

# Air Force Ready to Purchase

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Air Force readied buying orders for 2,727 new warplanes today, awaiting only President Truman's signal to start building a 70-group peace-time armada.

Shortly after the Senate gave a 74-to-2 vote of approval yesterday to a \$3,233,200,000 airpower expansion fund, Air Force officials announced they were warning up their purchasing machinery.

A Senate-House conference committee was expected to act swiftly to compromise minor differences in the bill previously passed by a 343-to-3 vote in the House.

While most of the debate centered on the theme that airpower is the best defense against attack, a number of lawmakers left no doubt they would like to avoid an election year vote on reviving the draft and setting up universal military training.

Mr. Truman, who asked for both of these, took scathing exception to a substitute manpower plan put forward by Rep. Leo Allen (R-Ill.), chairman of the House Rules Committee.

Allen, whose committee had blocked action on UMT, suggested shelving the draft as well as offering bonuses up to \$1,500 to volunteers.

Mr. Truman told his news conference yesterday this was the most assinine proposition he has seen since the war.

The Air Force said the new funds will provide 243 bombers, 1,575 jets and 1,905 fighters.

## Man Waives Hearing in Death of 2

PERRYTON — Derby A. Cronister, 40, Ochiltree County rancher, waived preliminary hearing before Justice of the Peace Dewey R. Allen here yesterday afternoon on two charges of premeditated murder, growing out of the fatal shooting of two of his neighbors.

C. W. Barker, 53, and his son, W. H. Barker, 26, died from bullet wounds in their chests shortly before noon.

Cronister gave himself up to Deputy Sheriff Ray Phagan at 12:20 p.m. yesterday. He made no statement, and the immediate cause of the shooting is as yet unknown.

A white gold watch the elder Barker carried in the bib of his overalls was broken. The imprint of the hands from being mired against the dial showed the shooting occurred at 11:32 a.m. yesterday.

J. R. Cook, Ochiltree County, was an eyewitness of the fatal meeting between the men. He told Sheriff Bill Lance that he and Cronister were riding in a jeep southward along a dirt road toward the Cronister home, when they were stopped by the Barkers, who were also riding south in a pickup truck.

## Jews Claim New Successes; U. S. Fears New Outbreaks

Jews claimed new successes today against the Arabs in Palestine. The Jewish Army, Haganah, said two Arab villages were taken during the night in Northern Palestine between Nazareth and the Sea of Galilee.

The fighting was only preliminary to the expected battles which the United States, the United Nations and much of world opinion have been endeavoring without success to forestall after the British mandate ends next Friday night.

Churchill urged U. S. Of Europe. THE HAGUE, The Netherlands (AP)—Winston Churchill urged today immediate formation of a European assembly as the first step toward a council of Europe free of the jealousies and rivalries of the past.

Churchill asked members of a 22-nation forum to plead with their governments to "create a new Europe" whose united voice could be continuously heard.

The new council of Europe should be a subordinate but necessary part of the world organization of the future, he said.

Britain's wartime leader said the West is gripped and perplexed by the attitude of the Soviet Union, "without whose active aid the world organization cannot function, nor the shadow of war be lifted from the hearts and minds of men and nations."

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A resolution is before the meeting to create a "European democratic assembly" through which views could be exchanged and a common European opinion expressed on problems of the day.

The meeting also is asked to create an emergency council to direct joint action for economic recovery and military defense to "preserve democratic freedom."

Churchill is honorary chairman of the meeting. (See CHURCHILL, Page 8)

## Each Texas Demo Faction Is Certain That It Will Win

AUSTIN (AP)—Texas organization Democrats today predicted victory for their side at the Brownwood convention, but the opposition said "wait and see."

W. A. Wakefield, director of organization for the State Democratic Executive Committee, analyzing returns from 94 county conventions, said he believed the advocates of an unstructured delegation to the National Convention would win.

Woodville Rogers of San Antonio, leader of the pro-Truman faction which wants the Texas delegation instructed for Truman, said at San Antonio.

It will be close. We have a good chance to win. Rogers is also studying returns from county conventions, but he would not give specific figures.

Wakefield said 75 of the 94 counties reporting were "pro-Tejano," and that this assures 927 votes at the May 25 Brownwood convention for a Texas delegation unstructured as to candidates, but instructed against the civil rights program of President Truman.

Nineteen of the 94 counties "checked" are sending representatives to Brownwood, definitely committed to seek an unstructured delegation, Wakefield said.

These counties have a total vote of 465, he added. The total convention vote is about 2,150.

Wakefield's analysis was based on county support of, or opposition to, the resolutions recommended by the State Democratic executive committee, adn endorsed by Gov. Jester.

these improvements are made, objectionable odors will be eliminated and a suitable treatment will be produced. This improved plant will be adequate to serve Pampa's needs and also a 40 percent increase in population.

Pampa's present sewage plant was constructed about 20 years ago to accommodate a population of about 8,000. Since that time no improvements have been made to the system. None of the sewage, therefore, is receiving adequate treatment.

Offensive odors and polluted water due to insufficient treatment are being created by the present plant. The existing treatment facilities consist of two Imhoff tanks and a trickling filter. However, no provision has been made for secondary treatment of the effluent from the filters.

An extensive survey of the present plant was made by the consulting engineers. This survey consisted of making chemical analysis to determine the efficiency of treatment, measurements of the quantity of sewage to be treated, and an appraisal of the condition of the present plant. The engineers pointed out the following deficiencies in the present system:

1. Inadequate sludge digestion capacity.
2. Insufficient filter area.
3. Lack of secondary treatment.
4. Improperly constructed sludge drying beds.

"Copies of the engineering report by Merriman and Roberts are on file in the City Engineer's and City Manager's offices," said Mayor Huff. He said he urged any interested resident to go into these offices and look them over.
