



Philippine Army Is Released From U. S.

WASHINGTON—(P)—President Truman today signed an order releasing the organized military forces of the Philippine government from the service of the armed forces of the United States.

At the same time the President signed into law legislation permitting the immigration into the United States for citizenship purposes of 100 Filipinos and 100 East Indians annually.

Neither country had an immigration quota previously.

The legislation permits the naturalization of Filipinos and East Indians already in this country, provided they can meet citizenship requirements.

A POSSIBLE 2,760,000 OF MEXICO'S POPULATION WILL CAST BALLOTS IN FORTHCOMING ELECTION

MEXICO CITY—(P)—"Imposition," hunger of the poor, communism, religion and possible influence of the United States in Mexican affairs are among the issues in Mexico's campaign to elect a new president and a congress Sunday, July 7.

The successor to President Manuel Avila Camacho will take office December 1 for a single six-year term. The two leading candidates, Miguel Aleman and Ezequiel Padilla, both are former members of Avila Camacho's cabinet. Gen. J. Augustin Castro former secretary of national defense and Gen. Enrique Calderon, a career soldier, also are in the race. Campaign arguments have been heated, but somewhat one-sided. It is Padilla, former secretary of foreign affairs, who usually attacks, and Aleman, former secretary of the interior, who ignores the repeated blasts. Padilla is the opposition and Aleman represents the party in power.

He is backed by the official party, PRI (partido revolucionario institucional), and the great mass of people on the public payroll are committed to his support.

"Imposition" is a widespread cry, which however was not invented by Padilla. It is the charge that the government and PRI put their men in office by their influence and by elections which have been denounced by fraudulent by angry crowds.

In one case, at Leon, Jan. 2, a crowd protesting against the "imposition" of PRI mayor was fired upon by troops which killed 30 and wounded 30. In Monterrey, second industrial city, PRI opponents charged election results had been disregarded and officials "imposed" but the supreme court refused to intervene.

Roughly, formerly self-supporting, he imports one-seventh of what she eats. Even the tortilla is one-fifth corn from the United States, and half the wheat for her little rolls is North American. Both candidates urge more irrigation and better farm methods with state aid and direction.

Nearly half of Mexico's 21,000,000 population is illiterate. President Avila Camacho, like others before him, pressed a campaign to teach simple reading and writing to all. Hundreds of thousands have been taught in a year and several millions are getting a smattering of ABC's. Schools are being built and teachers are being trained.

Padilla is the foremost advocate of honesty in elections and in government. Both he and Aleman bear heavily on the need to help the "little fellow." Many more than half of Mexico's 21,000,000 earn so little that leaders admit frankly that they are hungry. Aleman's friends credit him with a sincere desire to better their condition. Padilla, expressing similar views, blames the government, "corruption" and selfish officials for their plight.

Padilla's attacks on communism center on Labor Leader Vicente Lombardo Toledano, president of CTAL (confederacion de trabajadores de America Latina), who denies he is a communist.

Padilla's attacks on communism in the race as a man who kowtowed too much to Uncle Sam. The attacks were general and vague, but Aleman took no part in these efforts. Aleman probably is the best known man in Mexico in the sense that

more people have seen him in the flesh. Campaigning for almost a full year, he has visited each of the 28 states, three territories and the federal district (Mexico City and its suburbs).

Efficient as a speaker, rather dull in his language, Aleman makes people think he is glad to meet them. He goes to the smallest villages. His big idea in this campaign has been the "round table." He sits down with the farmer, the farm hand, the factory manager and the leader of his employees, the school teacher and other persons who can speak for their groups.

Padilla is a cultured orator, impressive in appearance and capable of charming and mastering an audience. A student of international affairs, he is interested primarily in basic reforms, world cooperation and domestic reconstruction.

He has no backing such as Aleman's political machine, but he is rich and has wealthy friends. His party, PDM (partido democratico Mexicano) was formed to support him.
