# Established Foreign Policy Given Support

NEW YORK-(.P)-Top-flight republican diplomats at the United Nations and the council of foreign ministers rallied to the support of established American foreign policy today in an evident effort to quiet jittery specultion abroad about possible radical changes in this country's international relations.

Foreign delegations to both the U. N. assembly and the Big-Four council sessions took the election results with little show of concern, but much of the foreign press viewed the republican capture of congress as marking a sharp American swing to the right and threatening new difficulties with Russia.

While the United Nations drove through another round of committee work today and the foreign ministers marked time until iomorrow on the dispute over control of strategic Trieste, republican statements on the foreign policy situation were much discussed by diplomats here. Associates of the President were inclined to agree that Mr. Truman, being a reasonably stubborn man from Missouri, will not quit. They said he is likely to follow the course of doing what he thinks is best for the nation in the next two years and letting the political consequenses fall where they may.

Republican National Chairman Carroll Reece said it is "a matter between the President and his conscience" as to whether Mr. Truman should resign. The constitution mentions the possibility of a presidential resignation, but does not say to whom it should be submitted. There is no precedent for no president ever has resigned.







3. Sugar rationing has been administered from the District Office since last January. In the future, sugar forms required by the trade and consumers may be obtained from the District Office.

4. Pending compliance actions by the board will be transferred to the District Office.

5. The local board office will be closed for the transaction of pub-lic business on November 4. How-ever, the paid clerical personnel will continue on duty during the month of November in order to transfer records to the District Office and to perform the many other duties involved in closing the board.

6. As in the past, supervision of rent control will be administered by the Borger Defense Area Rent Office, 1131/2, S. Cuyler, Pampa.

#### IT IS NOW TIME WE **PROVE FREEDOM IS NOT A MYTH**

What has just happened in America is to be expected sooner or later in a land of popular government. Certainly it must happen if that government is to survive.

So it is that the people have just voiced their approval of a change in the political party that is to administer the affairs of this country for the next two-and possibly more-years. The people have voted to the right, perhaps not to such extreme as Henry Wallace would have wanted them to vote to the left.

It was Henry Adams, the American educator, who said "Modern politics is, at a bottom, a struggle not of men but of forces.'

There is little doubt that the struggle through which round the master's chair. the people have gone over a period of years is one of forces-ideas-rather than men.

It is quite true, it seems, as some have observed, that the U.S. has turned to the right, surprisingly, while the the rest of the world has turned further to the left.

The right, as most people understand it, means a system under which men exercise the theory of free enterprise-that is, men are left unfettered by the bonds of government control and regulation; while the right means a system of government under which men's lives are regulated for them, and lose their freedom.

For the past 14 years, our nation, which in 50 years had grown strong and wealthy under laissez-faire (free enterprise), has experimented dangerously with new political concepts-new, we should say, in the American way of life. An old political maxim was reaffirmed for later kept the Germans out of its truth during those years. It said: "If any lessons can be drawn from history, one that seems clearest is that when people obtain any kind of economic security, the non-economic problems begin to rise in importance."

That is what our government has sought to do for 14 years—it has sought to delve into the social and personal be vice chairman of the council of lives of our people—it has sought to give them more economic, social security. Our great empire here could still be lost through that sort of defective search for security. If we fail to remember that the real, untarnished sort of security we want is born through personal effort, we can again fall back into bureaucratic confusion.

With great victories go great responsibilities. That of the Republicans has been a great victory; it is now theirs to prove that freedom in America is not a myth, theirs to prove that a turn to the right is right. Other than that, we will have gained nothing by this change.




