

Bill Garland Works Again, But Loses to Abilene 6 to 5

Williams Hits 7 for 9 As Boston Wins 2

Thumping Ted Williams in baseball's man of the hour—almost certain to be named most valuable player in the American league if the Boston Red Sox cop the pig prize. Adding 11 points to his batting average with one afternoon's effort on seven hits in nine times at bat, the sharp-eyed slugger is tops in hitting at .365 only ranks first in runs scored, runs batted in, total hits and home runs.

Williams hit for the cycle in yesterday's second game triumph over St. Louis, 7-4.

A double and a brace of singles by Williams drove in one of the runs Dave Ferras needed to record his 15th victory of the season, 3-0, in the first.

Nelson Poised To Annex Honors at All-America Meet

CHICAGO—Byron Nelson, golf's golden boy—peevish at critics who "claimed he cleaned up last year because the top stars were in service"—today was poised to grab the 1946 cash-collecting leadership in the \$50,000 All-American tournament at Tam O'Shanter.

Nelson primed for a crack at the \$10,000 first prize offered in George May's All-American by roaring from behind to top the \$10,000 Chicago Victory National open yesterday with a five-under-par 279.

The All-American merry-go-round which opens today with three days of qualifying competition for amateur, feminine and professional entries finds Nelson owning more than \$19,500 winnings in six major triumphs, while leading money-winner Ben Hogan—who finished far behind in the Chicago victory with a 286—has some \$25,000 for eight victories.

Nelson methodically ripped apart Medina's puzzling No. 3 course yesterday for a closing 36-hole round of 68-68-137, five under par, after starting tactically Friday with a 73 and then perking to a 69 Saturday.

Blue Sox Score Two Runs in 9th; Pete Spatafore Is Hero

ABILENE—Scoring two runs off Lefty Bill Garland in the ninth inning, the Abilene Blue Sox took the second game of their three game series with the Pampa Oilers here yesterday, 6-5.

Garland, who set the Sox down with five hits Saturday night for his 15th victory, came into pitch after Foster White and John Gist had failed to stem the tide of Blue Sox hits.

Pete Spatafore, Abilene second baseman who was suspended last week at Lubbock for insubordination, arrived at the ball park two minutes before the game and won it with single, driving in the last run in the ninth inning after Manager Shorty Freer had lifted the suspension.

Both teams collected 12 hits and the Oilers played errorless ball for the fourth and went ahead with the hitting of Spatafore and Matthews provided their downfall.

Pampa scored one in the second inning but the Sox tied it up in the fourth and went ahead with three runs in the fifth inning on Matthews' home run with two on.

Pampa took a 5-4 lead with two runs each in the seventh and eighth but the Sox came from behind in the ninth with two runs.

Al Zigelman, Oiler catcher selected on the North All-Star team for the game at Lubbock Friday night, was charged with his second passed ball of the season. Zigelman's record of only two is far better than that of any other catcher in the league.

The two teams will play at Abilene again tonight after which Pampa will return home for a series with the Berger Gassers. Abilene enters a three-game series starting tomorrow.

In-Betweens May Outdraw Fabulous Louis Conn Bout

NEW YORK, (NEA)—Middleweights are expected to give boxing a much needed shot in the arm when Tony Zale and Rocky Graziano battle 15 rounds for the title at Yankee Stadium, July 25.

This fight is expected to outdraw the late unannounced Joe Louis-Billy Graham boxing event which drew 50,000. The gate probably will exceed \$350,000 at from 3 to \$30.

Graziano, a local boy who made good by punching, is the best New York drawing card in the area since since Louis was in his prime, although the ignited Italian from Manhattan's lower east side may be greatly overrated because his victims were mostly lighter men. This bout should prove his real class.

Zale, never a standout attraction, is 32, same age as Louis, has been in the name as long as the Brown Bomber was in the army, but books and acts much younger, and has scored six knockouts in 20 rounds since his discharge—against tailor-made competition, of course.

Both fighters appear to be in superb physical condition.

Graziano's left hand is vastly more formidable than it was, but it is still a case of an unadulterated slugger with only one thought in mind against a rugged warrior who combines a punishing punch, especially to the body, with a measure of skill.

Public fancy leans toward the swarthy, which makes Graziano, who has a tremendous New York following, the favorite at 5 to 11, one of the few cases where a challenger was favored over a champion in a titular engagement.

Zale has advantages in weight, six pounds, and height, but Graziano has a much more important pull in age. He's only 24. The Gary steelworker plans to come in at 159, stands five feet eight-and-a-half. The homegrown fighter to step into the battle pit at 153. He is five feet seven inches tall.

In his only bout against a middleweight, Graziano was hard put to eke out a decision over Sonny Horne in 10 rounds at Madison Square Garden last spring.

Graziano showed vast improvement in timing during workouts at Greenwood Lake, N. J., where he boxed 180 rounds with tough sparring partners. Rockabye Rocky insisted on making each training session a real fight.

Zale put in 130 rounds of boxing at Pompton Lakes, N. J., spending most of his time perfecting a body attack.

In doping the fight ringworms point out that the age angle didn't seem to affect Louis in his dance with Conn. The fact remains, however, that Graziano has a terrific pull in the matter of youth, also that he is an intensely aggressive slugger with a potent punch. something Conn sadly lacked.

Zale appeared to be training for a short fight as if he hoped to wear out his foe with punishing blows to the body.

Graziano gave the impression that he could go on forever, wound up each day's work eager for more.
