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West Restive; People Ask 'Who's Next?'

(Compiled From AP Dispatches) Indications last night were that Finland will heed the summons of Marshal Stalin and enter reluctantly into negotiations for a "defense pact" with the Soviet Union.

And, while Czech Communist Premier Klement Gottwald threatened merciless war on "agents of domestic and foreign reaction" following the grab in that country this past week, observers in London and Western Europe asked "Who's next?" on the Communist list.

Finland—the last "vacuum country" between the West and the Red East—had received a note from Russia "suggesting" the peace pact, and Finnish President Juho Paasikivi was expected to seek opinions from the various parties in Parliament on Monday.

Helsinki dispatches said that so far the Finns are in the dark as to just what Stalin wants. Sources close to the government said Friday he had proposed a mutual defense pact similar to that with Russia's other Western neighbors. This system of alliances now reaches across Europe, from the Baltic to the Black Sea.

WHAT NEXT? Czechoslovakia, it came as statements, journalists and men in the streets muttered "Munich" and drew parallels between Russian expansion now and German expansion 10 years ago. They speculated: "What happens now?"

Throughout the West there were expressions of concern. Communist expansion has not yet stopped. (See Mackenzie's Column, Page 7). These facts stood behind the fears:

1—Communism is strong in some Marshall Plan nations, notably France and Italy.

2—Russia's nine-nation Communist Information Bureau (the Cominform) has openly declared it intends to wreck the Marshall Plan by whatever means it can.

In Elre, the former Prime Minister Eamon de Valera's presidential campaign was a western focus in their final form.

Noting the events in Czechoslovakia, the newspaper said: "Finland and Sweden will soon go the same way. . . . Which country will be next on the list—Italy or France?"

The country would precipitate an atomic war between two continents.

CZECH PURGE Simultaneously with Premier Gottwald's purge threat, there came the news that the Czech government was purging its ranks.

Alanreed's 66 Ruling May Be Given Monday

Judge Lewis M. Goodrich Saturday said a judgment would be given Monday in the suit for a restraining injunction, brought by W. J. Ball, et al, a group of Alanreed citizens, against the State Highway Department et al.

He said he does not favor restoration of the two-thirds rule which would force the national convention to a two-thirds majority in making its nominations.

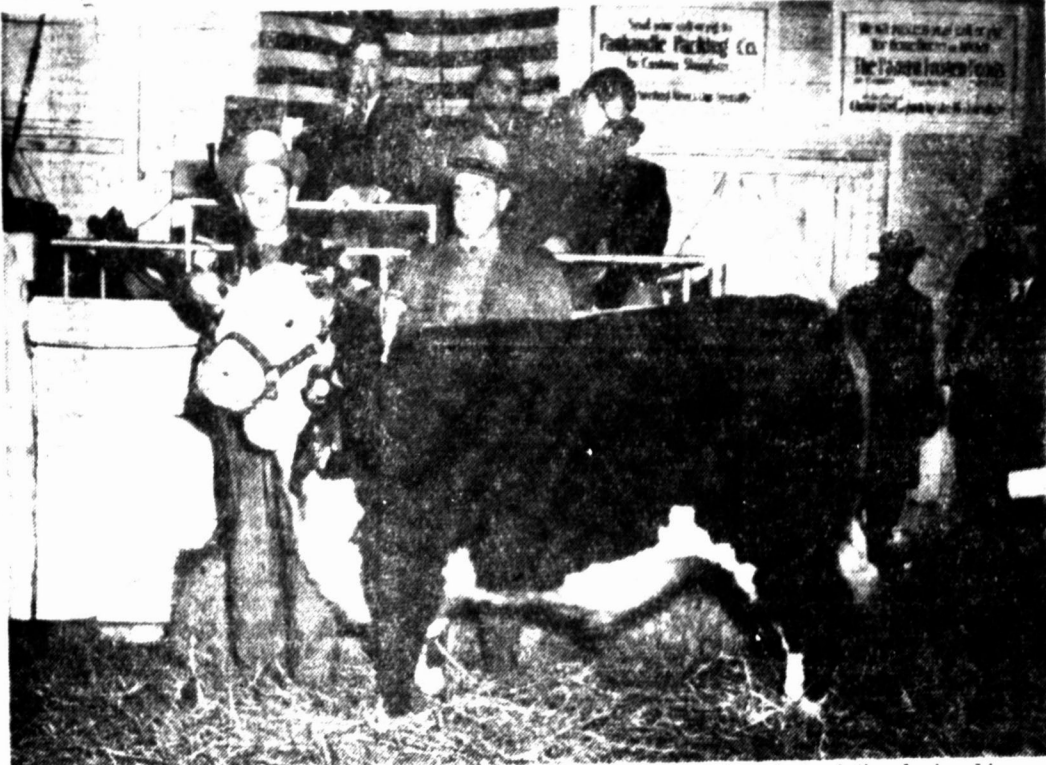

Cold Weather Hinders Crops

AUSTIN — This month's cold temperatures hindered Texas truck crops.

The United States Department of Agriculture has reported weather conditions unfavorable to lower valley spring crops and potato crops particularly, and other truck crops generally.

Planting of tender varieties of snap beans, cantaloups, cucumbers and watermelons in areas outside the valley was also being delayed.

Rains and cold weather in the North Texas onion area kept farmers out of the fields, causing serious delay in transplanting, USDA said.

Some of the best beds for the East Texas tomato crop were reported a total loss, but there was said to be ample time to replace them.

Harvesting operations remained fairly active, despite the cold weather. Shipments of beets, cabbage, carrots and mixed car loadings were accounting for a considerable increase over movements of this date last year.

