

Cripps Given More Power in Britain

Dalton Incident Weakens Cabinet

LONDON—P—Britain's senior ministers, their faces grim, met in emergency session today. The Labor Party prepared to meet a full-scale Conservative onslaught in the wake of a scandal which forced the resignation of Hugh Dalton as chancellor of the exchequer.

The Dalton incident arose from his premature disclosure of budget information to a lobby journalist. It was a "damaging blow" to the prestige of Prime Minister Attlee's regime, a high government source acknowledged.

One informant said the government would not resist a combined Conservative-Liberal motion for an inquiry by a select committee of Parliament. The committee's report would bring a House of Commons debate in which the opposition could fire its heavy guns, possibly on the basis of a no confidence motion.

Former Pampan Dies Result of Shotgun Blast

Clarence Neal Barrett, 42, of 404 McFarland Blvd., Dallas, was found dead of a shotgun blast last night in a room at his home, according to a story by The Associated Press.

La F. E. Kemp, of the University Park Police, said Mr. Barrett, former proprietor of a frozen foods store here in Pampa, had been in ill health for some time. Mr. Barrett's wife and two daughters were at home at the time and heard the gun when it discharged, the officer said.

Justice of the Peace W. E. Sterrett investigated, A. P. said. He has not returned a verdict in the case.

While in Pampa, Mr. Barrett managed the Pampa Lubricating Company and later went into the frozen foods business. He graduated from Pampa High School in 1924 and attended Georgia Tech.

He had been living in Dallas about a year. He leaves his wife, Mrs. C. Barrett, and two daughters, Ruth Ann and Betty, also residing with him in Dallas. One brother, Julian, lives in Atlanta, Ga. Mrs. H. E. McCarty, a sister, lives in Pampa. There are no other listed survivors.

The body is being shipped to the Duken-Carmichael Funeral Home and funeral services are being held in the First Presbyterian Church. Time and date of the funeral were pending today.

Pampans Urged To Join Idea of Friendship Train

Rev. E. A. Norris last night urged the people of Pampa to give immediate support to the "Friendship Train," in a special talk over KPDM. He will speak over KPDM tonight and talks also set for Saturday and Sunday.

He said in order for Pampa area donations of money and wheat to catch the Friendship Train down the line, donations must be in by bank closing time Wednesday. The Danforth Foundation is milling the wheat cereal at cost, and the food will be delivered at the point of need in Europe for a cost of one cent a serving.

"Christian love and sacrifice is back of this effort and no dollar diplomacy," Rev. Norris stated, as he explained that the project is being handled by Church World Service.

"For Pampa to catch the Friendship Train we must first catch the spirit of that train, and that is the spirit of world brotherhood," he declared. "Remember this: it doesn't help much to criticize when children are starving."

Rev. Norris said that \$4,500 will purchase a carload of special relief cereal which could be shipped directly from St. Louis. For \$10 each, 500 families could finance this special shipment. He said that wheat may be donated at Gray County Elevator, and checks may be made to either bank in Pampa, or marked "Friendship Train," or they may be given through the church treasurer.

The Friendship Train idea grew out of a suggestion by Drew Pearson in his columns a few weeks ago, that while our government goes through the slow process of legislation, the delay will be too costly. Tens of thousands of children will starve and die unless we in America do all we can to help. Rev. Norris declared.

Pampa Serving With Military Government

Private Charles A. Wedgworth, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Wedgworth, 622 North Russell, is now serving with the repair and utility section of the Fukushima Military Government Team in the city of Fukushima on Northern Honshu Island, Japan. The team's function is to assure that the policies of the occupation army are being adhered to, and to reconstruct the city of 1,900,000 Japanese in the prefecture of Fukushima.

A former student of the Pampa High School, Pvt. Wedgworth entered the Army December 9, 1946, and completed his basic training at Fort Ord, Calif. Upon his arrival in Japan, Wedgworth joined the 11th Airborne Division where he served with the 511th Parachute Infantry Regiment, receiving his wings as a qualified paratrooper. He was later transferred to the Fukushima Military Government Team where he began his present duties.

