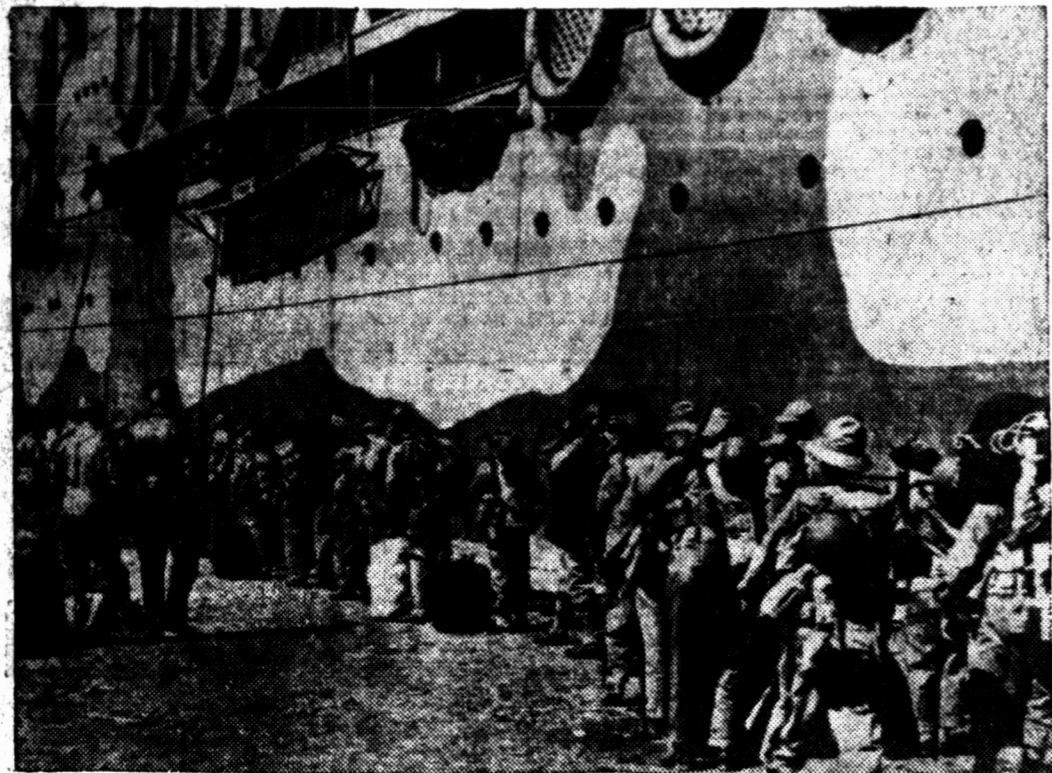

Victory Called Complete And Absolute Today

Britain's triumphant Egyptian armies were reported battling Axis rearguards today well beyond El Daba, 33 miles west of El Alamein, while dispatches from Greece said Adolf Hitler had sent a fleet of 500 planes to rush fresh troops across the Mediterranean in an attempt to avert utter disaster.

On the battlefield, Lieut. B. L. Montgomery declared the British 8th Army had already won "complete and absolute victory" over Field Marshal Erwin Rommel's battered legions.

MOSCOW, Nov. 6 (AP)—Joseph Stalin declared today that because of the lack of a second front the Germans had been able to break through the Russian lines in the west last summer, and in five months advance about 300 miles.

