

WASHINGTON, June 4 (P)—The navy, describing the situation at Dutch Harbor, Alaska, as quiet at present, reported today that the second wave of enemy planes which flew over the base yesterday failed to drop bombs and probably was engaged only in reconnaissance.

A communique declared total damage at the base was not extensive and fires were quickly extinguished after the initial raid yesterday morning.

While the source of the attacking aircraft was not definitely determined, the communique said, they are believed to have been carrier-

The communique also announced the loss of the USS Cythera, a small naval patrol vessel, in the Atlantic area and said that next of kin aboard the converted yacht had been noti fied

The Cythera was commanded by Lieutenant Commander Thomas W. Rudderow of Highland Lane, Bryn Mawr, Pa

The total of men lost aboard the Cythera, which was described as overdue for more than three weeks. was not given although as a yacht the vessel had carried a crew of

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



If You Have Time On Your Hands, Cook Hopkins Stew

By DAVE CHEAVENS **Associated Press Staff**

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Next time seven hours hang heavlly on your hands, cook up a pot of kins County stew.

If your appitite will not permit you to wait that long without food, stave it off with a light snack of hot cakes and molasses, but be sure and give that stew seven full hours of cooking. To do it right takes seven hours, no more, no less.

Speaker of the House Sam Rayourn renewed his old friendship with Hopkins County stew a few weeks ago at a luncheon in Sulphur prings. He first acquainted himself with it years ago when he was a country school teacher at Greenwood in eastern Hopkins county.

Hopkins County stew hasn't changed much in those years, unless was for the better. You may have your choice of recipes, shading your ng from flat to hot, but basically Hopkins County stew follows a master plan-it is not only economically sound, utilizing home grown products, but it is gastonomically perfect.

When Hopkins county switched over from cotton production to dairying, it didn't matter. Cotton was about the only farm product in e county not used in making stev anyway, and no one has had the gal

to try to put milk in it.

The primary implements in achieving a Hopkins County stew are plenty of time, a big cast iron cooking pot, and a long-handled spoon for stirring. The pot must be big because no one would think of aking such stew in less than 25 gallon batches and the spoon should long to reach the bottom of the kettle. Mustn't let your stew stick and stick it will if it is not kept stirring, from the bottom. You'll see why.

Most Hopkins county experts advise a 6 a.m. start. Begin with a bed of hot, hardwood coals, outdoors. If the weather is too wet and windy, a gas flame might do. Your cast iron kettle is clean and dry and when it's hot enough to frizzle several strips of bacon, you're ready to

Into the smoking fat dump several chickens, well cut up, including all the giblets. If you're of a mind, you might add chunks of fresh pork beef, depending on your taste in the matter. If you can't get chicken, substitute squirrel although in these days of game laws, that is governed by the season.

While this foundation material is browning, get busy and cut up your vegetables. Again the season and the ilablility of garden stuff determines what goes in. Onion, of course Potatoes. Tomatoes, but later. Turnips? Okay, if you like them. Corn, absolutely. Might as well leave out the meat as the corn. There is a difference of opinion

whether the corn should be canned or cut fresh from the ear. Some hold out for canned corn. They believe it tastes better, and you can always get it. That isn't true of roasting ears. Others claim the sweetness of





Cook book cooks, who like to see vegetables stand out individually in stew-barely cooked done-will be horrified to read that this mess of vegetables is dumped into the pot as soon as the chicken is brown. They are accustomed to thickening stew with corn meal or flour, but not in Honkins county. They couldn't get away with it. A Hopkins County stew thick of its own substance, or it isn't a Hopkins county stew. Only the kernels of corn retain their identity. That's why you've got to keep stirring. If you are all by yourself and have to peel and cut up those vegetables with your left hand, keep it turning. That's about all there is to it. If you still have strength enough to lift your eating arm, get a bowl, a big spoon and a double of crackers. Sit down. Fall to. You'll come away from the table with memories fonder than strings of white chicken meat in your teeth. You might think that chicken cooked so long would be tasteless and ingy, but not if you know how to

select tender hens. The meat will fall off the bones, which settle glumly to the bottom of the pot; the corn, tomatoes and potatoes blend into one beautiful design, flavors wedded and intermingled with the chicken in an indescribable mid-day dream.

For variation, try quall instead of chicken. They say they still have quail in such abundance in Hopkins county that seasoned hunters get thred of eating it. They start out, at the opening of quail season, frying their birds. Then they broil them. Pretty soon that gets old, and they bake 'em.

But when you're fed up on quail every other way, go out some after-noon and shoot your limit, leave them to chill overnight, and get that Meet In Kentucky stew going before daylight. Quail meat, by 1 o'clock, will take on new ning. At least, that's what they say in Hopkins county. BUY VICTORY STAMPS-



What happened to Cologne and Essen is not a climax, not a crest. As Prime Minister Churchill promised in his grim message, raids of similar destruction will be unleashed on the Reich "city by city from now on."

British planes alone took part in the attacks, but soon American bombers and fighting squadrons will join the aerial offensive against Germany, doubling and redoubling the fury of the RAF's great week-end assault.

Lieut. Gen. Henry H. Arnold, chief of United States air forces, was quoted in London as saying that the "maximum impact of our combined air strength" will be turned loose upon the Germans with such destructiveness that the enemy "cannot meet it, defeat it or survive."

This means, in reality, that ach man should pay in proportion to the amount f this world's goods he consumes each year. All he taxation should be raised on this universal, nmutable, mathematical rule. This is the only rue democratic system of taxatio., as contrasted p all other socialistic, dictatorial, oppressive

DALLAS, June 4 (AP)-Golf under daylight savings, thinks Graham Ross, veteran Dallas professional, is in for a boom during the coming year unless either of these things happen:

1. A halt in the present program reclaiming golf balls. A

2. General gasoline rationing. The second is more serious right now for Professional Ross, but the first would be more serious for the game generally. In fact, he says, the first would virtually kill it for the duration.

"Gasoline rationing would mean most of the golfing would be at city courses that could be reached by bus or street car," Ross pointed out. "Clubs like mine (Glen Lakes) that are located several miles out of town would just be out of luck."

But unless the plan of reclaiming balls is stopped Ross thinks the country should be able to go golfngly on pretty much as before for at least a year. There should be sufficient equipment on hand, other than balls, for that period, he ob-

He already has sent in 4,000 old balls for rebuilding. This is done with a material (called Balata) from South America on which there is no government restriction. It is a fine substitute for rubber and makes balls as good as new, Ross declares. So if neither of those things hap