No Injuries as Two Cars Collide

There were no injuries, but serious damage was caused to two cars when they collided at the intersection of N. Frost and W. Francis at 7:15 last night.

Involved in the crash up were: Derrell W. Coffman, 36, 863 Pampa, driving a 1937 Chevrolet sedan and Charles Morris, 36, S. Hobart, driving a 1946 Ford sedan. Coffman was driving north and Morris was traveling west when the crash occurred. Damage to the Ford was estimated at \$200. Damage to the other car was undetermined.

Farmer Injured As Car Hits Cow

Harmon Mosley, 45, farmer and implement dealer of Fort Mot, received slight head and knee injuries at about 9:15 Wednesday night when the 1947 Plymouth sedan he was driving struck a cow in a field near Lakewood, one-half mile south of Pampa.

Damage to the car, which he had just purchased in Childress, was estimated at \$400.

Texas Baptists Conclude Annual Convention

AMARILLO—(AP)—Jeff Ray, 86, a Fort Worth fixture at Baptist State Conventions for 64 years, says he doesn't see how this year's meeting could have been improved.

Delegates were homebound bound today as Ray, short, plump and amiably alert lounged around his hotel room in soft shoes slippers and summarized the action of the three-day convention that closed last night. Delegates had been told Texas Baptists have increased to 1,000,000 members in more than 3,300 churches and that one out of every two Texas church goers is a Baptist. The budget for the next year will be \$4,000,000.

The 5,000 Baptists attending the meeting had shown an enthusiasm for future expansion of Baptist properties and Baptist evangelism.

Ray, a professor emeritus at the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, said: "I've missed only five conventions in 64 years and I've never seen a better one or heard a finer set of speakers."

"Of course," he added, "things are different now—more streamlined, less on schedule."

"Half-a-dozen times during the last three days I'd have liked to have said something but the only time I did get to say something was to shout 'where are the police?' when they were throwing that fellow out. Nobody heard me then and I was hemmed in by

PALESTINE VIOLENCE RAGES

Hughes Forgotten As Huge Wartime Profits Probed

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Howard Hughes case blossomed out today into a full scale Senate investigation of whether high ranking Air Force officers were in a position to profit from high wartime aircraft contracts.

Obviously aroused by stories of witnesses already hears, Chairman Ferguson (R-Mich.) of the War Investigating Subcommittee told newsmen he may call Gen. H. H. Arnold, retired Air Force commander, to tell what the service did to guard against such possible corruption.

This move developed in the wake of testimony that:

1. Maj. Gen. Bennett E. Meyers, then deputy chief of Air Force Procurement, told his superiors he had no aircraft company stock at a time when he actually held 2,700 shares in seven companies.
2. The Air Force dismissed an "crackpot" and tried to conceal from committee investigators—an anonymous letter asserting that Meyers made \$1,000,000 to \$2,000,000 out of the war.

Meanwhile the committee summoned as witnesses today Maj. Gen. Oliver P. Echols, retired chief of Air Force Procurement and now president of the Aircraft Industries Association, and Larry Bell, president of Bell Aircraft.

A committee investigator testified yesterday that 1,000 shares in Bell's company were part of \$38,175.50 in aircraft stocks held by Meyers on Feb. 5, 1943, when he reported to the air force he owned no such stock.

Ferguson read into the record a federal statute imposing a maximum of a \$2,000 fine and two years imprisonment for officials who represent the government in dealings with companies in which they have an interest.

The question of an anonymous letter came up while Ferguson was questioning Maj. Gen. J. W. Jones, Air Force Inspector general.

The letter, dated June 22, 1945, was addressed to the Federal Bureau of Investigation and mailed from Kansas City, Mo. It declared Meyers derived "immense profits" through "certain irregularities" involving his official position.