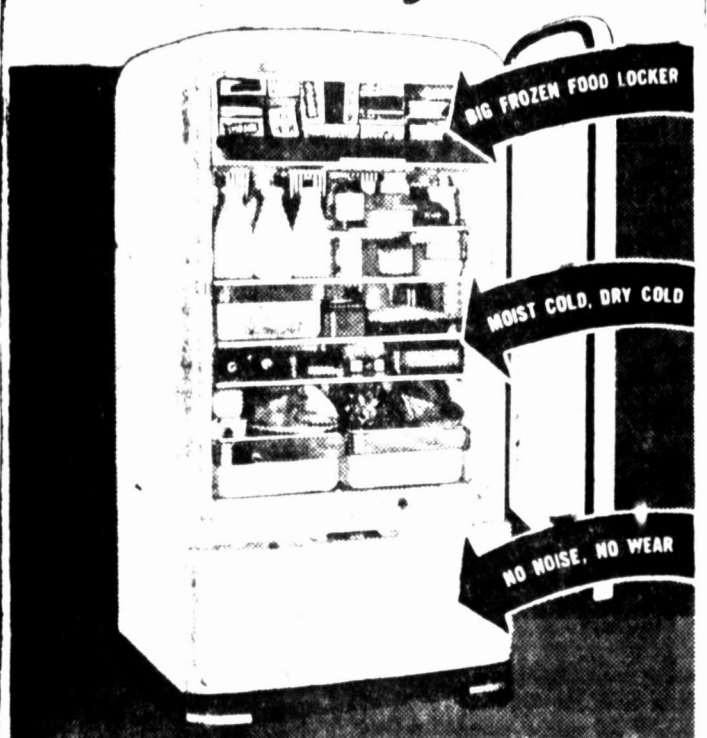

Action Delayed on Remount Station

WASHINGTON — Senate action on a proposal for disposition of the Fort Reno, Okla., Army Remount Station has run into another delay.

Senator Elmer Thomas (D-Okla.) said it was because Senator Morse (R-Ore.) was not present when the bill was reached on the Senate calendar. He added: "I would not take advantage of his absence."

Thomas, however, told the Senate his views and announced he would seek action at the earliest possible time when Morse was present.

The bill, by Rep. Case (R-SD) provides that four Army remount stations, including Fort Reno, shall be turned over to the Agriculture Department for continued remount use.

Thomas and Rep. Morris (D-Okla.), however, have proposed an amendment which would authorize the city of El Reno to acquire buildings and land needed for hospital and industrial purposes.

Check This, Then Make Tax Returns

WASHINGTON — Say you're making your 1947 income tax return on Form W-2, the withholding statement.

This is the receipt an employer gets from a boss for tax withheld from his wages or salary in 1947. He must give it to you.

You don't do any tax-figuring with it. Just fill it out and mail it to your internal revenue collector. Don't send any money with it.

He'll check it and notify you if you owe him money. You have 50 days to pay him after he notifies you.

If he finds too much tax withheld from you in 1947, you'll get a refund.

Husbands and wives—if both had 1947 income and can use Form W-2 as a separate or joint return—don't lose money either way by filing jointly or separately.

By law the collector must figure out which way is cheaper for them when he gets their separate or joint returns.

If you worked for more than one boss who withheld tax from you in 1947, get a Form W-2 receipt from each.

You can't make a return on Form W-2 without all your receipts. Without them you'll have to file your return on the 1040 short-form.

When you have them all, attach them all to form W-2 receipt you got from your last boss.

Fill out that last one, not the others. But you send them all in.

ernment is forming a seven-man commission to oust from all parties any "reactionaries."

The commission is headed by Communist Rudolf Stransky, who helped organize the Cominform ("information bureau") at the historic meeting in Poland a few months ago.

"SUICIDE EFFORT"
Meantime, Prekop Drtina, member of the National Socialist Party and former secretary to Pres. Eduard Benes, was found badly beaten Saturday. An announcement from Communist-controlled police said he had "attempted suicide."

Drtina had been at loggerheads for weeks with Vaclav Nosek, Communist minister of the interior who directs the Security Police.

It was Drtina who brought the conflict between Communists and anti-Communists in the Cabinet into the open on Jan. 21. He charged that Communists were implicated in mailing explosive parcels labeled as perfume to three cabinet ministers in an assassination plot last September.

Drtina himself was one of the intended victims. Foreign Minister Jan Masaryk, a non-party man, and Vice Premier Peter Zenk, an anti-Communist, were the others.

Gottwald sounded his keynote of sweeping threat of reprisal against those who opposed the march of communism at a farmers and peasants rally.

"We will have a complete change," he declared. "Merely changing a few people in the government is not enough. New stage settings are not enough. We will be merciless in getting rid of the agents of domestic and foreign reaction."

Saturday it was announced from Washington that American officials predict that the resistance of the Finns to Russian "defense" overtures will be greater than that of the Czechs.

There is no longer much disguising the fact that authorities in Washington were privately shocked and distressed at the speed with which the Czechs gave in to Communist demands.

The boss gives you a Form W-2 in "original" and "duplicate." You keep the "duplicate." Fill in the "original" and send it to the collector.

So you don't do anything on the front of the "original," except check your name and address. Turn it over. Then you answer simple questions on the back.

This is the way you do it: Say you're married, with three children, and your 1947 income was \$4,500 from wages or salary. Your wife had \$500 income in dividends on stock.

On line no. 1—left side, back of "original"—you write your salary \$4,500, and on line no. 2 your wife's \$500.

You claim your three children as exemptions since none of them had income of \$500 or more. (If a dependent has income under \$500 it doesn't count.) Write in their names. Each exemption takes \$500 off your income before it is taxed.

Christmas Seals Brought \$572,000

AUSTIN —(AP)— Your contribution for T-B Christmas seals last Yule season helped build a \$572,000 tuberculosis war fund.

Dr. Z. T. Scott, treasurer of the Texas Tuberculosis Association, reported that total, \$572,000 of which was raised in counties having local affiliated associations.

In those counties 80 cents of each dollar raised will be used locally. The remaining 20 cents going to the state and national program, he said. The balance of \$44,000 coming from counties without affiliated associations will be divided 65 to 5 between the state and national programs, respectively.

torneys in the case, no precedent case could be found in legal records, other similar cases mostly involving property rights, not a primary point of contention in this case.

