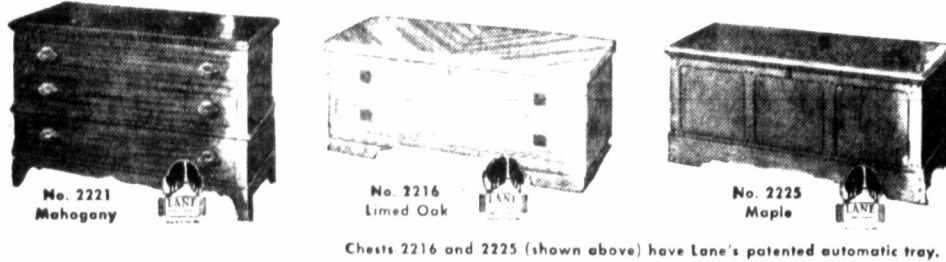

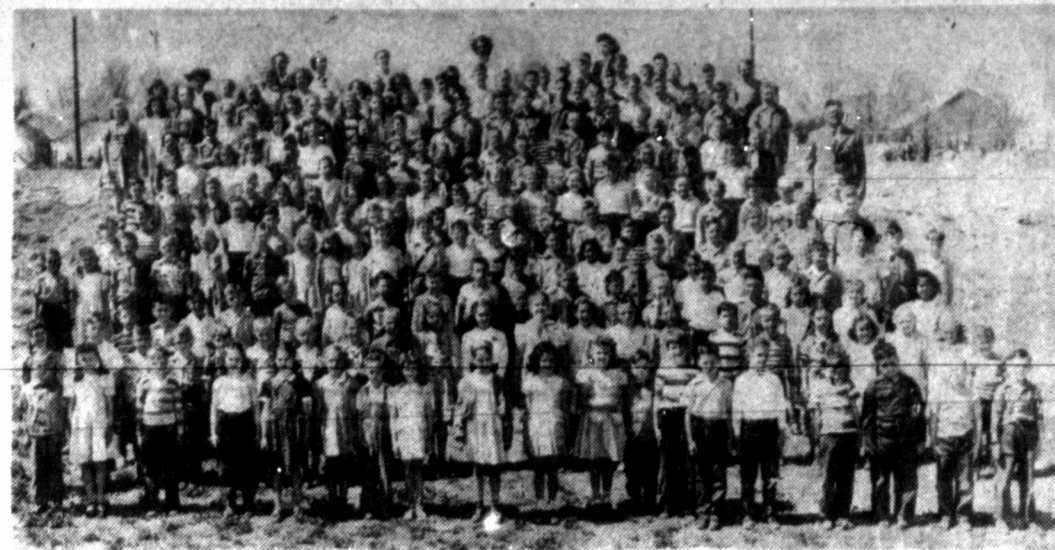

Legion Told Men Needed For Combat

INDIANAPOLIS — (AP) — The American Legion had the word of its National Security Commission chairman today that armed forces should release all fit men from housekeeping duties and put them into combat training. "Citizens can do the Army's KP chores and all other non-combatant work," Perry Brown, of Beaumont, Tex., told the Legion's Executive Committee. "We're going to need fighters, and the sources from which we have to get them just are not producing them. The manpower pool is disastrously low."

Brown said the nation's pool of manpower in the 18-25 age group available for military service has dwindled to 1,300,000. He said he was given the information in Washington last week and had authority from "high Washington sources" to make it public. "The situation shows that actually in terms of last-ditch fighting manpower, we have less than 5,000,000 World War II veterans standing as the last bulwark between our national security and national disaster in event of any emergency," Brown said.

He presented a breakdown showing more than 9 1/2 million men in the 18-25 group. He listed more than five million veterans, more than 1 1/2 million physically unfit, and the rest except for the available 1,300,000 — in the armed forces, National Guard or Reserves, or deferred.

More than two thirds of the \$805 million which the American people spent on reading matter in 1946 was spent for newspapers and magazines. The remainder was chiefly for books and maps.

Willkie's Son Is Elected to Office

RUSHVILLE, Ind. — (AP) — Phillip Willkie, who unlike his famous father started his political career at the bottom of the ladder, won his first election by a smashing margin in Tuesday's Indiana primary. The 28-year-old son of the late Wendell Willkie won the Republican nomination for a seat in the state House of Representatives from Rush and Henry Counties. He piled up 5,831 votes to 1,215 for his opponent—a margin of nearly 5 to 1.

