

**Blast Bremen**

After three weeks of already frightful struggle on the immediate approaches to Stalingrad, main theater of the world conflict, the German offensive achieved peak ferocity today against the elastic Russian defense and the Germans claimed two penetrations of the city itself.

By Russian accounts, however, the battered capital of the Lower Volga region still flew her red banners of battle, with the foe checked once more on the outskirts.

The Germans said that Stalingrad had been entered in both southern and northwestern sections. The southern penetration was first reported yesterday, the northwestern today. The latest German claim today said dominating heights in the northwest of the city had been occupied after a bloody fight.

Typical of the repeated rectifications in the semicircle of defense was the official Russian admission that precious ground had been yielded southwest of Stalingrad but only until strength could be marshalled to stop and then blunt the new penetration.

## FDR To Get Power **Exceeding Request**

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13 (AP) Senator Brown (D-Mich.) said today that President Roosevelt would be directed to stabilize wages as of August 15 and farm prices at levels not below parity under the terms of HIGH NOTE anti-inflation legislation to be introduced in the senate today.

Brown told reporters the President would be authorized and directed to take both actions simultaneously. He reported that the bill also would contain a broad grant of powers to the chief executive to deal with other factions involved in the cost of living.

In stabilizing wages and prices, Brown said the President would be authorized to take into account substandard conditions and to correct any "gross inequities" that might arise

He could not, however, force agricultural prices below parity levels. The general effect of this limitation, Brown said, would be to keep farm prices at about their present levels, since the average of these prices now is estimated at 101 per cent of parity.

### **Doctors Work Overtime**

The most serious problem faced by the medical profession today lies in the vast numbers of doctors who are being called to service with the armed forces. It is the government's policy that American fighting men must be given the finest medical care possible, and doctors are joining up by the thousands.

In order to meet both military and civilian needs for doctors, medical groups are taking definite action. During the next three years, for instance, U.S. medical schools will graduate more than 21,000 students as a result of recently-adopted programs for accelerating the education process. This is 5,000 more than would have been graduated without the accelerated programs.

Retired doctors are coming back into harness, and other doctors are working harder. The most efficient utilization of all our medical resources is rapidly being attained.

So far as the patient is concerned, authorities are urging that everyone do what he can to "spare the doctor." That simply means that we shouldn't ask for unnecessary house calls, and we shouldn't waste the doctor's time when he comes. If you take more of his attention than you actually need, someone else may have to go without. If patients will remember this, it will help greatly to solve the problem.

The Nation's Press

Any week's collection of handouts by the Office of War Information will show how many members of the Washington burocracy conceive it to be one of their primary duties to leave their desks and their jobs and run around the country exhorting the people to work and sacrifice. The words beat so insistently upon the ears of the people that they soon lose the capacity

What purpose can all this exhortation serve? It cannot harm the Japs or the Nazizs. It cannot impart any necessary information that is now un cannot arouse any sense of duty that was not aroused when bombs fell on Pearl Harcannot turn out any guns or tanks or planes. On the contrary it can, as it did when Secretary of the Navy Knox orated about Valley Forge refor an hour and a half.

What, then, is the purpose? Is it possibly that in speech making the burocrat may find the means of forgetting present failures, confusion idleness, and incompetence? By loosing a drumfire of words against the people, telling them off for fancied failings, he may momentarily hide his own incapacity.

MORE AND MORE "COST-PLUS" CONTRACTS I have just been reading an article by John T. Flynn in Barron's Weekly on "'Cost-plus', a World War Evil, Returns." The subhead says, "outlawed after the last war, it bobs up in current

contract renegotiations." "Cost-plus" contracts offer a great chance for favoritism. It takes the real management out of

the hands of experienced manufacturers. For an individual to let a contract on costplus basis to a man in whom he has confidence, is an entirely different thing than for the government to let "cost-plus" contracts.

If a private individual wants to show favoritism in letting contracts and run his costs up, that is nobody's business but his own. But for the government bureaucrats to have the right to make cost-plus contracts and make the final decisions as to the relative values and efficiency of things is an entirely different matter.

Even John Flynn, whom I have always regarded more or less of a socialist, sees the waste and danger in cost-plus contracts.

Government Gan Only Get Cost-Plus Contracts And these cost-plus contracts are becoming the only way the government can get private entrepreneurs to undertake a job when the government by the renegotiation law, takes away from the contractor all the benefits of a contract that makes him run the risk of having a loss and no

assurance of being able to keep a profit if he makes one. The renegotiated law gives the government the right to abridge the contract any time prior

to three years after the end of the war. A concern entering into a contract of this kind has no way of keeping books to know what its profits or the value of its assets really are. In many cases, it cannot even make a bank loan because the bankers cannot tell whether the finan-

cial statement of the corporation is subject to

revision by the government or not. Here is an example given by Mr. Flynn, as to how the renegotiated law works and how it forces the government to make cost-plus contracts. I quote:


"Here are some actual examples of how works-names withheld for good reason. Mr. 2 is a small business man-has a plant worth two or three million dollars. He is efficient; has a high reputation in his industry. When the war effort begins the Navy urges him to take a batch of war orders. He scraps his old plant, junks his

machinery, scraps also his four or five hundred old customers, and goes all out for war production The government wants him to make an item for which it has been paying around \$8,000. Mr. X makes an estimate of \$3,500 apiece. The Navy thinks he is "wacky." But he takes the contract. At first he loses money, but as he gets organized and swings into large-scale production he makes big profits. Even so, his profits are trivial compared with the money he is saving the government. Moreover, he produces with such speed and efficiency that he is nearly a year ahead of schedule. He is showered with praise by the government and is among the first to be presented

with the Navy E. If the Navy had been right about his estimates, he would have lost money. But he was right, and he has made sizeable profits. However, he has no wish to keep all of those profits. And he fully expects the government to tax a big chunk of them away from him.

"Now such a business is, nine times out of ten, an instrument that responds to the ingenuity, energy and administrative ability of a single man. His presence in his plant, with his mind free to concentrate on the problems of production, makes all the difference between big production and little production. Yet at this critical point, Mr. X is summoned to Washington to be renegotiated. The auditors and inspectors swarm over his plant. His attention is almost totally diverted from his factory and is concentrated on his contract and



The confusion, empty indolence, and misconluct of the Washington burocrats do not entitle them to lecture anybody. What they should do is throw all their manuscripts in the waste basket, tackle their problems with the energy and resolution they praise in their speeches, gear the administration of the war effort to the demands of the fighting forces and of victory, and drive forward toward the overthrow of our enemies. The people are doing their full duty: the fighting forces are doing their full duty; it is now the turn of the men who compose the war administration to do their full duty. The road toward their goal is straight. It cannot be reached by side trips or excursions.