At one point the plaintiff counsel said, "If the arbitrary power of 'boards' in this country keeps increasing, the people will have no rights left—we might just as well do away with the courts. It has already been established that the people have no property rights, and now we want to know if they have any right of protection."

Govt. Price Support Not Responsible for High Priced Meats

DALLAS —(AP)— J. Walter Hammond, president of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, said here yesterday that government price support of farm products cannot possibly be responsible for the present high price of meat and other farm products.

Speaking at a luncheon attended by representatives from 18 counties of the North Central District Four of the federation, Hammond stated:

"There has been criticism of the whole price parity program on the grounds that high corn and wheat prices mean high consumer prices for meat from animals fed high-priced grain.

Movie Award Race Winners Are Predicted

HOLLYWOOD —(AP)— Throwing caution in all directions, let's sit down and try to dope the Academy Award winners.

It's just like picking a horse race. You study the condition of the horses (popularity of the

actors), the speed of the track (number of good pictures) and then try to figure the sentimental factors. Of course, a dark horse might sneak under the wire a winner, but let's not think about that.

First of all, the pictures. Scratch "Crossfire" and "Miracle on 34th St." They may have been entertaining, but they aren't the type of prestige pictures that win Academy Awards. I think we can skip "The Bishop's Wife," since not everybody in Hollywood thinks it is an achievement.

That leaves "Great Expectations" and "Gentleman's Agreement." Both are excellent in all departments, but the former will suffer in the voting because it was made in England. Choice: "Gentleman's Agreement."

Now it gets tougher. Among the ladies, Susan Hayward is getting much support, but her picture ("Smash-Up") was not a smashing success. Likewise, Joan Crawford's ("Possessed") and besides, she has an Oscar already. Dorothy McGuire's "Gentleman's Agreement" role was difficult, but not meaty enough.

Loretta Young in "The Farmer's Daughter" showed the most improvement, and that means a lot in academy voting. But the part lacked the heavy dramatics afforded Rosalind Russell in "Mourning Becomes Electra." And Miss Russell has been close to an Oscar before. I'll pick Roz.

Among the actors, John Garfield's entertaining "Body and Soul" lacks the prestige value of more expensive films. Michael Redgrave makes a strong bid with "Mourning" but faces stiff competition.

It now looks like a neck-and-neck battle among William Powell ("Life With Father"), Ronald Coleman ("Double Life") and Gregory Peck ("G. A."), but because a winning picture often sweeps the slate and because of his great popularity, I'll lay a buck on Peck. But remember—I've been wrong before.

ANALYST POINTS TO 'ROAD' WORLD IS NOW TRAVELING

Moscow's rape of Czechoslovakia brings Western democracies face to face with the grim certainty that further concessions to Russia or her slave-states lead down the broad highway to disaster.

The reaction from the chancelleries of democracy show they are recognizing belatedly that they've been giving aid to their enemy on the battlefield—providing him with ammunition to use against them.

They are realizing that Russia meant it when she declared war to a finish against the democra-

ties.

They are learning tardily that there are times when even the exponent of the Golden Rule no longer can turn the other cheek but must stand up for himself.

On top of the joint American-British-French condemnation of the Red aggression in Czechoslovakia, we get an illuminating declaration from French Foreign Minister Georges Bidault. He told the National Assembly that the Communist seizure of Czechoslovakia menaces the liberty of the rest of Europe, and pushes the continent back to where it was when Hitler was climbing to power.

"An event of incalculable consequence," he declared, "has now rendered futile all efforts to liquidate Europe from an intense tyranny. . . It is impossible to think that these maneuvers in the East can be pursued without leading to some change in the hearts of Frenchmen."

Blunt language that. And it comes from the foreign minister of a nation which has pursued a policy of trying to act as mediator between Russia and the Anglo-American democracies. It comes from the member of a government which itself is threatened by the Red scourge.

Bidault might well have been more inclusive in his remark that the liberty of Europe is menaced. The liberty of the United States and all the rest of the Western Hemisphere is menaced. "Let's be realistic for once and recognize that this Bolshevik drive is a world revolution—so described by bolshevism itself."

We don't need to abandon the idea that right will triumph in the end, but we shall be foolish if we don't stop to consider how long it may take that "end" to arrive. We are entitled to try to ensure that it doesn't come after you and I have been killed off. It would be nice for this generation as well as posterity to have a little peace, and be able to lie on its back in the sun and wiggle its toes.

Our people have not been led along the path of atonement, but down the road to reprisal, and the new seed of hatred which has been sown has grown profusely.

Sportsmen are invited to participate in a crow hunting posse Sunday, starting at 3 p. m. The posse will leave the courthouse square and go to a 500-acre crow roosting ground near Lake Dallas. A delegation from the State Game, Fish and Oyster Commission is expected to attend, J. P. Harrison, club president, said.

Yanks in Japan Honor Ernie Pyle

TOKYO —(AP)— The memory of Ernie Pyle, war correspondent killed in action beside the G.I.'s he loved, was honored this week. It was the second anniversary of the founding of the Ernie Pyle Theater, big GI entertainment center here.

Brig. Gen. Paul B. Kelly, special service officer, praised Pyle's spirit under fire. Addressing 3,000 occupation personnel in the big theater, Kelly declared "he knew more of the brutal facts of war than almost any soldier and he died in harness."

"Pyle spent his time with G.I.'s in fox holes where the going was toughest, and he wrote about them in such a way that he endeared himself equally to the people back home and to the G.I.'s themselves."

Pyle was killed by Japanese machinegun fire in the fight for Okinawa.

"It is a great pity that the world should have been deprived of his presence, but I like to think that some of his spirit lives on in this building," the general said.

The five-story Ernie Pyle Theater is Tokyo's finest. It has two motion picture auditoriums, a library visited by 6,000 weekly, a popular snack bar drawing 25,000 a week, and other activities for occupation personnel.

"Ernie Pyle would be very proud that his name is over the door and on the program," said Kelly.

