

TRUMAN ASKS 'COST OF LIVING' TAX SLASH

HST Tax Plan Seen 'Unsound' By Republicans

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Republican cries of "political" and "unsound" today greeted reports that President Truman might propose tax relief for low income groups only if the revenue loss were balanced by higher levies on business profits.

A close associate of Mr. Truman disclosed earlier this week that the chief Executive was weighing such a suggestion from some of his advisers.

Influential GOP members of both House and Senate left no doubt that they are all set to fight it.

At least two Democrats, however, said they would go along with Mr. Truman in preference to the Republican bill to cut income taxes for all individuals by a total of \$5,600,000,000 without disturbing present corporation taxes.

Senator Lucas of Illinois, the Democratic whip, told a reporter he has been working on a bill similar to that of the House.

Mr. Truman's proposed tax relief would exempt \$500 million of income from the 58 percent rate and apply the income-splitting community property principle to all states.

The Republican-backed bill written by Chairman Knutson (R-Minn.) provides for a \$100 million in personal exemptions, the community property idea and cuts in present levies ranging from 30 percent in low brackets to 10 percent at the top.

Taking issue with the Knutson bill and voicing hope Mr. Truman would offer his own counter-proposal, Rep. Dingell (D-Mich.) said:

Arguments for, Against Military Training Given

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the last of three stories on compulsory military training which may be a hot issue in this 1948 Congress.

WASHINGTON — There are many arguments for and against compulsory military training now for young men 18 to 20. In time such a program would give this country a big pool of men who had had some military training.

In an emergency those still in training 90,000 a year could be pulled right into the armed forces.

And those who previously had had training, but were civilians again, might fit into the armed forces faster than those never trained.

But with a bill now before Congress to set up such a program, this is the main question: Is such a program necessary right now to keep this country prepared against attack and discourage any would-be aggressor from starting war?

There are some arguments for and against the program.

It is necessary to start such a program now?

We need to start it now. Right now the United Nations can't preserve peace. U. N. lacks the machinery, a world police force, to do it.

But the world is in bad, unsteady shape, with communism creeping across Europe from Russia.

If we prepared with a reserve of trained men, an enemy would hesitate to attack us or start a war.

If we militarily strong, other nations will have more confidence in us and so be more willing to resist pressure from any would-be aggressor.

Russia is not believed to have atomic bombs now. It may have it within three to eight years. At that time, if we're unprepared, Russia might attack us.

We shouldn't start such a program now. We joined U. N. to help keep world peace collectively.

We should try harder to make U. N. work better. Training young men for war doesn't show much faith in U. N.

The next war will be atomic. If we're attacked, it will be with a rain of bombs, not just one.

Scientists have predicted that a future atomic attack might wipe out 40,000,000 people.

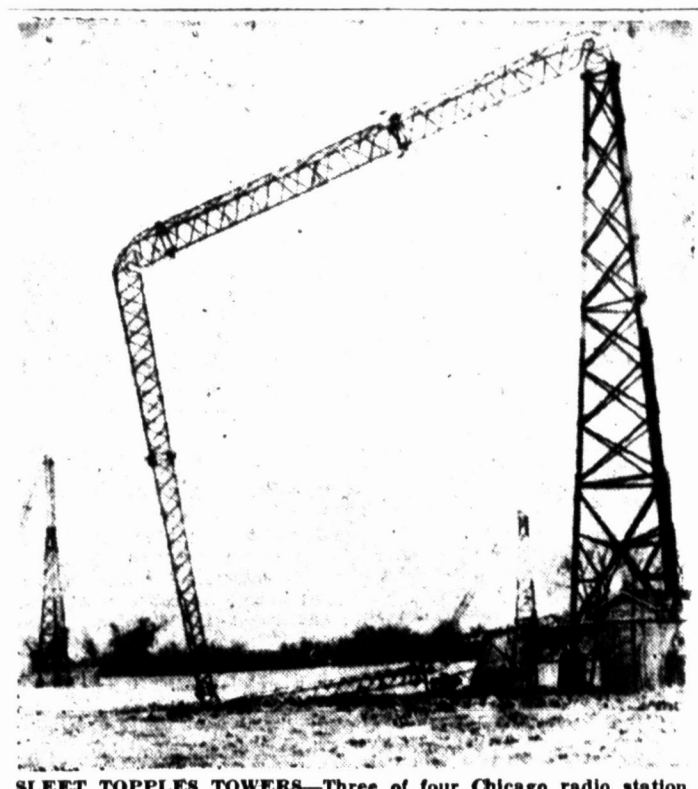

Meyers Enters Plea Innocent to Charges

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Maj. Gen. Bennett E. Meyers, accused of lying to the Senate War Investigating Committee about his private wartime business deals and of inducing another witness to commit perjury, pleaded innocent in federal court today.

