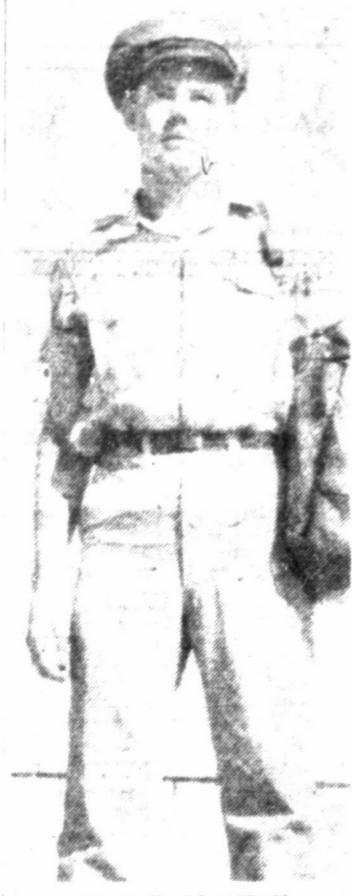


Do Russians Still Have U.S. Spies?

 WASHINGTON (AP)—What about a Russian spy ring in this country right now?
 Is there one? We don't hear anything about it.
 So far all the sensationalism in the un-American Activities Committee hearings have dealt only with the period before and during the war. All, or nearly all, that has been said at those hearings has been known to the FBI a long time.
 But not a word has been said anywhere by anyone about what may be going on now.
 The committee is going to start public hearings on a new investigation next week.
 This will deal with "atomic espionage" according to Chairman J. Parnell Thomas, New Jersey Republican.
 That, too, will deal with something which may have happened years ago.
 This writer called the FBI and asked whether it has any knowledge of a Soviet spy ring operating in the United States now.
 This call was made as a routine check and not with any expectation that if such a current spy ring is under investigation now, the FBI would break the news to a casual questioner.
 The FBI said "No comment."
 Robert Stripling, chief investigator for the un-American Activities Committee, was asked the same question.
 The answer was the same: "No comment."
 But a logical question can be asked at this point.
 If the Soviets had a spy ring here several years ago, while relations between this country and Russia still were pretty good, would it be more anxious to learn what it could through a spy ring?

 which marks the division of Berlin into East and West, a 14-200,000 Germans had demonstrated in a nearby square against the Communist drive for power over the city.
 Crowds hurled rocks at three Russian soldiers in a jeep and at Russian-controlled police.
 Russian military police and their German colleagues fired into the throngs of anti-Communist demonstrators.
 The Communist press claimed the demonstration was directed against the Soviet military administration. It carried a veiled hint of Russian reaction, and renewed demands for ousting the elected anti-Communist city government.
 The Socialist press claimed the Soviet-controlled police "indiscriminately" arrested about 90 men and women in the Russian Zone on their way home from the rally. The papers said those arrested were pursued "and in some cases fired upon" by the Communist controlled police.
 The Soviet police later announced they had arrested 27 demonstrators inside the Russian Zone. They said all were placed in Soviet jails, the Russian-licensed news agency reported.

Rumor of Huge Russian Tool Order Denied

WASHINGTON (AP)—A report that Russia has ordered \$48 million worth of machine tools from a British manufacturer brought a quick denial from an official of the firm.
 W. H. Russell, a Stockport, England, city councillor, said on Tuesday that the order had been awarded to Craven Brothers, Ltd.
 W. Lord, commercial manager of the firm, denied this Thursday in Stockport.
 "We have had Russian contracts in the past and we are negotiating for some more now, just as we are negotiating with buyers everywhere," Lord said, "but we have no contract for such a huge amount of money with anybody."
 A spokesman for the London Board of Trade said they were investigating published reports of the huge order, but expressed doubt that such a deal had been made with any British company.
 U. S. government officials said they have had no official word.

