Declaration of Independence the Spirit of the Constitution

"No language is more worthy of frequent and truthful consideration than these words of Mr. Justice Matthews specking for his court in Yick Wo Y Hopkins 118

"'When we consider the nature and theory of our institutions of government, the principles upon which they are supposed to res nd review the history of their development, we are constrained o conclude that they mean to eave no room for the play and ction of purely personal and arbitrary power.'
"The first official action of this

nation declared the foundation of government in these words: "When in the Course of human events, it becomes necessary one people to dissolve the political

bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the Powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

" 'We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with cerunalienable Rights, tain among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.' "While such declaration of prin-

ciples may not have the force of organic law, or be made the pasis judicial decisions as to the limis of right and duty, and while in all cases reference must be had to the organic law of the nation for such limits, yet the latter is but the body and the letter of which the former is the thought and the spirit, and it is always safe to read the letter of the Constitution in the spirit of the Dec-laration of Independence. No duty rests more imperatively upon the Courts than the enforcement of those Constitutional provisions intended to secure that equality of rights which is the foundation of free government."

And many, many things have happened in the United States that are absolutely in disagreement and incompatible with the spirit of this decision of the Supeme Court. They are incompatible with the Declaration of independence and the Sermon on the Mount and the Ten Command-Every discriminatory law is a violation of the spirit of the

The Sixteenth Amendment passed in 1913 absolutely repudiated the very spirit of the Declaration of Independence. It set up one class against another class. gave the majority the right to rob the minority by a progressive taxation.

A year later in 1914 the Clayton Amendment to the Sherman Anti-Trust Law was passed which permitted workers and farmers to conspire to create an unearned monopoly. It permitted workers to combine and fine any other workwho sold his services for less and made it illegal for the employers to do the same thing. The Norris-LaGuardia Act pas-

sed in 1932 was another violation of the spirit of the Declaration of independence. It prevented employes from entering into a binding contract with owners that they would not conspire with others to extort a fictitious wage. It prevented the employer from getting an injunction to restrain