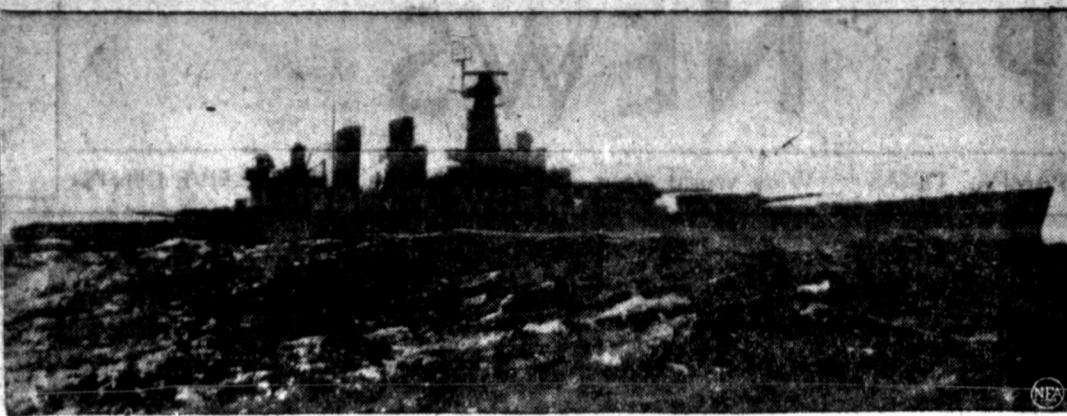

American's expanding Navy has 21 battleships and five aircraft carriers in service, launched or nearing completion, despite many hard blows suffered in a year of war. No. 1 of the fleet's new superdreadnaughts is the 35,000-ton U. S. S. North Carolina, first battleship completed in the U. S. in 18 years.

Following October, four years after keel laying. Other U. S. battleships now under construction are beating this record. The vessel is 704 feet long (two North Carolinas on end would be higher than the Empire State building). Its 108-foot beam just permits clearance through the Panama Canal.

1941, tests, the North Carolina fired the greatest salvo in naval history—10 tons of metal in a \$23,750, 19-gun broadside. For scouting and protection, the ship carries three catapult planes. A belt of 16-inch side armor and 6-inch deck plating protects her from shells, torpedoes and bombs.

Navy's Latest 'Cruiser' Will Visit In Pampa

"Docking" at Pampa tomorrow will be one of the newest additions to Uncle Sam's Navy.

A Navy "cruiser", a recruiting station on wheels, will anchor at 10 a. m. at the intersection of Cuyler and Foster. It will carry a crew of six, with all members of the crew ready to answer any question concerning the Navy.

Men from 17 to 50 years of age, interested in the Navy, are invited to go aboard the "cruiser". Questions will be answered, with out obligation to the person requesting the information.

The "cruiser" is a car and trailer combination, with the trailer as complete a laboratory as can be placed on wheels. Desks, testing equipment, eye charts, scales and everything used in Naval bases for examinations will be found.

Coming from the Dallas headquarters station, the "cruiser" has been in Ft. Worth, Wichita Falls, and Amarillo. From Pampa it will go to Borger, thence to Lubbock, Big Spring, and Abilene.

State honors have come to three Gray county 4-H boys club members, Glenn T. Hackney, Gray county farm agent announced today. Drew Word, 16, Alanreed, has been awarded one of the 19 trips given by the Santa Fe railway to Texas boys to the fat stock show to be held in Chicago this month. He has been in 4-H work for six years, and made an outstanding record with pigs and beef calves.

John Baggerman, 15, Grandview, has been in 4-H club work five years, spent two years on a maize project, two on swine, and is now raising beef calves.

Still Too Young He has been awarded one of the five Texas trips to the fat stock show by the Rock Island railway. John Spearman, 12-year-old Far-

ington boy, lacks three years of being old enough to compete for the stock show trips, but is proving he'll have one as soon as he is of age.

He has won the Thomas E. Wilson company's meat animal award, a gold medal, thus following in the steps of Word, who won the medal in 1940, and of Baggerman, 1941 winner.

This is Spearman's second year to raise beef calves.

Due to war conditions, it is possible that the trips to Chicago may be cancelled; but this does not lessen the honors won by Word and Baggerman, and also by Spearman.

There are eight boys 4-H clubs in Gray county, with membership totaling 75.