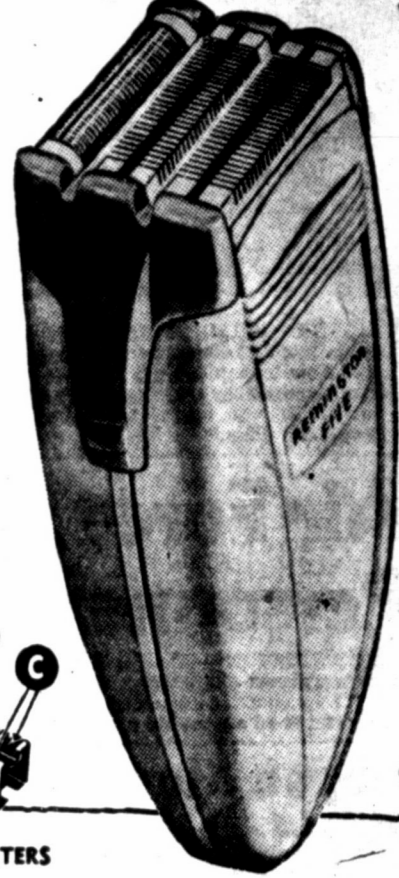

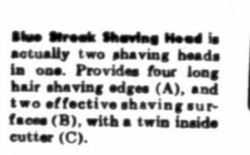

Labor Demands Up in Pampa

Labor demands are up and labor supply is down in the Pampa area, L. P. Fort, manager of the Texas Employment Commission office in Pampa, said. Industrial demand is keeping pace with agricultural demand, he said.
 At the present time, there is a demand for laborers to plant wheat and harvest food, and a few farm jobs are open for year-around families. Housing is furnished on these permanent farm jobs.
 The demand for laborers in industry is growing more acutely, Fort said. There are jobs open for about 10 men, including construction laborers, pipe fitters, street builders, painters, warehousemen, receiving clerk, railway yard clerk, office clerk, man, engineering aide, insurance salesman, public auto service station attendants, and many farm jobs.
 While the cotton harvest is yet some weeks off, industrial activity is climbing. It is believed that the cotton harvest will be taken care of by migrant labor, but industry in this area is "scrapping the bottom of the barrel," Fort said.
 There are some migrant laborers from all over the nation, but few of these stop long enough to take jobs, he added.

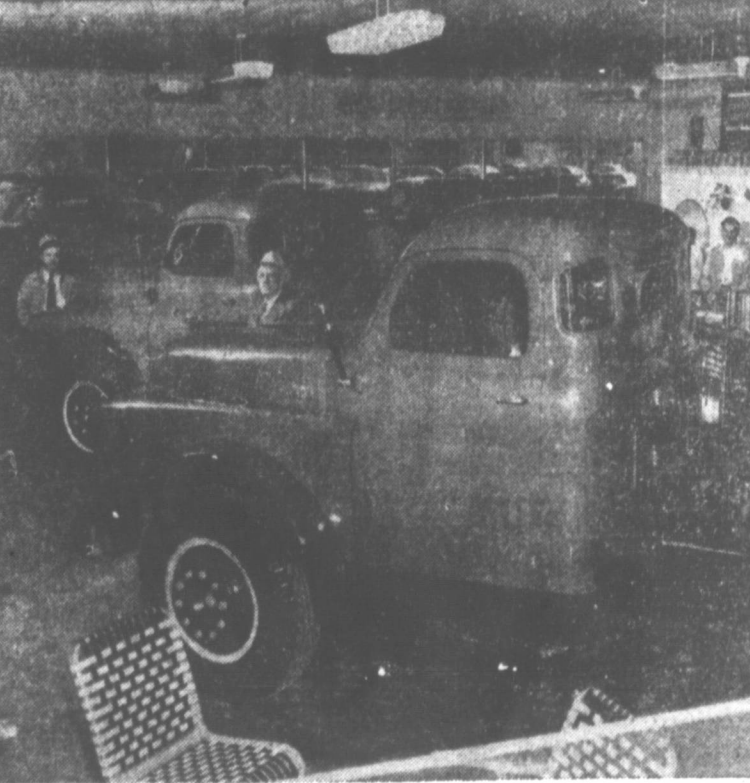

Citizens, Think This Over

Today we are advancing some ideas to see how they will fare among the readers of Pampa. In the following paragraphs we shall set out some ideas, with the hope they will grow—not only to eliminate several of our problems but also to work to the ultimate betterment of the community.

As a preface, we must call to mind these facts: The present location of the Junior High School was chosen at a time when the city was much smaller. It was chosen for its proximity to the residential area that it was to serve...

Not only does the Junior High School plant sit in the edge of the main business district of Pampa; it also stops the northward growth of the city for another block.

Moreover—and this is quite important—by virtue of its proximity to the business district, the school creates a hazard for the children who are compelled to attend it. They must cross streets, they must play next to streets that carry much of the traffic of commerce from one whole section of town to another.

We ask the readers to visualize this situation. The school plant now sits on a block that is actually not practicable for educational purposes, and since real estate is worth much more as business property, why could it not be sold and the money used to build two junior high school buildings...

WHAT TO DO?

It was a strange fact which I never understood that next to our State Department and our Office of Strategic Services, Mr. Davis' own O.W.I. was more venomous with Communists than any other government bureau. These three bureaus provided deep dugouts for some of the most bloodthirsty anti-Nazis of the extreme left wing throughout the war, but these slacker probably cause the true zealot to snarl a fight.

Joe Curran probably never was a real Communist either. If only because he kept getting himself put in with the others who were dangerous contact with the enemy was when he took a vacation trip to Africa, in a beautiful summer month. He could not have been exempt from the draft, and yet he hounded with Charles Chaplin and Henry Wallace and Henry's blabbing friend, William Westwood, for American high school boys to stop the beach in Normandy to have the strain of Russia and save the lives of Russian soldiers, to kill more Americans in the next war.

Students have turned up in so many important positions inside the New Deal, and they are so uniformly leftist, the question arises: Just the House committee? Or the Committee for Un-American Activities? Or the radicals, and Frankfurter is hardly to be described as naive if he did not know his protégés were a problem, and if he himself now repudiates the Marxism he taught them in Harvard Law School, then he might welcome the opportunity to go before the committee and clear himself.

