Rabies On The Rise

State Representative Mike Ezzell of Snyder has been advised by the Texas Department of Health of the serious nature of the rabies problem in Texas. Ezzell's House Bill 1323, which was passed by the 66th Legislature and signed by the Governor, dealt with the eradication of rabies in Texas. That bill gives the Texas Board of Health a greater ability to deal with the rabies situation in the state.

In response to numerous inquiries about rabies as a result of its increase in areas such as Eagle Pass and El Paso, the Texas Department of Health held a conference in Austin on

June 28, 1979. A total of 567 cases of rabies have been confirmed by the Texas Department of Health laboratory as of June 23, 1979. The total number of confirmed rabies cases for 1978 was 556. The Texas Department of Health has been working on large scale education of the public concerning rabies. Local clubs and civic groups interested in learning more about rabies should contact the regional health office in Midland or Abilene.

"Wild animals such as skunks, raccoons, or foxes should not be kept as household pets," advises Ezzell. Ezzell also said "it is con't on pg. 4

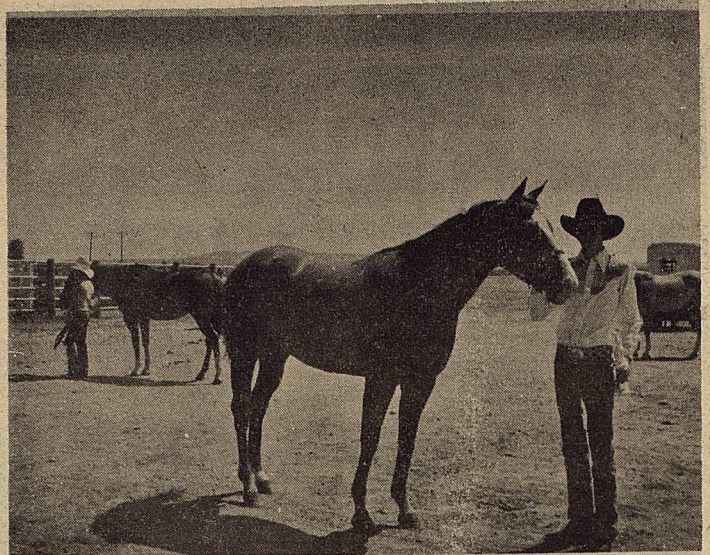

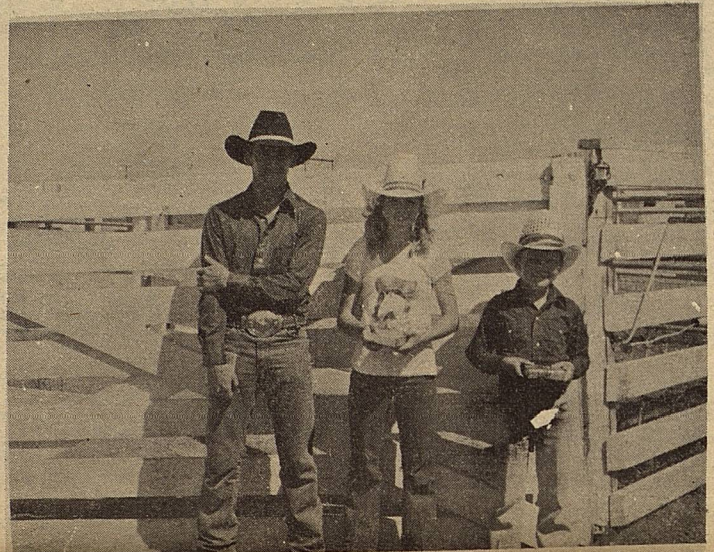

O'Donnell man killed

A 22 - year - old O'Donnell man died Monday after being involved in an apparent hit - and - run incident shortly after midnight, according to a spokesman with the Department of Public Safety in Lamesa.

Rogelio Perales was found along Highway 87 near the Lamesa City limit about 1 a.m.

A motorist from Lubbock on his way through Lamesa saw the man and called the DPS, the spokesman said.

Perales died at 2:45 a.m. Monday in a Lamesa hospital.

The spokesman said Perales' car apparently had run out of gas and he may have been walking back to O'Donnell.

Officers found the man's car keys in his pocket, the spokesman said, and later located his car on a Lamesa street. When officers tried to start the car, it was out of gas.