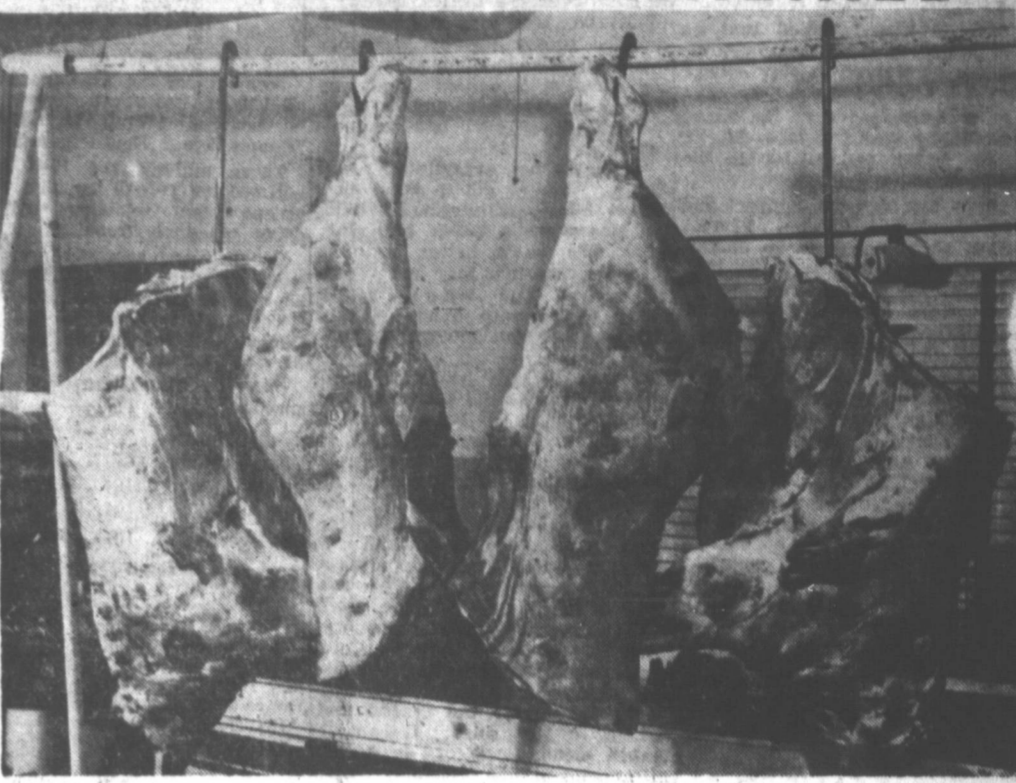
Leaves From a Correspondent's Life Note Book

NEW YORK—(AP)—Freckles . . . I've had a transcontinental rash of them.
It all began some days ago when I wrote about borrowing a freckle from a five-year-old girl I know. I found myself in a pickle when she asked me to return it. She said she was sure her freckle had become lonesome for her.
But how can you give back a borrowed freckle to an imaginative child? You can't just tell her: "Sorry, small fry, I had to turn it into the federal freckle tax collector."
My first plan was to tell her that her freckle had changed into a chocolate bar—and hand her one. I figured that the candy bonus would still any doubts in her mind.
But readers from coast to coast began sharpshooting at that prospective solution.
"She'd feel like a cannibal, eating her own freckle," objected Rosemary Sprague of Cleveland Heights, O. "Oh, you didn't mail the chocolate bar?"
She proposed instead that I inform the little girl that her freckle had been changed into a beautiful golden buttercup and that she would find it some day when she grew up.
"The little girl sounds like one of the sweet sensible kind who know there are fairies," wrote Jennie M. Barholm of Fitchburg, Mass. "Why don't you let her know the fairies have the missing freckle and are polishing it and polishing it until it gets all spandy 'ew looking."

Farmers, Ranchers Making Good Progress, Says Texan

ANGLETON—(AP)—R. M. Boswell of Kenedy, a Texan with a national reputation in soil conservation work, thinks farmers and ranchers are making good progress in improving their lands.
In a speech made before the Gulf Coast Soil and Water Conservation Association, Boswell spoke against several proposals of giving the federal government more authority in directing this work.
Boswell is vice president of the National Association of Soil Conservation Districts.
"Then some night when one's fast asleep a fairy will fly in and gently put it back on again. She'd better look in the mirror every morning, and when there's a freckle that's apparently brand new, then she'll know it's the one."
A lady in Burlington, Ia., suggested that I buy a dime store soil and "paint a gorgeous freckle right on the end of her nose." Mrs. Rose Emerson of the Bronx, New York City, recommended that I tell the little girl I was pasting the freckle in a letter to her but that freckles in such cases frequently fade and disappear.
More solutions came from Sacramento, Calif., Columbia, Mo., International Falls, Minn., and other cities—but none from Hollywood, where freckles sometimes support people, instead of vice versa.
I got so much varying advice in this "case of the purloined freckle" that I was at wits' end what to do. Nobody agreed except on one point—that my idea about the chocolate bar was all wet.
Then came the letter that solved the whole problem.
"I felt sorry for you so I am sending you a few of my own freckles," wrote 13-year-old Carlene White of Portland, Me. "They are not real, but I hope they'll do."
The letter was a tiny cellophane packet containing twelve freckles. If Carlene hadn't described them as freckles, I would have sworn they were pieces of red eraser from a lead pencil.
I delivered them promptly to the little girl. She accepted the freckles gravely, thanked me and said:
"They aren't exactly my color anymore. You must have left them out in the rain and they got rusty. I bet they're glad to be back with me—'cause I'll take better care of them."
Anyway I learned one thing. I'll never borrow a wart.
Boswell also spoke against a proposal that direction of the work be taken over by the production and marketing administration of the Agricultural Department.
"The summation of this whole program," he said, "is that it puts soil conservation in politics."
He said his national organization favors the Jensen Bill.
"Until something better is offered, we are wholeheartedly for the Jensen Bill because it provides for a national land policy and recognizes and strengthens the landowner controlled districts."
Further, he said, it provides technical assistance to the districts and in addition provides material and machinery for the placing of soil conservation measures on the land.

