The Texas Highway Patrol investigated seven accidents on rural highways in Bailey County during the month of August, according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and 12 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first eight months of 1971 shows a total of 36 accidents resulting in no persons killed and 28 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for August, 1971, shows a total of 581 accidents resulting in 25 persons killed and 400 persons injured. This was 17 more accidents, 13 less fatalities, and 76 more injured than during July.

The traffic deaths for the month of August, 1971, occurred in the following counties: Wise, five; Gray and Potter. three each; Garza, Hale and Carson, two each; Baylor, Crosby, Montague, Parker, Briscoe, Castro, Randall, and Roberts. one each.

SPAG Receives Crime Control Extra Funds

South Plains Association of Governments of Lubbock announced they will continue operation of their regional law enforcement training program with a grant approved by Gov-

ernor Preston Smith. The award, \$32,326, comes from Criminal Justice Council, a body which oversees statewide law enforcement planning and administers funds from the U.S. Department of Justice for crime control projects in Texas.

"All swine farms within the federally-quarantined areas will be inspected by the state animal health officials for signs of sickness," Hollis says, "and this inspection will be completed as quickly as possible."

Swine producers within the quarantined areas who wish to exhibit at the Panhandle-South Plains Fair may do so as long as the hogs are accompanied by a certificate of inspection. After the fair, these hogs must be taken directly home and isolated for 30 days.

The specialist urges any producer who has sickness in swine to notify a veterinarian, county agent or animal health officials.





LEGAL NOTICE BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEG-ISLATURE OF THE STATE OF

SENATE BILL 249, Section 1, (a) This Act shall apply to every county in this State. In all the counties, each owner of any livestock mentioned in Chapter I of Title 121 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 shall within six months after this Act takes effect, have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the county clerk of the county. These owners shall record the marks and brands whether the brands and marks have been previously re-

corded or not. FACTS CONCERNING RERE-CORDING OF BRANDS IN TEXAS.

All brands and marks on Texas livestock must be rerecorded with County Clerks after August 30, 1971, according to a new law passed during the last session of the Texas Legislature. Producers will be given a sixmonth period (August 30, 1971 through February 29, 1972) in which to register these brands and marks and the location on the animal which they are currently using, after which time any unrecorded brand will be available for use on a "first-

come" basis. The law further states that all such brands and marks must be rerecorded every 10 years. Each County Clerk records for his given county only, so many producers may need to record their brands in additional counties if their operations are extensive.

The owner shall have the right during this six-month period to file the mark and brand now recorded in his name. In the event it cannot be determined from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

The committee has no decision-making powers, but is called in "to advise the Secretary and other officials on matters such as domestic and export requirements, and production adjustment and stabilization programs." Appointments are for the period ending April 28, 1973.

Under the terms of the Agriculture Act of 1970 the loan for 1972 is to be set at 90 percent of the previous two-year average wourld market price, except that the Secretary may adjust the loan level as he deems necessary to "keep U.S. cotton competitive and to retain an adequate share of the world market for such cotton,"

World cotton prices for the past two years have been such that, if the Secretary uses the same formula he used in 1971, the loan for 1972 would come to about 21 cents per pound, basis middling-inch, 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire, net weight. Whether this same formula is to be used, or whether the Secretary is to exercise his option to "adjust" the loan level, will be thoroughly discussed in the Advisory Committee. The 1972 loan must be announced on or before November 1 of this year.

There is a widely held belief in the U.S. cotton industry proper authorities before dumpthat additional cotton production will be needed in 1972, and some are urging USDA to raise the 1972 base allotment next year as an inducement to increased acreage. "This too will be discussed," Johnson said, "but in preliminary talks USDA officials indicate they may not be so inclined."
