## Central Tire Works Owner Recalls Old Methods of Recapping Tires

Wardie Maddox, owner and operator of the Central Tire Works, recently drew an interesting comparison between the methods of vulcanizing tires, used 28 years ago, and the efficient, streamlined methods used today. Repairs on tires in the good old days were very expensive, and not too effective.

There were several different operations required to repair a tire years ago. The first step was to turn the tire wrong side out, put gasoline on the puncture, then scrape until clean. After this was completed, the tire was cemented and left to dry for 24 hours. After the cement had dried, the next step was to cover the puncture with fabric, then cure the tire on an inside curing arm. After all of this, the tire was then placed in a tread mold and, using a sand bag and large hammer, beat, and clamped the tire down as tight as it would go. The tire was then left to cure for three hours under 70 pounds of steam pressure.

When a tire was completely repaired, in the old days, the repaired spot was about one third smaller than in any other place, and a thousand miles of travel was considered excellent for a vulcanized tire.

Mr. Maddox recalls that the cost of new passenger car tires ran from twenty-five to eighty-five dollars. Truck tires at that time were all solid. Repairs on tires ran from fourteen to forty five dollars, and you didn't have much after it was repaired.

The modern method of repairing a tire takes only three hours, and with new materials and equipment, a vulcanized tire now is just as good as new.

The Central Tire Works uses nylon cord in their tire repairs, because nylon is many times stronger than cotton, and also a lot lighter. This lighter cord eliminates bumping, which is caused by too much weight in one place on the tire. A nylon repaired tire can be easily balanced, and will roll smoothly on your car. A tire that bumps might as well be thrown away, if it can't be balanced, because it will shake your car to pieces.

Mr. Maddox can usually remove the bump from a tire with his balancing machine. That is, if it isn't too bad. Wheel balancing is one of the most important things about a car, because it keeps your wheels in line, makes your car steer better and safer, and makes your motor run smoother.

The Central Tire Works is also equipped to change batteries. This service is offered at a very low price, and includes cleaning of the battery, and filling with a non-corrosive solution. In stock also, is a large supply of high quality batteries. The Central Tire Works carries a complete line of new tubes and used tires, and will service tractor tires with chlorite.

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# Daddy Tells the Horror, but Sonny Listened for the Bugle

HOT SPRINGS, Ark.—(AP)—The most frightening thing about the prospect of a third World War is the admiration that is being generated over the second World War.

I don't know of a veteran who fought a hundred days in the line whose hair wouldn't turn gray at the thought of his son going through the same untidy business.

Yet to hear him talk now war was the big romantic adventure of his life, the flight from tedium he will never forget.

The Lord help me, I am one of these criminals, too. Every time I lock memories with an ex-serviceman, I do the same sorry thing. With his children and neighbor kids standing bug-eyed around us, we fight the war over again. We start off by saying how horrible it is, but somehow without meaning to—because we know it isn't really true—we end up by making death glamorous to the small fry.

I know this is true because my Uncle Tony did it to me. He is a man of great common sense who came back after the 1918 armistice with the conviction that war is the dirtiest enterprise that man, heir of earth, suborns his talents to.

Uncle Tony has a heart as deep as the history of Ireland. I really don't think he would hurt any man to make a million dollars.

I know that Uncle Tony never won the first World War. He was careful at the time to point out that he didn't. For all his kindness and good will to everyone he came back our family hero, and the story of his war experiences overseas threw a peculiar luster over battle that his children never outgrew.

Now a new crop of veterans is doing exactly the same thing. No matter how much they hate war to their bones, when they reminisce about it they make it interesting—and out of the routine.

You can't blame old soldiers for being liars either. The human tendency to make the best of things converts the dirty-legged, pock-marked Arab girl they bought eggs from in Tunisia into the most beautiful girl since the Arabian Nights. It makes them feel better—and their wives jealous—to recall a 48-hour leave to Paris as the gayest date-time of their lives, when actually they spent it taking baths, drinking French watered beer, riding the Eiffel Tower and writing letters home from a Red Cross center.

I am old enough to know better.

but as I go around the country and meet old war comrades I lie with the best of them. I almost convince myself that war was wonderful and fun and I wasn't really scared all the way.

My Uncle Tony tell me he got something out of the war that I believe most soldiers did—or should have.

"I learned how to live with men and to get along with them," he said.

Well, that's an expensive way to learn something you're taught in Sunday School.

But we'll go on—just like Uncle Tony—putting the most pleasant face possible on past catastrophe. Yet our sentimental lies do one thing.

They help make the younger generation realize that there is something greater than themselves—our country—and prepare them for the time when the bugle blows. The bugles have been necessary for too many centuries, but until the world smartens up to a way to hang them up forever old soldiers and their clarion memories have a place and a purpose. I wish the time would come when they didn't.

got out of the car and ran through the Justice of the Peace H. R. Vosges of Comal County, with whom the charges are filed and before whom an examining trial was scheduled at 3 p. m. today, said York was shot in the right side; his wife in the right breast; his son in the left side and York's mother in the back.

York suffered a flesh wound in the right hip. She was taken to a New Braunfels Hospital and later transferred to a San Antonio Hospital. She is being given transfusions.

The bodies of Mr. and Mrs. York were found in the front seat of the car. York's mother lay dead about 12 feet to the rear of the vehicle, sprawled in the roadway. The son who was dead on the ground, just outside a rear door.

