

Second Class of Pampa Aviation Cadets to Receive Wings Saturday

Another group of Axis-smashers will be on their way to blast Hitler and his cohorts into oblivion Saturday morning when the second class of cadets is graduated from the Pampa army air force advanced flying school.

The main speaker for the ceremonies, which will be attended by a large number of parents, wives, and sweethearts of the graduating cadets, is to be Lieut. Col. John W. White, commanding officer of the new army air force bombardier school at Childress, Lieut. Col. Daniel S. Campbell, commanding officer of Pampa field, announced today.

Saturday's festivities, which will begin at 10 a. m., mark another step in America's all-out drive toward the mightiest air force the world has ever known, and serves as the high spot in the lives of the young men who graduate.

These young men, many of whom never did anything more deadly than throw a brick through a window, have mastered 36 weeks of the toughest training you'll find, and now are ready for the biggest job of their lives—pounding the Axis into defeat.

Starting off the graduation weekend will be the gala graduation dance Friday night, featuring one of America's top dance bands, Charlie Agnew and his orchestra. Agnew's crew comes to Pampa from a long list of successful eastern engagements, highlighted by the all-time meteoric rise to stardom of their young female vocalist, lovely Jean Carroll.

Special decorations have been planned for the dance, which will be held in the post recreation hall. A backdrop has been built so that the danceable music of the Agnew band will not be missed by a single couple in the hall.

The program for the graduation ceremonies proper, as announced by Lieut. Paul E. Daugherty, secretary, is as follows:

Invocation by Lieut. Maurice P. Garner, chaplain; administration of the oath of office as second lieutenants to the graduating cadets by Lieutenant Daugherty; introduction of the guest speaker, Colonel White, by Colonel Campbell; graduation address by Colonel White.

Libyan Tribesmen Seek Free State

 CAIRO—Two prominent leaders of the Senussi, those gallant tribesmen who have fought more than 30 years for the right to live at peace in their native Cirenaica, say in an exclusive interview that they hoped the British would provide forward to establishment of an independent state, with the Grand Senussi, Sayid Mohammed Idris el Senussi, as their titular ruler.

Although the British have declared they have no desire for permanent territorial gains as a result of the Eighth Army's sensational victories in the Western Desert, these Senussi leaders—who asked that their names be withheld—said in an exclusive interview that they hoped the British would provide some sort of temporary protection for the hoped-for Senussi state, along with preliminary financial aid. They explained their people were not ready for complete independence, but needed guidance in developing and improving their green, fertile, rolling lands along the Mediterranean between Benghazi and Derna.

For hundreds of years, Cirenaica and Tripolitania were separate countries, but the Italians combined them after World War I and called the whole expanse Libya.

The history of the Senussi is fascinating. The movement was founded more than 100 years ago by Sayid Mohammed Ibn Ali el Senussi, a reformer who believed the simplicity of primitive Islam had been obscured. As a young man, Sayid Mohammed travelled in the Sahara as an itinerant missionary, preaching a reformed Islam.

His teachings spread like wildfire from Arabia to Morocco. The Senussi soon achieved great political power, which they held in varying degrees down through the years.

The Senussi creed leads the hard-ship-toughened tribesmen to admire law, order and material development. Most don't smoke, or drink beverages as strong as tea. Their holy city is at the Libyan Desert oasis of Jaramah, where Sayid Mohammed was buried in 1880.

After the Italians took over Libya, they started colonization in Cirenaica on a grandiose scale.

Senussi leaders interviewed here conceded the Italians had made many improvements—such as roads and irrigation—during their quarter-of-a-century occupation, but emphasized the oppressors had been extremely cruel. Many natives were hanged. Some were shot.

Cirenaica has been occupied by the British three times in this war. During the first two occupations, most of the colonists remained on their farms. Before the present occupation, however, the colonists moved out—most of them apparently to Italy. The British found only priests in many of the villages, and the Senussi lost no time in taking over.

Meat Point Values To Be Announced

WASHINGTON, March 17 (AP)—JPA will announce next week the point values for meats, fats and oils, butter, cheese and canned fish, officials said today.

They emphasized that all these products will be rationed on the same coupons, beginning March 29. They will be obtainable with use of the red stamps from War Ration Book 2, already used for processed and canned fruits and vegetables.

New Mexico Official Says He's Innocent

SANTA FE, N. M., March 17 (AP)—Declaring himself innocent of a federal grand jury's indictment charging conspiracy to conceal \$15,000 assets in a bankruptcy case, Attorney General E. P. Chase of New Mexico yesterday posted \$1,000 bond and said, in a statement:

"I welcome the opportunity to prove again my complete innocence of a charge based upon testimony, the falsity and malice of which will be made apparent at the proper time."