New Uprising Is Feared in Marseille

MARSEILLE—(AP)—Unidentified gunmen fired on Communist Party headquarters here today while a meeting was in progress and troops were immediately alerted to prevent a recurrence of bloody rioting which developed Wednesday.

There were no casualties from the gunfire, but police feared it might mark the beginning of a war between Marseille's underworld gangs, known as "Nervis" and the tough, hard-fighting Communists of the rugged Marseille waterfront.

The shooting occurred as the Communists were completing plans for a demonstration in connection with the funeral of a leftwing party member killed in Wednesday's disorders.

Central Labor Council ordered a general work stoppage during the funeral, but did not issue a general strike call, which the Communists have demanded. After a long session, the council agreed that "only the (individual) unions can decide" whether to join the spreading strike movement.

Workers already on strike—including truckers, bus drivers, seamen, longshoremen, metal, building and chemical workers—began halting trucks in the outskirts of Marseille, whose great port was paralyzed. Not a single ship entered or left during the morning for the first time since the war.

Some of the strikes spread to the port of Sete, more than 100 miles down the coast, where longshoremen and building workers demonstrated their solidarity with the Marseille strikers and also demanded higher pay. Strikes also were reported in other Mediterranean ports.

Strikers were reported to be in virtual control of the St. Antoine section of Marseille, halting trucks and controlling a vital intersection at which two main highways leading into the city converge.

The Rhone Delta prefecture of police said armored units, planes and infantry were being held in readiness around Marseille in case of serious trouble and a newsmen was told "we'll use them if we need them."

A truce was reached with the strikers on the issue of allowing food into the city. Longshoremen began to unload food cargoes destined for the central markets and the truck drivers allowed food trucks to proceed.

Jewish Gang Is Believed Staging Reprisal Action

JERUSALEM—(AP)—Four Britons—two police and two soldiers—were slain today in a continuing wave of Palestine underground violence which has cost a toll of 11 dead and 30 wounded in three days.

The police were killed on the Jaffa Road in Jerusalem by attackers who fled on foot. The two soldiers were slain in Tel Aviv by bullets from a speeding car.

Police said the Stern Gang, a Jewish underground organization, probably was engaged in a campaign of reprisals.

Authorities said the two Jerusalem policemen, both constables, were unarmed and in civilian clothing, on their way to their assignments in the Mustapha Police Station, when they were shot in the neck.

However, Jewish sources at the scene said one of the constables was armed, and that as he fell he turned and fired at the attackers. They said his shots injured a small Jewish girl. The wounded constable died later in a hospital.

Police said a crew of a patrolling armored car pursued the attackers through an alleyway and that one was believed to have been hit by gunfire.

Police fatalities in the current wave of violence now total four. One was killed and three were wounded in Haifa Tuesday, when a gunman, believed by police to have been a sterner, fired into a coffee shop. Another was killed and one was wounded in Jerusalem last night when bombs were tossed into a cafe. A British soldier also was killed, and 27 persons in all were injured in that attack.

The Tel Aviv shooting this morning came during a general strike which was called off Wednesday. British authorities raided a house near Tel Aviv believed to have been a terrorist training school. Police expressed belief that a new outbreak of violence was in the making.

Audience Warned Of Treacherous Crossroads Ahead

"America today is standing near the most treacherous crossroads we have ever approached," Dr. W. H. Alexander, pastor of the First Christian Church, Oklahoma City, warned parents and students last night in the auditorium of the Pampa Senior High School.

Dr. Alexander, laboring on the statement, pictured a long train, roaring down a grade, the brakes gone, and carload after carload of passengers showing little if any concern or cooperation in setting the roaring streamer to stop before it plunged into an abyss only a few miles ahead.

Speaking on a theme surrounded democracy, religion, prejudice, the teachings of churches, and peace, the movie-contract-refusing pastor hammered home to a attentive audience what was happening to the world today, especially this country.

He pictured, semi-comically, the world at war again, tossing atom bombs "like apples" until only two men remained alive in two jet planes chasing each other over the earth, finally crashing their planes in some South American jungle and the chimpanzees looked at each other and said, "well, we'll have to start it all over again."