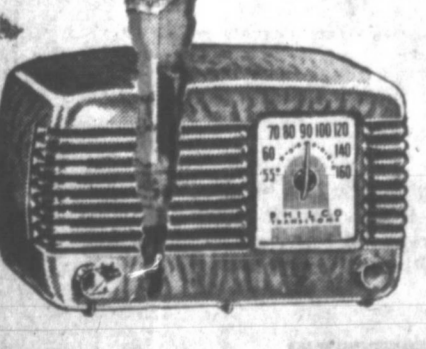

Boxing's 2nd Death in a Week Presses Inquiries

HOLLYWOOD—(AP)—A 20-year-old Negro boxer with a reportedly faulty heart lay dead yesterday as officials pressed inquiry into the fight game's second professional fatality within a week.

Elroy De Catur, Los Angeles lightweight making his first pro start, collapsed and died in the ring 10 seconds before the end of the fourth and last round of a bout he was winning against the 171-lb. Herrera, 20, of Jerome, Ariz.

It was a \$75-apiece preliminary scrap last night at Hollywood Legion Stadium, and came exactly one week after the fatal knockout of Sam Barpigi in Chicago.

First post-mortem examination of De Catur disclosed he suffered from an acute dilation of the heart, Dr. Frederick Newfarb, chief autopsy surgeon, reported.

De Catur's boxing license, issued Jan. 23, showed that he passed a physical and eye examination Jan. 12.

Hollywood police homicide detectives joined with John Home of the Legion's Stadium committee, and post commander J. P. Bradley in an investigation of the fatality.

De Catur collapsed after a light flurry of blows and never regained consciousness. A stadium physician administered artificial respiration for 20 minutes. The youth died in the ring.

Herrera, the opponent, said: "he never showed any signs of being hurt. When I hit him with a left and then a right, I stepped back because I thought he was going to come out of the clinch fighting. I didn't know what to think when he hit the floor."

Texas Diamond Campaign Just Two Weeks Away

AUSTIN—(AP)—Just two weeks away is the start of the baseball campaign for the University of Texas Longhorns, defending champions of the Southwest Conference.

Twenty-six titles have come to the state school since the conference made baseball a major sport 24 years ago and there are plenty of reasons to believe the 1948 outfit will run the string to twenty-seven.

Weaker at bat but stronger field and boasting probably the best pitching balance the circuit ever has seen, the Longhorns are the team to beat once more.

However, there will be a well-balanced field of opponents, with the bristling Baylor Bears and the Texas Aggies apparently the toughest. Rice, Southern Methodist and Texas Christian all have improved squads. Arkansas does not play baseball.

Texas' best weapon will be pitching. Heading the throwing list is a familiar name, Bobby Layne, who has yet to lose a conference game, winning 24 in three previous seasons.

Last year, the Longhorns lost by a one-run margin in the national collegiate semi-finals to California, the eventual champion and only the Baylor loss marred the conference season.

Texas' first game will be March 13 against Milwaukee of the American Association.

They open the conference race April 2 against Texas A and M.

Writers May Gain If New Bills Pass

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Working on a novel or a play you're sure will bring big dough from the movies?

Then Rep. Hugh D. Scott, Jr., (R-Pa.) is your pal. He has introduced two bills to cut Uncle Sam's take from authors, dramatists or composers.

Here's what they would do: The federal tax on money received for selling the motion picture rights of your creation would be no more than 25 percent. That's because it would be considered a gain in capital, not income.

Any other money received from the sale of a creation—"of whatever nature and from whatever source"—would be taxed no more than 30 percent.

Growers Score Security Tax On Shed Help

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Spokesmen for the fresh fruit and vegetable industry protested Wednesday against their packing shed employees being considered under the Social Security Act.

They urged Internal Revenue Commissioner George J. Schoeneberger to revoke recent rulings that such workers come under the law.

C. B. Moore of Los Angeles, representing the Western Growers Association, said many small packing sheds would have to go out of business if forced to pay the government a minimum of three percent of their payroll as required under the old age pension program.

Congressmen from farm districts, particularly in Florida, Texas, California, sat in on the discussion.

Under the act, persons handling foodstuffs before they reach terminal markets are considered agricultural workers and are exempt from its provisions. Revenue authorities have interpreted the

Reminder on License Tags Is Issued

State Highway Patrolmen yesterday issued a reminder to new residents of the state on changing in their automobile registration tags, especially those that have expired in their respective home states. The patrolmen referred to Article 8675A of the state's vehicular code which reads:

"Every owner of a motor vehicle, trailer, semi-trailer used, or towing states whose licenses have to be used, upon the public highways of this state shall apply each year to the State Highway Department through their county tax collector in county in which they reside for the registration of each vehicle owned or controlled by him for the ensuing or current calendar year or unexpired calendar year of any other state."

portion thereof." Penalty for violation, or violation, of the law is classed as a misdemeanor and is punishable by fine not exceeding \$200.

This means that any person moving from another state who makes his domicile, business, or other gainful employment in this state must register his automobile license here, and whose 1947 home state auto tags have expired, will have to pay the remaining portion of the Texas 1947 license before they can purchase the 1948 license.

The patrolmen listed the following states whose licenses have expired for 1947: Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Florida, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Louisiana, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New York, North Carolina, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Oregon, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, Washington, West Virginia, and Wisconsin.

Their identities were revealed to city officials by the father of the older boy.