Chase, C. Ray Smith of Oklahoma City and Bruce M. Hyde of Marshall, Texas, were indicted March 6 on charges of conspiracy to conceal assets in the bankruptcy case of Hazel Hyde, a client of Chase's private law office.

Chase was acquitted last fall of a grand jury's charges of accepting a bribe.

Navy to Give Student Tests

Pampa High school boys will have the opportunity to take qualifying tests for applicants for the new navy college training program, V-12, to be conducted at 9 a. m., Friday, April 2, at the high school building here.

Conducting the tests will be B. G. Gordon and Lorraine Bruce, high school mathematics teachers. Similar tests will be held at the same time throughout the country.

For those who take the examination the navy will eventually select students for the navy college training program.

Those accepted will take their college training while on active duty, in uniform, receive pay, and be in complete discipline. Upon completion of their college training they will receive further training leading to commissions. Out of those selected, 50 per cent will start their college work in July, the remainder in November.

Canadian Red Cross Starts New Classes

CANADIAN, March 17—A home nursing course of 12 lessons has been arranged, using Red Cross text books and beginning Tuesday of this week. Mrs. Calvin Isaacs is chairman of this division of the Hemphill county Red Cross work.

Mrs. Tom Scott, R. N. is donating her services as teacher. An afternoon class and an evening class will be held each Tuesday and Friday for six weeks.

The home economics room at the Canadian High school will be used for these classes and Mrs. H. A. Hill will assist Mrs. Scott.

Mrs. Hill's third year girls will take the home nursing course and later the second year girls will be given the lessons.

Wheat Suit Dismissed

DALLAS, March 17 (AP)—Asserting that jurisdiction lies in the federal district court of the three-judge federal court, yesterday dismissed for want of jurisdiction Tex-O-Kan Flour Mills company's suit to prohibit the government from interfering with a shipment of 2,000,000 bushels of wheat from Canada to Mexico.

Oklahoma Crows Eat up Peanuts

OKLAHOMA CITY, March 17 (AP)—"I can't understand why the country endures meat shortages when ten million succulent meals go to waste in Oklahoma alone," sighs Jess Pullen.

"That many crows are feasting on the state's war-essential peanut crop when they should be eating the ration rations of meat-hungry Americans now learning in some sections to serve up horses and muskrats, asserted Pullen, assistant state attorney general.

"It's time to revive the crowing fast of the early 30's."

"Why if we had the priorities for the dynamite and shot to kill them, I'd show you how to put a crimp in the black markets with the biggest blackbird market you can imagine."

Pullen was one who sang the praises of crow meat—"It tastes like roast duck"—so loudly a decade ago that meat dealers sold it, restaurants featured it and officials had their pictures taken exploring it hesitantly at luncheon clubs.

But the time-proven steaks and chops still were available then and crow meat sank quickly back into oblivion. Pullen scoffed that only "superstition" keeps it there.

"People have the idea these birds aren't clean in their eating habits. They are in fact cleaner than a pig or chicken."

"They are far superior to horse meat that you hear so much about."

"Then too, patriotism calls for use of crow meat."

"The government wants an unusually large peanut crop and these pests are probably the worst enemy farmer has."

Higher Taxes To Pay Jobless Is Declared Need

AUSTIN, March 17 (AP)—The state unemployment compensation commission today was sharply divided on the question of what will happen to Texas' backing for the jobs in post-war days when many defense industries shut down.

Chairman Claude A. Williams of the commission forecast possible bankruptcy for the trust fund if hosts of post-war unemployed claim their share, unless the legislature imposes higher taxes on war industries.

His statement followed one earlier in the week by Harry Benge Crozier, employer representative on the commission, voicing opposition to a bill now under study by the house committee on revenue and taxation, which he said would change the tax structure of the unemployment compensation act.

The bill, by Rep. Joe Carrington of Austin, is scheduled for hearing Tuesday night. Other tax bills this session have found the going rough in this committee.

Williams, characterizing the measure as one that would freeze the rate for war industries, added that its passage would "only alleviate the situation now confronting the trust fund."

"Unless something is done at this session, the trust fund of \$90,338,000, large as it now seems, will be depleted within a few months after the war is over," he said.

"It is important that Texas put its house in order now, because every effort will be made by the federal government this year to take over our state unemployment compensation system with the result that Texas employers, both normal and war industries, will be called upon to pay a minimum tax of six per cent."