"We are further away from peace now than we were at the beginning of the war," the speaker declared, taking a crack at the selfish efforts of the peace makers of today of all countries. He related the old-told story of the two French officers, sitting in the Maginot Line preparing to repel the Germans, who were considering the event of the third world war before the second had actually begun.

He lost no listeners either when he asked the churches today to reform themselves and stop teaching the phylistine and petty theological differences.

"Even Jesus Christ never heard about." The speaker, whose father was one of the first 20 men to organize a minority machine to lick Tom Pendergast in Kansas City called for a reform in the churches today to help the young people. "Jesus himself was a radiant person," Alexander declared as he asked why church people thought they should walk around the streets with a solemn and mournful air instead of letting themselves loose for a little.

And the two committees are planning to have the annual Christmas decorations hung in full regalia before parade time, December 5.

In connection with the parade and the decorations, the committees have sent an appeal to the business and professional people of Pampa in which they ask for the cooperation of these people in the promotion of the Christmas season. The letter stated that with the cooperation of these people it will be possible for Pampa to have one of the most outstanding Santa Day parades in the Southwest.

Couple Injured in Wreck Improved

Mr. and Mrs. N. C. Barry of Bell Flower, Calif., injured at noon yesterday when their car overturned just east of McLean, were reported as better this morning at a Shamrock hospital. Police asked all drivers to be very careful because of children looking around the streets without looking right or left.

Riots may start, but won't last long as it was indicated this morning when tear gas bombs and guns were seen being readied for use. Uniformed policemen will be stationed at strategic points over the park prepared to stay any hot headed trouble before it gets a real start.

Driver Uninjured As Truck Overtakes

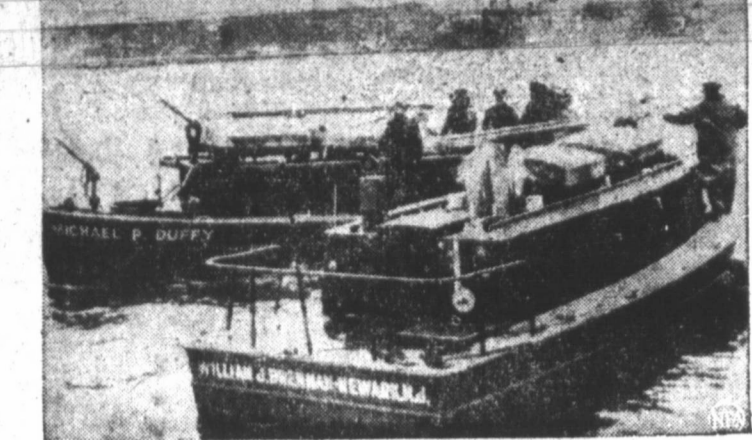

NEWARK—(AP)—The heralded engagement between the Battleship New Mexico and Newark's "squirt-gun navy" was postponed today after the decommissioned dreadnaught arrived outside the harbor three hours behind schedule, too late for the morning tide.

The Coast Guard reported that the towing company whose tugs are bringing the venerable vessel into port said the ship now is due to enter the harbor on tomorrow morning's tide.

Rosebud Bank Is Robbed by Unmasked Men

ROSEBUD—(AP)—Two unmasked armed men broke into the First National Bank here at 2 a. m. today after being up the night switchman and escaped with an unestimated amount of valuables, including jewelry and cash.

V. D. Nicholson, president of the bank, said he could not make an immediate estimate of the loss.

The night watchman, Melvin Lucas, about 52, said that two men came to his office, near the bank, shortly before 2 a. m., forced him to go with them to a small barn far from the bank, where they bound and gagged him.

"It was dark," he said, "and I couldn't recognize them, but they were both big men."

Lucas said he finally freed himself about 5 a. m., and reported the robbery to City Marshal J. B. Curtis.

When Curtis went to his car to go to the bank to make an investigation he found that two tires of his automobile had been punctured with an ice pick.