Work Simplification Instructions Are Being Passed on to HD Clubs

The Home Demonstration Clubs of Gray County are holding meetings on work simplification. Instructions which are being used are hints and suggestions that were given at recent Work Simplification School held in Pampa and are aimed to make housework easier for the homemaker. Some of the helps are briefly summarized below.

The idea of simplifying work to study each household job to see if you could do it in a shorter, better or easier way. While there is no pattern or best method for simplifying any job that will apply to all individuals, there are certain principles of time and motion which you can follow if you wish to make a job easier and do it in less time.

A well-managed home is one of the goals of every homemaker, and the job of homemaking is more individual than any other job because each family varies so much in its members and their activities. Many do the work the hard way because they follow the same old rut. Some methods have been ruled out as inefficient, costly and time-consuming by people who have found a better way. If homemakers want to save time and effort they will be willing to admit there may be room for improvement. The way a woman does her work has a direct relationship to the length of the working day and how one feels at the end of the day. Homemakers should study the tasks to see whether they can be done in a shorter, better and easier way. Such simple every day jobs as washing dishes, setting the table, clearing the table, making beds, sweeping a floor, making a bed or getting dishes out of a cabinet may be taking much more time, energy, and extra steps than is really necessary to do these tasks in a satisfactory manner.

First of all leave out any part of a task that is not necessary. Draining dishes besides saving time is more sanitary. Putting away sheets and towels without ironing, not only means that you are saving time, but that you get all the benefits from their hanging in the sunshine. Keep everything within easy reach and keep those things together which will be used together. In the kitchen all mixing bowls, ingredients for mixing, and the casserole or other utensils should be kept at the mixing center. Then one trip to the ice box for any dish can be prepared ready for the stove without having to take another step. The coffee pot, coffee mixing spoon and coffee should be kept at the place where the coffee is made.

House cleaning can be made easier too. By keeping all cleaning materials in one place, you can save time and energy. . . .

Texas Historian to Speak at Junior High

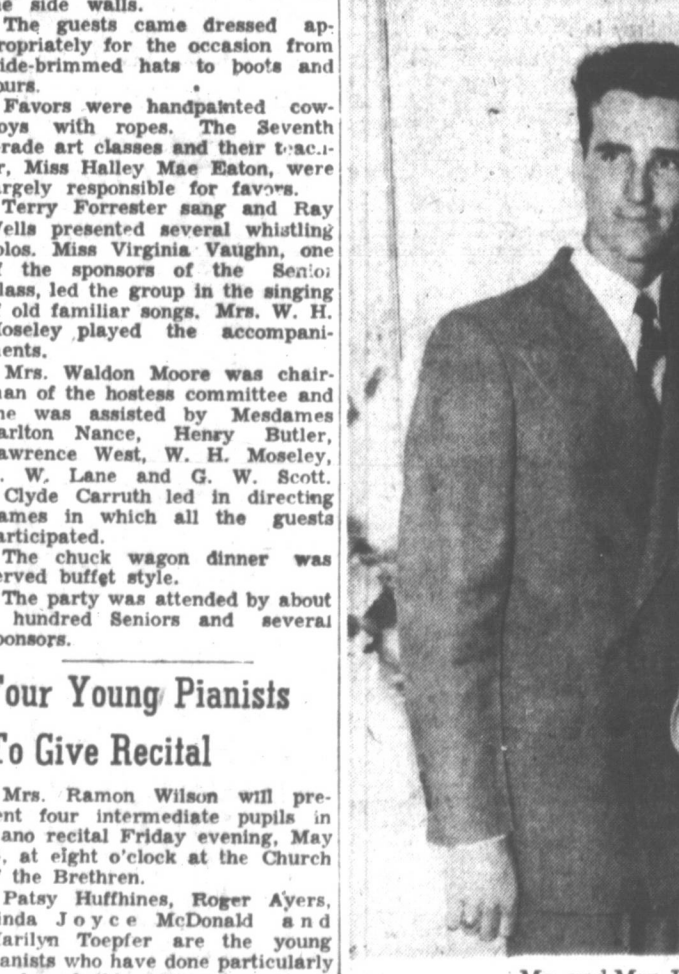

Women Own a Fifth of All Life Insurance

Women in the United States now own nearly \$40,000,000,000 of life insurance, the highest total in history and about one-fifth of all the life insurance now in force in this country, according to estimates of 1947 sales and ownership released today by the Institute of Life Insurance. Women's purchases of new insurance during the year, according to the estimates, exceeded three and one-half billion dollars.

Based on a sampling of representative life insurance companies, the Institute's figures show that women bought about the same amount of life insurance in 1947 as they did in 1946 and about the same proportion of all life insurance sold. One-third of all women buying policies said their main occupation was housewife, a little more than one-half listed other occupations and among the rest were girls over the age of school.

