

4-H Members Honored

Outstanding youths from 20 South Plains counties were saluted and challenged to continue to achieve and accept leadership at the annual District 2 4-H Gold Star Banquet here Monday night, November 19.

Forty boys and girls received the highest county award offered in the 4-H Club program-the Gold Star Award-at the banquet at Coronado High School. With it, each youth received the acclaim of parents, fellow 4-H'ers, government officials, Extension leaders and other community leaders.

Honored from Borden County were Karen Williams, daughter of Mr. & Mrs. Kenneth Williams of O'Donnell, and Ty Wills, son of Mr. & Mrs. Ty Wills of Fluyanna.

John T. Montford, Lubbock criminal district attorney, challenged the award recipients to continue to accept roles of responsibility as they become adults. Montford gave the 4-H'ers "four R's" to remember to help them continue to be good leaders. The key words, he said, are retain, resist, respect and responsibility.

He urged them to retain the fundamental values they already have formed. "Your heritage," he said, "stems from what has been the backbone of our nation, the family unit." And he said 4-H is based on the values of the productive, cooperative family.

Resisting peer pressure brings to the forefront the strongest aspect of leadership abilitym the district attorney said. "Saying no' is not always the popular thing, but it may be the right thing," he noted.

Respect for the law, 'the very foundation of our society," also is needed, Montford said. "The place to change the laws is in the legislative process," he stressed.

Blane Dyess scored 32 points and grabbed 12 rebounds against the New Home J.V. In all 9 Coyote players scored with Bart McMeans getting 8, Craig Peterson and Carley Doyle 5, Ben Murphy and Danny Holmes 4, Jr. Benavidez 3, Jym Rinehart and Jeff Martin 2.

Against Tahoka Dyess had 15 points and Peterson 12 to lead the Coyote scoring effort.





Tis the season to shop early, mail early, says Postal Service

Gail Postmaster Nicole Lackey has joined other Postal Service officials in encouraging shoppers to Shop early and mail early."

By shopping early and mailing early. Lackey said, the public can be better assured their cards, letters and packages will reach their destinations in plenty of time for Christmas.

With the Christmas season now upon us, she emphasized that many suggested dates for mailing packages overseas have already begun. This means that packages should be mailed as soon as possible for overseas delivery, including delivery to the U.s. Armed Forces.

These dates, for overseas mailings, vary according to different parts of the world, Lackey pointed out. Specific information can be obtained by calling the Gail Post Office. The phrase to remember is shop early and mail early.

In addition to planning early shopping, l'ostmaster Lackey suggests taking the necessary time to properly prepare the cards and gifts for mailing. This includes the use of zip codes. By legibly writing both the sender's and the addressee's name, street address and zip code, the

senders is assured of better service.

"A full, neatly written zip-coded address helps in processing the mail more rapidly and assists in making delivery in case portions of the address becomes illegible," Lackey noted. The Post Office also recommends proper wrapping of gifts to be mailed, including the use of strong packaging materials.

Remember," Lackey closed, The key to the successful mailing of cards

and parcels is to allow adequate time. Shop early, allow enough time to properly prepare cards and parcels for mailing, and mail early. By cooperating with the Post Office in this manner, you will help us help you have a better Christmas."



SEWING HOLIDAY FABRICS

Holiday season is here and sparkle is the fashion.

Look for metallic and sequined fabrics everywhere.

When sewing with metallic or sequined fabric, select simple patterns without gathers or buttonholes. This fabric has a nap, so buy fabric according.

When pinning fabric, insert pins under sequins, not through them. Use tailor tacks for marking.

Use shears that are well sharpened because these fabrics will definitely dull blades and may eventually ruin the shears.

Make all fitting alterations before stitching. Ripped seams will leave broken metallic disks or a permanent line of stitching holes. Use a fine needle and change often because of dulling.

As sequins break in a seam, pull off and attach new sequins.

For cleaning and pressing, read the recommendations on the end of the fabric bolt. Most fabrics must be dry-cleaned.

Press fabric on the wrong side with a dry iron at a low temperature setting.

To help prevent flattening, cover the ironing board with a terry towel.

Always test a scrap of fabric to make sure the steam will not discolor or melt the metallic.

BUTTERSCOTCH POPCORN

1 Cup white corn syrup 2Packages (6 oz. each) butterscotch chips 4 cup crunchy peanut butter3 quarts popped corn

Place corn syrup and butterscotch chips in 1 quart measuring cup. Place cup in microwave oven and cook 4 to 5 minutes. Stir smooth, then add peanut butter and stir again.

Place corn in 5 quart pan or dish. Pour butterscotch syrup over corn, mixing evenly. Pour and press butterscotch popcorn into 13 x 9 x 2 inch dish or pan and refrigerate until set. Serve in bars or squares.

Your County Agent Says By Sam Field

Fall and winter are good times for farmers and ranchers to have soil tested.

At present, Extension Service laboratories are processing soil samples as soon as they arrive, and reports are mailed within five to seven days.

Use of a new computer program has helped speed up reporting. However, waiting until near planting time to have soil tested can result in not having results when they are most useful.

In addition to getting aprompt reply from the laboratory, sampling well in advance of planting allows time to obtain needed fertilizers.

In many instances, wet soil during winter may hamper collection, advises fall sampling. Since wet soil adds to shipping costs, samples should be air-dried for a day or two. They should not be heated, however, since heating some soils to high temperatures fixes potassium so that it cannot be tested by normal laboratory procedures.

Pint boxes, mailing cartons, history sheets and instructions for collecting

and mailing samples are available from the county Extension office. Study sampling instructions and follow them as closely as possible.


To get reliable information from a soil test, the sample must be as nearly representative of soil in the field a possible. For a representative sample, make a composite by taking a core or slice of soil from 10 to 15 spots in fields not larger than 40 acres. Letting one sample represent fields as large as 100 to 200 acres only gives general information.


For specific information the sampling unit should be uniform. The exact size will depend on a number of factors, including soil variation. To sample soil properly, divide the field or farm according to the type of soil as well as past and future cropping practices.

Take enough time to collect a good sample and fill out the information sheet as completely as possible. Contact the county Extension office for details on how soil tests can supply information that will help you make greater profits from fertilizer use.




