Curley Will Appeal Case On Mail Fraud

BOSTON—(AP)—James M. Curley—garve but still maintaining his poise—told newsmen today he had instructed his attorneys to appeal to the Supreme Court his conviction on mail fraud charges.

The 72-year-old mayor refused to pose for photographers, explaining that he did not feel it proper and expressing a hope they would understand.

I talked with my lawyer this morning," he said, "and I have instructed him to take an appeal to the Supreme Court."

Curley said he understood the stay of execution of sentence was automatic pending the appeal.

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The U. S. Court of Appeals affirmed today the conviction of James M. Curley, 72-year-old mayor of Boston and former member of Congress, and two co-defendants on mail fraud charges.

The white-haired Curley, veteran of half a century of politics, was sentenced in Federal Court here last Feb. 18 to a term of 6 to 18 months in jail and a fine of \$1,000 for his alleged activities as president of Engineers Group, Inc. The government contended the organization profited from the sale of mail fraud cases and had been free on bond in the present case.

Donald Wakefield Smith of Pittsburgh, former member of the Federal Labor Relations Board, was sentenced to four to 12 months jail and a \$1,000 fine as treasurer of Engineers Group. A third defendant, James G. Fuller, received a 16-month to four-year sentence as executive vice president. Fuller recently completed a term under a five-year sentence in another mail fraud case and had been free on bond in the present case.

Both Curley and Smith have been free on bail since their conviction after a lengthy trial last winter. Curley was elected mayor of Boston during the trial. He continued as representative in Congress from his district. Previously he had been in the Senate.

Pampan Mistaken For Burglar, He Is Hospitalized

Lewis Caudill, 1132 Terrace, early Sunday morning was hospitalized in Pampa Hospital after he had been shot through the left lung very near his heart. The accident occurred in front of the Scott Service Station, 875 W. Foster St., Chief of Police Louie Allen reported this morning.

Allen said Caudill, a friend of William H. Scott who shot him, told him that he went to Scott's home after closing hours and failed to identify himself when he awoke Scott to give him some gasoline. Caudill then went to the front of the next door service station and waited for Scott to come out.

Scott's statement to Captain Ernest Winborne, who investigated, stated that "a man came to his rear door for some gasoline. He intended to fool Scott, Caudill told police, he stood in the shadows and Scott, falling to recognize him and thinking it was an intended holdup, shot immediately."

Police arriving at the scene, searched the grounds and found no one, then called both hospitals and discovered Caudill had hailed a passing taxi and gone to Pampa Hospital.

Allen said this morning that both men have been friends for years, trading with each other, working for each other and that no charges will be filed against Scott.

Scott in his statement to Winborne said he did not know it was his friend, Caudill, when he fired. Attending physicians today reported Caudill's condition as "very satisfactory."

Victims of Antarctic Crash Relate Story

ABOARD U. S. S. MT. OLYMPUS—(AP)—Six survivors of the wrecked Byrd expedition seaplane told today how they emerged from the shock of their plane crash in the white hell of Antarctica, withstood terrific hardships and tenderly buried their three dead comrades in graves of snow.

William G. H. Warr, an aviation machinist's mate of Reading, Pa., and Radioman James Robbins of San Diego, Calif., were called manfully in helping pull the survivors through.

Others said Capt. Henry H. Caldwell, commander of the seaplane tender from which the photographic flight came, seemed made of iron and kept the men's courage up until the explosion and crash.

When Caldwell went aboard his tender, the Pine Island, yesterday and shook hands with Capt. George Dufek, the task group commander, his first words to Dufek were: "They wasn't the slightest doubt you'd get us."

It was on the seventh day of their long vigil that they buried the three dead under the southern edge of the seaplane's wing, with an American flag flying. Caldwell conducted burial services.

This is the story told by the survivors: When the plane exploded after bouncing off an ice crest, Ensign Maxwell A. Lopez of Newport, R. I., Fredrick Warren Williams, Huntington, Tenn., and Aviation Radioman IIC Wendell K. Henderson were killed outright at their stations.

Caucus Is Called Today in Fight For Redistricting

AUSTIN—(AP)—Legislators planning a finish fight to force redistricting will caucus today to map strategy for their campaign.

Their first move will be an effort to seat Philip A. Schraub of Corpus Christi, elected, as representative from a Nueces County district which does not now exist but which would if the state had been redistricted.

Schraub, a 50-year-old lawyer and ex-convict, holds a certificate of election to the House of Representatives, signed by the Nueces County judge which he hopes to present soon after the House organizes tomorrow.

Backers of the renewed redistricting effort are expected to urge their cause, spearheaded by Schraub's effort to win a seat, on the basis that the Legislature's failure to redistrict the state since 1921 has brought on taxation without equal representation.

Next-growing Corpus Christi and Nueces County should have two representatives in the Legislature instead of one, as under the present set-up, Schraub said.

O. K. Rabb, 30, was found yesterday in the plane wreckage. He had been missing since Saturday while on a flight between Temple and Waco.

Another plane crash victim was Mrs. Maria H. Sotelo, 35, of Laredo who died Thursday from burns received Friday night in a kerosene fire at her home.

Miss Doris Francis Wallace, 18, was killed yesterday at Houston when struck by an automobile as she was crossing a street.

Four Policemen Die in Explosion

JERUSALEM—(AP)—Haifa's 95,000 inhabitants were held under virtual house arrest today by a British curfew imposed last night after violent explosion wrecked the city's police station, killing four policemen and injuring more than 142 other persons.

