Communist Group On HST Blacklist

WASHINGTON - P - President Truman Saturday night ordered a purge of all Government employes where there are "reasonable grounds" to doubt their loyalty and set up sweeping new standards to test it.

His executive order directed a "loyalty investigation" of everyone who applies for a job in the executive departments and agencies, without exception, where now only questionable applicants are tested.

Loyalty Check Order Includes Nine Provisions

WASHINGTON- (AP) -President Trunan's executive order last night for a loyalty check of federal employes provides in brief:

1. The Attorney General is to list groups that are "Totalitarian, cist, Communist, or subversive," that seek to deny citizens their constitutional rights, or that seek to all that seek to change the form of change the form of Government "by government "by unconstitutional unconstitutional means.'

MacARTHUR SAYS IT'S TIME TO LEAVE JAPAN

If General MacArthur's announcement that the Japanese are ready to walk alone had no other reaction on the American people, it certainly must have carried the impact of abruptness.

And if they received the news with utter credulity, they have but to look to the other side of the world to get a picture of complete and disgusting contrast. While the Japanese people under the unified command of Gen. Mac and his men have been divested of their totalitarian concepts, the people of Germany are thoroughly confused under triumvirate rule-American, British, Russian.

It was a year ago that MacArthur hinted the Japanese people had learned fast, and it was but a few weeks ago that he intimated to a group of editors that the country could get along all right if placed under United Nations supervision.

All this sounds like good news-not only to the parents of those men who are serving there, but also to the American taxpayers. It costs a good deal of money to occupy a country, for it is necessary to keep the populace supplied with food and other essentials as well as the occupying forces. But whether this news is the whole truth, perhaps we will have to wait on time and circumstances to deter-

It would be a deplorable commentary on the foresight of American management if within a few years hence there again reared its ugly head the spectre of a warring nation. But the success or failure of historic missions like that of MacArthur, so often is determined by one individual: experience in such matters is rarely drawn on, because it always seems there has been no parallel. Therefore, a good deal is left to the discretion of him in charge. Indeed, there had never before been a beaten Japan, and she may have learned her lesson; but it would be more than sad to realize in later years we had withdrawn from the land too soon. We have been in the country for only about 19 months, and at the beginning it was being proposed that we keep an occupation army in Japan for as many as 10, or even 20, years.

THEY'RE NOT SALESMEN!

Chairmen in the Red Cross drive here tell the story that the workers are being treated with indifference when they make their contacts in the business and residential sections. We think this is not only indifference—it is contempt.

It seems that it is contempt for an organization which stands ready at all times to help in case of disaster, has trained help that could be dispatched here within a matter of hours-to care for the sick, or the hurt, or the hungry, or the cold.

These are not salesmen—these people who are contributing their time that some \$7,500 might be raised here. We should not only give them consideration as they call at our homes or our businesses-but should be aware of the fact that they are giving more of their time to an important cause than we are.
