Search Is On For Historical Brands

COLLEGE STATION-The search continues throughout Texas for outstanding cattle brands to include in another chapter of their history by "burning 'em in' Texas A&M University's "branded stairway".

L.A. Maddox, chairman of the unique branding project, said that some 3,000 brands, or more, are expected to be imprinted on the 254 "county oak panels" in the University's new \$9.5 million Robert J. Kleberg Animal and Food Sciences Center.

"County Extension agents are working with their local beef cattle committees to select eight brands per county, and with historical societies to select other brands for the panels," Maddox, fTexas Agricultural Extension Service beef cattle specialist, said.

"We now have slightly more than 500 burned in."

There are some 200,000 brands recorded in Texas and on file with the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association in Fort Worth. This is the state's most complete record.

The "branding" was an idea of Dr. O.D. Butler, for many years head of Texas A&M's Animal Science Department and now associate vice president for agriculture and renewable resources. He said that not only are cattle brands a rich part of Texas livestock history but a prized possession of ranchers in identification of their cattle.

"We felt that the branding ceremonies would bring about a closer tie-in between cattlemen and our animal science facilities on campus as well as with research and educational work throughtout Texas," Butler said.

Application of the brands was initiated last June during a meeting of directors of the Texas and Southwester Cattle Raisers Association. J.R. Anderson of Gail, Texas burned the Muleshoe brand on the Borden County panel at this time. Officials of other livestock groups also are being invited for a "burning party."

Maddox said that branding ceremonies also will be conducted by Extension district groups until "all panels are branded." This probably will be about next April 2-3 when the annual Texas Animal Agriculture Conference is staged at Texas A&M.







Plan To Curb Inflation

Congressman Robert K. Dornan, R-Calif., has come up with the best idea yet for curbing inflation. He is introducing a bill to tie the salaries of congressmen and high federal officials inversely to the rate of inflation.

Dornan's plan is to reduce the salaries of congressmen and high government officials by the same percentage that inflation shoots prices upward. Thus, if inflation in 1979 is 10 percent, each congressman's and federal official's salary would be reduced by 10 percent.

This is the healthiest idea in years because it puts sanctions on those responsible for inflation and provides a direct monetary incentive to mend their ways. The main cause of inflation is deficit spending proposed by the executive branch and then voted by Con-

Dornan's bill would apply to all members of Congress and to top appointed federal officials except the president, vice president and federal whose salaries are constitutionally protected against reduction.

Dornan's bill would not apply to civil service employees. In other words, most of the top decision-making officials of our government, the ones responsible for inflation, would be affected.

Under the present system, federal officials and congressmen have a monetary incentive to continue inflation. An escalator clause raises government salaries when the consumer price index goes up. Federal tax receipts climb even faster than prices during inflation because we are all shoved into a higher tax bracket. Dornan's bill would repeal the escalator clause.

Other parts of the bill are still to be worked out. One provision under condideration is to allow a congressional pay raise in the fourth year if there is no significant inflation for three years.

Also, in order to have a realistic chance of passage by his collegues, Dornan's bill will probably specify a floor below which congressional salaries cannot fall, such as \$42,500. The present salary of a congressman is \$57,500.

With such personal incentive provided by the Dornan bill, Congress could be expected to eliminate at least some of the tens of billions of dollars in direct and indirect foreign and domestic give aways that are the principal cause of inflation.

It is time that we hold accountable those in the administration and in Congress who make the decisions and who prepare and approve the budgets that perpetuate those

This bill is just the latest of Congressman Dornan's constructive ideas that go to the heart of an issue and dramatize the problem in ways that make an impact. When President Carter proposed an instant voter registration plan to allow anyone to vote without registration simply by presenting an I.D. card, Dornan proved how easy it is for anyone to secure phony identification (and thus cast fraudulent votes). He showed up at the Capitol with several phony I.D. cards for himself and his fellow congressmen.

When President Carter, last year, planned to allow the sale of our best super computer, the Cyber 76, to the Soviet Union, Dornan energitically collected the signatures of 315 congressmen and brought them personally to the White House. Mr. Carter stopped the sale in the last inch of time.

Congressman Dornan, who was a flighter pilot with the first supersonic Air Force Wing, is a helicopter pilot and a commercial pilot and has piloted the B-1, our best Air Force bomber. He made a gallant fight to prevent the administration's cancellation of the B-1.

Dornan lost that fight and the Carter administration cancelled it without getting any concession whatsoever from the Soviets. The Russians not only did not cancel any weapons whatsoever, but they continue building new weapons at te. Astime goes on and soviest con-tinue their stheegic buildup, more and more people are coming to the conclusion that Dorman was right and Carter was wrong.

Your County Agent Says by Randy Upshaw

The cold, wet weather during early November had hindered field activity in Borden County. This first taste of winter has also prevented producers from soil sampling their fields and obtaining fertilizer recommendations from a soil test. Now is the time to sample fields before other operations such a cotton harvesting and tillage keep you busy, the County Extension Agent, Randy Upshaw said.

"Four good reasons now exist that indicate a good crop fertility program for 1979 is important," the county agent

First, our rainfall picture is more encouraging than last fall's. Comparing this September, October and November's rainfall against the longterm average and the rainfall received last year, suggests that a better soil profile moisture should exist. During the September, October, and November period, the long-term average at Lubbock in-dicates that 5.2 inches are usually received. Last year, during this period, only 2.5 inches were measured. However, during this 75-day period 4.9 inches were measured at Lubbock and many are as have reported up to 9 inches.

Secondly, due to the soil many of our dryland producers did not fertilize. The picture appears more favorable this year. If you are intending to fertilize. The picture appears more favorable this year. If you are intending to fertilize;

it makes sense to first determine what plant nutrients are available and what is needed.

Third, nitrogen is one of the essential elements required throughout the High Plains for cotton a producer never knows what to expect with soil nitrogen.

Fourth, Fourth, a considerable savings in fertilizer can result from applying fertilizer based upon soil test recommendations. For example:

"Here are some tips that will help you obtain better results from your soil analysis,", says Randy Upshaw.

Prior to taking small samples scrape the litter from the surface, then use a spade, soil auger or soil sampling tube. To use a sharp shooter dig a V-shaped hole and take

a 1.2 inch slice of soil from the smooth side of the hole. Repeat in 10 to 15 different

Place subsamples in a clean container (plastic bucket, paper sack, etc.), mix thoroughly, and take out approximately 1 pint for the composite sam-

"To aid in the interpretation of the soil test and in making recommendations, fill in Form D-575, 'Soil Sample Information Sheet for Field Crops', as completely as possible and submit with your samples". "Each soil sample should be marked with your name and sample number, which should correspond with the information furnished on the information sheet. Mark the analysis desired and include the proper fee. The information sheets are at my office or the Soil Testing Laboratory in Lubbock".
