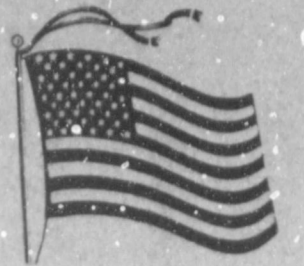

J P, Municipal Courts File 50 Cases In Week

A total of twenty-three cases were filed in Justice Court for the period from June 29 to July 6 with Justice of the Peace Tana Holmes.

Eleven cases were filed for speeding, four for non valid MVI's, three for expired registrations, two for no driver's license and one each for the following offenses: defective stop lamps, failure to stop at stop sign, and failure to have liability insurance.

Dispositions were made of the same number of cases; however, not the same ones. Ten convictions were made for speeding, three for over 34,000 tons on a tandem axle, two for expired license plates and one each for the following violations: failure to stop at stop sign, defective stop lamps, operating unregistered in Texas, no motor carrier authority, theft of certificate, passing in no passing zone, non valid MVI, and one for no driver's license.

Bailey Heart Association Sets Goals

The Bailey County Chapter of the American Heart Association began their 1982-83 year on Friday, July 2, setting their fund raising goal this year at \$4,000. Other plans for the association this year include the purchase of a recording "ResuscAnne" for use in cardiopulmonary resuscitation training sessions.

Reports made during the Friday meeting indicated that the local chapter raised \$8,649 during the 1981-82 year. Through the use of heart association film, pamphlets and literature, the local chapter has been successful in educating or reaching 280 pre-schoolers, 3,165 school students, 26 teachers and 151 parents through the local school system. Besides stressing the importance of proper diet and exercise, CPR demonstrations were presented to classes in the Muleshoe schools. The Bailey County Heart Association Chapter is rated sixth in Cont. Little League To Host All-Star Tournament

Cotton, Inc. Lowers '82 Crop Estimate

Cotton Incorporated analysts Tuesday lowered their estimate of the 1982 U. S. cotton crop to 10.7 million bales but said the overall cotton supply should remain adequate to meet a foreseeable demand.

The new crop projection, a drop of one million bales from Cotton Incorporated's previous estimate in early June, reflects the U. S. Department of Agriculture planting report issued earlier Tuesday plus heavy crop losses inflicted by severe weather in sections of the Southwest.

David W. Cox, vice president of Corporate Development and Business Services, reported that the USDA planting report confirmed that cotton producers in most sections of the country did reduce their planted acreage to meet the government's acreage reduction program requirement of 15 percent. Cox said Cotton Incorporated was in general agreement with the planting figure of 11.6 million acres, although the figure reported as actual plantings in Texas was somewhat lower than expected, and apparently reflects planting difficulties associated with the weather there.

However, Dr. Lawrence Shaw, director of cotton analysis, said much of this planted acreage will be abandoned due to winds, hail and rain in parts of West Texas and Oklahoma.

"At this time," Shaw said, "it appears that for the entire state of Texas, acreage abandonment will total 29 percent and that production this year will be only about three million bales, down dramatically from last year's bumper crop of 5.6 million bales."

Texas Folklife Festival Scheduled August 5-8

"The only difference between Texans and other people is they think themselves different." This observation by a newcomer to the state in the early 1900s still rings true, for Texans are truly a breed apart.

Perhaps nowhere is this uniqueness more apparent than at the annual celebration of the state's ethnic variety and pioneer heritage -- the Texas Folklife Festival.

The Festival is produced by the University of Texas Institute of Texan Cultures in San Antonio which serves as a statewide communications center for the ethnic and folk history of Texas. During the four-day festival, the Institute's 15-acre grounds become an open-air classroom where visitors discover the differences that set Texans apart.

At the eleventh annual Texas Folklife Festival, this August 5 through 8, visitors will learn about the great diversity of cultural backgrounds among Texans as they meet some of the 6000 participants from around the state. Alsatian Texans, Belgian Texans, Swiss Texans, Mexican Texans, Polish Texans, Japanese Texans -- more than 30 ethnic groups are represented at the Festival, sharing their food, music, dance and folkways with visitors.

aromas of distant countries greet visitors as they stroll around the festival ground. A Lebanese folk dance troupe in flowing skirts mesmerizes an audience with their graceful movements. An Irish tenor sings a melancholy ballad about "Auld Sod." Shrimp sizzling on a grill sends tantalizing aromas through the air as camarones a la plancha is prepared at the Spanish food booth.

Nine Festival stages feature constant entertainment by ethnic groups. Indians from Livingston perform ancient tribal dances on Stage 5, Cajuns from Port Arthur invite members of the audience to learn the fais-do-do on Stage 9, Czechs from West dance the beseda on Stage 6, while visitors sing along with a gospel group in the shade of the grape arbor at Stage 4.

The Festival's menu is a smorgasbord of exotic dishes with more than 145 selections at the 27 ethnic food booths were scattered throughout the grounds. Chinese egg rolls, German Sausage, Hungarian Goulash, Jewish Bagels and Wendish Noodles are just a few of the foods available. Prices are modest enough so that visitors can try something from each booth. For 20 cents visitors can sample Alsatian Parisa, Japanese Fried Wontons, or a Scottish Haggis Ball. Forty cents buys a Czech Kolache a Filipino Maruya (banana fritters) or a Mexican Tamale.

As visitors learn about the amazing wealth of diversity among Texans, they also discover the ties that bind Texans together as they stroll through the "Back 40" serve to illustrate the common lifestyle of Texas pioneers, whatever their cultural background and highlight the traditions that are an important part of the state's heritage.