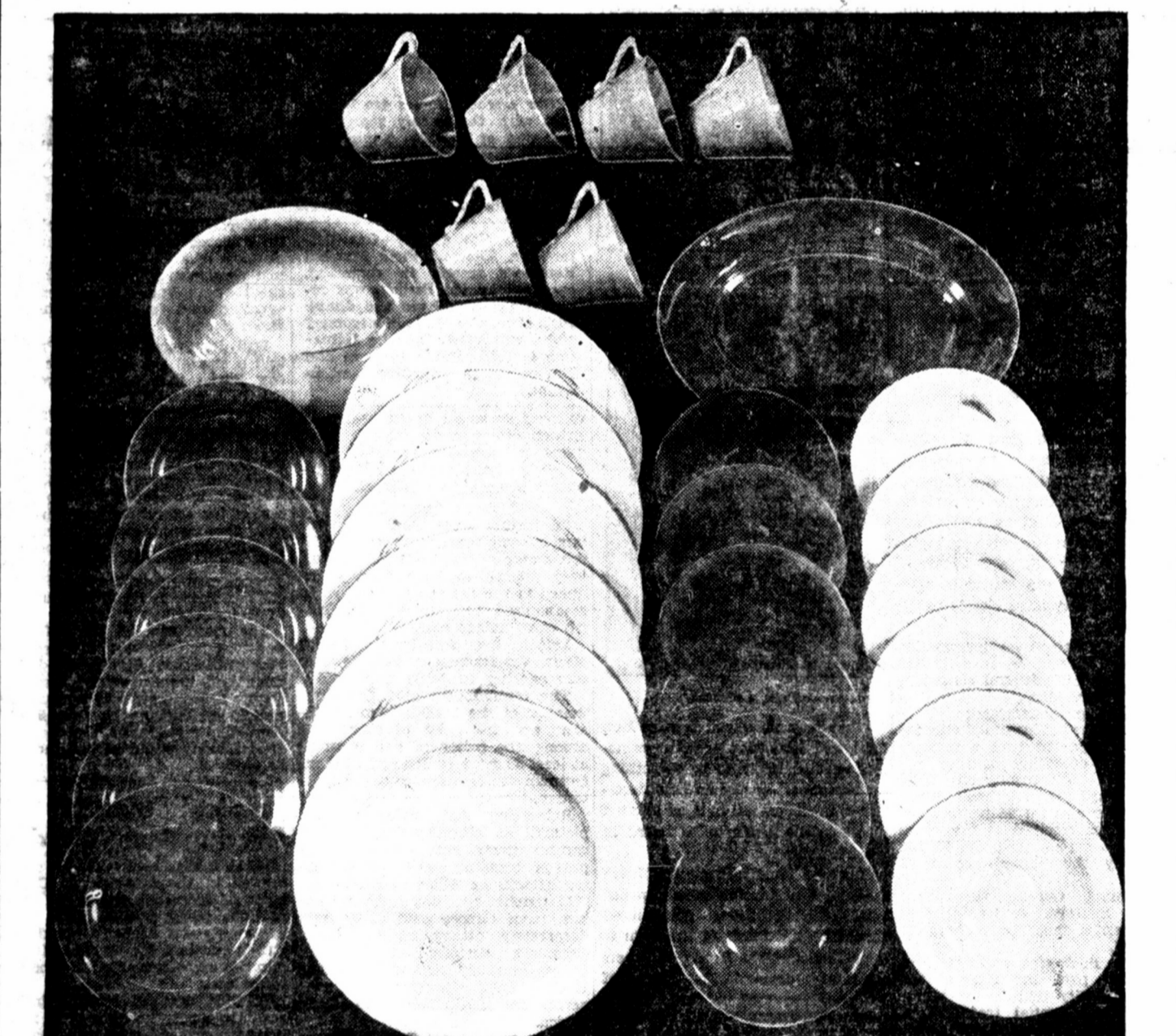

War Creates New Need For Poppy Fund Aid

The war has created a greater need than ever for proceeds of the annual Buddy Poppy sale of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, according to Commander Fred L. Fender, Pampa Post, No. 1657.

Heretofore, the sale originated in 1922, has been conducted for benefit of the national home for orphans and widows of war veterans, and for disabled and needy veterans, and their dependents, Commander Fender explained.

"Today, for the first time in the 20 years of the poppy sale, men in active service, and their dependents, are eligible for assistance," Commander Fender said.

Free doughnuts and coffee are served. Dates with pretty town girls are sanctioned and dances held, but when the visitors got to talking about what a vile food okra was, they trampled on tradition.