The casualty list showed two British policemen and two Arabs Temporary Constables dead, 62 policemen—British, Arab and Jewish—hurt, one Briton severely; 48 civilian hospitalised; 32 given first aid, and many more cut, bruised or shocked.

The blast—set off in an automobile load of explosives planted outside the station—shook Palestine's main seaport throughout, sent glass splinters flying for as much as a mile, disrupted traffic and the telephone system and started forces that ragged for a half hour in the next-door postoffice and other nearby buildings.

The government said that the six-story headquarters, at the foot of Mount Carmel and about 100 yards from the harbor entrance in a Jewish-Arab neighborhood, was "virtually leveled."

Officials reported that three men in police garb and the others in raincoats drove the bomb-laden "Police" up to the building and fled into a tangle of streets and alleys. Guards fired after them and, noting a blazing fire in the automobile, gave an alarm to clear the station.

About 15 policemen got out before the blast three minutes later. Immediately guards on public buildings were doubled, Bren gun carriers took strategic posts and checkposts established by the British First Infantry cut off the neighborhood of the explosion. At 11 p. m. the curfew was imposed.

An hour after the blast, the secret police from Zol Leumi, Jewish underground group, broadcast a denial of rumors current all week that the underground was withholding violence to await the outcome of negotiations for an independent Jewish State in Palestine.

Meanwhile, a reliable Arab source reported yesterday that the Palestine Arab higher executive committee had accepted a British invitation to a London conference on Palestine's future government scheduled for Jan. 21. Palestine's Jewish agency executive declined to attend "under existing conditions."

GOP Delays Showdown on War Profits

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Senate Republicans today put off until Wednesday a showdown on their dispute over whether a special committee should investigate war profits.

The dispute, which has split the GOP, comes down to this: Whether an inquiry, if made, should be undertaken by the regular Armed Services Committee headed by Senator Gurney (R-ND) or by a special committee under Senator Brewster (R-Maine).

Republicans held a private conference on this morning. Senator Taft (R-Ohio) told reporters afterwards that no decision was reached on the main question and that it will be discussed further Wednesday.

He said there was an agreement that the special committee, if approved, should be limited to inquiry into what has happened in the past. This would leave to the Armed Services Committee questions of future policy.

Taft said another question bothering the senators—whether to have a special committee to investigate problems of small business—will be discussed tomorrow.

On the House side of the Capitol, members who are war veterans or organized into an informal association, Rep. Francis E. Walters (D-La.), who was named chairman, told reporters "this isn't going to be a See WAR PROFITS, Page 6

Delegates to U. N. Council Examine Dispute Reports

NEW YORK—(AP)—Delegates to the United Nations Security Council examined with considerable interest today a voluminous file submitted by Great Britain in her dispute with Albania over the Corfu Channel mine blasts which killed 44 British sailors.

The British submitted the case to the Council last Friday. The United States has to have it considered concurrently with disarmament, which will be taken up again by the Council when it meets Wednesday (10 a. m. CST) at Lake Success.

The Council still must determine just how it will tackle the arms question. It has before it an American proposal that atomic energy be given priority in arms limitation and a Soviet Russian motion urging that the whole broad question of arms reduction be taken up promptly.

8,000 Troops Will Reinforce French Indochina Forces

PARIS—(AP)—The French government announced today that the liner Le De France had sailed yesterday for Toulon carrying 8,000 troops to reinforce French forces now battling Viet-Nam Nationalists in Indochina.

Some disagreement over French policy in Indochina was in evidence meanwhile among Socialists. President Auriol yesterday said that the first aim should be "defense of our fellow citizens and our friends."

However, Leon Boutbain of the Socialist party executive committee, who went to Indochina with Montet, told reporters the French must share the blame for the outbreak and probably still could find common ground with truly representative Viet-Nam elements. He reported he had talked unofficially with Viet-Nam leaders in Hanoi.

Gen. Leclerc, sent to Indochina to lead the French fight, also came back to Paris yesterday. But French reports showed that operations in Hanoi still were going on. They said that patrolling Viet-Namese faced with capture and blowing themselves up with hand grenades.

The French general staff in Saigon reported that French troops holding Hanoi's European quarter had met for the first time in a week behind a straining Spitfires and artillery fire and captured the southern suburbs. The commissioner general was said to have ordered all "unnecessary" civilians removed from Hanoi to save food.

Hollis, which won a 36-1 game from Pampa at Hollis earlier in the season, has lost only one game this season, that to Mangum in a double-overtime, 39-37.

 NEW YORK—Judging from the early returns there will be a goodly number of new conference champions this year as several of last season's college basketball titans have shown a marked inability to maintain their championship pace.

Among the defending champs which face a difficult job ahead are Kansas, Dartmouth, Ohio State, Idaho, Baylor and even the mighty Oklahoma Aggies.

The second week of conference play finds only California, Arizona, Kentucky and Duke among last year's titleholder, perceived as being at the top of their respective leagues.

An eyebrow lifter was Oklahoma A. & M.'s 38-20 defeat by unheralded St. Louis University last Friday night. The Aggies, who have gone through two years without a defeat in a Missouri Valley league game, are currently resting in fourth place with a 1-1 record.

Wisconsin, showing the form that carried it to the NCAA championship in 1941, is well out in front in the Big Six race with three straight victories.

Cornell, Pennsylvania and Columbia are right up at the top of the standings with Princeton keeping pace with the unbeaten list.

Baylo, which won 11 of 12 games to annex the Southwestern conference title last year, got off on the wrong foot by losing to Texas last week in its only start. Texas, best on once in 14 starts, leads the league.

However, three league games to be played in Abilene this week only go far toward deciding the 1947 champion.