"One of the reasons given for federalizing the state systems is that the states' trust funds are not adequate to meet the drain on them during the immediate post-war period."

Crozier said that Texas employers preponderantly oppose any change "and that whatever changes are needed should await more stabilized after-war conditions."

WASHINGTON, March 17 (AP)—A single United States Army Air Force fighter squadron downed 72 Japanese planes in aerial combat in New Guinea between June 1, 1942, when it moved into that area, and Jan. 8, 1943, shortly after the fall of Buna Mission, the war department announced today.

High combat scorer for the squadron is Capt. Thomas J. Lynch of Catasauqua, Pa., with eight confirmed victories. Second Lieut. Kenneth C. Parks of Blackwell, Okla., downed seven Jap planes.

Among those having two confirmed victories: Second Lieut. Ralph C. Bills of Dawson, Texas.

Among those with one confirmed victory: First Lieut. John C. Price of Longview, Texas.

Brown Sugar Is Flown to Toto

MIAMI, Fla., March 17 (AP)—A Pan American clipper has arrived here with a 50-pound package of brown sugar for Toto, female gorilla, who toured the country with the Ringling Brothers circus last season in a two-room cage with Gargantua, the male star of the menagerie.

Special permission to import the sugar was granted in Washington to Toto's owner, Mrs. Mary Hoyt of Havana. The jungle queen is in Sarasota, Fla., at the circus winter quarters.

FDR Thanks Solon Who Defended Sons

WASHINGTON, March 17 (AP)—President Roosevelt has written Representative Lanham (D-Tex.) thanking him for his talk in commendation of the President's sons.

Lanham recently read to the house a letter from Lieut. Col. Elliott Roosevelt, who wrote from North Africa to protest against attacks by Representative Lambertson (R-Kas) on two of the President's four boys.

Lanham said today he had received "a note" from Mr. Roosevelt expressing appreciation not only for presenting Elliott Roosevelt's letters to the house, but also for the speech he made in connection with it. Lanham said he did not think he should make public the presidential letter.

South Plains Faces Drought This Year

LUBBOCK, March 17 (AP)—Dirt farmers on the South Plains who have weathered several crises this winter are going into the spring planting season facing another threat—drought.

It hasn't rained a half an inch since mid-December. Top soil is dry. The sub-soil, however, is in exceptionally good state. Plowing has been delayed to guard against wind erosion and also because most lack farm help.

The recent March freezes, three in a row, apparently have caused less damage to fruit on the high plains than anywhere in the state, except in the southern tip, where protection usually is given citrus groves.

Oil Permit Meet Is Postponed

SAN ANTONIO, March 17 (AP)—The public hearing by the house oil and gas committee set for March 15 has been postponed until Thursday, Chairman John Hoyo announced today.

The committee is to consider a bill proposed to validate permits issued by the railroad commission under exceptions to rule 37. The hearing will be held in the hall of the house of representatives at Austin.

Supreme Court Grants Review Of Lepke Case

WASHINGTON, March 17 (AP)—Taking unusual action, the supreme court agreed Monday to review the conviction of Louis (Lepke) Buchalter, Emanuel Weiss and Louis Capone, alleged members of "Murder, Inc.," on a charge of slaying Joseph Rosen, a Brooklyn storekeeper.

The trio are under sentence to die at Sing Sing prison.

A review was denied by the tribunal on February and Monday it granted a petition for rehearing.

This means that the high tribunal will hear oral arguments on the case and then will deliver a formal opinion.

In other actions Monday, the court:

Refused to review the conviction of Orman W. Ewing, former Democratic National committeeman from Utah, on a charge of raping a 19-year-old government worker here Oct. 26, 1941.

Granted a request for reconsideration of its recent decision upholding the conviction of Enoch L. (Nooky) Johnson, former Atlantic City Republican leader, on a charge of evading federal income taxes for 1934 and 1937.

Refused a second time to review the conviction in Texas courts of two members of Jehovah's Witnesses for violating city ordinances dealing with the distribution of literature.

Refused for the second time to review the conviction of William Dudley Peley, former leader of the Silver Shirts of America, on a charge of criminal sedition. Also denied a rehearing were Lawrence A. Brown, a business associate, and the Fellowship Press, Inc., a publishing house at Noblesville, Ind., where Peley's magazine, "The Gallilean," was printed.

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One Sane Note On Manpower Today's War Analysis

By PETER EDSON News Washington Correspondent

Amid all the screaming on manpower shortages, size of the army, deferment of farm workers ...

