Seeking revenge for a 49-40 loss at Amarillo a few weeks ago, Pampa's Harvesters will meet the title-bound Amarillo Golden Sandies tonight at eight o'clock in the Junior High Gym. There will be one game only.

Furthermore, Amarillo may not be fire-bound, should Pampa win tonight's game, for it would throw the Sandies into a tie for first with Lubbock, one of the two teams holding a victory over Amarillo this year.

However, what somebody else does will not be forgotten tonight as the locals try for their 12th win of the season in a game dedicated to their newly-elected basketball queen, Nicki Fraser.

Although Amarillo will be favored in tonight's game, Sandie basketball teams have registered only one victory on the local court in the past several years. Incomplete records do not show the entire series record.

Friday night, Pampa will meet the Claude Mustangs in the final game of the season. It will be a non-conference game.

Eleven out of sixteen district champions of Class AA Schoolboy Basketball probably will have been entered in the records following a long list of championship titles that are on schedule for tonight.

Six schools, El Paso High, Denton, Paschal, Port Worth, Crozier Tech. of Dallas, Brownwood and Harlingen, already have gained clear district titles, while five others, Amarillo, Greenville, Waco, Texarkana and Bryan, assured of at least a tie in final standings, can move into district competition by turning in victories tonight.

Of the remaining districts, dead-end playoffs loom between Houston and San Jacinto, in Houston District 13, and Beaumont and Goose Creek, in District 14, while Big Spring, Abilene, Midland and San Angelo meet in a District 3 championship tournament Friday at San Angelo.

First tilts of three-game series to determine winners in Districts 2 and 15 are also on schedule for tonight at Graham and Corpus Christi.

By districts, the title situation is as follows:

1. Amarillo, with an 8-1 record, must defeat Pampa, at Pampa, tonight or fall into a tie with Lubbock 8-2-1.
2. Graham defeated Electra, 61-29, at Wichita Falls Saturday for Western Division crown. Vernon won Eastern Division with 3-0 record.
3. Big Spring defeated once in conference play, must meet San Angelo, Midland and Abilene, in championship tournament starting Friday.
4. El Paso High won title Saturday by defeating Bowie of El Paso, 36-25.
5. Greenville can clinch crown tonight by defeating Denison, at Greenville.
6. Denton collected its championship by defeating McKinney, 60-24, Friday.
7. Paschal has repeated as the Fort Worth winner, far ahead of second place Polkton.
8. Last year's state champion, Crozier Tech, had little trouble in sewing up the Dallas race, but was tripped Saturday night by a conference rival, San Jacinto.
9. With a 9-0 record, Waco must defeat Cleburne at Cleburne tonight to gain clear title.
10. Texarkana, with only one loss all season, won over Longview 44-33, to clinch a tie. Championship will be at stake tonight when Texarkana invades Kilgore.
11. Bryan, first half winner, met his first defeat Friday, a 55-40 loss from Lufkin, but can claim the crown tonight with a victory over Jacksonville, at Jacksonville.
12. Sam Houston of Houston leads by a half game over San Jacinto but the two teams probably will finish in a tie. Sam Houston has one game to play against Lamar, tomorrow, while San Jacinto is favored over Lamar tonight and Reagan Thursday. In case of a tie, Sam Houston and San Jacinto will battle it out for title Friday.
13. Goose Creek defeated Beaumont Friday night, 46-38, to throw the race in virtual tie. Beaumont, with one game to play, leads by a half game, but Goose Creek has two remaining games.
14. Thomas Jefferson of San Antonio and Corpus Christi clash tonight at Corpus Christi in first game of playoff series. Second game will be Friday at San Antonio, as will third game Saturday, if necessary.
15. Harlingen, with 10-0 record, gained clear title Friday with 29-19 victory over Kingsville.

The West Texas-New Mexico league meeting here Sunday was gratifying in many respects, but mostly because of the spirit of cooperation and friendliness that existed in the comparatively young circuit's meeting.

Although many openly disagreed on some measures, the whole thing was marked by a lot of kidding on the part of both the members and spectators. Milton Price, who did a lot to put members at ease with off-hand cracks at the managers and owners.

The best thing, of course, was the approval by the owners of the \$2,800 monthly salary limit, a raise of \$300 per month over last year. Even Lamma, which finished last in 1943 and drew fewer paying working league all-stars, were pleased to have all clubs were wholeheartedly in their ratification of a measure to enable players to off-games.

Every club owner, although not over-enthusiastic, was optimistic about the league's future and all were quick to congratulate those who had done much to promote the league's success.

Although no organization is any stronger than its members, we agree with the owners in that Price, Harlingen league president and secretary of the Texas league, has done more for the circuit than any one man. Easy to get along with and friendly, he is from Dallas. Price conducted a slightly rambling "ambulatory" meeting in an orderly way and had it not been for his chiding the members at various times, the session might have been much longer than the four hours.