Sheriff Scholl said 11 discharged shells from a 300 caliber automatic rifle were found five yards from the York automobile. The scene was 23 miles west of New Braunfels.

The sheriff said an automatic rifle was in Dr. Ross' car.

"Ross had very little to say about the gun in his car," Scholl stated. "He just said the gun had been fired. He didn't say under what circumstances it had been fired and he didn't say who pulled the trigger."

Scholl sent out a broadcast pickup order on Dr. Ross thirty minutes before the physician walked into the San Antonio police station.

In addition to the four murder charges, Ross is charged with assault to murder in the wounding of Ann York.

Dr. Ross is a member of the same Methodist Church to which the Yorks belonged, the sheriff said.

The suit which Ross filed in District Court asked that York be required to make a complete disclosure and accounting and surrender all securities.

Ross is married and has a daughter. He is five feet 11 inches tall, weighs about 150 pounds.

"His wife has not been to see him," Sheriff Scholl said. "He says he does not want to see his family at present."

## Further Bloodshed Feared Before India Settles Independence

You would think that India, after all her centuries of subjugation and longing for freedom, would be able to submerge her politico-religious strife and grasp with eager hands the gift of independence which England is offering—but no, the Moslem-Hindu hostilities continue at a pitch which is causing authorities to fear further bloodshed.

The hope is that the civil warfare, which in recent months has taken thousands of lives in various parts of the country, can be confined to isolated communities while the independence program is ironed out. Should it spread the length and breadth of the mighty subcontinent with its four hundred millions, we should see one of history's great tragedies, for there is nothing to equal the ferocity of religious warfare among Oriental peoples. However, at this juncture that's a danger to be recognized as a possibility rather than something to be expected.

We can add this more positive thought: If there should be an upheaval, responsibility for it will rest heavily on the shoulders of leaders among both factions. Sparks from the Hindu-Moslem fire in the capital of New Delhi fly far and start flames among the rank and file who, broadly speaking, wouldn't fight among themselves under ordinary circumstances. There always are local religious and political leaders who are ready to take advantage of opportunities to stir up strife, even though the chiefs in Delhi are trying to prevent disturbances as they undoubtedly have done.

Civil disturbances provide a fine breeding ground for Communism and Red organizers have been laboring in India for years. Former Under Secretary of State Sumner Welles said last night in a broadcast (WOL Mutual) that "Communism has recently strengthened its hold in all of the cities and is rapidly spreading into the rural areas."

While this Communist crusade is going on the signs are that the all India Congress, which is predominantly Hindu, and the Moslem League may agree to divide British India into Hindu and Moslem states—Hindustan and Pakistan. Britain finally has acquiesced in this reluctantly, after having fought for a united country under a federal government. The Hindus also wanted this, but the Moslems refused on the ground that they are outnumbered three to one by the Hindus and wouldn't get a fair deal in a central government.

Under such an arrangement it is possible that some 600 princely states might group together and ask for outright independence, or what seems more likely, request dominion status in the British Commonwealth of Nations. The princes had been prepared to join in a federal government with the provinces of British India.

What eventually will come out of this bickering and confusion remains to be seen. Sumner Welles says that a solution to India's problem "will only be found if and when the Indian leaders are willing to think in terms of India, rather than in terms of their own communities." He maintains that these leaders also must be willing to enter an agreement upon a federative system similar in principle to that which we evolved here in the United States. Observers generally hold that a federal government is the only logical solution.

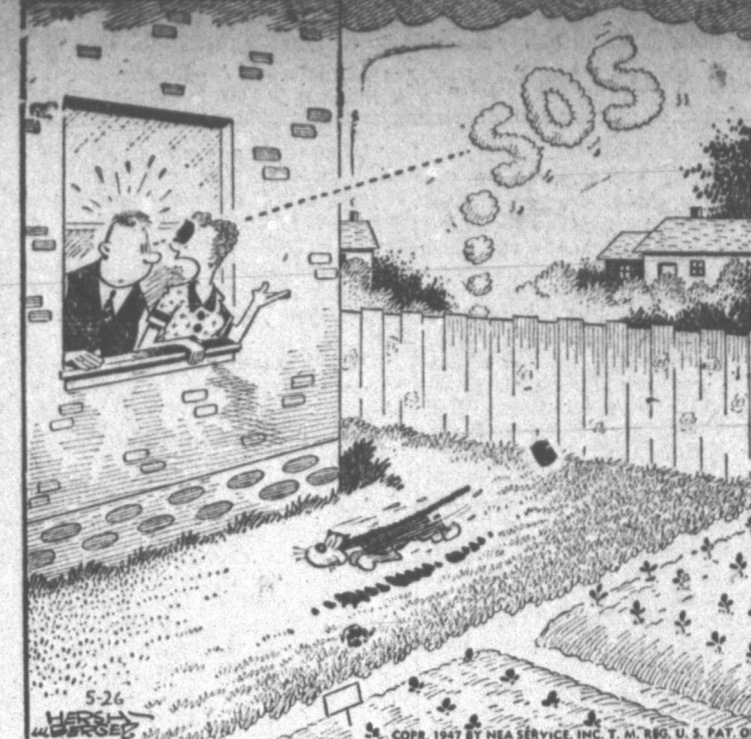