Entrance to the bank was gained through a rear door, which had been pried open. The knob on the deposit vault was knocked off.

The main vault was not disturbed, only the safety deposit vault, which contained 52 boxes.

Rosebud, a community of 2,000 inhabitants, is situated in Falls County, approximately 25 miles south of Waco. Marlin is the county seat.

Sheriff Brady Pamplin of Marlin, state patrolmen and Federal Bureau of Investigation agents of Waco were notified.

One officer said "there are fingerprints aplenty."

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

Scripture: 11 Peter 1:5-11; Jude 17-24-25

By WILLIAM E. GILROY, D. D.

Before commenting specifically on this lesson, I should like to add a word concerning the need of evangelism, upon which I touched at the close of comment on the last lesson. That call, as Peter expressed it, was to those already disciples. The great need of the world is not for more converts, but for more disciples. It is not to make a call to right living effective to masses of men who have never committed themselves to the way of love and righteousness.

Two men whose names were associated with great movements of popular evangelism have died recently. One, Dr. E. B. Smith, died on Queen Mary on his way to America. He was nearing his ninetieth year, and his career of evangelism went back to the days of the famous Dwight L. Moody, whose last surviving son, Paul, has also just passed away at 88. Dr. Paul Moody, preacher, chaplain, and, for many years, president of Middlebury College, did not attain the fame or world-wide eminence in evangelism of his father. His death, however, recalls the era and environment out of which he came, and the immense achievement of his honored father.

As a student in Toronto, I participated in one of the last lessons of D. L. Moody. I have a vivid recollection of the man, but all that can be said of his preaching is that it was a four-world challenge with which he made a searching appeal for decision. "Will you do it?" I do not know how effectively a campaign of the Moody type is being carried on today, but I am convinced that we do need mass movements of religion emphasizing the appeal of the Gospel, the demand for Christian living, and the need for decision.

Decision is not only the gateway to the Christian life and salvation, in the acceptance of Christ's invitation, but it is at the basis of, and is the continuous condition of, all building of Christian character.

It is the continuous condition, for character is not built all at once. The primary decision to accept Christ, and follow the Christian life, is like the acceptance or approval of an architect's plan. The building goes on from there, giving effect to the plans and specifications. And what a Master-Architect we have in Christ!

Jude, from whose one-chapter book in the New Testament a part of our lesson is taken, calls himself "brother of James." He was, also, the brother of Our Lord. These brothers (see John 7:3-5) apparently at first considered Jesus a dreamer, and were resentful and skeptical of His claims. They later became earnest disciples. Jude, like James, makes a strong plea for practical Christian living, and "meatly faith," and "praying in the Holy Ghost," as the sure foundation for building character.

Is there any other, or surer, foundation today?

innocent laughter and fun at the same time.

He strongly demonstrated this at the beginning of his program when he had his audience, with part of the student body, take part in an "exercise" called "The Grand Old Duke of York." Dr. Alexander previously made a hit with the student body yesterday afternoon and the students came in for the second appearance last night. They clapped and cheered heartily at every suggestion he made, and followed right through with the "exercise."

The speaker, in strong words, told the parents that they were the most influential people in the world along with the school teachers, who were at one time in the seat of the world's most honorable profession and now in one of the lowest pay brackets in the country. The country, he added, has lost 300,000 teachers in the last 18 months because of the low salary paid them.

He pleaded with the teaching profession to "stick by us just a little longer. Don't run away." At present America has five times as many children attending public school as any other two countries in the world.

He pictured the Church, home and school as the bulwarks against a successful democracy that was built originally by minorities and emphasized that by explaining less than half of the people were for the American Revolution while the greater part remained Tories or fence sitters trying to come out on the winning foot.

The minister returned to prejudices and warned parents and preachers that young people today cannot be captured and won over by prejudicial teachings, and that to love "our fellow man we must also believe in our fellow man."