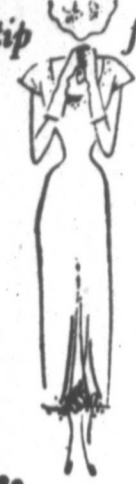
Jimmy Valentine, chief probation officer for the juvenile court, said the boys told him they ac-

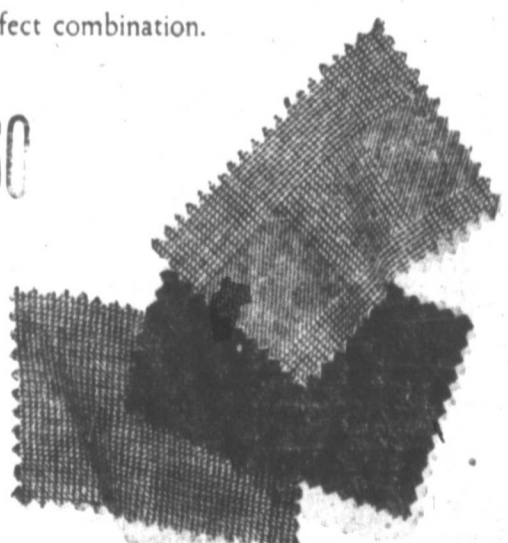

**Reduction of
Employer Tax
Rates Sought**
AUSTIN —(P)—Reduction of employer tax rates for unemployment insurance has been recommended by the Texas Employment Commission.
The office of the Governor said TEC, in its annual report to the Governor, also recommended:
1. That application of the Texas Unemployment Compensation law be extended to employers of four or more employees. The law now applies to employers of eight or more.
2. That the present maximum weekly benefit of \$18 for total unemployment be raised from \$18 to \$20.
3. That the maximum number of weeks for drawing benefits in any one year be increased from

18 to 20.
4. That the Texas Unemployment Compensation Act be changed to permit employers newly subject to the tax to pay less than the maximum until they accumulate enough employment experience to be rated on an individual basis.
The commission said a fact supporting its recommendation for lower tax rates is that in 1947 the interest on the unemployment trust fund amounted to \$3,182,731. This was sufficient to pay 45 percent of the benefits paid last year.
Workers in firms employing less than eight employees "certainly need the benefits of the law during periods of economic distress as direly as do people who formerly worked for larger firms," TEC said in support of its appeal for extension of coverage.

Private Enterprise Protection Asked

WASHINGTON (AP)—An oil company official has asked Congress to continue what he called "protection to private enterprise" against any expansion by the Navy of its oil reserves at Elk Hills, Calif.

Floyd S. Bryant, vice-president of Standard Oil Company of California, said such "protection" was "solidly established" in a 1944 act governing the Navy's Elk Hills Reserve.

Bryant told the House Armed Services Committee the 1944 act set up methods by which the Navy could condemn lands within reserve No. 1 and outside the reserve.

"These protections to private interests outside the reserve have been relied upon by the industry as standard since that time," Bryant testified.

He said the Navy now proposes "an entirely new philosophy as to Navy's obligations to protect the reserve." He said this includes plans to go outside the reserve

boundaries for certain explorations. "Navy proposes to gain access to such outside lands by executive order," Bryant continued. He urged that such explorations and any additions to the reserve be carried out with approval of Congress rather than by executive order.

Bryant said standard has no objection to the Navy exploring outside the reserve to find out extent of oil pools within the reserve. But, he said, this should be done "through sound engineering principles" and only with Congress approval.

Red Grabs Far Exceed Hitler Nazis Thefts

Before Hitler's Germany went to war, she reached out and took control of more than 1,000,000 neighboring square miles and upward of 28,000,000 people.

During and since the war, Russian and Communist rule have spread over more than 680,000 square miles and more than 110,000,000 people to the east and west of the Soviet Union.

Hitler and his Nazis won most of their territory by sending in troops or by threatening to do so. Russia and communism got theirs by occupying it in most cases to drive out the Germans, by winning concessions from the Western Allies, who needed Russia's help in the war; or by the methods of Communist parties in neighboring countries.

Here are the territories Russia has taken over during and since the war:

- 1939 — Sept. 27, Russia invades Poland, starting to divide it up with Hitler; gets Polish territory under later Big Power agreements; 77,703 square miles; 1,275,000 people.
- 1939 — Nov. 30, Russia attacks Finland; with peace in March, 1940, Finland gives Russia 16,173 square miles with 500,000 people.
- 1940 — July 14, Russia takes over Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania; 61,368 square miles, 5,955,985 people.

1945 — Feb. 3 - 11, Yalta Conference promises Russia Kuriles and half of Sakhalin; 17,878 square miles, 350,000 people.

1945 — March, in armistice, Romania gives Russia back Bessarabia and Northern Bukovina; 19,300 square miles, 12,560,000 people.

1945 — July 29, in treaty of Moscow, Czechoslovakia gives Russia sub-Carpathian Ruthenia; 4,886 square miles, 606,568 people.

1945 — August, Potsdam Agreement gives Russia part of East Prussia; 5,690 square miles, 1,200,000 people.

This is the timetable by which Communists have won control of countries in Eastern and Central Europe:

- 1944 — Polish Committee of National Liberation recognized by Big Three at Yalta, February, 1945; last top opposition leader, Stanislaw Mikolajczyk, forced to flee, October, 1947; 124,642 square miles, 23,800,000 people.
- 1944 — November, Communist Marshal Tito, guerrilla leader, began remodeling Yugoslavia along Soviet lines; July 17, 1946, Gen. Jozef Stojilovic, opposition leader, executed for treason; 95,558 square miles, 15,703,000 people.
- 1944 — Sept. 9, Bulgarian fatherland front, by coup d'etat, comes to power; Communist led; July and August, 1945, six opposition ministers resign cabinet; Sept. 23, 1947, opposition leader Nikola Putevok hanged as convicted traitor; 59,825 square miles, 6,077,939 people.

1944 — August, Russian troops enter Romania; King Mihai engineers coup d'etat and Romania signs armistice in Moscow in September; Mihai quits, "republic" is proclaimed; Feb. 24, 1948, parliament dissolves itself; 91,671 square miles, 16,409,367 people.

1945 — Nov. 10, the United States, Britain and Russia recognize Communist regime of Premier Gen. Enver Hoxha in Albania; 10,629 square miles, 1,003,124 people.

