NEW YORK (AP)—Joe Louis' dismal winning effort against Jersey Joe Walcott was the biggest disappointment of 1947 to the sports editors of the nation who contributed answers to the annual Associated Press year-end poll.

Harrison Leads Richmond Open

RICHMOND, Calif. (AP)—Paced by lanky E. J. "Dutch" Harrison of Little Rock, Ark., a 7-under par shooter in his initial effort, a field of 109 crack professionals and amateurs teed off today in the second round of the 72-hole, \$10,000 Richmond Open Golf Tournament.

Harrison jumped into the lead late in the day yesterday. His 35-30-65 set a new competitive record for the par 37-35-72 Richmond course and gave him the choice position over a pair of rival pros, Jim Milward of Northern California, and Erick Monti, Santa Monica, who had shared first place earlier with 66's Milward's second nine 29 was the lowest for the starting round.

Far for the 6,988 yard layout appeared destined to take another terrific beating as the great field of U. S. and foreign pros, plus stout amateurs, legged off for turn in cards under par, with 13 in the second eighteen.

The first round saw 39 players others equalling standard figures. Former U. S. open champion Lloyd Mangrum of Los Angeles, one of the strong favorites, moved into the second round two strokes off the pace. He was tied at 67 with Ed Furgol of Pontiac, Mich.

Douglas Ford, New York amateur, shot a first day 68 to become bracketed with pros Chandler Harper, Portsmouth, Va., Skip Alexander, Mid-Pines, N. C., Felice Torza, Torringham, Conn., Peter March, Lake Tahoe, Calif., and Jimmy Demaret of Ojai, Calif., the latter one of the prime favorites.

Harold West, Portland, Ore.; Fred Hawkins, Antioch, Ill.; and amateur Frank Stranahan, Toledo, O., all with 69's, rounded out the group that managed to get around the course in less than 70 blows.

Layne to Confer With Pro Owners

AUSTIN (AP)—Quarterback Bobby Layne of the University of Texas, under option to the Chicago Bears of the National League and Baltimore Colts of the All-America League, will confer with owners of both clubs after taking school final exams this month.

Layne, one of the nation's outstanding collegiate passers, said yesterday he will pay visits to both clubs "to look over the situation."

He would not reveal whether he expects to sign a contract before graduating in June.

Harvesters Meet Bulldogs Tonight

Pampa High School's undefeated Harvesters basketball quintet opens its conference play tonight in the Junior High School Gym at 8 o'clock, when they tangle with the Berger Bulldogs in the initial District I-AA Conference clash for both teams. The B teams from both schools will meet in a preliminary game at 7 o'clock.

The Harvesters, winners of both the Spearman and Childers Invitational Basketball Tournaments in the past two weeks, hold an impressive record of 16 wins against no defeats. While the Bulldogs, coached by "Tex" Hanna and Norman Trimble have a record of nine wins and five losses.

The Harvesters hold a 57- to 54 win over the Bulldogs gained in the Spearman tournament of Jan. 13, while the Bulldogs were entered in the Childers tournament as were the Harvesters, in their team met. The Berger team was defeated in its initial round by Wichita Falls but came through with flying colors to win the consolation round by taking Nocona in the final round.

NEW YORK (AP)—Lavern Roach, the Plainview, Texas, ex-Marine who was named boxing's "Rookie of the Year" makes his first debut in Madison Square Garden tonight against ring-wise Tony Janiro. Roach is a 3-2 underdog.

Roach, who has won 22 of 23 fights since turning professional, has risen high in the ranks of the nation's middleweights.

Janiro, veteran of 67 fights, will give away four or five pounds to Roach, but is favored to win on the basis of his past record.

WICHITA, Kans. (AP)—Champions of six states—California, Texas, Oklahoma, Florida, New York and Kansas—will qualify direct to the 14th annual National Semi-Pro Baseball Tournament here Aug. 13-25, the National Baseball Congress announced today.

Trappers Hired by Commission To Battle Predatory Coyotes

AUSTIN (AP)—The Game, Fish and Oyster Commission has thrown some more weight into the battle against predatory coyotes. At a meeting yesterday, the commission authorized employment of 15 additional trappers at \$3,000 a year to help fight coyotes, report the Panhandle.

The commission also officially inducted a new member, A. V. (Doc) Neuhaus of McAllen, who was sworn in to succeed Gordon Stewart of Sonora.