The DPS spokesman said officers today were investigating some leads as to who might have hit Perales.

Services for Perales were at 10 a.m. Wednesday in the O'Donnell Baptist Mission, with the Rev. Ramiro Faenz, pastor of O'Donnell Assembly of God, officiating.

Burial was in O'Donnell Cemetery under direction of Branon Funeral Home of Lamesa.

Perales was a native of Mexico and was a farm laborer.

Survivors include his wife, Mary; his mother, Nonhemi Perales of Mexico; two sisters and five brothers.

Q: I want to contest a ticket for speeding. Do I need an attorney?

A: While it is advisable to consult an attorney anytime one must appear in court, most citizens represent themselves in Municipal Court and in Justice Court. You may want to attend prior court sessions on similar cases in order to acquaint yourself with the type of questions asked and the type of evidence used, and also to determine whether you should bring witnesses to the trial.

Q: My mother deeded me her home and reserved a life estate in it. At that time she lived in the house, but has since moved and now rents the house for \$50.00 a month. The rent money goes to her, which is the way I want it, but do I have to report the \$600 a year as income.

A: No, your mother should report the rent as income on her personal tax return. As a life-estate holder your mother may lease her interest or a part of such interest to a third party and the rent income would be taxable to her.

He was named Best Actor in the District One Act play competition this past year. Throughout high school he was active in numerous UIL contests including one - act play and number sense.

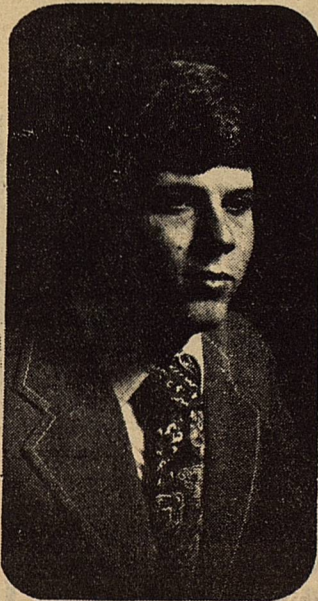

the responsibility of the public to see that domestic pets such as dogs and cats are leashed and vaccinated."

In District 63 only four cases of rabies have been confirmed this year. Three were in skunks and one was in a cow. Most dog-to-dog transmissions occurred in El Paso, Eagle Pass and Maverick County.

Persons who suspect a particular animal to be rabid should report any incident to the local sheriff or police department. Rabid animals should not be shot in the head as it makes laboratory testing impossible. The Health Department also advises veterinarians or other persons shipping head specimens to the Austin lab for rabies testing to get a copy of the directions for shipping heads of suspected rabid animals from local health departments. This will speed analysis and increase accuracy of findings.

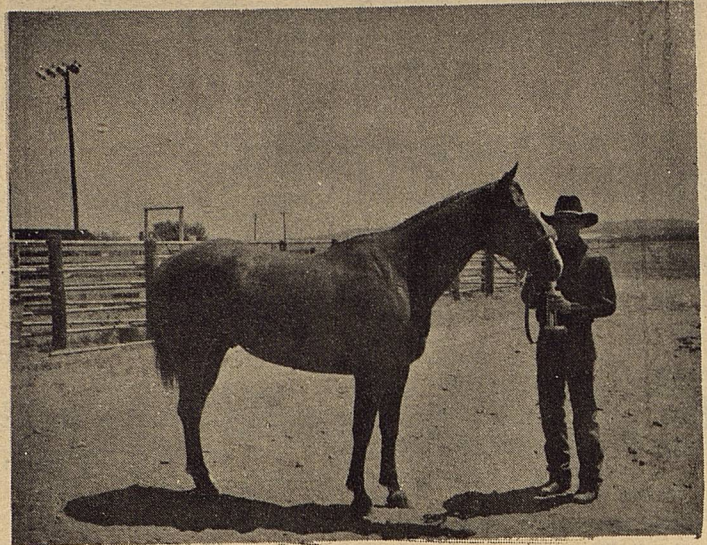
Final Reporting Date
July 16 is the final date to report cotton, grain sorghum, set-aside and other crops planted. *to participate in the program, producers must certify all crops on all farms in which they have an interest.*

If no report is received, the crop acreage report will be zero. For, cotton, if no report is received, the yield for the farm shall be set at zero.