Significant last year was the fact that women continued to buy large amounts of "ordinary" life insurance, which is issued to individuals in amounts of \$1,000 or more and is usually paid for quarterly, semi-annually or annually. During the past generation purchases of life insurance have increased greatly and in accord with this trend, more and more women have been buying ordinary policies—straight life, limited payment life and endowments. During the war the trend was accelerated as women took on a greater role in the economic life of the nation and assumed increased family responsibilities. Today's purchases average around a billion and a half dollars each year and are much more than the amount bought by women in 1942 and before.

Reason for the increasing purchases of ordinary life insurance by women, the Institute points out, is the desire of women to protect their dependents and to help provide income for later years. Their total ownership of ordinary life insurance now represents about fifteen percent of all ordinary life insurance in force; in 1947, they purchased slightly more than ten percent of the nearly fifteen billions of new ordinary life insurance bought by all persons during the year.

Although more ordinary life insurance is owned by men than women, the opposite is true of "industrial" life insurance, which is insurance in smaller amounts usually paid for by the week or month. Industrial life insurance represents only about a sixth of all life insurance in the United States but of this, two-fifths is owned by women, a third by men and the rest is on the lives of children. Purchases of industrial life insurance by all people in 1947 amounted to just over four billions of dollars.


A third kind of life insurance, growing in importance in the United States, is group life insurance, which is set up for the employees of a company or firm. Since this kind of life insurance is issued to all employees of the firm who want it, the number of women protected by group insurance depends primarily upon whether there is group insurance in the stores, factories and offices in which they work. A sixth of

all life insurance now in force and almost a third of all new insurance added to the nation's total during 1947 is group life insurance.

The nearly forty billions of all life insurance owned by women at the end of 1947, the Institute points out, is considerably greater than the total life insurance in force in the United States at the end of the first World War.



ing supplies stored together. A basket which holds the bottle cleaner, furniture polish etc. can be picked up and carried to the room where it is to be used, saving time and trips back for something you have forgotten. Of course that doesn't mean you need only one box of sink cleaner. There should be a box in each place in the house where it is used.

Then too, we overwork the right hand. We should make both hands work. We can do this when dusting by using two dust cloths and dusting with both hands. Also use both hands to put dishes away.

Each household job breaks down into three parts. First, get ready for the job. Plan the work, collect tools and supplies, have plenty of space in which to work. Second, do the job. Use smooth motions, work at speed best for you, keep work space in order, work calmly and quietly. Third, clean up. Use carrying device such as tray or cart on wheels, clear work area before beginning another task, and have storage nearby.

After a task has been studied and an easier way found, keep working at it until the habit is formed. The new way may seem awkward at first, but soon it will be natural. Fit jobs together. Tasks requiring the same tools may be done together. Go smoothly from one task to the next. If possible, carry one process to completion before beginning another. Encourage the family to help you. Study the plans and methods of others who have well-finished, smooth running homes. You may be able to adopt some helpful ideas that will fit into your own situation.

It might help to have someone else study your methods and give helpful suggestions for improvement. Most people can find the time to do a good job by planning ahead, by using short cuts, by simplifying family living, by gaining the cooperation of family members and by having the will and desire to try to find a QUICKER, EASIER, and SIMPLER way to the work. Other suggestions were made. For example, a waste basket in every room can save many steps.

Square biscuits can be cut in much less time and taste just as good as round ones. When cutting square biscuits you do away with all the little scraps that have to be re-rolled and cut again.

Much time can be saved in looking for a suit pattern if they are filed. Use a box about the size of the patterns, stand the patterns so that the fronts are all facing one way. Place all patterns for different members of the family together and use subdividers with their names placed on them. This way you can look through patterns easily, and a lot of time can be saved when sewing if all sewing equipment is kept together.

WASHINGTON—Prominent politicians of at least four Southern states have notified their agents here that Gen. "Ike" Eisenhower regards himself as a Democrat and will accept that party's nomination for the White House if it comes to him in the form of an honest and unadorned draft.

ALABAMA is expected to play a key role in the plan to sweep the Democratic convention with the supposed magic name of Eisenhower as Taft, Dewey and Vandenberg delegates were stamped by the Wendell Willkie whirlwind at the GOP's 1940 convention.

WINNER The leaders of the revived movement maintain that they bear no particular personal animosity toward President Truman. Their attempt to shove him aside, they insist, is not inspired by resentment against his Civil Rights program so much as it is by their desire to propagate a winner.