With the House committee probing to the inner cell of the revolutionary system, the question of what to do with the Reds becomes one of the hottest on the agenda of Congress and the American people. This question will take up a lot of Congressional time next winter.

The answer depends both on laws yet to be enacted and on future presidential policies.

Twelve years ago Rose Wilder Lane wrote the booklet "Give Me Liberty." The edition was all distributed. A group of men in Los Angeles joined together and called themselves the Pamphleteers, Inc. to reprint masterpieces that were out of print and unavailable. Their first reprint was "The Law" by Frederic Bastiat, unrelated to them by the writer's Common Ground. Now this organization has reprinted this booklet "Give Me Liberty" by Rose Wilder Lane.

But a majority does not govern; it cannot govern; it acts as a check on its governors. Any government of multitudes of men, anywhere, at any time, must be a man, or a few men, in power. There is no way to escape from that fact."

"Perhaps the only genuine solution would be mass deportations— to find a nice, green island big enough to support the hundreds of thousands who will not become reconciled to Americanism and ship them there. The Reds could then enjoy Marxism to their heart's desire—though their stomachs might suffer."

WASHINGTON — An organized demand for a federal bonus for World War II veterans and a liberalization of the pension provisions for widows of World War I alumni will harass the next president of the United States, whether he be Harry S. Truman or Thomas E. Dewey. And the next Congress, for the first time, and Senate.

The sum quietly mentioned in the list of bills at Washington is \$300 per man, which would mean a total bill of approximately five billion dollars when administrative costs are tabulated.

PAY — Veterans in opposition to a federal bonus emphasize that the potential beneficiaries will pay for it out of their own pockets. Most of the state grants have been financed by higher taxes on personal and corporate incomes, beer, cigarettes, gasoline and general merchandise.

BENEFICIARY — Governor Thomas E. Dewey may be a beneficiary of the movement for a federal bonus, for under his regime New York has not done badly by her World War II heroes. The Albany Legislature granted \$50 to men with less than sixty-one days' service, \$150 to those in uniform for more than sixty days, and \$250 to those who served overseas. The money comes from a \$400,000,000 bond issue to be retired in 1958 with revenue from a 20 percent increase in the existing income tax rate and an extra one-cent tax on cigarettes.

RETURN — The legislators on Capitol Hill may react favorably or unfavorably after they have read the election returns on November 2, when six states will vote on referenda proposing bonuses for their World War II heroes. Inasmuch as approval seems likely from past experience, ratification will give an impetus to the movement at Washington.

MEXICO TO SEND WORKERS TO U.S. — More braceros (workers) soon will be sent to the United States by recruiting offices to be opened probably at Monterrey and Culiacan. Mexican authorities plan to send some of these to certain counties in Arkansas, Mississippi and Missouri when satisfied there will be no discrimination. Under the Feb. 21 agreement this year there is no limit fixed on the number of braceros to be sent. Requests for them are certified to Mexico by the U. S. Employment Service and the men are sent under the general agreement that covers equality of wages and treatment with United States workers in the same field. About 20,000 braceros have been sent this year but Mexican authorities said probably half of these had finished their contracts and returned home. Thousands of braceros, however, cross the Texas frontier illegally, authorities say, because of the Texas demand for harvest hands. Officially, Mexico does not send braceros to Texas, contending the is discrimination against Mexicans there. Baker County in eastern Oregon has produced more than \$150,000, 000 in mineral wealth.

Russian Kidnapping Called Example of Terror Methods

We have a prime example of Communist tactics the world over in the kidnaping, by Russian agents, of 19 Western Berlin police after the latter had left the City Hall in the Soviet Zone under a Muscovite guarantee of safe passage.

The Red maneuver was just as bold and cold-blooded as that. It was another move in the Russian campaign to unseat the duly elected Berlin City Council which is anti-Communist. The Western Berlin police came from the American-British-French zone and were present to shield a meeting of the council.

U.S. Secretary of State Marshall takes us a step further by stating that the Communist attacks on the Berlin city government are largely intended to upset talks of the Big Four military governors on the crisis in the Soviet-blockaded German capital. The secretary said the Berlin officers have followed a familiar Communist pattern, and declared that the efforts to disrupt the conferences of the governors must be firmly resisted.

Poland is providing us with further evidence of Bolshevik tactics. The Communists launched a drive for the avowed purpose of destroying "all exploiters and capitalists" among the some 15,000,000 peasants of the nation.

Larry Allen, Associated Press correspondent in Warsaw, says reports from usually reliable sources state that Communist groups have smashed factories owned by so-called "rich peasants" in Central Poland, and that fences dividing individual farms have been torn down in some places.

Red action committees have been sent out to spread the news among peasants that their production must be put on a common basis. And so it goes.

You wouldn't think the Communists would dare crack down so hard on liberty loving folk like the Poles, who time and again have fought for their freedom. But bolshevism is as hard-boiled as the devil himself.
