

Largest Show In History

Barrow Tops Sale

A grand total of \$28,755 dollars exchanged hands during the three hour Jr. Livestock Sale in Gail, Texas, Saturday February 24, 1979.

Seventy six animals were sold as compared to 79 in 1978. However, the total number of dollars was up a slight \$450. The total average was \$378 - up \$20,00.

The average in each animal division was: Steers \$403,50, Lambs \$346,11, and Barrows \$416,18.

Starting at one o'clock on Saturday, veteran auctioner Monte Paxton called for floor bids. Sweetwater Livestock Auction gave the top bid of \$66.00 for the 14 steers to be sold. This was up \$21.00 from last year. Sweetwater Auction also gave the top bid for the 46 lambs sold. This amounted to \$68.00 - down \$2.00. A floor bid of \$54.00 - up \$7.00, was recieved from South Plains Hog Co. of Lamesa for the 16 Barrows.

The Grand Champion Barrow topped the sale bringing a whopping \$1,675.00. This could possibly be the highest price paid for a single animal in the history of the Borden Co. Jr. Livestock sale. This light weight Cross owned by young Brice Key, was bought by Ezell-Key Feed and Seed Co. and Key Implement, both of Snyder. Malone-Hogan Hospital & Clinic, and Clinic. and Medical Arts Hospitalonce again gave the top bid for the Grand Champion Steer, Owned by Kim Wills, the heavyweight Cross brought \$800.00. The Grand Champion Lamb, a heavy weight Medium Wool owned by Ben Murphy was purchased by Dewey Everett of Snyder for \$552.00.

Continuing with the sale, the talented Mr. Paxton was aided con't page 7

Borden Co. Jr. Livestock Assoc. held one of the largest 4-H and FFA shows in the counties history.

E. L. Farmer, the counties capable and faithful announcer for many years, opened the two day show at 1:00 p.m. Friday February 23.

With grooming still being heard in the back ground, it was immediately evident that the judges had a hard job on

their hands. After much deliberation, Swine judge Denny Belew, ag teacher from Anton, tapped a 220 lb. light weight cross as the Grand Champion Barrow. This animal was owned and shown by young Brice Key. Brice, a 9 year old and first year 4-H member is the son of Mr. & Mrs. Roland Key. If his first show is any indication Brice is going to prove to be an exhibitor to be reckoned with. He entered three hogs in the show and besides the Grand Champion trophy, walked away with a Champion Duroc and Champion Hampshire. Breeders for the Duroc and Hampshire were Pappy Tucker of Slaton and Richard Robinson of Hereford respectively. Placing first or second and a Grand Champion to boot with 100% of your animals entered must be a record for a first year exhibitor. Trophy was donated by Dorothy Browne.

There may be some exciting hog shows ahead. Another first year 4-H showman wasn't too disappointed as her Heavy Wt Hampshire was named Reserve Grand Champion of the show. Kelli also showed two more swine, placing 3rd in her class with each. Kelli is the young daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Williams of the Plains Community. Trophy was donated by Don Cox.

Texas Tech University Day

Lubbock--As many as 1,200 high school students, and maybe more, are expected at Texas Tech University March 2 to learn about college life, roam the campus and end the day with a free swimming and dance party at the Aquatic Center

While most students will be coming for personal advice on college choices, there will be planned activities for fun as well as ongoing university events open to the visitors.

Students from throughout Texas and as far away as Connecticut and New Jersey have indicated they will attend the fourth annual University Day at Texas Tech, beginning with registration at 8:45 a.m. and a general assembly from 9:30 to 10 a.m. in the University Center Theater.

Capacity of the theatre is 1,000, but Admissions Officer John Edwards said that response from high school counselors indicates there could be an overflow crowd "if the weather is good for travel."

Lubbock merchants, working through the Lubbock Visitor and Convention Center, are assisting with party food for the swimming and dance event beginning at 8 p.m. There will be live music there. For the price of admission students can choose to watch mime Keith Berger performing at the University Center Theatre or hear Don Sanders playing the guitar and singing at the University Center coffeehouse in the "Storm Cellar.".

The basis for the University Day is to help high school students learn more about higher education, whether they intend to enroll in Texas Tech University or some other institution.

Open Letter

"To the people of Borden County"

As we move with the hustle andbustle of the big city, fight the early morning traffic and live in close quarters with others (but never even know their names), it is so good and refreshingto know where our roots are - the small rural community of Borden County. 