Prior to his address a half hour band concert was given by the Harvest Band. Parents toured the school rooms getting acquainted with their children's teachers, bulletin boards bore samples of students' work on both the heavier and lighter sides of school life. The chemistry class displayed several experiments with one group of boys favoring the exploding of hydrogen. Refreshments were served in the cafeteria during the open house. The home economics teacher knowingly advised a reporter that two of her sophomore girls had quit school to get married. Both were doing well in their cooking classes.

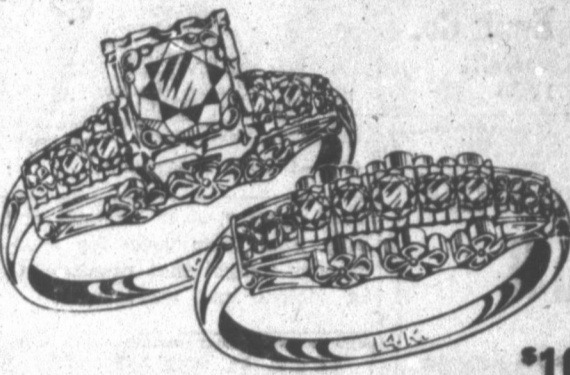

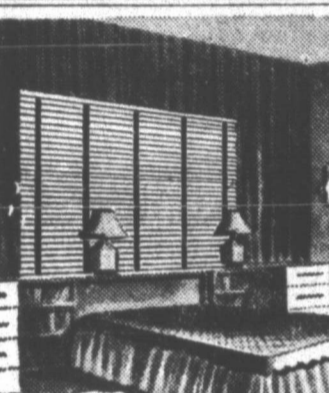

Tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 at Harvester Park, two high school football teams in the person of the Pampa High School Harvesters and the Amarillo Golden Sandstorm will meet for the twenty-second time since they first met back in 1922.

The game, which will pit two schools that make up one of the biggest rivalries in the annals of Texas School football, will be a District 1-AA conference clash, that should decide the district's representative in the state interscholastic league football playoffs which begin December 6.

A win for the favored Sandie team will clinch the district title for them. A win for the lighter Green and Gold squad will throw them into a tie for the race with the Sandies. However, in the event that the Harvesters win, and then go on to down Berger on Thanksgiving Day, they will be awarded the title, because of an interscholastic league ruling stating that in the eventuality that two teams tie for a district leadership, the team that has defeated the other of the tied teams, that team will be awarded the right to represent the district in the playoffs.

Comparing scores of teams both the Harvesters and the Sandies have played you will find the local squad at least 16 points better than the Amarillo club. Amarillo beat Brownfield 20 to 7 in Brownfield, while the Harvesters downed the same club at Harvester Park 41 to 12. Both teams downed the Lubbock Westers by the identical scores of 27 to 0. But the Harvesters beat them in Lubbock, and the Sandies on their own turf.

Despite the fact that on paper, the Harvesters should be the better team, sports writers find that there is no reason why the Golden Sandies should not repeat as District 1-AA champions, unless it be Coaches Tom Tipps and Aubra Nooncaster's Pampa High School team. The Sandies were predicted as pre-season favorites to repeat as champions.

Looking back over previous games, you find that a Harvester team has only owned the Sandies on three occasions throughout the playing of the long series. All three decisions came at Harvester Park and at no time did the Harvesters in these three games beat the Sandies by more than seven points. However, by the same token a Sandie team has never defeated a Harvester squad by more than 14 points at Harvester Park. The Harvesters have never defeated the Sandies on Butler Field in Amarillo since the series has started.

The Sandies will outweigh the Harvesters seven pounds to the man, with the biggest weight advantage coming in the backfield where the Sandies will outweigh the local bunch 17 pounds to the man. On the line, however, the difference will be negligible as the Harvesters will only be outweighed one pound to the man.

