

#### REBEL' DIES AT AGE 102, WILL BE BURIED TOMORROW

GRAHAM, Texas- (AP) -R. S. Uncie Bob) Hilburn, a veteran of the War Between the States, died here yesterday at the age of 102. Like many another old soldier, Uncle Bob liked to tell of his war experiences.

He joined the Confederate Army while still in his teens. His father, who enlisted with him, was killed at Fayetteville, Ark. The two had fought side by side in that battle. Hilburn would have been 103 in September. He was a native of Texas. He used to call himself an "unreconstructed" Confederate. He said he had never surrendered to the Union Forces.

When the war was over, he limbed on his horse and returned to Texas, a wild country in those days. He claimed to be one of the 2 surviving Confederates living in

Hilburn is surived by a daughter, Mrs. T. E. Mathews, with whom he had mace his home here the last 12 years, and two sons, Fred Hilburn of Shannon and Claude Hilburn of Dallas.





# Look who gets squeezed!

Union leaders representing less than one-tenth of railroad employes reject recommendations of President's Emergency board—refuse to negotiate except on their own terms—threaten to paralyze nation by strike!

THE LEADERS of three railroad unions, representing less than one-tenth of all railroad employees, have called a railroad strike that would paralyze the nation.

These leaders refuse to accept a 151/2 cents an hour wage increase retroactive to November 1, 1947, This increase was recommended by an impartial Emergency Board appointed by President Truman.

This increase of 151/2 cents already has been accepted by the 19 other railroad unions. But the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, and the Switchmen's Union of North America won't accept what more than 90% of all railroad employes have accepted. They have called a strike to get more!

Unions refuse rules discussion

Certain rules changes demanded by these union leaders—which would increase wages still further—were recommended by the Board. But the union leaders want more—they demand that the railroads put into effect ALL the changes they asked for, including those the Board felt should be denied. On top of this, they insist that certain rules changes proposed by the railroads be withdrawn—in spite of the fact that the Board recommended them! These union leaders have refused to negotiate except upon these arbitrary terms.

Greater wage increase not justified Engineers and firemen are among the high-est paid of all employes in America, as figures in the box show. This strike threat doesn't

justify giving a greater increase than other railroad workers received. Emergency Boards are a means provided by the Railway Labor Act in the public inter-est to avoid strikes. The President's Board, after hearing evidence for 33 days, made recommendations based on all the facts in the case. The railroads have accepted these

burden, the railroads accepted the report of the Board because they felt it was in the public interest to uphold the spirit and intent of the Railway Labor Act.

- In contrast, this small group of railroad union leaders are attempting to flout the intent and spirit of the Railway Labor Act, and dictate their own terms.

Pampa's present sewage plant was constructed about 20 years ago to accommodate a population paigns. of about 8,000. Since that time no improvements have been made to the system. None of the sewage, therefore is receiving a decimal to the system. therefore, is receiving adequate

Offensive odors and polluted water due to insufficient treatment are being created by the present plant. The existing treats ment facilities consist of two Imnoff tanks and a trickling filter. However, no provision has been made for secondary treatment or the effluent from the filters.

An extensive survey of the pres ent plant was made by the co sulting engineers. This survey consisted of making chemical analysis to determine the efficiency of treatment, measurements of the quantity of sewage to be treated. and an appraisal of the condition of the present plant. The engineers pointed out the following deficiencies in the present system:

1. Inadequate sludge digestion

2. Insufficient filter area.

"Copies of the engineering report by Merriman and Roberts are on file in the City Engineer's and City Manager's offices," said favor Huff. He said he urged any interested resident to go into these offices and look them over.


