

Britain in devaluating her currency in 1949, Pakistan did not do so, with the result that prices of Pakistan's exports in terms of the Indian rupee rose between 30 and 40 percent. Replying to this, Pakistan claims that her prices were still below those which India paid for Australian and Argentine grain. She also asserts that she now has a surplus of 350,000 tons of rice which India could purchase, and anticipates another surplus of 150,000 tons out of the coming wheat crop this May and June. Furthermore, charges Pakistan, India, in an effort to make herself "totally independent" of Pakistan's jute and cotton, has diverted some of her food-producing land to these crops. #

All in all, the problem may be considerably more complicated than Mr. Lippmann implies, particularly since Pakistan insists that any American gift of food to India would put our country's resources behind India's campaign to throttle tiny Pakistan's economy. If this claim is true, then a "humanitarian" gesture on our part toward In quite "unhumanitarian" gesture toward Pakistan!

Other voices have also entered the controversy. Some Americans claim that such a gift would seriously deplete our reserve stocks of grain. Others point to India's allocation of 50% of her budget to "defense," when the only "aggressor" Mr. Nehru professes to see in Asia-is Pakistan! Still others insist that India could trade the United States some much-needed manganese in exchange for grain. They recall that when the State Department suggested such a swap more than a year ago, Nehru was not interested.

Perhaps our first and foremost duty in this highly-controversial matter is a thorough "search for facts." If we use our heads as well as our hearts,-something our leaders have almost forgotten how to do,-we might come up with a three-way solution which would not only avert famine in India. but at the same time strengthen Pakistan's economy, and also bolster our own U.S. supply of strategic manganese.

It ought not to be too difficult for mature and moral men to combine both sense and sentiment for the benefit of all concerned!

Later the ADL published that William's was NOT a member of Military Intelligence. It seems that sometime between May 1947 and March 25, 1948, at which time the ADL issued its book, Williams did become a reserve officer in Military Inteligence so there seems little doubt that he was in that status when the ADL's book was published and Sabath made his statement attacking Williams. The ADL won the court decision and was upheld


