WASHINGTON (A) - The U. S Court of Appeals affirmed today the conviction of James M. Curley 72-year-old mayor of Boston and former members of Congress, and two co-defendants on mail fraud

The white-haired Curley, veteran of half a century of politics, way sentenced in Federal Court here last Feb. 18 to a term of 6 to 18 months in jail and a fine of \$1 000 for his alleged activities as president of Engineers Group, Inc. The government contended the organiza-tion profited to the extent of \$60,-000 by representing itself as able to obtain war contracts for clients.

Donald Wakefield Smith of Pitts-burgh, former member of the National Labor Relations Board, drew a four to 12 month jail sentence and a \$1,000 fine as treasurer of Engineers Group. A third defendant, James G. Fuller, received a 16month to four-year sentence as executive vice president. Fuller re-cently completed a term under a five-year sentence in another mail fraud case and has been free on

But that does not mean that fog is thicker in China green only because the immediate than it is in America, or that American flying equipment is decidedly superior.

The probable answer is that weather information is better here than it is in Shanghai, and that American planes would have been grounded in Shanghai's Christmas weather. However, it cannot be said that a similar tragedy can't happen here. In fact, there are times when it seems that such a tragedy will be required to quicken the tempo of the leisurely airline efforts to make badweather flying safe.

Two efficient means of bad-weather landing were developed during the war, ground-control approach and instrument-landing approach. There are two schools of thought as to which method is better, and the resulting debate has contributed to the fact that neither system is

in use. There are other reasons, of course. The Civil Aeronautics Administration blames Congress for not giving it enough money to finish up experimentation and development and get some sort of blind-landing method in operation.

Then there are those who put the major blame on CAA. These critics maintain that the CAA's dilatory passion for perfection has led it into an attitude of insistence upon conducting all research on a somewhat theoretical plane. It would be better, say the CAA critics, if it would authorize the installation of blind-landing equipment which is known to be workable and decidedly better than ever, since we will not be there, nothing, then make refinements suggested by experience in actual use.