AGREEMENT The Army's current answer to this charge (it is also Eisenhower's) is that the agreement for postwar allied occupation of Germany had been negotiated by former Secretary of State James F. Evidence to Prove 4 Are Not Guilty

NEW ORLEANS —(AP)— Former Louisiana Governor James A. Noe and three others planned today to present evidence tending to show they are innocent of federal government charges they conspired to influence a federal jury here in 1945.

The government late yesterday rested its case against the quartet — Noe; wealthy Lake Charles oilman William T. Burton; former State Senator Joe Cawthorn, of Mansfield, La.; and Marcel F. La Branche.

La Branche was a member of a hung jury which in 1945 heard Burton tried on charges of evading income taxes. It is this jury which the defendants are charged with having conspired to influence.

When U. S. Attorney Robert Weinstein halted presentation of government evidence he still had 14 witnesses listed who had not testified.

Defense attorneys moved for directed acquittals of all four defendants. Judge Wayne G. Borah overruled the motions without comment.

The defense then called John L. Beard, senior vice president of the Central Savings Bank and Trust Co., Monroe, La., to the stand. He identified records of

Noe's account, particularly those relative to transactions involving Burton.

He listed records of 21 drafts by Noe on Burton, totalling \$110,000. They were in addition to drafts of \$7,197.62 and \$7,466.33 which the government had offered as evidence in a transaction in which Noe paid for insurance.

Prior to the offering of defense testimony, John Joseph Astorias, former chef at the Roosevelt Hotel here, told of receiving a package of money from Burton and turning it over to a man who "looks like La Branche. He said he delivered the package after Burton's 1945 trial.

Astorias said the recipient of the package tore off a corner revealing a \$20 bill and remarked "There's \$1,500 in here."

Texas Today

Dr. R. C. Koeninger, sociologist at Sam Houston State College, Huntsville, says one-third of all criminals convicted in Texas in the last 11 years have come from only five of the states 254 counties.

The counties: Harris, Dallas, Bexar, Tarrant and El Paso.

With the cooperation of prison officials, Koeninger made a study of prison records over the 11-year period, 1937 to 1947 inclusive.

His conclusion:
"The slight increase in crime now prevalent corresponds to slight increase in the movement of rural population to the cities. The average number of criminal convictions per county for a

border, and El Paso, Hudspeth and Culberson on the Mexico and New Mexico border.

Culberson has the worst rate of all, 16.93 convictions per 1,000 population.

We asked Koeninger why the four west Texas counties should have such high rates of crime: "I can think of several possible reasons, he replied, "first, the sparse populations of these counties makes a high percentage rate more easily possible. Second, you have the heritage of lawlessness in the west—that may have something to do with it. Third, the counties are in mountainous territory, and you find plenty of rugged individuals in such areas. Fourth, there is a big migratory element in the region. Fifth, the prospect of good hiding places could lead men to crime. A criminal in those four counties could consider getting away across the Mexican border or hiding in the mountains.

Here is a rather amazing fact, Koeninger found that three Texas counties had had no convictions at all in 11 years. They are: Kenedy and McMullen, in South Texas, and Loving, in West Texas.

1,000 population over the 11-year period is 3.39.

The big city counties have higher rates. Tarrant County (Fort Worth) has 4.84 convictions per 1,000 population; Bexar (San Antonio) has 4.23; Harris, (Houston) 5.83; Dallas, 4.85.

Harris County leads the state in convictions during the 11 years with 3,087. But then Harris County has the biggest population in the state.

El Paso has a high percentage of convictions—8.78. The number of convictions also was high, about 1,100. Koeninger estimated off-hand.

The sociologist, a 150-pound man of 40 with brown hair and brown eyes, a native of Plainview, Tex., and a graduate of Texas Tech, told us that the four worst counties in the state in percentage of criminal convictions are Dallas, on the Oklahoma-New Mexico

Truman Declares House Shortage 'Almost Fatal'

WASHINGTON — (AP)—President Truman last week called the housing shortage an "almost fatal" problem and asked prompt action by the House to meet it.

In an extemporaneous speech before the National Conference on Family Life, the President said the problems that require solution include housing, health and social security, which have a "direct bearing on family life."

He said the family unit is the basis for all government.

Asserting a study of the problems of the founding fathers made him wonder how they were ever solved, he said:

"I look at some of the things our ancestors had to contend with, and I wonder how they did it."

Discussing housing, he said: "Just recently the Senate passed the Taft-Ellender-Wagner (housing) Bill in wonderful form. I sincerely hope that the House of Representatives will study the legislation and give us the opportunity to act on this problem."