Your writer was recording secretary at the meeting and we were more than amazed when Price told us he wouldn't be necessary to type the minutes, meaning that he could actually read those chicken tracks we call handwriting. Just in case we didn't see the minutes and read them to him along with our original copy.

We were however, slightly disappointed that Pampa didn't openly bid for the league of the Pampa-Olers, moved that the game be awarded to Amarillo, after members had discussed a plan of rotation. Most of them, however, agreed that the game should be held in the larger cities and, after thinking it over, we were inclined to agree. However, after that meeting or so, a system of rotation should be started when it is evident that each of the eight clubs is on a more sound footing.

Sam Rosenthal, president of the Lubbock Hubbers, took issue on our statement that none of the league ball parks had put water fountains. Sam informed me in no uncertain terms that his club installed two conveniently-located fountains last year. He also said that it was the smartest move his club made in its public relations.

The little disagreement between Manager Grover Seitz of the Olers and the Olers Pioneers last year was recalled when J. H. Wilson of Clovis stood up and said that Clovis doesn't want to see any more of that sort of trouble and promised his cooperation in keeping it down.

FORT WORTH—(AP)—Headed by one defending champion, six newly crowned Golden Gloves titleists and one substitute will represent Texas in the Tournament of Champions in Chicago next week.

Charles Robinson, Fort Worth, who won the welterweight title by default over Wallace Willard, Houston, announced he would not make the trip, leaving Willard to take his place.

The only knockouts on the program came in the Golden-Trophy division—bouts matching outstanding fighters who had been eliminated from championship competition.

Tony Byers, 167, Ada, Okla., fighting as a Marine from Corpus Christi, knocked out Walker Benjamin, 165, of Long Island, N. Y., fighting as a soldier from Kelly Field, San Antonio. The knockout came in 1:30 of the first round of the light-heavyweight match.

Ray Boy, 185, of Waco, kayoed Albert Hansen, 182, of Monahans, in 1:59 of the first round of the heavyweight bout.

In the championship division, Barron had Douglas "Buster" Harrison, 158, on the canvas five times but couldn't put him away in the middle-weight class.

Baggett, 112, easily decided Louis Allen, 113, of Port Arthur, in making the flyweight title. He floored Allen once in the second round.

Luna, 119, won the bantamweight crown by a narrow margin from Pete Valdez, Port Arthur.

Layne, Walker To Renew Rivalry on Diamond, Gridiron

Associated Press Sports Editor DALLAS—(AP)—One of the deepest personal rivalries in Southwest Conference sports is coming up this year between a couple of pals who figured in the ascendancy of Highland Park of Dallas in Texas schoolboy football.

Bobby Layne, Texas' great passer, will be finishing out his athletic career at the big state school. Five years ago Layne almost pitched Highland Park into state championship—just one of the fellows he was throwing to was Donk Walker, the chunky little guy who can do anything in football.

Came 1944 and Layne went to Texas while Walker played his final season at Highland Park in 1945 both entered the Merchant Marine but they were discharged at the same time and were back ready for college football Nov. 1.

Here the paths of the two split up. Walker chose SMU.

The first meeting of Walker and Layne at Dallas in the Texas-Southern Methodist game of 1945 was a revelation. Both were stars that day. Layne shaded Walker by performing with the winning team and accounting for 27 yards against Walker's 166, but the showing of Walker was more astounding. This was the first college game he ever had played.

In 1945 Walker was called to Army duty. Layne was first rejected then called again but was never taken when the government suspended the draft.

Bobby was one of the nation's stars last year both in baseball and football. He accomplished the unusual feat of pitching nothing except victories for Texas at the Longhorn baseball team swept up the title. He led the collegiate football world with his passing, was the conference's top punter, the conference's top punter.

Walker was discharged from the Army not so long ago. He made a base line for Southern Methodist today by bringing "old" list and "old" with his work in spring football training.

But Southwest Conference baseball practice opens March 1 and among the candidates at SMU will be Doak Walker, who has played outfield, infield and caught—and is quite a boy at all. 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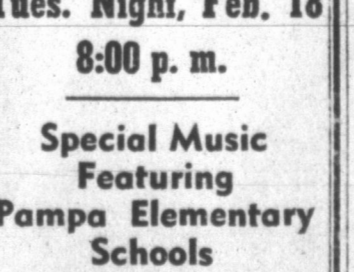

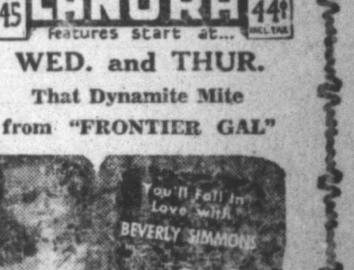
Needlecraft Club Is Entertained