O. K. TEXAS OYSTERS
AUSTIN, Nov. 6 (AP)—The state department of health has announced that oysters from Nueces Bay in the vicinity of Corpus Christi had been approved for shipment in interstate commerce.

Completion of a sewage treatment plant and alterations in the outfall were followed by extensive surveys of oyster beds in the area by the department.

War And The Top O' Texas

Vital Information

Increased wildcat operations and further development of leases in the oil-rich Southwest were forecast by Southern region OPA officials following advice from Washington that services of drilling gas and oil wells had been exempt from price control. Effective immediately, amendment 7 to revised supplementary regulation No. 11 to OPA also exempts oil field fire-fighting services as well as drilling operations. Because each individual well and fire present their own particular problems no fixed price or standard of pricing can be made to apply in all cases. OPA specialists pointed out.

Necessary steel for extension of the "Big Inch" pipeline from Illinois to the east coast has been allocated by the War Relocation Administration. The 87-mile addition to the line will assure a direct delivery of 800,000 barrels of crude oil or products from the East Texas fields to terminals at the New York-Philadelphia refinery district. Initial deliveries are expected by June 1.

U. S. Bombers Smash Four Enemy Ships

CAIRO, Nov. 6 (AP)—United States heavy bombers scored direct hits on four enemy ships in the Libyan port of Benghazi and probably on a fifth, an American communique announced. American medium bombers and fighters continued to harass the retreating enemy, inflicting heavy casualties on axis armor and motor convoys. Messerschmitt 109s definitely were destroyed and there were no United States losses, said the war bulletin from the U. S. Army Middle East command.

STANFORD ELECTED PHOENIX, Ariz., Nov. 6 (AP)—Rawleigh C. Stanford, who was born in Buffalo Gap, Tex., was elected to the Arizona supreme court by a near four to one majority over his republican opponent, E. S. Clark.

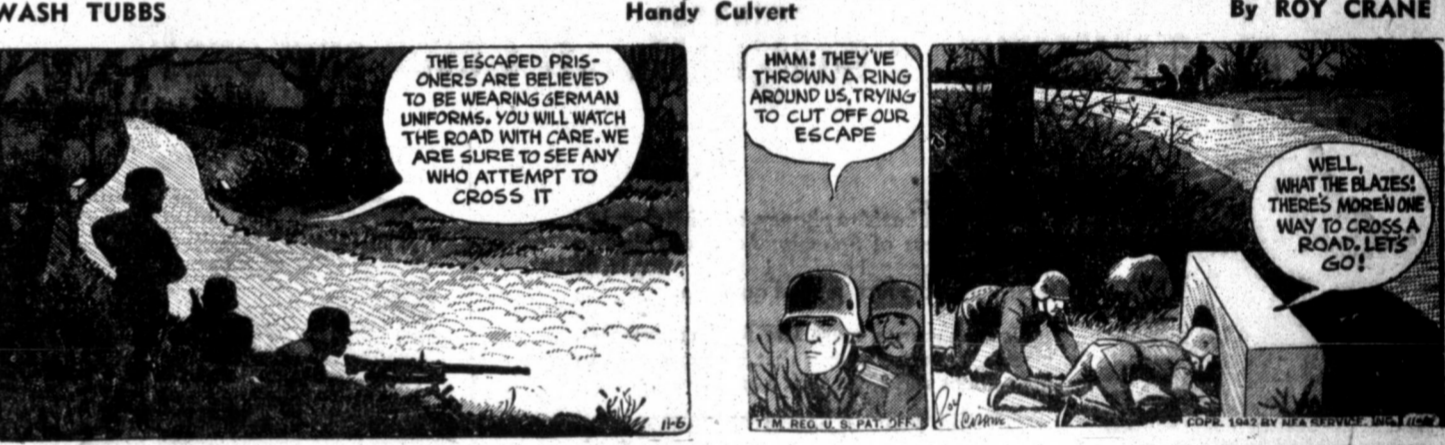

Askev Visits Vestal Askev, secretary of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association with headquarters in Sonora, stopped for a few hours in Washington, winding up an inspection of meat distribution in the north and northeast.