It will be worth it because this fierce offensive through the gluey center of the rapidly thawing Donets region ...

It is perhaps no more than you might expect, but it is reassuring to find even one note of sense in all the confusion ...

"Although we can and will obtain several millions of new workers, the principal means by which we can alleviate the manpower shortage ...

"To obtain that efficiency, we must perfect our system of allocating raw materials and scheduling production so that all the necessary materials will flow into the factories at such times and in such quantities as to enable them to operate to the utmost extent ...

"If we can increase the operating efficiency... the excuse for labor hoarding... will cease to exist. Thousands of workers from whose services no present benefit is being obtained would instead be put to work on the front."

PRactical ANALYSIS There you have in a few well-chosen words which anyone should be able to understand as practical an analysis of all this manpower muddle as has yet been offered. In the same breath, it is by far the most difficult solution yet offered, but that is perhaps the best commentary on the inadequacy of all diagnoses and prescriptions on record.

Every solution to manpower thus far offered has been in the nature of a panacea presented by partisan. But no one-shot, sure-cure remedy is going to cure shortage of manpower, any more than snake oil will rectify rupture, rheumatism, and restore loss of manhood.

Cutting the size of the army by two million men won't fix things, and neither will drafting everybody now outside the army. Issuing a lot of directives won't do it, and neither will reshuffling a lot of government bureaus, nor appointing a czar.

CONGRESS' IDEA Nobody has yet licked absenteeism and chances are nobody will. If anything, absenteeism is likely to increase as more and more marginal workers are brought into industry. The same goes for hoarding manpower by employers who want to be sure of an adequate working force.

Defering all farm workers won't work because a lot of farm workers would rather work in war plants and because a lot of farm workers don't want to be deferred. Farm boys would rather get in there and fight. The \$50 a month offered them by the army is better money than they can earn behind a plow or under a cow, and army life is a lot more fun. Incidentally, it should be remembered that this \$50 a month pay was the idea of congress.

Army brass has opposed it, so the farm bloc congressmen thus have only themselves to blame for some of the farm labor shortage.

But no one thing is going to make more manpower and so, as the Truman report points out, the only way to remedy the situation is to see that what manpower we have is fully and most efficiently employed.

The National Whirligig News Behind The News

SACRIFICES: Admiral-Ambassador William H. Standley has suffered one of those diplomatic wrist-tappings for his plain speaking at Moscow. But the inside fact is that the blunt sailor man expressed the secret thoughts of the military and political leaders in London and Washington. It is also probable that he reflected the sentiment of their people.

His remarks came at a most opportune moment. February of this year saw our arms and food transported to the Soviet by lend-lease authorities than any other month since the program was inaugurated in March, 1942. Consignments of planes, tanks and motorized vehicles reached a peak.

From March to December of last year we forwarded an average of only seventy thousand tons of foodstuffs every thirty days. In February the shipments amounted to one hundred and two thousand tons. They required more than twenty vessels plus escorts to get through to Murmansk and Vladivostok.

MOOD: Republican strategists on Capitol Hill believe they have hit upon a winning issue for 1944 that will catch the former noninterventionist vote without subjecting themselves to the charge that they are selfish and narrow nationalists. Ironically, they pulled the idea from speeches and private confabs of a man who may be F.D.R.'s crown prince, Vice President Henry A. Wallace.

The Iowa, according to the viewpoint of his political enemies, heads the American school which wants to "give away everything," a position outlined in his repeated utterances that the United States must assume responsibility for feeding, financing and policing the postwar globe. In the cloakrooms, critics from both parties have nicknamed him "Give away Henry." They attribute present and prospective "lend-lease" reinforcements California's adoption of his policy.

Most civilian secretaries would have accepted the verdict of our senior commander, but not F. D. R."

"He called together a noted American naval engineer and a British admiral and told them to go ahead with the project. They did, and as a result the Kaiser's U-boats were trapped like herring in the North Sea net. It was a brave, far-sighted act."

"But he was never a good administrator—his son now. It is interesting to observe that Lloyd George and Woodrow Wilson were exceptional managers and Winston Churchill and Franklin Roosevelt are particularly weak in that line."

In 1917-18 subordinates in the Navy department used to warn, "Never write a letter or a report on more than one sheet of paper, otherwise F.D.R. won't read it. He likes flashes; he hates details. Yet he works both wet up a strong War Cabinet—the real board of capable but tough-skinned directors—he could disentangle most of our current snags."

