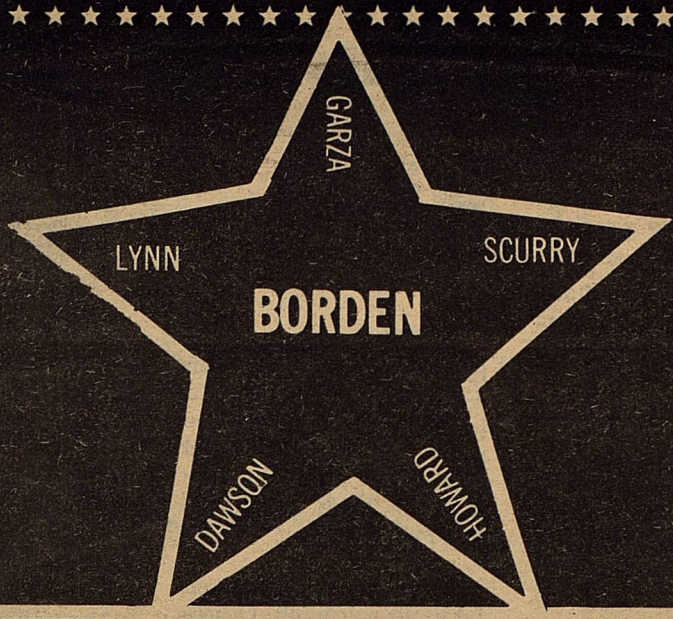

We're happy to be a part of the community of Gail and hope to provide good service to all Borden County residents," Lonnie reported.

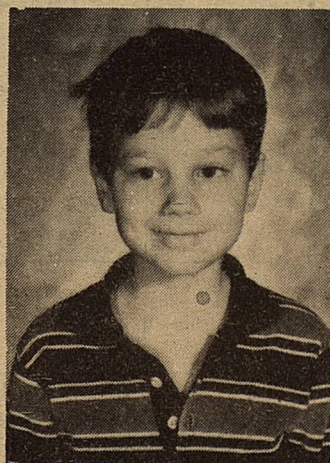
## Student Claimed By Sudden Illness

## Students Taking T.A.B.S. Tests

### IN A STRUGGLE TO GET BACK TO BASICS

Borden County students in grades 5 and 9 are undergoing T.A.B.S. testing on Tuesday and Wednesday of this week. The Texas Assessment of Basic Skills (T.A.B.S.) test has been designed to determine whether students have mastered skills in reading, mathematics and writing.

The tests are a part of an effort by T.E.A. to upgrade education in some areas that may be lacking and "get back to the basics." in education.

Exam questions are designed to measure a broad field of skills, depending on the grade level examined.

A sampling of general knowledge areas which T.E.A. said are included in the reading tests on the fifth grade level includes use of an index of a book; use of maps, charts, graphs and schedules; following a set of written directions; discrimination between fact and opinion, and drawing logical conclusions.

Ninth graders will be tested on some of the same skills and also on use of various sources to locate information, evaluation of information, and use of various parts of a book.

In grade five math, students are expected to know addition and subtraction of whole numbers, identification of common geometric terms and figures, multiplication of whole numbers, addition and subtraction of decimals and the solving of a number of different types of word problems.

Ninth graders are being assessed on their ability in the same areas plus their

knowledge of keeping personal records, solving word problems involving money, use of ratios, percents and use of charts and graphs.

In writing, all students are being tested on spelling, handwriting legibility, punctuation, capitalization, sentence structure and "appropriateness of response to purpose and audience in a given writing situation."

To administer the test, each school district will use a district coordinator, a separate coordinator for each school (most of whom are counselors) and a number of teachers in each school.

Next year, the third grade students will take the T.A.B.S. tests.

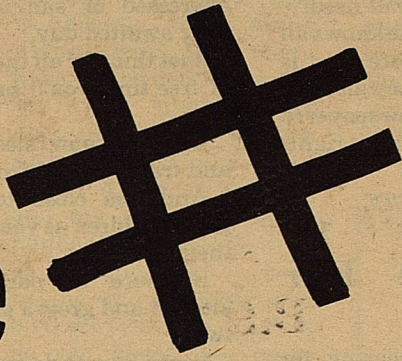

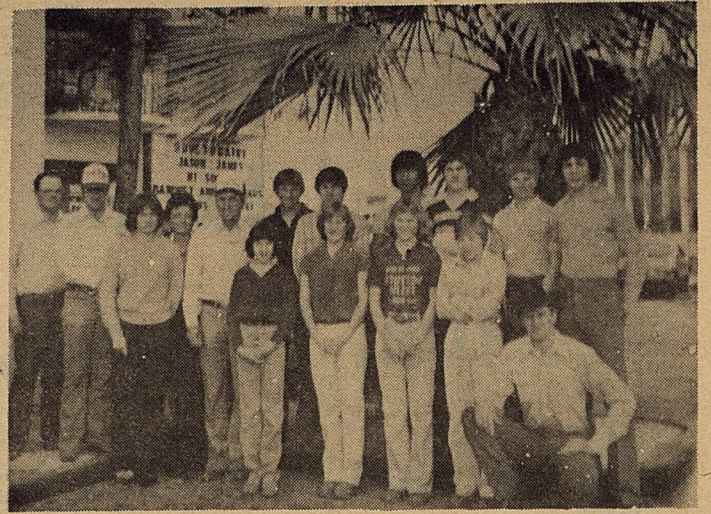

There is soon to be joy and celebration in the White House—the President is on the verge of winning a big one. Congress is about to give him his 250 billion-dollar gift from the taxpayers, the Windfall Profits Tax. So no big deal, it's just money that will be taken out of major oil company profits, right? No doubt some of it will come from that source, but let me ask some more questions and then answer them myself, from an independent's viewpoint:

**Question:** Is the Windfall Profits Tax a tax on excessive profits from oil production?

**Answer:** It has nothing to do with profits. It's a tax on a product—a barrel of oil—and has nothing to do with whether I make a million dollars this year or lose my shirt drilling dry holes. It's a punitive tax laid on by the federal government to punish me for trying to raise my prices to the same as those the Arabs and Mexicans are getting.

