COLLEGE STATION -Fisheries experts at Texas A&M University are successfully doing what anglers throughout history have attempted - finding where fish

like to congregate. Led by Dr. Mark Chittenden, re earchers from the university's Department of Wildlife and Fisheries Sciences are identifying the distribution of fish populations along the Continental Shelf in the northwestern portion of the Gulf.

"While people generally know about the kinds of fish that can be caught in the Gulf, such as Atlantic croaker, the silver seatrout or the gulf butterfish, little is really known about the fishes," said Chittenden. "There's some general knowledge, but nobody has ever closely looked at the composition of the fish communities, how abundant they are, how large the fish grow, their life cycles or their spawning habits," he said.

The result of the research will not only be a boon for commercial fishermen but will also help fisheries scientists manage fish populations and avoid over-fishing. ****