AMARILLO—(Special)—Coach Howard Lynch and his Golden Sandie gridders were grim, but certainly not pessimistic, as they faced a chill north wind Wednesday afternoon to prep for their next-to-the-last hurdle in the 1-AA grid race, the Sandies' clash with the Pampa Harvesters of Coach Tom Tipps tomorrow afternoon in Pampa in the game that will probably decide the winner of District 1-AA.

The Sandies, who have won the last three times they have met the Harvesters, haven't forgotten that the Harvesters are hard to beat when they are the underdogs. The footballers of Coaches Lynch, Hull and Whinnery are riding the crest of an 18-game winning streak in district play. Their last conference loss was a 7-0 setback in 1943, and the Pampa Harvesters was the team that turned the trick.

The Sandies were working out minus the services of Oliver Barfield and Ed Hagan Wednesday—Hagan was injured in the Amarillo-Borger game last Saturday and Barfield's face was badly smashed in Tuesday's practice session. It is not known at this time whether either of them will see action in the coming game Saturday.

No particular phase of the game was receiving special consideration in Wednesday's workout—both offense and defense came in for its share. Despite the cold wind that was sweeping across the field this reporter was chilled to the bone before he had been there 10 minutes) the Sandies were firing and snagging passes with regularity. The lights came on before the practice session was over.

The Sandies, who are gunning for their 19th district championship since the Texas Interscholastic League was organized 26 years ago, have won seven of eight games played this season. Their only setback was a 21-0 decision at the hands of the defending state champs, the Odessa Bronchos. The locals, who have scored 81 points to seven for their opponents in conference play, have defeated the following teams: Childress 3-7, Abilene 6-0, Pecos (Fort Worth) 13-6, Denison 14-7, Brownfield 20-7, Lubbock 27-0 and Borger 34-0.

Regardless of season standings, Sandie fans—as well as Sandies and coaches themselves—have come to look for a battle when that annual encounter with the Harvesters of Pampa rolls around and this year does not shape up as an exception. The Harvesters who are double tough in their own back yard, probably have visions of a December 31st date with the Wichita Falls Coyotes in the first round of the state playoffs—ditto for the Sandies.

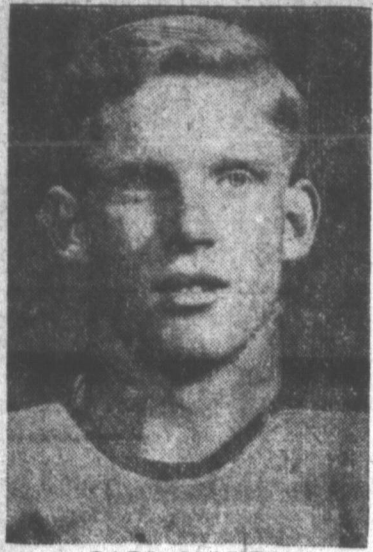

Common Ground

WASHINGTON — A sour note in all discussions of American aid to Europe has been struck inside and outside Congress with the querulous question of how much assistance the members of the British Commonwealth have given to the mother country. There seems to be a feeling that the burden on the U. S. could be lightened if the dominions exhibited greater generosity.

A corollary suggestion, which bobs up in mail to members of Congress and to the writer, is the effect that England has several rich assets which she could but has not tapped. There have been proposals that the royal family sell or pawn the crown jewels, with some folks estimating their value at many billions of dollars.

GOLD — Another scheme frequently advanced on this side of the water is that Britain nationalize the gold mines of South Africa, which number some of the richest in the world, and obtain dollars from the U. S. by depositing this commodity in the world's deepest and wealthiest bank—Fort Knox, Ky.

British representatives here, somewhat disturbed by this fairly widespread criticism, prepared a report on what the dominions have done for the old country, on the saleability of the crown jewels and on the nationalization of South African gold mines.

In addition to the fact that Canada, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa suffered serious human and material losses during the war, both before and after this country entered or was dragged into the conflict, it appears that the dominions' contributions have been rather imposing.

