

Census Reports Due

Reeder trains, rides champion cutting horse

Larry Reeder, 33, of Ste-phenville, son of Mrs. Sid Reeder of Gail, trained and rode the champion cutting horse in the National Cutting Horse Association Futurity held in the Will Rogers Coliseum in Fort Worth earlier this month.

The horse, Lynx's Melody, a two year-old, is owned by Billy Cogdell of Tulia, Tex. Reeder shared a purse exceeding \$63,000 with Cogdell.

The event started Dec. 4 with 420 entries and wound up Dec. 11.

The total purse in the Futurity was a shopping \$302,891. Second place was won by Doc's Poco-Doc, ridden by Gene Suiter of Glendale, Ariz., and third by Doc's Tin-Lizzy, ridden by Terry Riddle of Wynnewood, Okla.

Three riders - Buster Welch, Kenny Patterson and Charles Ward - tied for fourth place. Larry, a professional cuttrainer, trained

about 35 horses this year at his stables just outside Stephenville.

Sweet victory came for Reeder and Lynx's Melody after four go-arounds. Reeder won the high marking after the first two go-arounds, qualifying him for the semifinals against 44 other entries. Fifteen riders and horses went into the finals.

Reeder won : Ryon's engraved saddle, the B.A. Skipper Memorial Trophy and the Edgar R. Brown Trophy. He also earned an engraved belt buckle, blanket and a vacuum clean-

Lynx's Melody is now eligible to compete in other futurities in Waco and Califor-

Reeder had several other entries in the snow. One advanced to the non-pro finals and another to the NCHA semifinals.

AUSTIN -- Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown urges Texas farmers and ranchers to complete and return all 1978 Farm Census reports as soon as they are received early next year.

"The report forms which will be used for the 21st national agriculture census will take just one-third the time to complete as the old forms,"
Brown said. "Prompt completion of the forms will allow the U.S. Department of Agriculture to quickly and accurately compile this benchmark data for its current agriculture statistical series.

"In addition, this census is

the only source of uniform data at the county level on agricultural production and inventories," he noted. "It is widely used across the nation by decision-makers. in both the public and private sector."

Several changes have been made in the current census, and these are explained in full with the report forms. Completion of the forms is required under federal law.

Brown also pointed out that all information submitted on the reports is confidential. Each producer is required to answer only those questions pertaining to his own opera-




Midseason Break


All the girls on the J.V. team were able to play in the games and all of them contributed a great deal to win the first place





Don Cox had surgery Friday morning and then again Friday night. He is reported to be doing better, but is expected to stay in the hospital for at least two more weeks.



But when the cabbie explained to them the denominaions of American legal tender, they were so grateful that Mrs. Swiss tipped him fifty.

So it does pay to be honest.
You know, you read all these
stories about the rude New
Yorkers--the bad city--don't go out at night--don't ride in a taxi alone. Well, the city fathers must have a p.r. meeting with everyone each morning. I got only one cranky

cab driver. The bus driver even accepted cheerfully my correct change--in pennies.

And everyone was certainly helpful with directions-if you can understand them, that is. I find it easier to understand the British than some N'Yokk'rs. We all nearly drowned all because 52nd was heard as 57th. Four blocks up and five back in a rain, rain resulted in wet dog looks and smells.

Anyway, the Big Apple is trying awfully hard to shape up. To improve it's image and thereby attract the big spenders. The shop keepers are doing all in their power to co-operate. In fact the shops for the most part were open all of Sunday afternoon. Now I don't know when the sabbath is for the Mohammedins or the Buddhists, but the Arabs and Japanese were just as evident in the stores as the Jews who stay home on Saturdays, I guess. But Mr. Tiffany said his posh place would never open on Sunday. But how many of the working class who have only Sunday to shop will drop into Tiffany's to buy a bauble anyway?

On that Sunday afternoon, Fifth Avenue was closed to There were carol singers, disco roller skaters and all sorts of entertainment going on. And of course the ice skaters sat Rockefeller Center were that day so the shoppers, for hot chocolat, onion soup, coffee or a toddy. The sound of cash registers almost drowned out the jingle of bells. I never saw so many folkslittle kids - old folks - all nationalities - all spending money of one kind or another I imagine New York's economy was boosted appreciably that pre-Christmas Sunday. She certainly is working at making flings enjoyable.

Learning Problem?

After several months of struggle this school year, some families may be wondering if their children have more than ordinary difficulty in learning. Depending on which definitions and statistics you use, between 10 percent and 40 percent of school children have some type of learning disability. Problems can include memory, hearing, reading and speech difficulties but the list is not limited to these alone.

The Texas Medical Association lists some signs that can help alert parents as to whether their child has a learning problem. > Whether there is a learning disability or not, the child often can benefit fromparental help in learning. Here are some suggestions:

Minimize distractions and choices. Give the child his or her own room and arrange it simply. If an object is forbidden, remove it rather than lecture the child on not playing with it.

Assign simple tasks, with simple directions, one stop at a time. Show the child what to do rather than rely on language. Better yet, do it with him.

Avoid situations where the child must try to learn while overly tired or overly stimula-

Reinforce schoolwork in informal ways. Read to the child to expand vocabulary and grasp of concepts. Use maps, clocks, and calendars to help him or her understand time, space and di-

Help the child to develop coordination with eye-hand games such as pickup sticks and jacks; install a basketball hoop and a horizontal bar in the backyard.

Most inportant, show the child he or she is loved, even if success at school is elusive.

Mesquite Tree Removal **Increases Soil Moisture**

LUBBOCK - Does removal runoff. or killing of mesquite trees or a combination increase soil moisture in the High Plains?