A committee to scour the state for possible sites for public hunting preserves was named by Chairman Murrell Buckner of Dallas, to report back to the commission's next session.

This will probably be held in April at Rockport, coincident with the expected opening of the new state marine laboratory there.

Members of the committee to explore for public hunting preserve sites were Gene Howe of Amarillo and Dr. Will Watt of Austin. The commission was informed it has enough funds in hand to begin acquisition of such preserves, paving the way for acquisition of the land by those who owned it before the federal government bought the area for Camp Bowie.

Officials of the Texas Wildlife Federation had urged purchase of the land for a preserve, and Brownwood citizens protested.

Dr. Watt criticized "gun-toting, gun-carrying, big-game-hunting" game wardens who, he said, kept the game department in hot water with the public. He said they should be ordered to leave off their sidearms in the daytime and be compelled to wear uniforms.

Other members agreed that some wardens did too much gun-carrying, but left the remedy to Douglas as an administrative problem. They adopted Dr. Watt's motion authorizing Dodge to buy uniforms for all wardens, if the attorney general says department funds may be spent for that purpose.

In changing to the wording of other rules for clarification purposes, the board put all manufacturers and others on notice that it contemplates prohibiting the use of hard and unyielding substances in protective equipment after Sept. 1, 1950.

Wrestle Royal Proves to Be Just What It Is

Five men entered the ring last night in the Sportatorium in a wrestle royal and for 15 minutes, wrestling fans witnessed the wildest exhibition of wrestling yet seen in the local ring. The first man eliminated from the battle royal was done away with by all four of his opponents and so it went, three on one, and then two on one until only two gladiators were left in the ring.

The spectators partaking in this "wholesome" type of the ancient sport were Rod Fenton, of Edmond, Okla., Dory Funk of Hammond, Ind., Olan Boynton of Amarillo, George Lopez of Tampico, Mex., and Johnny Corlin of Tampa, Fla. Fenton was the first eliminated.

The second and third wrestlers eliminated in the battle royal, Funk and Boynton, came back for the semi-final bout of the evening, while Lopez and Corlin, the two victors of the royal, were pitted in the final match of the evening.

The semi-final bout between the former Big Ten wrestling champion, Funk, and Boynton of Amarillo was by far the roughest exhibition of wrestling exhibited at the local ring and resembled more of the types of bar room battles shown in Western thrillers of the movies.

As in the movies, the people's choice won, and that man was Funk. After the crowd tossed him out of the ring, Funk became peeved and after 15 minutes of wrestling in the first fall Boynton fell to the grappler from Indiana as a victim of a Canadian grapevine. The second fall was even rougher with Boynton tangling Funk's neck in the ropes three times and then having the situation reversed as Funk placed Boynton in the same uncomfortable position. It was on the last occasion when Boynton was using a towel to wipe sweat from his face that Referee Jones tried to separate the two. Boynton became irate at the referee's actions, planted a hard right to his jaw, which stunned the poor Mr. Jones from Berger and after Referee Jones had regained his senses, he disqualified Boynton for unnecessary roughness, giving Funk the match in two straight falls.

After George Lopez had won the first fall in 20 minutes with a body press after a series of flying mares, Corlin came back in eight minutes and the second fall lasted nine minutes in the third to defeat Lopez both times with a reverse crab.

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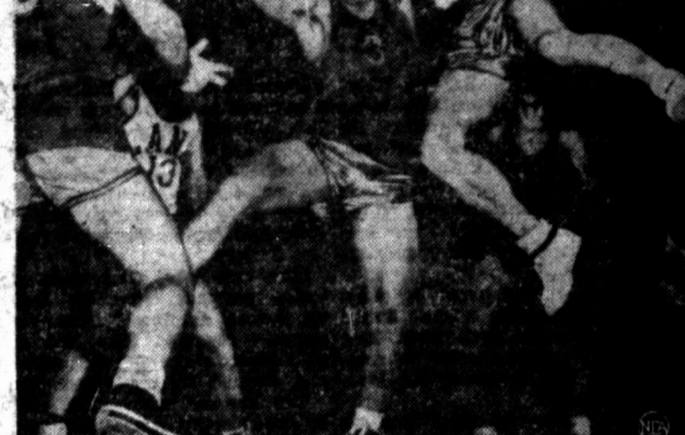