Federal judge David A. Pine, before whom Meyers was arraigned, set the trial for Feb. 16.

Judge Pine gave defense counsel 10 days in which to file motions attacking Meyers' indictment.

Meyers was indicted on three charges of perjury and on three charges that he persuaded Bleriot H. Lamarre, 35, a former business associate of the general, to tell falsehoods to the Senate committee.

Lamarre also was indicted on three charges of perjury and pleaded guilty yesterday before Judge Pine. Sentence against Lamarre was deferred pending a report from the probation officer.

Evidence before the Senate committee showed Lamarre was installed as president of the Aviation Electric Company, founded by Meyers in Dayton, while the general held a high post in Air Force purchasing during the war.

The arraignment of Meyers required only a few minutes. The bald, 52-year-old retired officer arrived early in Judge Pine's court and waited while several routine criminal cases were handled.

He stepped forward briskly when his name was called and when the clerk asked him how he wished to plead on each of two indictments.

"Not guilty," he said in a firm voice.

Judge Pine then pointed out that a \$2,000 bond, posted by Meyers in New York City, covered only one of the two indictments, and said bond would have to be posted on the other indictment.

District Attorney George Morris said it would be satisfactory to have the present bond stand, with \$1,000 of it shifted to the second indictment.

Meyers thus was allowed to go free, but Judge Pine ordered him to be fingerprinted and photographed as is the custom with defendants arraigned in criminal cases.

Lamarre, who told the Senate War Investigating Committee he was the "dummy" president of a Dayton aircraft parts plant actually owned by the 52-year-old Meyers, is expected to be the government's main witness against the retired New York general.

The proceeding yesterday lasted only a few minutes. Attorney See MEYERS, Page 3

Homes Provided For Four Children

Four local children from a broken home have found places where they will receive care and attention and a chance to develop into useful citizenship as a result of the efforts of local welfare officers. Cal Farley of Boys' Ranch, and warm-hearted people who volunteered their homes and care.

It is the too-frequent story of the breaking up of the family unit, with the burden of care placed on one working member of the family who cannot give the time and attention young children must have.

The mother, who had never given adequate care to the children, left home a little over a month ago. After the separation the mother was to care for the two smaller boys, the father to care for the two older children. But this did not work out. By agreement, she and the father placed the children in the home of a relative. The relative became ill and unable to take care of the children and they were returned to the father.

The father made an effort to furnish a home for the children, but as he worked all day, he found it near impossible.

The local welfare office contacted Cal Farley, Farley made a radio appeal, and a number of generous people responded. The two younger boys, 4 and 6 were placed in one of the homes offered. The two older boys, 10 and 11, were placed in Boys' Ranch.

Higher Corporation Taxes Are Proposed

WASHINGTON — (AP) — President Truman asked Congress today to vote an immediate "cost of living" tax cut of \$40 for every individual taxpayer and each dependent.

He proposed that this \$3,200 million loss in federal income be made up by higher corporation taxes.

In his state-of-the-union message which he personally delivered, Mr. Truman thus laid the groundwork for another tax battle with the Republican-controlled Congress on the second day of its 1948 session.

Speaking to a joint session of the House chamber, the President said the "cost of living" tax credit he proposed would mean a \$160 tax cut in 1948 for a man and wife with two children. Thus, he said, it would give them "a saving that could be used to buy the necessities of life."

There are 54,500,000 individual income taxpayers. Mr. Truman's recommendation would sweep millions from the tax rolls—all those whose tax as now computed does not come up to \$40 for the taxpayer himself and each dependent.

Because of inflation, he said, the government should not reduce its total revenues—and he described corporations as well able to take up the slack.

The recommendation ran sharply counter to a \$5,600,000,000 GOP tax cutting measure sponsored by Chairman Knutson of the House Ways and Means Committee which would give income tax payers percentage cuts all along the line and leave corporation taxes unchanged.