Donald J. Bedunah of Fort Worth, a doctoral student in range science at Texas Tech University, investigating these questions in an attempt investigating to find means of increasing soil moisture levels. Prof. Ronald E. Sosebee of the range and weldlife management faculty is supervising the study.

Bedunah said two obstacles face High Plains ranchers in maintaining or increasing soil moisture -runoff erosion and soil water depletion by mes-

Mesquite tree removal will help increase soil moisture by decreasing competition for available water, and the par-ticular method used for removal may increase soil

moisture levels even more, Bedunah said. Because the land is so hard and flat, it resists absorbing rainwater, he said. Mechanically breaking up the soil just enough to roughen the surface may provide enough catches for rain to be absorbed.

Bedunah set up six treatments on mesquite rangeland plots for examination of mes quite removal methods and resulting increases in soil mois-

The control plot was left untouched to compare with experimental plots. One plot was completely cleared to leave bare ground and to determine water infiltration rates during rain. Athird was chemically sprayed to kill mesquite trees, which were left standing. The trees in another areawere shredded and left on the ground to form blocks against water

Mesquite trees grubbed out with a tractor and small blade in a fourth plot, with pits left to serve as rainwater collection points. The last plot was grubbed between trees, which were untouched, and ditches about three feet wide by six inches deep were created.

Bedunah said these last two methods may prove most effective in increasing soil moisture. Both methods distrube the soil surface just enough so water cannot completely run off. Whether disturbing the soil mechanically increases soil moisture levels signisoil moisture levels significantly enough for wideqpre ad use among ranchers remains a question, Bedunah warned.


The pits left when trees were removed have growths of various native weeds on the edges, he said, which indicates increased soil moisture.. Where the land was grubbed without removing or killing the trees, the resulting pits have no new growth surrounding


Bedunah said this circumstantial evidence indicates that mesquite is still very water-competitive and should probably be removed before water levels could be increased.


Bedunah and Sosebee are still collecting data for analysis of the different methods.

They hope to try root plowing the mesquite trees as another alternative. Sosebee said there might not be any runoff at all with this method, since the entire ground surface would be broken up enough to hold rainwater until it could be absorbed.



Upland loans will be available to cooperating producers for ten months from the first day of the month in which the loan is made. During the tenth month, the loans may be extended for an additional eight months at the producer's request, provided the average spot marked price of SLM 1-1/16 inch cotton during the preceding month does not exceed 130 percent of the average spot price for the preceding 36 months.

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

New Management Program

"The recent tax revolts calling for holding a line on government spending and limiting future tax increases illustrate: why we need the Texas Management Intern Program (TMIP)," comments Gregory Moore, State Coordinator with the Texas Merit System Council.

Moore's eyes light up as he continues, "TMIP is designed to attract graduates who have received special training in managing public programs and policies. With the public's dissatisfaction with the services they are receiving for the tax dollars they are spending, there is a great demand for effective managers who can control costs and improve services."

The goal of the program is to place 25 outstanding public mamagement graduates in one- year internships with Merit System agencies.

To become an intern, an applicant must be a recent graduate or graduate student in public management; and be nominated by his school dean. The nominee is then interviewed by a panel.

Those applicants scoring highest will be available for employment in one-year management internships in state agencies served by the Texas Merit System Council. Individuals who successfully complete their internships will be eligible for regular Merit System appointments.

According to Leo Brockmann, Director of the Texas Merit System Council, "The federal plan, one which the state effort is based, was formulated by Dr. Alan K. Campbell, U.S. Civil Service Commission chairman and former dean of the LBJ School of Public Affairs at the University of Texas at Austin."


The Merit System Council is the closest agency Texas has to a civil service system. Operating under federal guidelines, Merit System Council provides personnel for ten state agencies that receive certain federal grant-in-aid funds.

Names of individuals making the top ten scores for a particular classification are placed on the register according to rank. When a member agency has an opening, it requests the list for interviewing.

Participating are the Employment Commission, Air Control Board, Commission on Alcoholism, Governor's Committee on Aging, Surplus Property Agency, Drug Abuse Division, Disaster Emergency Services, and the Departments of Health, Human Resources, and Mental Health and Mental Retardation.





















Washington, D.C. -- Congressman Omar Burleson (D-Texas) said today that the Civil Service Commission is now receiving applications for the 1979 competitive examination for summer employ-ment with the United States Government. The examination, which includes a written test, applies to most Federal summer jobs in clerical and administrative positions, as well as in engineering and the

physical and biological sciences, GS-1 through GS-4. The Congressmanurges applicants to file early to recieve maximum consideration for employment because opportunities for summer employment are extremely limited.

Tests are scheduled locally by CSC area offices. Applicants who file with an are office by December 15 will be tested in January. Applica-tions received after December 15 and post marked no later than January 12, will be tested February. Any applications postmarked after January 12 will not be accepted.

Notification of when and where to report for the written test will be given about two weeks in advance.

Those candidates who took the test and qualified for summer employment in 1978 are not required to retake the test in 1979. The Civil Service Commission will communicate in writing with 1978 eligibles to determine their interest in applying for Group I jobs in 1979. Those eligibles who respond and indicate availability, will be issues a new notice of written test results to be used in applying for Group I jobs in 1979.

Complete instructions for filing for the written test and for renewing eligibility, along with all necessary forms, are included in the CSC announcement No. 414, Summer Jobs in Federal Agencies, which may be obtained upon request through Congressman Burleson's Washington office, 2369 Rayburn House Office Building, Washington, D.C. 20515, or from Federal Job Information Centers, most college placement offices, or from the Civil Service Commission, Washington, D.C. 20415. The nearest Job Information Center is listed in most local telephone directories under "U.S. Government," or the toll free distance telephone number in Texas can be obtained by calling 800-555-1212.




