

#### Revolt of the Suckers

Joseph Curran, president of the National Maritime Union, is the est union leader to join the leadership of what might be called the Revolt of the Suckers. Recently CIO President Philip Murray rebuked the communists for their infiltration tactics. Then Morris Mun-ster resigned as head of the CIO furniture workers as a protest against nunist control of his union. Now Mr. Curran has lashed out against the same state of affairs in the NMU's higher echelons.

Curran spoke in no uncertain terms. Among other things, he called the recent NMU elections "one of the worst machine jobs I have seen. He charged the communists with withholding from the member-ship information on the state of their own withholding from the membernformation on the state of their own union.

He accused them of putting parasitic followers on the payroll and running the union into the red, of trying to make their blessing a prerequisite to holding union office, of discrediting anyone who opposed m, and of breaking their promise to allow the rank and file to con-

This is substantially the story of communist attacks in every union

where they have managed to seize a strong hold.

It is evident that the communists in the labor movement think they're art. They have absorbed the Russian revolutionary technique emphasizes discipline, secrecy, tight organization and unremitting work.

They obviously believe that the rank and file can be led or pushed, ralsong and slogan, and made to swallow any preposter that suits the leaders' purpose, so long as it is told loudly and often

This may have worked well enough in Russia and some other tries. But here the communists have made several bad mistakes, which are now catching up with them. They evidently thought that energy was a substitute for resourceful-

ess, and that discipline takes the place of adaptability. They over-boked the fact that the "dopes" and "suckers" might succeed in electing to make Britain a gift of \$4,400,-But me of their own officers who wouldn't forever come to heel. Most of all, perhaps, they forgot that they were up against a differ-

sort of rank and file. Sure, the rank and file and some leaders, like Curran, have played along with the communists. But the rank-and-American can be pushed just so far and fooled just so many times. He can also be suspicious and alert. He is literate. And he has ample irces of information in a country where inquiry and speech are free. During the war, when the communists were lying low, the rank and file seemed to wise up. Today the same old line and tactics (and the nunists seem to lack the imagination to develop new ones) just aren't going over. The Revolt of the Suckers is under way.

Authorities mustered 21 trucks in Belfast, one for each emergency bread distribution center in the city The bread servers association had rejected a compromise to give the rationing a trial for a week by a vote of 377 to 325. Other parts of the six counties of

northern Ireland with a population of 1,500,000 likewise were threatened with a bread shortage. Some sub-urban bread servers had decided to ide with the Felfast association Others decided to work, however. Except in northern Ireland, bread rationing was conducted quietly without incident in Britain. bread queues were reported in London or other cities, perhaps because of large buying on Saturday when housewives beseiged the bakeries.