REINFORCEMENT — Here is a summary of the specific forms of reinforcement which the principal members of the British Commonwealth have furnished to London:

Canada: Between April and September of 1945, Ottawa gave the United States the sum of \$270,000,000 in the form of essential commodities. It wrote off \$470,000,000, which was the cost of training British aviators who could not win their wings at home because of German bombings in the earlier stages of the war.

It was these men who saved England so the island could become the takeoff for our invasion of Normandy, our aerial destruction of German industry and our final defeat of Hitler.

DOLLARS — Canada also loaned England \$1,500,000,000 at extremely low interest rates. She has also restricted travel to this country and other places so that dollars may be conserved for the benefit of London.

In view of Canada's resources and her population of approximately 12,000,000 people, against our 140,000,000 we would have to give England approximately \$25,000,000,000 to match our northern neighbor's contribution. It should be noted, incidentally, that under the Commonwealth setup, Canada was under no obligation to make these sacrifices.

HAVEN — Australia: The Aussies, whose men rang among the world's finest and most derring-do fighters, as American veterans of World Wars I and II know, were equally generous.

Canberra turned over \$8,000,000 as its contribution to Pacific War costs. Australia provided a haven for General Douglas A. MacArthur when he had to flee the Philippines and it was there that he began the zigzag island hop-skip-and-a-jump warfare that eventually landed him in Tokyo.

Australia sold for a song \$5,250,000 worth of gold to England. It has also pledged to sell for sterling its annual production of gold, approximately \$23,000,000, for as long as the dollar crisis lasts.

buildings used to preach the Gospel of Jesus Christ, find that if they oppose these authoritarian bishops who property for use stand up and try to defend what they are advocating, find that their church buildings are taken from them. And the one reason the Methodist Church finds itself with such leadership is that the bishops have set themselves apart and do not come in contact with reality. They will not learn because they will not test their proposals by trying to answer questions. How else can they learn?

Here is a nice example of their loose, vague way of covering up their socialistic nostrums. I quote: "We recognize the ethical divergence between property for use and property for power." Of course the committee would have a very, very difficult time if it tried to explain the difference between property for use and property for power. It is a hate expression. If a man uses property as tools to create new wealth, he would be using it for power and he would also be using it for use. But if he does not have any property used for power or tools, we will have mighty, mighty little property for use. In fact, most of our people will perish for lack of property to use.

Here is another of their errors: "Wealth created by society should be devoted to the development of all the people in ways to be determined by the people themselves." This theory that society creates property is the Henry George theory. Wealth is only created by individuals. Society creates no wealth. Of course if this committee could get the public believe that society collectively creates wealth then they can make the public believe that the majority by way of the state has a right to take wealth from the real people who create and give it to others who will keep the bureaucrats in power who take it from the creators to give it to the non-creators.

If the bishops and their appointees at the head of the Social Problems Committee, which invariably reflects the opinions of the bishops, would have been willing to investigate these problems in the open discussion with those people who believe in the Ten Commandments, they would not have been writing such falsehoods.

The Bishop James Chamberlain Baker in this San Diego district has so exalted himself that his appointees flatter him by taking a whole page to run his picture in the report.

The way the bishops have exalted themselves up as completely authoritarian, and so inflexible that they think their opinions need not be tested, the poor Methodist preachers who are trying to preach Christianity and do not go along with the bishops have a mighty tough job of it.

And the laymen who want to have the buildings they have built with their own sweat and blood should be asked to auction off the originals of the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution and Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation, not to mention the Roosevelt-Churchill Atlantic Charter, if any.

Fact is that the crown jewels do not represent such a fabulous asset. A. C. Mann, the crown jeweler, estimates their value at hundreds of millions, but he was apparently thinking of the sentimental appeal which they would possess for collectors. When they were returned to the Tower of London for a press preview after the recent war, the figure placed upon them was between \$40,000,000 and \$80,000,000.

It is also pointed out that, if these diamonds, pearls, rubies, emeralds etc. were dumped on the market in a forced sale, it would result in the price not only of their Majesties' baubles, but also affect adversely the market value of similar gewgaws.