**Question:** Who is going to pay the Windfall Profits Tax?

**Answer:** Who always pays the tax on Products? Who pays the import tax on your new Toyota, the Japanese manufacturer or you? Who pays the punitive taxes on whiskey and cigarettes? The same old boy is going to pay the windfall profits tax: you, the ultimate purchaser at the gas pump.

**Question:** How much of the Windfall Profits Tax money is going to be spent to look for new oil reserves?

**Answer:** Not one single cotton-picking penny.

**Question:** How is the Windfall Profits Tax going to affect your operations?

**Answer:** I don't know yet. It's like breaking a leg—I don't know whether I'm going to be crippled or just laid up for a while. If it's too bad I'll just produce what I've already found until it runs out, and instead of drilling high-risk wildcat prospects I'll send money to Washington. If there's any left over I'll do the same as you—try to find some inflation-proof investments like real estate or foreign currencies, and try to put away something for old age and my children. I mean, I

like to gamble, but not when I take all the losses and the feds take all the winnings. I may be stupid, but now I'm experienced.

**Question:** Isn't it your patriotic duty to help the President solve the energy crisis?

**Answer:** Look, I'm already spending more than I should be looking for new oil, and I don't have any real good idea of what the government is going to let me keep if or when I find it.

According to the President, I'm a greedy, public-gouging profiteer, worse than the Arabs, and my patriotic duty is not to find more oil, but to give more money to the government. Besides that, there is no way that I can keep up as long as you cats are burning up oil faster than all of us put together can find it. When I see more people riding buses to work than driving cars, more teen-agers riding bicycles and mopeds than spinning out in hot-rods, and more subways built than freeways, then talk to me again about patriotism.

**Question:** What part of the 250 billion dollars in windfall federal revenues will come from taxes on imported oil?

**Answer:** Zero percent. If the American government laid that kind of punitive tax on the Arabs, they would simply retaliate by raising the price to American purchasers by enough to offset the tax, and at the same time sell their oil cheaper in more friendly world markets; and tell me what that would do to the value of the dollar.

Two hundred and fifty billion dollars, and all from one tax on one American product! I can't help wondering how many wildcat wells that might have drilled and how much oil that might have discovered, or how you can suck that much money out of one American industry and not effect the whole national economy. Well, all of us should have been buying and hoarding gold all these years, but now how do you heard gasoline? Want a prediction? \$2.00 a gallon in August, 1981, and scarce.

# ASCS News

## BEEF REFERENDUM RESULTS

Sixty-two cattle producers register to vote in the Beef Referendum in Borden County.

Forty-six eligible ballots were received and canvassed by the ASCS Office Staff on Wednesday, February 27, 1980.

Twenty-five producers voted in favor of a Beef Research and Information Order with twenty-one producers voting against.

## COTTON PRODUCTION

Please make every effort to complete your ASCS-503, Producers Identification of Cotton Production, and return to this office by Friday, March 28, 1980. To date, records have been received on 85 farms with a total acreage of 14,529.9 harvested which will yield a county average of 502 lbs. per acre.

## NCA AND YIELD APPEALS

Notice of normal crop acreage (NCA) and yields will be mailed in the near future. If you wish to make an appeal for proving yields or increasing your NCA acreage it must be filed within 15 days from the date notices are mailed.

## SBA FARM DISASTER PROGRAM

Farmers and ranchers

who want information about the Small Business Administration disaster recovery program now have a toll-free telephone number they may call. The number is 1-800-692-4296 and the call is free from anywhere within the state of Texas. Again that toll-free number is 1-800-692-4296 for information on SBA farm disaster loans.

## RESOURCES CONSERVATION ACT (RCA)

The Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act of 1977 proposes some radical changes in the traditional soil water conservation programs. Documents providing information on the appraisal of current conservation efforts as well as the seven (7) alternative strategies in the RCA plan, which includes the possibility of tying future crop program benefits to various conservation programs, may be reviewed at the County ASCS Office.

The response period for comments on the proposed program ends March 28, 1980. It is imperative that interested persons file their comments prior to that time.

## SMALL GRAIN CROPS

At this time, there is no set-aside program for grain producers. There will not be a disaster program for 1980 unless present legislation is changed. However, in order to remain eligible under any program that might become available please contact this office before putting the acreage to any other use.

## NON-DISCRIMINATION

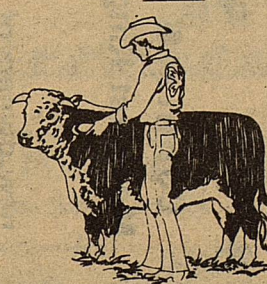