Vital Rationing Information

To clarify the meat rationing program for Pampanos, which goes into effect over the nation on March 29, the southwest region office of war information, Dallas, has listed the following 18 highlights:

1. Beginning Monday, March 29, housewives will use the red stamps in Ration Book 2 to get their family supplies of meats, edible fats and oils, butter, and canned fish.
2. Point values will be announced during the week of March 22.
3. These point values will be based on weight primarily, but with differences governed by supply, consumer preferences, and the edible content of the various cuts and products.
4. The official table of consumer point values will list 150 meat items.
5. In general, the new rationing program will include:
 - All fresh, frozen, cured, smoked, and canned meat products derived from beef, veal, lamb, mutton and pork, as well as variety meats and sausages.
 - Canned fish and canned shellfish.
 - Most edible fats and oils, including butter, lard, margarine, shortening, salad oils, and cooking oils, excluding mayonnaise and salad dressing.
 - Retailers will be permitted to give "change" in ration stamps, using only the one-point red stamps.
 - During the first five weeks, each holder of Ration Book 2 will have a basic allotment of 16 points per week.
 - Red stamps bearing the letter "A" will be valid during the first week. "B" stamps will be used for the second week, and so on for five weeks.
 - Consumers will not be asked to declare the amount of the newly rationed foods on hands. This exemption includes fresh meats in frozen lockers.
 - Consumers will have complete freedom of choice in using their red stamps to buy any one of the rationed foods.
 - Retailers will collect points from the outset of the program, March 29, but will not give up points to their wholesale suppliers until April 11.
 - The two-week "point holiday" extends all through the meat trades, permitting both wholesalers and retailers to maintain sizeable inventories and build up a "working capital" of points.
 - Wholesalers and retailers will register with local boards during the period May 3-14, and will be given an allowable inventory stated in points.
 - A separate table of "trade" points will be used by the retailer, with lower point values which allow for trimming, waste, and shrinkage, depending upon the type of meat.
 - Cuts having a large amount of bones and fat will have lower point values than those which are more completely edible.
 - Point values of brains, kidneys, hearts, etc., also will be lower because these parts are more perishable.
 - The meat rationing program makes no provision for pet rations.
 - At least one official list of point values must be posted in each store. In addition, point values must be posted at or near the place where the rationed items themselves are sold.

Texas Cattlemen Fight Price Plan

FORT WORTH, March 17 (AP)—Southwestern cattlemen Tuesday heard their president, Claude K. McCan, of Victoria, Tex., cite reasons for opposition to the government's proposed livestock price ceiling program.

They were part of the president's report to the 67th annual convention of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers' association, and recently were presented to Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard after approval by 14 organizations allied with the livestock industry.

McCan said that the committee of the organization believed that the imposition of ceilings on live meat animals would tend to aggravate rather than alleviate the present situation in regard to meat supplies and inevitably curtail the future production of meat animals.

"Feeders will reduce feeding in the face of uncertainties," he said. "There would be a tendency to keep calves and yearlings on the ranches and grow them out to heavier weights which would seriously curtail feeding operations during winter seasons, he pointed out.

He said that ceilings could not be imposed upon live animals except in connection with the grading of such livestock as the only means of fixing the price to be paid, and no system of grades could be devised which would give adequate consideration to the many factors that now help determine the price.

He maintained it would require an army of graders to even attempt to enforce ceilings, and that with the price arbitrarily set, only limited competition would remain within the narrow confines of the grades established.

McCan said the plan would have a paralyzing effect on the central markets and that auction markets could not function under the system.

Western States Lead In Trade Increases

SAN FRANCISCO, March 17 (AP)—Western states came to the fore again in the changing pattern of retail trade at the start of 1943. A year ago the spur of war had made trade jump more east of the Rockies than in the far west. In fact, not one state west of the continental divide had a retail trade gain of as much as the national average sales increase in January last year.

But in January this year, Utah led the parade of states displaying the magnitude of trade gains. Utah sales at independent retail stores ran 30 per cent higher than a year earlier.

In fifth rank, when rated by percentage gain, came Oregon, after Oklahoma, Nebraska, and Texas. Oregon's 16 per cent trade rise, along with Colorado's 15, California's 11, Idaho's 8, Washington's 7 and New Mexico's 6 per cent rise all bettered the national average.

The lieutenant governor said the verbal agreement between labor leaders and the governor had been violated in recent strikes at Love field, Dallas; the McKinney army hospital; and at Duncan field, San Antonio. He cited absenteeism at the Houston Ship Building corporation as an additional example of violation.