Be sure acreage reports are accurate. An erroneous certification could result in program penalties.

Reports are required for both participating and non-participating farms. **Measurement Service.** If you are unsure of acreages, measurement service is available. The acreage will be measured by aerial observation, and will cost \$11.00 for the first slide and \$9.00 for each additional slide. Applications for measurement service must be filed *Friday, July 6.*

Reminder on Set-Aside
Producers participating in the 1979 Feed Grain and-or Wheat Programs are reminded: There can be no *harvesting* of any kind from the set-aside acres during the entire calendar year. There can be no grazing from March 1, 1979, thru August 31, 1979. Set-aside acres should be protected from wind and water erosion and weeds should be controlled.

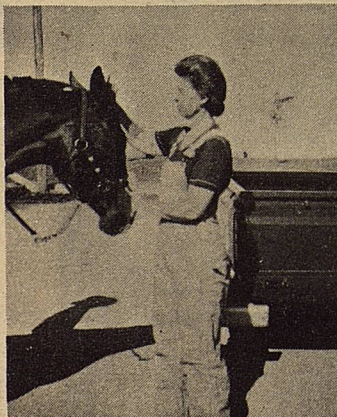

Rail Bill Pitfalls Hit: National Cotton Council President Hoke Leggett recently told a Senate committee the cotton industry is concerned about inadequate rate and service protection in a railroad deregulation bill. Rate stability, he said, is essential to orderly cotton marketing, and the rails' free rein to change rates without adequate notice would ultimately hurt producer prices. Leggett also told the Senators the cotton industry opposes the proposed loss of ICC power to set joint-line rates. Commodity shippers would be forced to negotiate rates with each line participating in a multiple-line participating in a multiple-line shipment if the present bill passes. He urged the committee to withhold a final decision until the Presidential Rural Transportation Advisory Task Force completes its final recommendations in January, 1980.

Cotton Research Funds: U. S. House of Representatives has passed the Agriculture Appropriations Bill. It restores nearly \$1.6 million in cotton research funds which had been deleted in the President's budget request. The Senate has a similar bill under consideration

Fuel Watch Urged: Following the termination of the agriculture priority for diesel fuel, National Cotton Council President Hoke Leggett stated: "Certainly we recognize the widespread problems caused by the growing fuel shortage. However, it must also be recognized that an adequate and dependable supply of diesel fuel is absolutely essential for full food and fiber production." He urged that any suspension or modification in agricultural priority be only temporary and that agriculture's fuel supplies continue to be closely monitored. As conditions warrant, agriculture priority should be immediately reimplemented to prevent any delay in harvesting this year's crops, including cotton, he stated.

Cotton Exports Rise: Exports of 131,800 running bales during the week ended June 10 brought the season's total to 5,109,800 compared with 4,417,500 a year ago. The week's new sales of 18,300 bales pushed total commitments for the current marketing year to 6,807,700 compared with 6,439,700 year ago. New sales of 52,800 running bales for 1979-80 delivery brought the total to 1,735,300 thus far.

And Cotton Yesterday: In 1949 Texas cotton farmers produced a record cotton crop - six million bales.

The contestants will model their fashions in a revue at 7 p.m. in the home economics auditorium. The revue is open to the public.

Two junior level contests will be staged at the same time as senior competition. These younger 4-H members, ages 9-11 and 12-14, will not compete beyond district level.

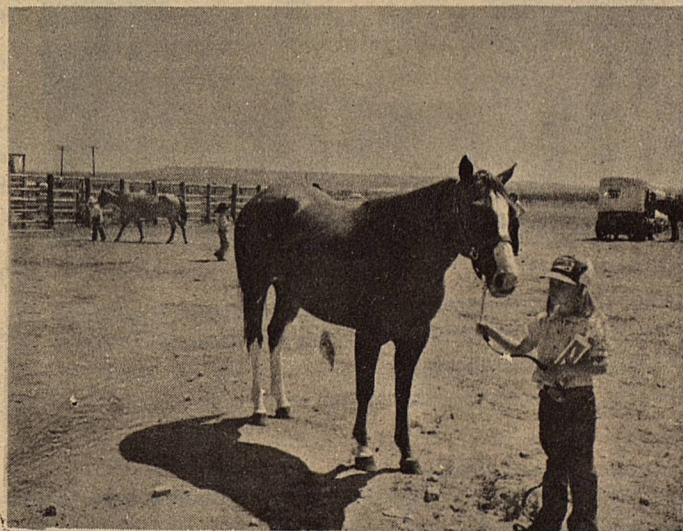

The Chatter Box

Sealing failures in home canning can result from some common mistakes.

