MOSCOW—AP—U. S. Secretary Marshall called on the Council of Foreign Ministers today to set plans for the creation of a German government in motion at once and both he and Britain's Ernest Bevin presented programs for the organization of a federalized German nation.

CANADIAN—(Special)—Canadian's newest business will open in a new building at 401 N. E. 2nd Street. It is C. C. (Charley) Allen's produce market and grocery.

The walls are finished with wall board inside, and stucco outside. The cream room is being finished in white and will meet sanitation requirements for such places.

### Estimate Offered On '47 Wheat Crop

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The agriculture department yesterday forecast a 1947 wheat crop of 1,212,000,000 bushels and a corn crop of about 3,000,000,000 bushels.

By comparison, last year's wheat crop was 1,155,715,000 bushels, the largest of record, while crops for the ten-year period of 1935-44 averaged 943,092,000.

Last year's corn crop, also a record, was 3,287,927,000 bushels and then ten-year average was 2,608,499,000.

Yesterday's forecast for wheat was based on last December's official prediction of a winter wheat crop of 946,527,000 bushels and on a prospective spring wheat acreage which, at ten-year average yields per acre, would produce 265,000,000 bushels of spring wheat.

The corn forecast was based on a prospective corn plantings of 87,500,000 acres and yields equal to the past five-year average.

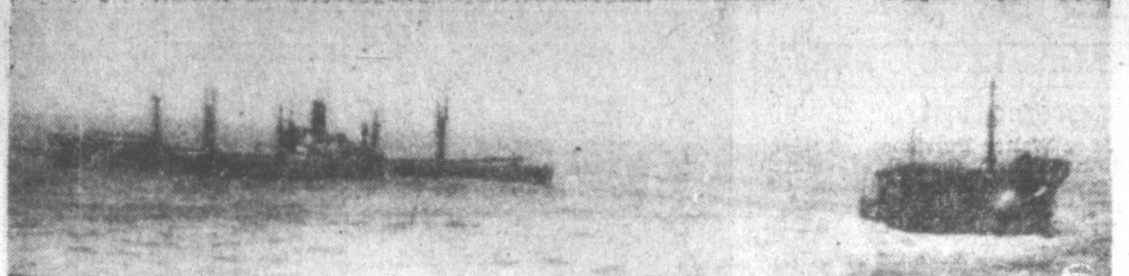

(Continued From Page 1) a major shift in American diplomatic policy.

Acheson said Eaton had called his attention to a demand within the committee that copies of the document be furnished to the press.

He made it clear, however, that some of the documents were not statements of the State Department itself and said that he was "sure that the press would treat them in that light in making them public."

Acheson testified under questioning by Rep. Mundt (R-SD) that Soviet insistence on participation in the defense of the Dardanelles Straits is one of the "external pressures" on the government of Turkey.

One of the primary reasons the administration desires to provide aid to Turkey, he said, is to combat "external pressure."

The under secretary added that there are no particular "internal pressures" on the Turkish government, but it is staggering under the load of maintaining a normal economy while also keeping armed forces in a state of semi-mobilization.

Mundt remarked: "The reason why fundamentally we are being asked to go into Turkey is that—at least in the opinion of the Turks—their Soviet neighbor is conducting a war of nerves as regards the (Dardanelles) Straits and along the border."

"Is that a fair statement?" Acheson: I would rather content myself with the statement that what has happened has convinced the Turks that they must keep their Army mobilized."

The South Dakota legislator then asked whether the aid to the two Mediterranean countries is "the first step in American policy to stop expansion of Communism into countries that are free and democratic."

Acheson recalled that President Truman had said Greece and Turkey asked the United States for aid. He added: "The President did not state at any time that this is a crusade against an ideology."

Rep. Richards (D-SC) took over the questioning and swung to the question of why the Greek-Turkish problem should not be put before the United Nations.

Acheson said that he was "not suggesting that U. N. be excluded from any problems," but commented that creation of the U. N. did not preclude one nation from asking another for economic aid.

FORT WORTH—(AP)—More than 600 schoolboys match speed, distance and height today in first preliminaries of the huge Southwestern Recreation Track and Field meet with their college brethren, also better than 600 strong, moving into action tomorrow.

Within 100 of the record entry of 1,406 in 1941, this greatest outpouring of athletes in a cinder path carnival and the nation brings runners, jumpers and throwers from the states of Texas and Oklahoma. There are nine universities, 16 colleges, 13 junior colleges and 69 high schools in the field. But all will not be track. Of the 1,308 entrants, 113 are in a golf meet. They represent 12 high schools and 13 colleges and universities.

Major interests rest on a flock of mighty sprinters for tomorrow's college preliminaries and finals with flyin' Charley Parker of Texas seeking to beat his first upsetter in five years, Bullet Bill Martinson of Baylor. Not only will these two speedsters, each with a 9.5 100-yard dash to his credit, battle it out in the century but they also are scheduled to tangle in the special 100-meter run that will draw Jim Metcalf of Oklahoma A. and M., Stonie Cotten of Baylor, Allen Lawler of Texas and Murphy Guilbeaux of Paris Junior College.

New records are expected in both events. The current standards are 9.6 for 100 yards and 10.3 for 100 meters. Parker also will be favored to beat the 220-yard dash mark of 21 flat.

Ideal track weather—sunshine and cool enough to be comfortable—was the forecast and R. D. Evans, meet director, said the cinder path would be in great condition for the shorter sprints. It will be a little heavy for the 220-yard dash and 220-yard low hurdles, however.

Universities entered are: Texas, Texas A. and M., Texas Tech, Oklahoma, Baylor, Texas Christian, Southern Methodist, Hardin-Simmons and Oklahoma A. and M. 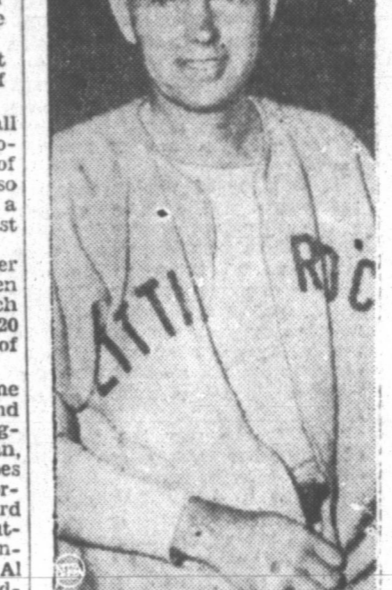
If Oklahoma and Wyoming succeed in holding their foes to a low score either or both may come through with upset victories.