Mr. Truman's 5,000-word message to a joint session of the two chambers also called for:

- 1. Enactment of the 10-point anti-inflation program he submitted to the recent special session, including standby wage-price control and rationing authority. The bulk of this program was turned down by the Republican leadership.
- 2. Prompt Congressional approval of an initial expenditure of \$8,000,000 to finance the European Recovery Program—the Marshall Plan—for 15 months from next April 1 as a "decisive contribution to world peace."
- 3. Quick action to set up a program of universal training as the foundation of national security program, and maintenance of strong armed forces as long as "there remains serious opposition to the ideals of a peaceful world."
- 4. An increase in the minimum wage from 40 to 75 cents an hour.
- 5. Extension and strengthening of

U. N. Gathers Confidential Information

LAKE SUCCESS — (AP) — Secretary-General Trygve Lie has laid confidential pipelines to siphon information from many of the world's major capitals, including three cities in the Russian sphere, it was learned today.

Material is fed into the lines from a network of United Nations information centers established and still being set up around the globe. The 12th of the string—the one at Moscow—will be in operation by the end of this month.

U. N. offices already are functioning in Warsaw, Prague, London, Paris, Washington, Shanghai, Rio de Janeiro, Mexico City, Copenhagen, New Delhi and Geneva.

Material will be opened in the Middle East and still others in three cities to be selected in Latin America, Asia and Africa. Publicly, the offices are responsible for dissemination and collection of U. N. intelligence by calling out documents and pamphlets, arranging for speakers and reporting reaction back to Lake Success.

However, one of the major tasks of the overseas offices is to send confidential reports direct to Lie's office on the internal situation in the respective countries as it affects the U. N. distribution of such highly classified reports are carefully restricted to Lie himself and the top men in his "cabinet" of assistant secretaries-general and closest advisers.

A high U. N. official stressed that the reports were limited strictly to situations affecting the U. N., but he acknowledged that the line was difficult to draw in many cases.

So far nationals of the home countries have been employed by the U. N. See INFORMATION, Page 3

Wayland College Music Director Killed in Wreck

Dallas Alford, 30, director of music at Wayland College, Plainview, was killed yesterday afternoon in a three-car collision seven miles north of Plainview. Six persons were injured, one critically.

Mr. Alford, first cousin of Bob Alford of Pampa, had appeared on musical programs in Pampa many times. He sang the tenor solo in the "Messiah" both here and at Amarillo. He appeared, along with the president of Wayland College, on a Kiwanis program here during the latter part of October. He and a group from the college, including some of the injured in the wreck, presented a program here at the First Baptist Church Dec. 31.

Injured in the crash were George Stokes, head of the Wayland Speech Department, Mrs. Wake Plvant, dean of women at the college; Mary Alice Gaston of Fort Worth; Muriel Okamoto of Hawaii; and Wanda Haneey of Borger, all three Wayland students and R. A. Delatte of Baton Rouge, who was in the car that was critically injured.

The college group was en route to Panhandle to present a musical program there.

Funeral services will be held tomorrow at 3 p. m. at the First Baptist Church of Plainview.

Dallas Alford is survived by his widow, parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Alford of Wellington, a cousin Bob Alford of Pampa, and relatives of McAlester, Okla., Shawlwater, Tex., and Borger.

He attended Wellington High School, Wayland College, Howard Payne and the Fort Worth Seminary. He had been head of the choral department at Wayland College since September, and was music director of a Fort Worth Baptist Church previously.

Causes of the three-car collision were under investigation by highway patrolmen. All of the injured were taken to a Plainview clinic.

NCAA's 'Purity Code' Expected To Receive an Official Okay

Coach Advocates Like Enforcement Of Cage Rules

PHILADELPHIA — (AP) — Formal action of a nation-wide committee to standardize interpretation of basketball rules is advocated by Don Kellett, coach at the University of Pennsylvania.

"It might not stop some of the worse blocking by the offense, but it would depend on the interpretation — but at least the players would know they were getting the same kind of officiating, regardless of what part of the country they played in."

The red-tape coach made his suggestion yesterday after relating his players' favorable reaction to a liberal translation of the rules in a game at Miami.

The officials overlooked some of the minor rule infractions and let the boys play the game with less than five of the select eleven and on four of the five eleven he was picked, Layne received a backfield berth on the same team.

New York Likely to Be Scene of Louis-Walcott Return Match

NEW YORK — (AP) — Although it hasn't signed either heavyweight champion Joe Louis or challenger Jersey Joe Walcott yet, it appeared today that the 20th Century Sporting Club had the "fight of the year" virtually sewed up for this town next June.

The 20th announced last night that it has "practically closed" the bout for the champion for a June title bout in one of the ball parks here.