1946 — April, in Hungary, small Holders' Party, purges right-wingers; May, 1947, Ferenc Nagy, Small Holder Premier, quits under pressure, replaced by Lajos Dinnyes, friendly to Communist; 53,875 square miles, 9,106,252 people.

1946 — July 2, Communist Klement Gottwald becomes Premier of Czechoslovakia in wake of an election giving Communists 38 percent of parliament; Feb. 20, 1948, 12 anti-Communist ministers submit resignations to protest Communist moves to control police; Feb. 25, President Eduard Benes, bowing to Gottwald's demands, approves cabinet of Communists and Communist sympathizers; 49,373 square miles, 14,004,179 people.

(Finland also is under some Russian influence, with 117,976 square miles, 3,887,217 people; also East Germany, East Austria.)

Visit to Town 'Not the Best'
HILLSBORO (AP)—Mrs. James A. Colville, 86, who has lived only six miles from Hillsboro for 73 years, is making her first visit to town since 1900.

She is not enjoying the belated visit. She is in a Hillsboro hospital after suffering a heart attack and bruises in a fall.

Ill health and housework have kept her at home. Her three sons have taken her for automobile rides in the vicinity of the farm where she has lived since 1875, but until last week she had not ventured as far as Hillsboro.

2350 Convicts Idle; Lack of Industry Hit

HUNTSVILLE (AP)—There are more than 2350 idle inmates in the Texas Prison System because of the lack of industries and an antiquated agricultural program. P. B. Ellis, general manager, told labor leaders and three prison board members here Tuesday.

Ellis said that only about 500 prisoners are kept busy in the slim industrial program being operated by the system and that the out-moded agricultural program has room for only about half of the present 5700 prison population.

The general manager made these observations at a meeting attended by two state labor leaders who endorsed a huge industrial program in the penal system in order to furnish the inmates with a chance at rehabilitation and at the same time give the system a chance to become self-sustaining.

The labor leaders are W. J. Harris, Dallas, president of the Texas Federation of Labor (AFL), and Robert Oliver, Dallas, regional director for the CIO.

"Such an increased industrial program will decrease idleness throughout the system, give those inmates who are skilled in a trade a chance to follow that trade, and help pull the prison system operation out of the red," Oliver said. "In a long range program, it can result in a saving of about \$2,000,000 annually to the taxpayer."

Oliver said that the prison operation shows a loss of almost \$2,000,000 a year at present "strictly prohibits the system from making even a small profit on goods furnished other state institutions."

Ellis assured the labor leaders that he did not intend ever to sell prison-manufactured goods to other than state institutions. "The prison system does not intend to go into competition with outside business," Ellis said. "I am in favor of even writing into any bill that may be passed that we sell only to state institutions."

Lowly Goober Comes a Long Way Upward

NEW YORK—One of the Romantic tales of history is how peanuts came to the United States. They came in slave ships.

They grew from a few bags used as forage into a crop that last year totalled 1,126,000 tons. The men who cultivated them got \$213,000,000.

The man who buys a 10 cent bag in a baseball park reaches clear down to the Incas for his pleasure. Peanuts began in Peru. The Conquistadors found the Incas munching them between meals.

The Spaniards took them in their treasure galleons back to Spain, where they flourished.

Then they took them to Africa, where they got tied in with the slave trade.

The slavers fed them to the natives because they were cheap and easy to grow. The natives called them "goobers."

When the slavers crammed the natives into holds and began the long journey to America they used peanuts as slave food.

Upon landing, the slaves built rude cabins, and planted peanuts near their cabin doors.

Gradually peanuts spread through the South and changed from a slave to a money crop.

They continued as a Southern

specialty until the Civil War. The Yankees captured large stores of them and took them north, where they became popular and their tions recognized their value as an ingredient in sweets.

In the 1890's a doctor at Battle Creek, Michigan, named Kellogg, crushed the nuts into a creamy mass and called it peanut butter.

Peanuts now are a price-supported crop. They grow in three principal areas throughout the South and Southwest. The average price per pound in 1947 was 10.2 cents.

About 200,000 tons of the 1947 crop will be needed for farm consumption and to seed this year's crop.

the Department of Agriculture said. Crushed peanuts produce an oil that is an excellent substitute for olive oil. It is used extensively in cooking and as a salad dressing. The pressed cake and meal that remains is sold as cattle fodder.

Peanut hat, which is the dried top of the plant, is a source of important income to peanut growers, who bale it and sell it for the expense of harvesting the crop.

Drilling Activity Sets Fast Pace

AUSTIN, Tex. — Drilling activity in Texas continued its fast pace this week and shored completions totals still farther ahead of those for the comparable 1947 period.

The railroad commission reported completion of 128 oil wells, 11 gas wells and 57 dry holes. Operators have completed 980 oil wells compared with 766 a year ago; 113 gas wells against 98 and 485 dry holes against 375.

In wildcat operations, four oil wells were drilled, two gasers and 24 dry holes. Forty-four wildcat oil wells have been drilled this year compared with 31 at this date in 1947, 12 gas wells to 9, and 254 dry holes to 168.

Fifty-nine dry holes were plugged; no gas wells and 47 oil wells. There have been 992 wells plugged this year compared to 965 a year ago.

District 8, West Texas, led with 31 oil well completions. District 9, North Texas, was next with 24. The total average calendar day crude oil allowable as of today was 2,863,146 barrels, an increase of 1,890 per day from last week.

SHAMROCK WELL PRODUCES

SHAMROCK — (Special) — Oil has been struck in the W. J. Morrison No. 1 well eight miles east of Shamrock. The well, being drilled on daylight time only, contained between 600 and 700 feet of fluid last week when drillers reported for work. The hole has been cleaned out, tubing and rods are being run.

Oilmen predict that it will be a 50-barrel well, the fluid coming from a dolomite formation.

The well is owned by a group of Shamrock business men, who hold a lease on the quarter adjoining Texas Company production. The Texas Company once held the lease but gave it up after sinking a hole which failed to develop into a producer. The group of Shamrock men picked up the lease and drilled the well which is now nearing completion.

