NEW ORLEANS - AP -Four unmasked armed men Stassen Charges 'Insiders' Have held up a mid-town New Orleans bank this morning and its President A. P. Imahorn, said they escaped with \$114,00 in cash.

Their constant plotting to beat the employer has developed a general disregard for the rights of others. They have, in fact, learned to look upon dishonesty as a virtue. In this situation we find the reason why moral concepts have disappeared from so many of our people. Moral barriers are becoming, progressively fainter, and utter