No opponent was named but Sol Strauss, acting director of the fight club in the absence of the ailing Mike Jacobs, hinted from here to Camden, N. J., that it would be the punching papa of six who almost lifted the Brown Bomber, crown in Madison Square Garden last Dec. 5.

In almost triumphant vein, the 20th issued the following statement:

"Subject to further discussion on some details, it can be said positively that Louis will defend his title for the 20th Century Sporting Club in June, preferably in one of the New York ball parks."

The "details" hinged around radio television and movie proceeds and since the club said it was prepared to give the contestants the same cut for those considerable extras as they would receive from the regular gate.

Louis agreed to take 40 percent of the net as against the 35 he collected for the first fight. And to get Walcott's signature for the widely-sought plum, Strauss may give in to the Camden, N. J., brain trust that handles the veteran challenger.

That would call for close to 30 percent — Walcott got 15 in December — although Strauss has insisted firmly since the disputed battle that he would give up no more than the 20 percent to a challenger.

After his amazing showing in the first go when Louis was awarded a split decision, Walcott added 30 percent for a return on the grounds that he was "robbed" of the title.

Since the return bout seems a cinch to draw in the neighborhood of \$1,500,000 the 20th undoubtedly is prepared to pacify Walcott, especially in view of attractive offers from promoters in Philadelphia, Chicago, Los Angeles and Miami.

Strauss pointed up the value of the "extras" connected with championship heavyweight fight when he disclosed that Louis already had received over \$300,000 and Walcott better than \$75,000 because of the sensational sales of the first fight's movies. The bout itself grossed only \$218,477 — a Garden record.

Training Guide

(Editor's Note: This is the third in a series of six guides prepared as an aid to young boxers anticipating boxing in The Pampa News-Junior Chamber of Commerce-sponsored District Golden Gloves Tournament to be held at the Sportatorium, Jan. 19-21.)

EXERCISES

Most important exercise for conditioning in boxing training is roadwork. Running strengthens the heart, the lungs and the legs. Many authorities agree now that short bursts of running or "wind sprints" are better than miles of jogging. Under this method the boxer sprints a hundred yards or so then walks the same distance, repeating the procedure. Total distance to be covered during a single workout should be a half-mile at first and gradually increased until more than a mile is covered.

Williams Signs Contract for What Is Believed Higher Than Babe Ruth's Record of \$80,000

O'Dowdy to Meet Corlin on Weekly Wrestling Card

BOSTON — (AP) — The consensus at Fenway Park is that fishing through the ice for pike has become a bit boring to even such an inveterate angler as Ted Williams, the Boston Red Sox slugger.

Even General Manager Joe Cronin was surprised to have the splendid splinter abandon his piscatorial pursuits in Princeton, Minn., long enough to consent, by both telegraph and telephone, to become probably the highest paid player in baseball history, maybe more than \$80,000 a year.

"Figures discussed regarding 1948 contract OK," Williams wired Cronin yesterday. Then Ted, probably at home packing up for his annual big game expedition into the Florida everglades, put in a long distance call to Fenway.

"I'm feeling fine," Williams assured Cronin. "I've been fishing pike through the ice. I'm enthusiastic about the coming season and you can tell Joe McCarthy I'll duplicate all my 1947 performances. See you in Sarasota."

In line with owner Tom Yawkey's policy, Cronin refused to give the slightest hint about Williams, 1948 salary terms. "It's enough to say that it's satisfactory to the player who led the American League in so many offensive departments last year," countered Joe.

But now and then a crack can be found in the wall of silence that surrounds Red Sox salary matters. Last year when "The Red Sox" Bob Feller was reported to be drawing baseball's top salary with a \$70,000 contract, some of the Fenway folk confessed that Williams was getting more than that.

That probably meant that Ted was getting \$75,000 and since Williams led the 1947 American League sluggers with a .343 average while hitting 32 homers, scoring 125 runs, driving in 114 more and drawing 161 bases on balls, it can be taken for granted that the Red Sox owner was thrilled with his work.

And when Yawkey is pleased, he generally is magnanimous, so much so, that it would not surprise many in baseball if he not only has given Williams a salary boost but one large enough to wipe out the \$80,000 record of the fabulous Babe Ruth set during his heyday with the New York Yankees.

Rickey in Quandary Over Grid Dodgers

NEW YORK — (AP) — Branch Rickey, who usually has his hands full with the Brooklyn baseball Dodgers, had the Dodger pro football franchise of the All-America conference today, but whether he would keep it was problematical.