Avoid making mistakes in home canning by following these suggestions;

- 1) Read and follow package instructions for using caps and lids. Don't take it for granted that all home canning caps are alike and are used exactly the same way.
- 2) Leave correct amount of head space when filling jars.
- 3) Take time to "knife out" air bubbles before sealing the jar.
- 4) Remove particles of food, seeds or seasonings from jar top or threads with damp cloth before putting on lid. Particles left on jar rim can cause lid to seal, then loosen.
- 5) Screwing band too tight can cause lid to buckle. A band must be tight enough to hold the rubber sealing compound closely against the jar top.

However, if the band is forced as far as it can be turned with a strong hand, the jar cannot vent. When the jar cannot vent, pressure within the jar causes the lid to buckle.

Therefore, tighten bands only comfortably tight to prevent buckled lids.

- 6) Screw bands tight enough.
- 7) Heat sufficiently to seal the lid. Follow recommended processing time and method.
- 8) Exhaust (vent) steam-pressure canner for a full 10 minutes, or until a stream of "blue steam" is visible, before closing petcock.

If steam is not exhausted, there is an uneven amount of steam pressure in the canner. As a result, some lids may seal while others in the same canner load may not.

9) Don't let pressure in canner fluctuate. This can cause food particles to be forced between jar and lid which will cause sealing failure.

The same thing may happen if steam is released too quickly after processing. Let pressure in canner reach zero degrees naturally before removing cover. Do not run cold water over canner to reduce pressure.

10) Don't reuse jars in which commercial foods are sold. These jars are designed for use on high speed packing machines and with caps developed especially for that product, but not for home canning.

11) Don't use warped, rusty, worn bands, or old commercial caps.

12) Don't reuse lids. The lid of a two-piece metal cap should not be used more than once. This applies to all brands.

The compound is not guaranteed to seal a second time and the lid itself is often bent or warped when removed the first time.

13) Don't use old jar lids. If jar lids are old, the sealing compound may harden and not soften sufficiently to obtain a good seal.

As long as the sealing compound is resilient when mashed with the fingernail, the lid will probably seal. It is preferable to use jar lids the same year as purchased.

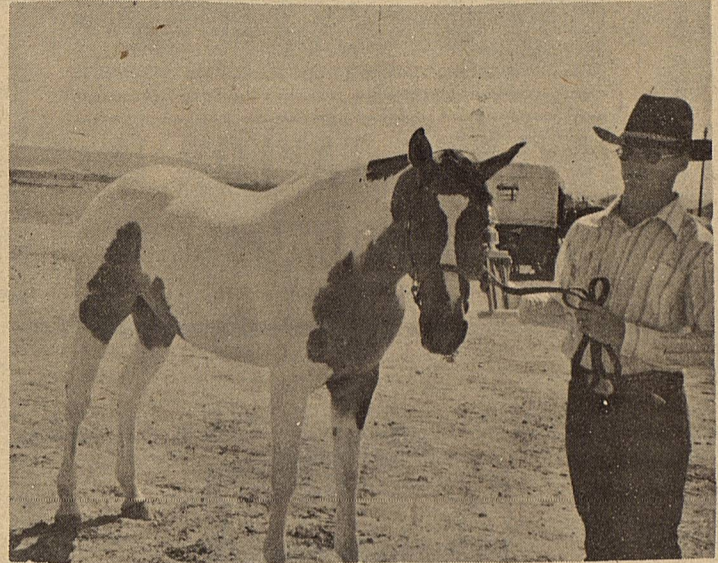
When kept longer, they often stick together and must be heated in boiling water to separate them.

If jars do not seal, you may reheat and process over again.

However, the product will be over-cooked and lose food value, flavor and texture.

You may keep a few jars in the refrigerator and use them within a short time instead of reprocessing.



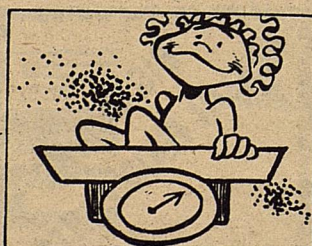