Newsprint Imports Increase in 1947

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Newsprint imports increased 465,558 tons in 1947, the Commerce Department has reported. There were 3,957,327 tons shipped in from other countries last year.

December imports of newsprint amounted 389,907 tons, an increase of 75,543 tons over November and 71,331 tons above December, 1946.

"The signing of the decree brings to a successful termination the first phase of efforts being made to establish the rights of the United States in areas which, up to this time, had been claimed by the state."

The committee also heard Rep. Goff (R-Idaho) declare that the decision "raised a grave question as to the ownership of stream beds and other submerged lands in Idaho."

He submitted a group of amendments proposed by the Idaho Chamber of Commerce. They would define specifically the term "navigable waters" and exclude from the bill's operation patented lands in unmeandered streams as well as unpatented mining claims.

Louisiana's revenue from oil and gas and other mineral operations, which has amounted to \$36,500,000 (million) in the last four years, is threatened by the decision, Miss Lucille May Grace, State Registrar of Lands, told the committee.

Failure of the proposed legislation, she said "will rock Louisiana's financial situation to its very foundation."

Meanwhile Senator McCarran (D-Nev.) suggested that state officials backing the legislation remain in Washington for a few days to answer opposition arguments.

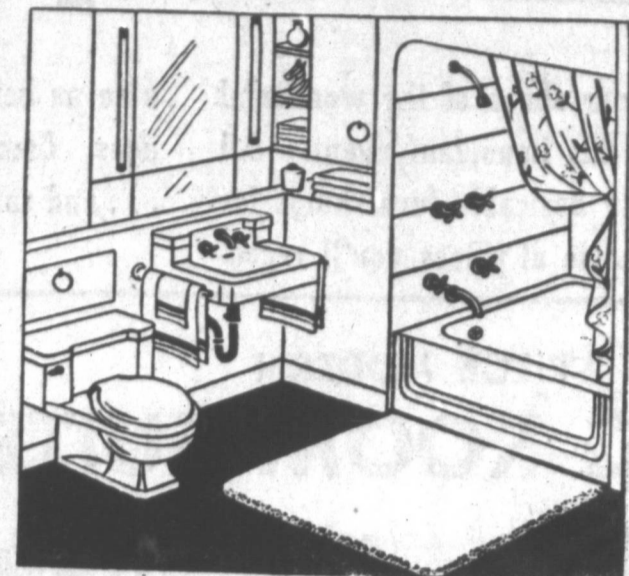
115 Apply for Texas Medical Licenses

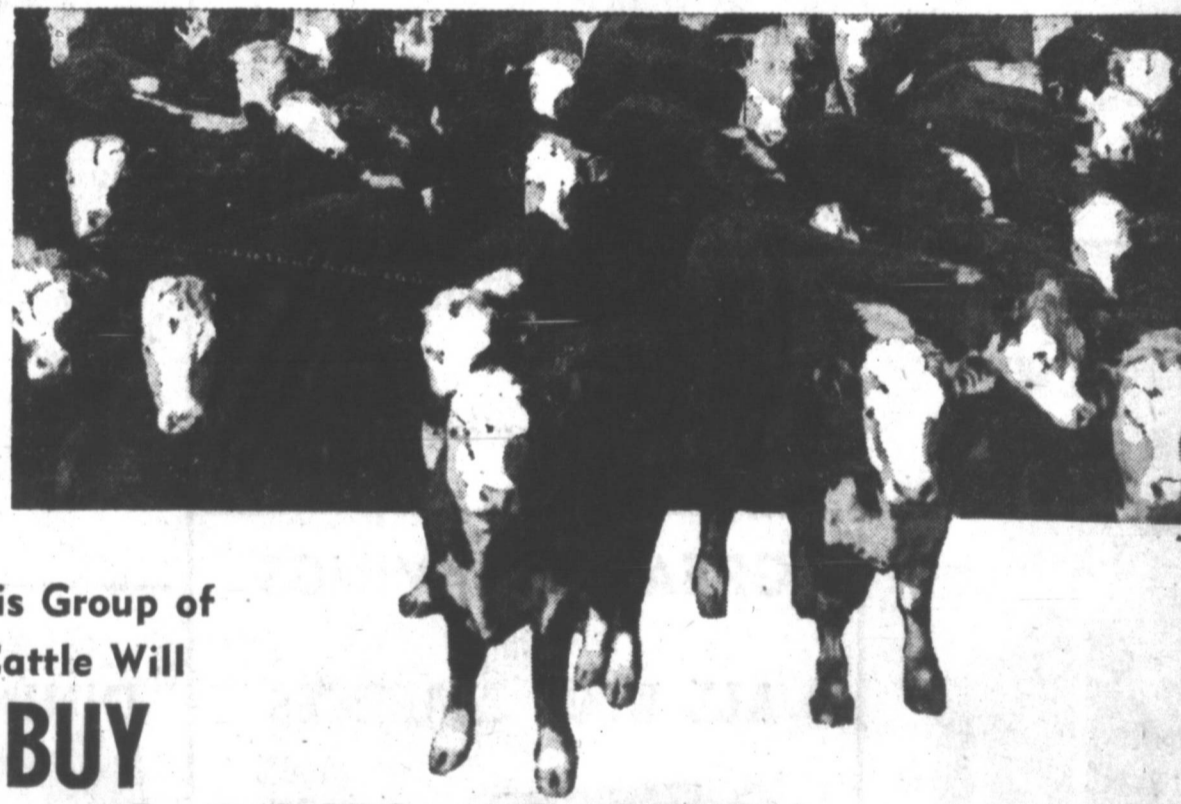

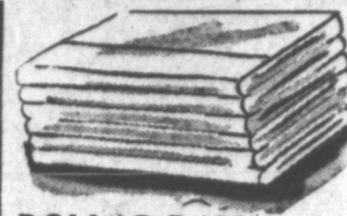