As for whether or not he will retain the football team, Rickey had this to say:

"I understand that there are people of responsible caliber who are interested in operating the franchise. If they can guarantee continued football in Brooklyn and prove acceptable to the league, I will give them one year rent free."

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Use Brisk Massage To Relax Feet

You can be your own masseuse, if it's feet that need attention. Feet, if they "go to sleep" while you're still awake, are benumbed by the cold, or are slow on the uptake when you want a snappy response.

Before you massage, sponge feet and legs with witch-hazel. This treatment will help to relax tense muscles and soothe tired feet, says model Doris Dillon. Blessed with photogenic feet, Doris is exacting about their care.

Her massaging technique begins with toes, manipulated with thumb and forefinger of each hand. For feet and legs she uses a brisk movement of hands in a bracket twist for which hands encircle the limb with opposite motions.

If you haven't time for regular foot exercising, Doris advises using the minutes while you sit reading, knitting or riding in a taxi to keep feet flexible. The simple exercise of rotating an ankle from left to right and of reversing the motion will repay you with stronger and nimble feet, says Doris.

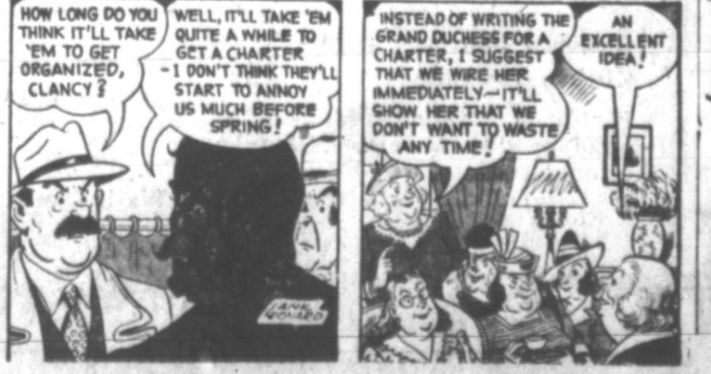

"will have a powerful effect" upon other nations of the Middle East and Europe "struggling to maintain their independence."

The President gave no clue to the size of the proposed budget for the fiscal year starting next July 1. The budget estimates will be sent to Congress Monday. However, he declared that "government expenditures have been and must continue to be held to the lowest safe levels."

He said expenditures have been cut from more than \$53,000,000 in the 1946 fiscal year to current fiscal year ending next June 30, while the number of civilian federal employes has been reduced from 3,750,000 to 2,000,000.

He held out the promise of helping nations elsewhere in working for "world economic recovery" and said he will submit to the present session "a special program of assistance to China."

He promised also that the United States will exert its "utmost efforts" to obtain satisfactory peace settlements for occupied Germany, Austria, Japan and Korea—efforts which he said have "so far been blocked."

In accordance with the agreement announced Monday by Chairman Vandenberg (R-Mich) of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, Mr. Truman made no mention of a \$17,000,000 over-all goal for European recovery.

He declared, however, that he considers it "of the highest importance" for Congress to authorize support of the program for the full four and one-quarter year period running to June 30, 1952.

And he held fast to his figure of \$6,890,000,000 as the initial outlay for the first 15 months. But while the administration makers are therefore required to turnish the tools for labor largely out of their profits.

Robert C. Knease started to enter a plea of guilty for Lamarre, but Judge Fine told him that while he might advise his client, the defendant must enter his own plea.

"I plead guilty," Lamarre said calmly.

The clerk then pointed out that the indictment contains three counts against Lamarre and Judge Fine asked him whether he pleaded guilty to each.

"I do," Lamarre said.

The indictment returned Dec. 19, charges that Meyers lied to Senate investigators in denying (1) that he had a financial interest in the Aviation Electric Company, (2) that the firm in 1942 bought him a new Cadillac, and (3) that the concern spent \$10,000 to have his Washington apartment redecored.

Meyers also is accused of inducing Lamarre to tell the same three falsehoods.

Subsequently, Lamarre told the committee that Meyers was the real owner of Aviation Electric and realized \$150,000 in profits from it, including "kickbacks" from "dummy" officers.

Lamarre said he was allowed to keep only \$5,000 of his \$30,000 annual salary.

Meyers told the senators he established the firm because Mrs. Lamarre was his "girl friend," with Lamarre's knowledge, and he wanted to keep her near his station at Wright Field.

Mrs. Lamarre called this a lie.
