Texas Wheat Crop Is Forecast High

AUSTIN -(A)- A Texas wheat crop of 55,278,000 bushels was forecast yesterday by the United States Department of Agriculture, which based its prediction on conditions as of June 1.

This production, though far be low last year's all-time record of 124,270,000 bushels, would be considerably above the 10-year (1937-46) average of 45,686,000 bushels. Acreage now being harvested was estimated at 6,142,000 acres, about 16 percent below last year's 7,310,000 acres but some 55 percent above the 10-year average of , 3.952.000 acres.

Drouth-breaking rains near the end of May were too late to be of greatest benefit to the High Plains wheat crop, but the late crop was materially helped. General deterioration from drouth was checked, the USDA reported.

'The best yield prospects in the state are in these Northern counties, although indicated yields are below average in all major areas,' the general crop report said.

OCEAN TAKES OVER

The secretary of agriculture may change the national diet at times, "in view of the new re-search in nutrition," but he is obliged to see to it that every person in the entire country gets enough food of the right kind, This obligation upon the secr tary would be discharged by means of food coupons, to be sold at a discount the amount of which must be suited to the economic condition of the individual household.

The amount of the discount would be, of course, the difference between what the household could afford to spend and what the secretary of agriculture might set up as a desirable level of ex-penditure. Or, if the household could afford to spend 75 cents where the secretary thought it desirable to spend a dollar, the public Treasury would make up the difference,
